'My Job Over,' McCanna Says Of His Resignation

The tax assessor's office was closed today, 48 hours after Assessor Richard McCanna and five of his employes handed in their resignations.

McCanna said today he had turned over the only set of keys to the office to Clerk of the Circuit Court David Gatchel.

"My resignation was effective as of Friday and as far as I'm concerned my job as tax assessor is over," McCanna said.

McCanna added that he felt that the office would not be busy this time of year anyway.

Attorney for the County Commission Mack Cleveland Jr, said that under Florida law, the Clerk of the Court could assume the duties of tax assessor until an interim assessor is appointed.

Gatchel declined to commont on the recent developments except to say that McCanna turned over the keys to the office late Friday afternoon.

Mrs. Mary Earle Walker who was elected assessor in the May 3 primary, was out of town today and could not be reached for comment. Mrs. Walker is expected to be out of town until the interest part of the week.

McCanna sent a telegram to Gov. Collins Friday submitting his resignation. He said in the telegram that "inasmuch as the desired goal of obtaining a lawful assessment level has been definitely achieved. I feel I would like to return to my private business practice.

Five of the nine employes of the office also resigned Friday.

At 2 p. m. today the governor's office reported that Collins was not expected to arrive back in Tallahassee until about 3 p. m. He was out of town when Mc-Canna's resignation was received by his office.

Gov. Collins had already taken under advisement a proposal that Mrs. Walker be reinstated in the office as soon as possible

That proposal was made last Wednesday by J. Brailey Odham, who sent a telegram to the governor asking the action because of the overwhelming vote she received in the primary and because "she has publicly committed herself to a posi-tion of full cash value assessments."

On the eve of West Virginia's Democratic presidential primary neither candidate was confident enough to relax. Both were starting soon after dawn on a strenuous schedule of vote hunding.

Humphrey, the 48 - year - old Minnesota senator, appeared to be a slight favorite over his 42-year-old rival from Massachusetts, although most observers were hedging their bets.

Gatchel Resigns Circuit Clerk Job; Mrs. Walker Be Reinstated As County Tax Assessor

While Seminole County awaited word on the possibility that Gov. LeRoy Collins might reinstate Mrs. Mary Earle Walker as tax assessor to fill that vacancy, David Gatchel resigned as Clerk of the Circuit Court.

Gatchel sent a letter to Collins resigning effective May 15 and asking that Arthur Beckwith Jr., winner of the clerk's job in the primary election, be appointed at that time.

Five minutes after Gatchel informed the County Commission he was resigning, the board authorized attorney Mack Cleveland Jr. to call on the governor's office for "immediate action" on naming an interim assessor and elerk.

Until he does, an aide said, McCanna is the tax assessor and must continue to serve.

McCanna, who left the keys to the office at the courthouse, said "my job as assessor is over" and returned Monday to his private business, leaving the office locked. It still was locked today.

The governor has been asked to appoint Mrs. Walker to the vacancy since she will take office next January anyway

In his letter to the governor, Gatchel said: "The voters of Seminole County decisively nominated Arthur H. Bookwith Jr. to serve as clerk. In view of this expression on the part of the voters, and the need for immediate establishment of policies and procedures in order to continue the efficient operation of the clerk's office, I feel that it would be in the best interesta f this county if I stepped aside so that you could apoint Mr. Bockwith in order that he could install his policies and procedures at the earliest date, rather than my implementing for the balance of the present term

plans which might be inconsistent with his. "The foregoing is particularily absolutely essential aince new and more modern equipment, which has been ordered for use in the clerk's office, is scheduled for delivery at an early date.

"In view of these facts, and recognizing the need for continuity of policy in this office, and because of the necessity of my devoting immediate attention to my per-sonal plans, I herewith submit my resignation as elect effective May 15.

The resignation came as a "shock" to the board and Chairman John Krider cited the importance of immediate action by the governor on the two appointments. "It won't be long now before we start work on a
