Boyle Urges Revamping Of State Taxes

No Need For Special Session Foreseen; French Avenue Pro- ject Starts Soon

Senator Lloyd F. Boyle said today that the failure of the Legislature to enact a tax bill at its recent session only serves to indicate the need for a complete revamping of Florida's tax structure although he added that he did not consider a sales tax advisable at this time and expressed the opinion that the Governor would not find it necessary to call a special session.

"There will be sufficient revenues to operate the state and provide for increased appropriations throughout the coming year," Senator Boyle stated, "and if any deficit occurs it will be some time in 1949 and by that time another Legislature will have been elected and another regular session will have the responsibility of providing funds."

Immediate revamping of French Avenue is in prospect, Senator Boyle stated, as he pointed out that a bill designating that thoroughfare as a State Road was successfully maneuvered through the Legislature. He quoted Chairman Elgin Bayless of the State Road Department to the effect that contracts for the improvement of this road at a cost of approximately \$50,000 will be let in July.

Although Senator Boyle opposed the bill to open the St. Johns River and Lake Okechobee to commercial fishing, he assented to a provision that the bill finally enacted is unconstitutional and will be decided by the Supreme Court. The State Game and Fish Commission is a constitutional body, he pointed out, and is vested with complete authority to control fishing in Florida's inland lakes and streams.

Rep. Smith Sees No Need In State For More Taxes

Representative M. B. (Tom) Smith, who left his home in good rest after his term in the Legislature at Tallahassee, today said that he was satisfied with the action of the Legislature in avoiding levy of new taxes.

"We didn't see fit to levy any new taxes as we knew we had enough to operate on without them," he declared. He pointed out that his opinion was based on a report of the House Finance and Tax Committee of which Percy Murray of Frostproof is chairman, and of which Representative J. Bentley Odham is a member.

Representative Smith trained the work of Mr. Odham in his first session at Tallahassee; also he pointed out favorable legislation obtained for Seminole County, including the designation of French Avenue as a state road; the appropriation for the Central Florida Employment Station, and extension of the City limits at the Municipal Airport.

He declared that he had voted for House Bill 318, which Governor Caldwell is reported intending to veto and which relates to reducing county shares in maintaining state tuberculosis sanatoria.

After the Legislature adjourned Rep. Odham motored to Pineville, La. for a visit with his wife and his father and mother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Tudor. He expects to return this week to Sanford, according to Mrs. H. B. Odham, his mother.

Japanese Surgeon Brought To Trial In Atrocity Court

U. S. Prisoners Were Injected With Bacteria At Truk Base

GUAMI, June 10, (AP)—A new "little Japanese" fleet surgeon charged with using American prisoners for inhuman medical experiments went on trial before a military commission today with 18 subordinates accused of spearing, strangling and beheading ten of their captives.

Frail, middle-aged Capt. Hiroshi Iwanami, who allegedly ordered prisoners injected with virulent bacteria on the sea bays of Truk, squirmed and licked his lips as the charges were read.

After this preliminary was completed, the commission recessed until June 24 to give Japanese defense counsel from Tokyo time to prepare their case.

The U. S. Army, which is conducting the trial, charges that bacterial injections killed four American prisoners. Experiments with tourniquets, took the lives of two men, the charges state, and two who survived were injected with moshine. When that did not kill them, they were strangled, the prosecution asserts.

Two other Americans allegedly were strung up like football dummies on Iwanami's orders. One of them was strangled with bamboo spears to test the value of spears as weapons while the other was bayoneted.

The Navy contends bodies were discarded near the hands buried and then sent to Japan for study. A persistent search in Japan has failed to locate the hands. The corpses buried on Truk, reportedly were dug up at the end of the war and hurried into the sea.

Three charges of murder and six of violation of the laws and customs of war describe the ten American victims as unidentified. All efforts to learn their names have been frustrated because the Japanese destroyed all records.

Lieut. Comdr. Joseph A. Regan of Brooklyn, prosecutor, told the tribunal that other Japanese were involved but that Navy investigators had been unable to learn their identity.

May Market Sales Total Over \$250,000

May sales at the Sanford State Farmer's Market were well over the quarter of a million mark, according to the report today released by the Market Manager.

Unit sales did not average as high as during May, 1946, when \$1,238 units brought \$138,203. However, the greater income was due to increased production, 173,650 units, which had a value of \$273,113.

The biggest money crop was celery at \$5.34 a crate which brought \$71,823 to the muckland celery growers. Peppers, at \$7.75 a bushel, brought the growers \$10,165. Green beans at a \$2.26 average totalled \$51,924. Cabbage held up well in price and averaged \$1.24 a 50 pound sack with a total of \$33,214. Oranges averaging \$2.78 brought \$34,455. Tomatoes were scarce but a \$2.26 totalled \$12,097. Cucumbers at \$4.19 average brought \$14,706.

Benanas led out of state products with the Cuban variety bringing \$3,013 and the South American, \$4,010 at 10-cent a pound.

Budget Group Aims To Block State Deficit

Commission Imposes Four-Way Check On Funds Of Federal Re- venue Departments

TALLAHASSEE, June 10, (AP)—Florida State Departments were instructed today to hold their budgets for the new fiscal year at recommendations of the Budget Commission, rather than the high appropriations granted by the Legislature.

Asking to forestall the general fund deficit, Governor Caldwell said the Legislature left in prospect by failure to levy new taxes, the Budget Commission imposed a four-way check on funds of agencies which are supported by general revenue.

Preparatory to reviewing the first of the budgets for the 1947-48 fiscal year which begins July 1, the cabinet board set out instructions to all agencies that:

1. All budgets shall be based on the Budget Commission's recommendations to the Legislature. This would mean the total 1947-48 year-outlay \$57,122,800, instead of the \$83,309,000 authorized by the Legislature.

2. Each budget shall not exceed 10 percent of the total of all agencies for the year.
3. Each budget year will be divided into four quarters, and no more than one-fourth of the amount released by the Budget Commission for the year may be spent or obligated within each quarter.
4. Contingent funds will not be budgeted or considered until the Budget Commission finds the funds are unavailable. That strikes out, temporarily at least, about \$5,500,000 in contingent funds the Legislature included in the general appropriations. Governor Caldwell already has said he will refuse to sign his name to checks on any of those funds.

Attorney General Tom Watson, who arrived at the meeting just in time to see the meeting adjourn, said he would support the Budget Commission's plan.

Ramadier To Call State Of Siege If Strike Continues

PARIS, June 10, (AP)—French leaders today urged workers to order the 700,000 striking workers of the socialized French railroads back to work, the deadlock remained complete.

PARIS, June 10, (AP)—Well-informed sources said today that Premier Paul Ramadier was ready to ask the National Assembly to vote a state of siege in France if parleys with railroad union officials fail to halt by this afternoon a five-day-old French rail strike.

Ramadier, flanked by his transport minister, Jules Moel, conferred throughout the morning with a delegation of union workers from the state-owned railroads, headed by Raymond Touraine, their secretary-general, who said the strike, for realignment of wages, in short order if it wanted to.

Ramadier has been insistent that the strikers go back to work before the government considers their demands.

There was no official confirmation for the state of siege, but the Premier has announced his intention of appearing before the Assembly some time today and asking it to vote a state of confidence.

No further progress was reported in halting the new strike of electricity and gas workers, thus far. There were predictions, however, that the lighting gas fuel strike might be extended tomorrow.

Representatives of the lighting union conferred with Robert Lacombe, industrial production minister, today.

Mississippi River Flood Waters Recede

HANNIBAL, Mo., June 10, (AP)—The swirling Mississippi River began receding slightly today along a flood-ravaged, 80-mile stretch in eastern Missouri and north central Illinois where the evacuation of an estimated 3,500 persons ran the number of homeless from high water in a four-state Midwest area to more than 22,000.

"The rather long crest" of the Mississippi rose slightly overnight but with a slight fall noted today rivermen and U. S. Army Engineers expressed belief that only further rains would aggravate the situation.

United States Of Europe Endorsed By Secretary Marshall

Pravda Attacks Americans Over Hungarian Issue

WASHINGTON, June 10, (AP)—Efforts in Congress to promote the idea of a "United States of Europe" won conditional approval of Secretary of State Marshall today, along with an endorsement by Winston Churchill.

Marshall is "deeply sympathetic towards the general objective," he wrote, "but we should make it clear that it is not our purpose to impose upon the peoples of Europe any particular form of political or economic association."

Churchill, wartime Prime Minister of Great Britain, radioed "I have been encouraged by the evidence of support for United Europe in America."

Both leaders addressed their comments to a resolution pending in the Senate and House Foreign Committee which would put Congress on record as favoring "the creation of a United States of Europe within the framework of the United Nations."

WASHINGTON, June 10, (AP)—Secretary of State Marshall has expressed general approval of a resolution to put Congress on record as favoring creation of a United States of Europe within the framework of the United Nations.

"Of course the United States wants a Europe which is not divided against itself, a Europe which is better than it realizes," Marshall said. "Only as we can insure that what we can expect more to do than make the great efforts which have been made it is to be avoided and civilization is to survive in Europe."

In 1930, according to government statistics, the national debt was a bit more than \$16,185,000,000. The war time debt of 1945 was \$259,115,000,000 and a little more. And the peace time debt of 1946 had risen to \$267,895,000,000. Forty-seven per cent of this appalling figure, or just under half, was "carried" or paid for by the taxes of the approximately 35 million people with incomes of \$5,000 or less. On an average, in this group, one day's wages out of every five went to the government. Those with incomes above \$5,000 paid the other 53 per cent. Of the largest income holders, some paid as much as 97 per cent of their total income in taxes.

It's wholesome, now and then, for people to sit down and review the tax figures. Winning a war is expensive in more than life. So is a peace program. Battle victory, peace victory, both come high.

Any patriotic American willingly pays his just share. But every American has the right to insist that his money is not wasted by his government. That is the essence of much of the present attitude toward tax schedules, both current and planned for the future.

Boston's Plight

Boston's city government may soon be run from a federal penitentiary. The United States Supreme Court has declined to review Mayor James M. Curley's conviction for using the mails to defraud. There seems to be no legal provision disqualifying a Boston mayor for crime, and Curley is not the man to give up a paying job just because he is in prison.

Whether Boston cares remains to be seen. "Our Fair City," a recent collection of accounts of city government today, thinks very little of Boston's public spirit. The most civic-minded people are said to have moved to the suburbs. Those who are left elect mayors such as Curley. He won four times, and at the last election had no rivals who could be called much better.

But what a come-down for one of the oldest and proudest of American cities!

Don't Worry—It May Not Happen!

When the great preacher, Dr. Lyman Beecher, then an old man, came to visit Professor Park at Andover, the afternoon talk turned to theology. Soon the two men were engaged in a violent dispute upon a series of subtle theological points. Park was a skillful master of the art of debate and Beecher simply a thoughtful and eloquent preacher. The argument did not end until well after midnight.

After they had parted, Professor Park's conscience began to trouble him. It said, "Here is your guest, an old man—and an honored friend whom you should have treated with affectionate reverence. Instead you have beaten him by your logic into insensibility, and sent him to bed in after humiliation. Your conduct is unworthy of a gentleman."

The Professor worried all night about it. He could not sleep and in the morning he crept downstairs in miserably low spirits. He took his place at the breakfast table to await in silence and shame the appearance of his guest.

Then the old preacher appeared and greeted his host: "Well, Park, how do you feel after the tremendous mauling I gave you last night?"

Professor Park had not made due allowance for the courage and character of his guest, and so he spent a sleepless night indulging in worthless anxiety. Imaginary worry is like that. It prejudices the case.

Explanation Given On Greek Guerrillas Papers Lottery Ban

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., June 10 (Special)—Newspapers are often taken to task because they do not publish stories about local drawings or the fact that John Jones won an automobile in a lottery, the Southern Newspaper Publishers Association declares. Organizations with commendable local projects often ask for publicity on some prize-winning event and are upset to learn that it is against postal rules and regulations to publish such facts.

Recently, E. C. Gorrell, publisher of the Palaski (Ind.) County Democrat, explained in his column "The Old Man At The Desk" the law and how it works. Excerpts from the column printed in the Indiana Publisher, follow: "The answer to the question about publishing prize-winning lotteries in a newspaper is provided by a single sentence in the postal regulations which says: 'No matter concerning a lottery or gift enterprise shall be deposited in or carried by the mails of the United States.' 'You could hardly write a sentence that would cover the whole subject in fewer words. It comes as near being bullet-proof as any regulation I know of, anywhere.' 'The rules go on to set out what constitutes lotteries or gift enterprises. They embrace any plan or scheme in which the element of chance is a part, it makes no difference how little the right to participate may cost. Tickets or numbers may even be given away. The beneficiary of the scheme may be a church or a club or charitable institution. If the winning depends upon what is often called luck, it's 'out' as far as the post office is concerned. 'Several persons are kept busy in Washington, I imagine, answering inquiries on the subject. For the regulations provide further that postmasters should not attempt to rule whether a proposed scheme is a lottery, but should refer the matter to one of the department heads.

"I know of several cases in which such letters have written to Washington. The reply is always the same, in effect: 'Your attention is called to section number so-and-so of the postal regulations, marked copy of which is enclosed.' The marked paragraphs are there, already mentioned. 'Strictly speaking, therefore, it is against the rules for a person to send a letter in which anything is said about a lottery or gift enterprise. Technically, it would be a violation for a Wisconsin woman to mail a letter to a friend in another town stating that a former schoolmate of theirs, Dorothy Ditts, is the wife of Dan Symol of Nashville who won an... 'But wait a minute. The penalty for such a violation is a fine in any sum up to a thousand dollars, to which may be added a year's imprisonment. I doubt if the penalty has ever been imposed upon the innocent writer of such a letter, but the same regulation has been used in the past to break up huge lottery schemes. If necessary serve me right, some wiser gentlemen than I have several years ago for using the mails to carry on their operations.

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Voters To Decide On 12 Proposed Changes In State Constitution

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., June 10 (AP)—An even dozen proposed changes in the Florida Constitution were submitted by the legislature to the voters for ratification or rejection in the November, 1948, general election.

Resolutions calling for nearly 20 constitutional amendments were introduced in the legislature, but only 12 won the necessary two-fifths vote of each house to obtain a place on the general election ballot.

If one of them is ratified, it would be possible for the next legislature to rewrite the entire Constitution by submission of only a few more amendments to statewide vote than now are proposed.

It would permit a constitutional amendment to revise entirely any one of the 20 articles of the Constitution and was designed to obtain a general revision of the 62-year-old basic law. At present an amendment can apply to only one of more than 200 sections and it would take that many separate ballot marks to bring about amendment.

The legislature also submitted to the voters a proposal to raise the pay of Senate and House members from \$6 a day to \$10 a day during the legislative session. It would permit counties to set up a permanent office for their members and provide them four paid trips between home and the capital during each session.

Another proposed amendment would allow retired circuit judges and supreme court justices to be called back to temporary active duty on the bench with their own pay at extra pay.

Only one of three amendments proposed by the Citizens Education Committee was legislative approval. It would permit counties to issue bonds for construction of schools and pledge for their payment of the money they will receive from the new state school fund.

The two rejected amendments which failed would have abolished county school districts and made it possible for the legislature, by statute, to provide for appointment, rather than election, of county school superintendents.

The legislature also approved a plan to use gasoline tax receipts for any purpose other than road building or aviation. At present one-seventh of the State tax goes to the general fund and schools.

There will be two more state senators in the voters' special session amendment creating a new senatorial district in extreme South Florida and one to match it in Northwest Florida. Monroe county would be given a senator to represent itself and Bay and Gulf counties would be created from Washington and Calhoun.

The other six proposed amendments involve only local affairs.

The city of Miami and Dade county governments would be merged into the renamed county of Miami under one.

Judges of the Escambia county court of record, only one of its kind in the state, would be elected to six year terms, rather than appointed, under another.

Four similar amendments would provide for consolidation of city and county tax assessment and collection functions in Pinellas, Volusia, Broward and St. Lucie counties.

Similar amendments previously have been ratified by the voters of Orange, Dade, Bay and Hillsborough counties. The legislature at this session rejected a proposal which would have permitted any county to consolidate its tax functions by statute.

Among the proposed constitutional changes which were defeated in the legislature, before it adjourned, were ones which would have permitted the legislature to reduce the voting age to 18 years, make ability to read a prerequisite to voting, abolished all ad valorem taxes in favor of a system of transactions, sales and use taxes, and one to set up a tax commission for the state supervision of local assessments.

schools. He also supported the co-educational bill making both state institutions of higher learning co-educational and changing the name of the Florida State College for Women to the Florida State University.

He especially commended the action of the Legislature for its efforts to improve health conditions in Florida and called attention to the passage of a bill doubling the State Health Fund and providing increased appropriations for tuberculosis treatment and care and to the blind.

Senator Boyle, who handled veterans legislation in the Senate, said he was successful in securing passage of all four bills sponsored by the various veterans organizations in Florida. These were:

1. A \$500,000 appropriation for the expansion of the State Service Commission for a two-year period.

2. Exemption from payment of state taxes on cigarettes given or sold to veterans in U. S. veterans hospitals.

3. Special treatment for veterans in all state and county and municipal employment.

4. Authorization for veterans of World War II under 21 years of age to make contracts under the Service Men's Readjustment Act of 1944.

A bill sponsored by Senator Boyle and enacted into law and known as the "Public Bookkeepers' Bill" makes bookkeeping a distinct occupation and was widely supported by small businessmen, Senator Boyle stated.

Other bills supported by Senator Boyle which became law were broader arresting powers and police immunity for the State Highway Patrol and the creation of the Everglades National Park.

Senator Boyle was a member of the State Committee on Constitutional amendments which considered over 70 proposed amendments. Twelve of these amendments were approved and will be voted upon by the people in the 1948 general election. Only five of these amendments, he said, are of a general nature.

As a member of the Senate Finance and Taxation Committee, Senator Boyle wrote the minority report which opposed the legalization of slot machines. Although the slot machine bill was approved by the majority on the committee, it finally died on the Senate calendar.

Senator Boyle commended the work of the House members of the Seminole County delegation and said that he received silent support and cooperation from Reps. Smith and Odham throughout the entire session.

economic association. The future organization of Europe must be determined by the peoples of Europe.

Marshall wrote Chairman Vandenberg (R-Mich) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, in response to a request for his views on the resolution sponsored by Senators Fulbright (D-Ark) and Thomas (D-Ill.). A similar resolution has been introduced in the House by Rep. Keogh (D-La.).

The Fulbright-Thomas-Boggs proposal, if adopted by the Senate and House, would constitute simply an expression of congressional opinion. Such a resolution would not go to President Truman for his signature and, consequently, would not have the force of law. So far, neither the Senate Foreign Relations nor the House Foreign Affairs Committees have taken any action toward sending the resolution to the floor.

Secretary Marshall also told the Senators it is "essential to the conduct our foreign relations" that the State Department have funds and freedom to make foreign language broadcasts and conduct a world-wide information program.

"As I have said before, one effective way to promote peace is to dispel misunderstanding, fear and ignorance," the Secretary of State said to the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee.
