## Federal Grand Jury To Probe Orlando Bank On Ice Firm Deals

ORLANDO, Fla. (UPI) — Transactions between a bank and a company that made \$18 million selling ice-vending machines before declaring bankruptcy will be the focus of a federal grand jury investigation beginning today.

The Miami Herald reported that the grand jury will investigate business transactions between Polar Chips International Inc., based in Davie, and the Florida National Bank at Orlando. The bank financed hundreds of ice-machine purchases.

Before it filed Chapter 11 proceedings in U.S. Bankruptcy Court on May 29, Polar Chips, started by entrepreneur Walter Kellin, became a nationwide success story, amassing more than \$18 million. Investigators are searching through the company's jumbled records to find out how the successful operation fell apart.

Polar Chips sold coin-operated machines to investors, who in turn leased the machines back to Polar Chips. The company then placed the machines in

motels and hotels nationwide.

Attorneys in Miami, St. Petersburg, Orlando and Daytona Beach, representing more than 100 investors, have scheduled depositions in four lawsuits against executives of Polar Chips and Florida National Bank at Orlando. Those suits seek more than \$82 million in combined damages.

Kellin also faces investigations by the Securities and Exchange Commission and the Florida Comptroller's Office for possible violations of state and federal securities laws.

## Vice President Bush Says Lawyers Are Unfairly Criticized

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — Vice President George Bush, playing a popular theme, told the American Bar Association Monday that lawyers are unjustly "blamed for a whole Pandora's box of social ills."

In remarks prepared for the ABA's annual convention, Bush said too many Americans are unfairly critical of attorneys who represent suspected wrongdoers.

"Lawyers are blamed for a whole Pandora's box of social ills: for the endless proliferation of governmental rules and regulations... for a lot of things — for crime itself," he said.

But Bush decried people who he said seek protection from the Constitution, people "who would not themselves extend the benefit and grace of law to the wronged."

He said he was referring to the "ruthless killer who cleverly avails himself of (legal technicalities) and the turncoat who breaks the secrecy agreement he signed and reveals the names of intelligence officers."

Bush urged several thousand attorneys in the audience to resist the "voices raised demanding the tearing down" of governmental institutions that sometimes seem to protect the guilty and

harm the innocent.

Another administration figure, Attorney General William French Smith, arranged to address a luncheon at Monday's convention of 14,000 attorneys.

Supreme Court Justice Byron White spoke to the convention Sunday, and said some lawyers are deliberately dragging out cases so they can jack up their fees to excessive levels.

This financial reward for inefficient work, White said, is hurting efforts to ease overloaded court dockets suffering from an ever-souring number of lawsuits. He urged the legal profession to help remedy these "twin evils."

## No Reason To Consult European Allies On Neutron Bomb, Says Weinberger

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger said today there was "no particular reason" to consult with European allies on the administration's decision to produce and store neutron weapons in the United States.

"There is no plan to deploy the weapon or to do anything with it but to stockpile it within the continental United States or within the United States territories," Weinberger said on ABC's "Good Morning America."

"So there is no particular reason to consult anyone, any more than there would have been to consult on the production of 155mm conventional artillery bombs."

Deputy White House press secretary Larry Speakes, in confirming late Saturday that Reagan had decided to move ahead on building neutron weapons, at first said allies were consulted on Reagan's decision to move ahead on building neutron weapons. But

Speakes said Sunday the decision was leaked to the news media before allies could be notified.

President Carter shelved a 1977 plan to manufacture the neutron weapon following vocal overseas opposition. Reagan made the neutron weapon decision at a national security meeting in Washington last Thursday, shortly before leaving for California for a month-long vacation.

Perhaps because there is no plan for deployment, the immediate reaction from Europe was muted. The strongest denunciation came from the Soviet Union whose Tass news agency called the decision to go ahead with the neutron bomb an "extremely dangerous" threat to world peace.

Weinberger said the barbed Soviet response was a result of "fury at having their propaganda campaign not work. Their propaganda campaign has been enormously effective in trying to persuade a lot of people that this is a special

kind of weapon that preserves all kinds of buildings and just hurts people and is otherwise inhumane.

"Any kind of weapon that is effective in war unfortunately has to kill people," Weinberger said.

Weinberger added, "There's been... more nonsense written about this weapon than almost anything I've heard of. There's some sort of theory that it can go inside a building, work its way up to the fourth floor and kill somebody and come back out again without hurting the building. That's ridiculous. Bombs kill people. All bombs kill people."

But Weinberger said the neutron weapon "enables the infantry to work more closely behind — on a battlefield attack — on this kind of weapon that a weapon that irradiates miles and miles of territory at one time.

"It is not just usable in Europe, it's usable in any theater where there is the danger of our forces being overwhelmed by superior numbers," he said.

# Pentagon Seeking New GI Bill To Attract More Recruits

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Pentagon is seeking a new GI Bill that would attract recruits by giving educational benefits to young men who join combat units of the Army and the Marine Corps, a spokesman said Monday.

But spokesman John Becher said no decision has been made about whether to propose the plan to Congress next year because "we're still looking at options. We're working with the congressmen."

Lawrence Korb, the assistant secretary of defense for manpower, told The New York Times in an interview the proposal is designed to attract recruits into the Army and the Marine Corps

rather than the Navy or the Air Force, both of which provide high levels of technical training.

"If a youngster joins the Navy or the Air Force, he's going to get a lot of technical training, which is a marketable skill," Korb told The Times. "But if somebody joins a combat arms in the Army or the Marine Corps, unless you can send him back to school, he doesn't have a marketable skill."

Korb said everyone in military service "is going to get some educational benefits, but we want to give the best package to those who go where we need them most."

"What we want is a kid who wouldn't even have thought about the military to give us a couple of years in the combat arms," he said.

Although Korb has testified before Congress on plans to provide educational benefits to recruits, the interview gave the first indication of how far the Pentagon is willing to go in attracting manpower to fill the expanding needs of the armed forces.

The Pentagon seeks to expand the force by at least 200,000 men in the next five years as part of the Reagan administration's plans to "rearm America."

## Continuing Saga Of Howard Hughes' Estate Goes To Court

HOUSTON (UPI) — A battery of attorneys, representing various claimants to the fortunes of Howard Hughes, who died without a will, prepared to present their cases Monday before a probate judge in the continuing saga of efforts to determine who should inherit his millions.

The reclusive tycoon created a legal problem of monumental proportions when he died in April 1978 aboard an emergency medical flight from Mexico to Houston. He left a tangled estate, variously estimated at \$163 million to \$1.2 billion, no living parents, brothers or sisters and no will, wives or children.

The scramble for the estate began shortly after his death and has continued ever since. The latest hearing, opening today before Probate Judge Pat Gregory, was to consider some of the stronger claims to the estate, those made through Hughes' mother.

The lawyers will speak on behalf of 15 maternal claimants and the estates of three other maternal claimants who died after Hughes' death.

Ted Dinkins, the court-appointed attorney protecting the interest of unknown claimants, said the lawyers will present testimony, birth certificates, wedding and divorce records, wills and other documents to validate the claims.

Gregory simplified matters Friday by dismissing 35 maternal claimants that all the lawyers agreed had made invalid

claims.

In the first phase of the proceedings two years ago, a jury in Gregory's court declared Hughes a Texas resident for estate and tax purposes. Gregory's job now is to determine who the heirs are.

Earlier this summer, Gregory decided Hughes left behind no wives or children. The maternal issue is a part of that process. Another phase to come up on Aug. 24 is the most complicated — to determine the paternal heirs or relatives on the father's side of Hughes' family.

Gregory's court will sort through the claims of an estimated 500 to 800 persons who claim lineage through Hughes' father's family.

Although Gregory two years ago declared Hughes a Texan, his rulings are certain to be appealed and other Hughes estate litigation is pending in federal court and in California, Nevada and Delaware.

Whoever divides the estate must stand in line behind the tax collectors. The federal government imposes a 77 percent tax, allowing up to a 16 percent credit for the tax of whichever state ends up winning Hughes as a legal resident.

Hughes was born in Houston and, lawyers say, maintained his Texas residence. California claims Hughes established legal residence there. Estate lawyers have suggested Hughes really was a resident of Nevada — which has no estate tax.

## More Negligence Charges Filed Over Condominium Collapse

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — The state has filed a new set of negligence charges against one of the structural engineers involved with the collapsed Harbour Cay condominium in Cocoa Beach.

The new allegations filed Monday against engineer Harold Meeler of Merritt Island stem from his work on the Ocean Sands condominium project in Indian Shores in Brevard County.

The Department of Professional Regulation accused Meeler of "negligence, incompetence and misconduct" in the Ocean Sands project,

which consists of two eight-story buildings, each with 30 units.

Similar charges were lodged earlier against Meeler in connection with the Harbour Cay condominium, which collapsed March 27, killing 11 persons and injuring 23 others.

The new charges accuse Meeler of making "deficient" designs and "errors" in computations while working on the Indian Shores project.

The agency said work was halted on the project at the second-floor level when the alleged design problems were discovered and another structural

engineer was hired.

The state also said Meeler failed to inspect the work on Ocean Sands and "failed to utilize due care in performing an engineering capacity or failed to have due regard for acceptable standards of engineering principles."

Meeler, who is contesting the Harbour Cay charges, has 20 days in which to accept or challenge the new allegations. If he contests them, the matter will go before an administrative hearing officer who will recommend whether he should retain his state license.

## Parents Won't Allow Surgery, Child Taken

SAN JOSE, Calif. (UPI) — A Superior Court Judge has taken a retarded 14-year-old boy with a life-threatening congenital heart defect away from his parents because they refused to let him have corrective surgery.

Judge William J. Fernandez ruled Friday that the custody of Phillip Becker should be awarded to a couple who befriended the boy while he was in a nursing home.

Becker, who suffers from Down's Syndrome and has a hole in the wall of his heart, needs surgery to extend his life span. Doctors said without the surgery, he will not live much beyond 30.

His natural parents, Warren and Patricia Becker of Los Altos, Calif., fought a state order requiring that they seek a medical cure for Phillip. The Beckers said their refusal to let Phillip have the operation was made in the fear he would outlive them.

In awarding custody of Phillip to Herbert and Patsy Heath, Fernandez ruled that the issue in the 12-day trial was not surgery instead it was a matter of "whether he will have a life worth living."

The ruling will allow physicians to determine by catheterization whether surgery is still desirable on Phillip's heart. During the trial, doctors testified Phillip may be too old for surgery.

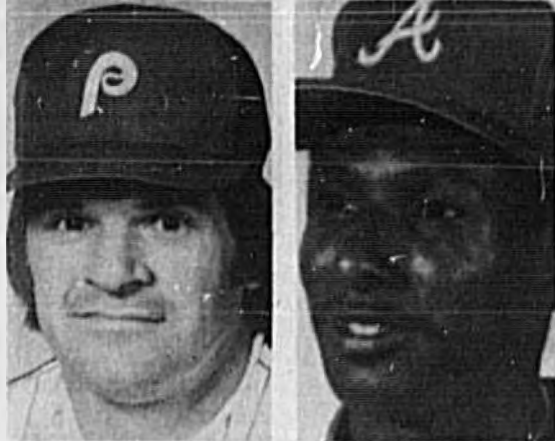

Pesky Pete Tops Musial Hit Mark

Now that Pete Rose's immortality is official, the Philadelphia Phillies can get back to the business of winning baseball games.

So said the man who eclipsed Stan Musial's National League career hit record of 3,630 when he lined Mark Littell's 0-1 pitch to right field in the eighth inning of Monday night's 7-3 loss to the St. Louis Cardinals.

"In a way I'm glad I got the hit tonight," Rose said. "The team got caught up in it, waiting and hoping I'd get the hit, and it may have taken their minds off the game."

Rose touched off a prolonged standing ovation by the Veterans Stadium crowd of 60,561. Fireworks went off and his teammates and 12-year-old son, Petey, rushed to congratulate him. Musial himself also joined the on-field celebration. In addition, 3,631 balloons were loosed on the field after the hit and President Reagan telephoned his congratulations.

Littell said Rose hit an inside fastball to break the record. "I felt like it was a good pitch but of course he's a great hitter," Littell said. "I gave him my best shot. I think it's the first hit he ever got off me."

# NATION IN BRIEF

## Court Rules Egging Is Not Protected By Constitution

DENVER (UPI) — Tossing raw eggs at a presidential candidate is not constitutionally protected as freedom of speech, a federal appeals court ruled.

The 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, in a decision filed Monday, let stand the assault conviction of a Communist Workers Party member who hurled eggs at former presidential candidate John Anderson while calling him "the bringer of the third world war."

The court declared Jose Calderon was guilty of assault for tossing the eggs at the National Governors Conference in Denver last year.

Calderon had argued throwing the eggs, coupled with the political statement made at that time, amounted to an act of symbolic speech protected by the 1st Amendment. The appellate court said Calderon was not accused of a criminal act because of his speech but because he hurled the eggs.

"Even if it was meant only to punctuate the communication of a protest, hurling missiles at a speaker is not under any circumstances worthy of inclusion under the protection afforded symbolic speech," the court said.

## Banker Emerges From Hiding

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Former banker L. Ben Lewis has emerged from six months of hiding and pleaded guilty to charges he helped in the \$21 million Wells Fargo embezzlement scheme, believed to be the largest fraud in U.S. banking history.

As part of a plea-bargain arrangement, Lewis agreed to appear as the prosecution's star witness against boxing promoter Ross Fields, better known as Harold J. Smith, and another one-time Wells Fargo officer, Sammie Marshall.

Lewis, Fields and Marshall were indicted by a federal grand jury last month for allegedly engineering the embezzlement scheme.

# FLORIDA IN BRIEF

## Search Resumed For Woman Attacked By Shark

ORMOND BEACH, Fla. (UPI) — The Coast Guard resumed searching today for a 19-year-old woman left for dead by three friends who said she was attacked by a shark while swimming ashore from a capsize sailboat.

Three Coast Guard cutters and two helicopters were searching the waters off Ormond Beach for Christy Wapniarski, 19, missing since Monday.

The Coast Guard said the drama began Sunday when two young Daytona Beach couples went out for an early evening sail aboard a 18-foot catamaran.

By 8 p.m., officials said a storm had turned the calm sea into a tempest, capsizing the boat about six miles off Ormond Beach. The four — Daniel Ferrin, Tanara Emma, Randall Cohen and Miss Wapniarski — had failed to take along life jackets.

After spending a perilous night clinging to a sinking pontoon without life jackets, authorities said they made a dangerous decision — they would try to swim ashore at dawn Monday. Miss Wapniarski never made it.

"They should never have left the boat, even if it was leaking," said Coast Guard spokesman James Williamson. "We found the boat immediately."

## Hard Times Predicted

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (UPI) — Sen. Ted Kennedy has predicted President Reagan's economic program "will leave most Americans worse off in 1982 than they were in 1981."

The Massachusetts Democrat compared the administration's prescription for the nation's ailing economy to "a tree ripe with the richest plums for the wealthiest individuals and corporations, but it yields only bitter fruit for the workers in the middle class."

## Abortion Issue On Tap For Reagan After Vacation

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (UPI) — With his economic recovery program on track, President Reagan plans to make his position "loud and clear" on social issues — particularly abortion — when he returns to Washington next month, a spokesman said.

Deputy press secretary Larry Speakes told reporters "the No. 1 priority on the front burner" will be to bolster the Social Security system.

But he also noted there are a number of social issues pending in Congress, such as busing, prayer in school and abortion, which will be on the congressional agenda in the coming months.

"We will give a loud and clear signal," Speakes said Monday when asked for Reagan's position on abortion. He also stressed the president is prepared to meet the issues of school prayer and busing before the end of the year.

As for the touchy problem of restoring the solvency of the Social Security system, Speakes ruled out any dipping into the general Treasury fund or increasing Social Security taxes to put the system on a better financial footing.

"We do not want to raise taxes on Social Security just after we've fought the battle to cut taxes," he said.

Reagan was expected to sign the fiscal 1982 budget bill and the 33-month 25 percent tax cut measure in a ceremony at Rancho del Cielo, probably on Thursday.

He has been vacationing at the ranch for the past five days and has not been seen in public.

## Coca-Cola To Funnel Millions To Blacks

ATLANTA (UPI) — Coca-Cola Co. executives agreed Monday to funnel more than \$30 million into black businesses and communities and, in return, Operation PUSH promised to end its short-lived boycott of Coke products.

The Rev. Jesse Jackson, founder of PUSH, called the plan "moral covenant" ... "symbolic of an underlying new direction for American business under the new federal philosophy of shifting responsibilities for many economic programs from the public to the private sector."

The Coke agreement calls for a \$1.8 million fund to provide loans for potential black investors, the establishment of 22 black-owned distributorships, the doubling of advertising in black-owned media and increased banking activity in minority banks.

Jackson promised an end to his group's "national withdrawal of enthusiasm campaign."

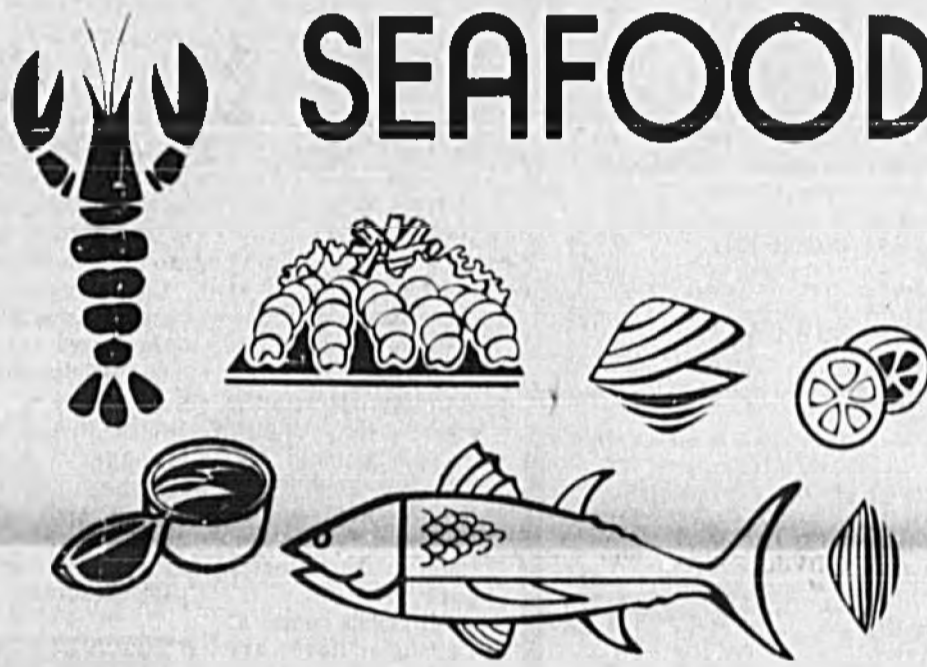

## Weak Vaginal Wall Leads To Rupture

DEAR DR. LAMB — Just recently I was told I have a rectocele. This is a small protrusion in the vaginal area.

Is this very rare? I am a little on the stout side. Is sex permissible with this? I am a married woman with several children and I am ashamed to ask my doctor.

DEAR READER — Your question is a natural one to ask your doctor. It's unfortunate that you feel embarrassment discussing this with him. He would be surprised if you were not having sex.

A rectocele is a rupture. The vaginal canal is a muscular tube and there is a muscular wall between the vagina and the rectum. Mostly through the stretching effects of childbirth, this muscular wall is stretched and weakened. In the course of time this allows the muscle fibers to separate and the rectal tube to rupture through the weakened wall.

Like other similar ruptures, it is intermittent. When you are lying down the abdominal contents fall back against the spine. When you stand or sit up they press down against your pelvis. So the hernia tends to occur when you are sitting or standing and not when you are lying down as in bed. Sex should be no problem.

The hernia will pop out also when you increase the intra-abdominal pressure as in straining. That is why poor bowel habits increase the chances of the hernia occurring.

A prolapsed uterus and a cystocele are also hernias caused by a weakened vaginal wall. When they are mild they don't cause any serious problem. But if they cause a lot of protrusion or symptoms, it is often necessary to surgically repair the weakened wall and other structures. No, none of these is a rare condition.

DEAR DR. LAMB — I have a real problem. I am only 5 feet 5 and I'm 18 years old. I would give anything to be about 6 feet 2. I'm praying to God every night to make me taller. There must be some kind of operation or drug that could help. It's really terrible because all the girls are taller than I. I'm always insecure when I go out. I don't think I could go through life this short. Don't suggest counseling because I have already gone through that. It helped for a while but now I am in the same boat.

DEAR READER — X-rays that show your bone age help in determining if there is still any chance of increased growth. Once the zone of cartilage at the ends of the leg bones have calcified, growth stops.

Despite your comments, I am going to advise counseling. You are not nearly as short as many others and as you know, there are many girls who are 5 feet 5 or shorter. Your reaction to being short is extreme and out of proportion to the degree of your problem. I do wish there were a way to increase your growth but at your age it is unlikely. Even if it were possible, most physicians would not be inclined to tamper with things in someone who has attained as much height as you have.

The contract is a sound, normal three no trump which can be reached after any number of reasonable bidding sequences.

The deuce of clubs is opened. East's jack forces your king and if you are the normal type of player you lay down your ace of diamonds and proceed with the suit until East takes his jack.

East leads the seven of clubs. Your nine or 10 loses to the queen. A spade is led to East's ace and two more club tricks leave you one trick short of your contract.

Now watch Pete at work. He notes that diamonds don't have to break so at trick two he leads a spade to dummy's king. East takes his ace and leads that same seven of clubs.

West wins and leads a second spade. Pete wins in dummy, leads a low diamond and finesses his 10, and Pete makes four no trump. Suppose that West held the jack of diamonds. Pete would make only three no trump while other players would be making four.
