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Hurricane Warnings

With the hurricane season already here, although none has yet been reported, we have heard the opinion expressed that our warning systems should be abandoned so that the enemy would not know of the approach of a storm and might get caught in its disastrous winds.

We can see in the facts nothing to justify such an opinion and we believe that no such action will be taken. If it is, it would jeopardize the lives and properties of many of our citizens and would never cause any harm to our adversaries.

Of all the craft which are safe from the destructive force of a tropical storm the submarine stands in the forefront. Even when surfacing there is nothing aloft that could be seriously affected by hurricane winds. Being absolutely water-tight, the highest waves would roll off like water off a duck's back. There is no extensive superstructure to become damaged.

Besides, a submarine notoriously is a comfortable place on which to be when the winds howl and the waves crash. If the roll and pitch get too obnoxious, all the craft has to do is to submerge to depths where the effect of the elements above is non-existent.

Then, too, submarines operating off our coasts will be the first to know if there is a storm approaching. Most of our information about the course and intensity of hurricanes have in the past come from ships travelling the lanes where tropical storms brew, and since this is the very area where most of the Axis U-boats operate, we in Florida would certainly not be in a position to give the commanders of the undersea craft any advance information. They, undoubtedly would know all about the storms before we did.

If a hurricane should head towards Florida or any other part of the country, the sensible thing to do is to give as much advance notice as possible so that our citizens can make plans to protect their lives and property as has been the case in the past.

Against The Record

Even against the hideous background of war the story of 12 Florida convicts who saw fit to mutilate themselves as a protest against work conditions which they found unbearable, stands out as a black mark against the record not only of Florida but of this democracy.

The case is in the stage of investigation and so, in fairness to all, judgment must be held in abeyance. The governor has promised to get to the bottom of the trouble and the men who were in charge of the gang of convict workmen have been suspended pending a decision.

Yet one cannot help but deplore the fact that this state once again finds itself in the limelight over the matter of convict chain labor control.

The violent deeds of violent men are hard to evaluate, nor can one analyze the psychology of these 12 convicts as easily as one would that of men whose adult behavior has been more normal. Yet anyone who admits that for a dozen men of different temperaments and personalities to take the resolve of self-mutilation at one and the same time, indicates a desperation and a determination far beyond the usual.

Aside from the fact that such episodes as this often have repercussions that are almost limitless, it should be obvious that an anachronistic penal system has no place in the setup of an enlightened community. Florida's progress should be measured, not only by educational and economic reconstruction but by a dynamic program of reform in the matter of its prisons and its handling of criminals. —Daytona Beach News.

again retreated to new positions after being almost trapped in a Nazi encirclement attempt.

Besides the enormous casualties suffered at Voronezh, the Germans were said to have lost 150 tanks, 34 anti-tank and field guns and machine-guns, and hundreds of supply wagons.

The midnight communiqué did not disclose any significant changes in the fighting which extended to the Rukh area north-west of Moscow. But there also was no attempt to minimize the gravity of the situation. Instead Soviet commentators emphasized the peril and called upon the Allies to open a second front in the West.

Multiple threats were fast developing to highly important industrial, strategic and psychological objectives from the rim of the North Caucasian area to the Moscow front itself.

Swift military developments in the Don Valley, on the Don Valley, Stepan, and at Voronezh heightened the danger to Stalin-grad, the Volga communications system and the East Caucasian front from which Russia gets more than 80 percent of her oil.

(Some Axis reports implied that the German columns which placed the North Caucasian area south of Guboghar had crossed the Don to overrun Kansk, on the east bank of the river 20 miles southeast of Boguchar, and also had reached Migulinsk, on the west bank 10 more miles southeast. That would put the Germans 100 miles from Stalin-grad on the Volga.)

The Germans were throwing in vast numbers of tanks, planes and motorized units of infantry over the broad southern sector, being partly held up only in the Voronezh district of the Upper Don. Even there, a breakthrough made the situation very grave.

Florida Crops Are Improved By Rains

ORLANDO, July 15 (AP)—Most Florida crops, including new citrus, are forerunning to the result of favorable rains during June, the Federal Bureau of Agricultural Economics reported yesterday.

In the summary of crop conditions in July 15, 1942, the bureau said that the citrus crop was "very good" and that the cotton crop was "good."

The bureau also reported that the rice crop was "good" and that the sugarcane crop was "very good."

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Planes Shows Great Increase

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—Industry has increased its annual production rate 1,500 percent in the first 33 months of World War II, and is making this achievement felt with deadly effect throughout the world where American fighting men and their planes are steadily cutting down enemy aerial supremacy.

Impressive testimony of the industry's accomplishment is given by President Roosevelt's announcement that 4,000 warplanes were produced in May, and also by the important House Military Affairs Committee which, in a report on its investigation of the war program, cited many recent occasions when several types of planes have shown the superiority of American aircraft in combat.

Behind the announcement of the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce of America that the aircraft industry's annual production rate is up 1,500 percent in 33 months are figures which reflect the scope of the industry's victory in the battle of production.

In August, 1939, the last month before the outbreak of hostilities in Europe, only 250 warplanes were produced in the United States. The last announced production figure prior to Mr. Roosevelt's 4,000-a-month statement for September, 1941, when 1900 warplanes rolled off the aircraft industry's assembly lines. This was a 760 percent increase in 24 months. Yet in the next eight months, the industry more than doubled its monthly output. That was the industry's response to the President's request for an annual production of 50,000 airplanes which has been increased to 60,000 in 1942 and 125,000 in 1943.
