SHA Board Vacancy Must Wait

The Sanford Housing Authority board of directors will have to meet at least one more time as only a four-member body.

Sanford City Commissioners Monday night tabled for the second meeting in a row consideration of an appointment to round out that board to its full five

Commissioner David Farr said the problem is few citizens are willing to serve on the authority.

"We are having difficulty finding qualified citizens willing and able to devote the time to serve on the housing authority," Farr said. "Those I've talked to feel it involves a lot of hazale and

Others seeking the post, he said, may not be qualified. The ideal appointee, he added, should represent not only the tenants and public housing, but the entire

The commissioners made no mention of the resume sent to them by Mrs. Ruthia Hester, vice chairperson of the Seminole Employment Economic Development Corp. (SEEDCO) and a housing specialist for Seminole Community Action, Mrs. Hester is seeking the appointment.

Farr pledged he will concentrate his efforts prior to the Aug. 24 city commission meeting on seeking out an appropriate person for the appointment.

Meanwhile, the Sanford Housing Authority board has a meeting scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Thursday at Redding Gardens. One of the authority board members, Eliza Pringle, at a special meeting last week, said harmony is needed on the board and to work toward

that end a full board is needed She said a new member might have

new ideas to contribute. The housing authority board is currently seeking applications for a new executive director. Salary for the post is negotiable in the \$20,000 to \$30,000 range. So far, 59 applications have been received. Twelve of them since executive director Lewis Cox resigned in July.

The other applications were received by the authority as the result of an advertising campaign early this year while Cox was interim director following the firing of Thomas Wilson III who served eight years. Con's appointment was later made permanent.

The housing board last week decided to again advertise nationally for applicants.

The advertisement early this year was general in tone, according to Ms. Linda Williams, the authority's director of management The new advertisement is more specific, she said. It is to be placed not only in local newspapers, but also in a National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials (NARO) publications.

Mrs. Williams said it is patterned on other advertisements which have appeared in the NARO publication.

It notes the executive director will be responsible for the administration of all phases of Sanford public housing including planning, fiscal management, supervision, coordination of 480 conventional units and will implement policies adopted by a five-member Sanford Housing Authority. The ad says the applicant must have management experience, a familiarity with government regulations and be able to obtain a public housing management certificate within one year.

The public housing management certificate can be obtained from NARO and other agencies after training, testing and candidate review, Ms. Williams said.

The SHA board of directors Thursday will consider whether to name Ms. Williams interim executive director while a permanent director is being

Canada Cites Near Misses

Flights From Europe Curtailed

LONDON (UPI) - The summer swarm of tourist-clogged jetliners from Europe to the United States was reduced to only four flights per hour today because of a boycott of U.S.bound flights by Canadian air controllers who warned of "severely jeopardized safety."

William Robertson, Canadian Air Traffic Controllers Association president, told NBC's Today show today he got a telegram from Transport Canada early this morning confirming that 26 of the first 28 alleged in-flight incidents reported by the union had occurred.

"In the last six days that preceded Monday, our members had experienced or reported 43 of what we

call in-flight incidents in or at the air space surrounding the Canadian border," he said.

"Nine of those, at least nine of those, were of a critical nature requiring evasive action by one or more aircraft to avoid collision."

Meanwhile, airlines across Europe were given an average of five hours notice of when each would be able to claim one of the quarter-hourly takeoff slots. The delays were creating airport chaos and disappointment for travelers.

At London's Heathrow Airport, British Airways - the biggest user of Europe's busiest airport - put out a sign warning "it is impossible to predict departure times" and stopped

check-ins for U.S. and Canadian flights.

A spokesman for Britain's Civil Aviation Authority said trans-Atlantic traffic, which averages 450 flights every 24 hours, was severely affected by the Canadian action.

"The only track open is one (of four) on this west-bound route and only four per hour are being allowed into this track," spokesman Derek Tornlin said. "The way we are trying to make this a fair system is we're allocating one flight slot to each operator who operates from Europe to the United

Longwood Raises Water, Sewer Rates

Longwood City Commissioners Monday night gave tentative approval to increased water and sewer rates, but indications are that the higher fees may be in for some rough sailing at a public

hearing set for Aug. 24. The commission unanimously passed an ordinance raising sewer rates from \$7.50 to \$9 a month, but commissioners Steven Uskert and June Lormann objected to the increase as too high and promised to argue against it at the public

"Everything seems to be going up," Uskert said. "People are paying a lot. I don't think we need to go to \$9."

City Administrator David Chacey however, said even the 19-per-month figure is not adequate. "The proposed \$9 charge would generate roughly \$44,000 next year," Chacey said. "We've already figured the cost of operating the sewage plant at around \$46,000. So, if we go with the \$9 figure we're actually going to be operating at a \$2,000 loss," he said. "The city will have to absorb that."

That idea wasn't to Mayor John Hepp's liking. "The city is not in the business of making a profit, but we at least have to keep our heads above water," Hepp said. "If you can show me the magic formula for stopping things from going up, I'll jump on the bandwagon, But until then, I say we have to charge at least a breakeven rate."

While the commission was on the subject of sewage. Chacey took the opportunity to reveal what he called the "white water plan" which could save some homeowners money and case demand on the city's sewage treatment

The plan calls for new homes to have a drain field in their yards into which waste water from everything but tollets and garbage disposals would be pumped. "The water would flow into the drain field and then seep down into the ground and eventually wind up as pure water in the aquiler," Chacey said.

"If everyone in Longwood went on this plan right now I could operate the sewer plant for half of what it takes now," he said. "And we could pass our savings on to the homeowners who go with the plan in the form of lower sewer rates."

After hearing Chacey's presentation. commissioners gave Chacey a tentative OK to try and convince local homebuilders to adopt the "white water

plan" in new developments. Next up for discussion was proposed water rate hike, and while the vote for approval was 41, opinion was again sharply divided. The commission had earlier agreed in workshop to charge a base rate of \$4 per 4,000 gallons of water used, plus 80-80 cents - depending on usage - for each additional 1,000 gallons consumed. The present fee schedule is \$4 for the first 5,000 gallons of water, and 50

cents for each 1,000 gailons thereafter. After debate, commissioners decided to keep the new base rate, and charge only 80 cents per 1,000 gallons for anything over the initial 4,000 gallons.

Arguing against raising fees past the 60-cent mark, Hepp noted that under the proposed plan, the heaviest increases would be shouldered by large water users, "and I don't want to crucify a man just because he's in business."

Commissioner Tim O'Leary contended the increased fees would encourage

conservation, but Hepp asked, "Is the difference between 60 and 60 cents really going to make a difference?"

"I think it will," O'Leary said. "If we don't go with the higher fee scale I know what's going to happen: Next May or June we could have another drought. There won't be any water and the people will forget about the shortage," he said. "We'll have to adopt a get-tough policy real quick."

"So what," Heppp retorted, "If there's a drought next year, we'll deal with it

O'Leary and commissioner Russell Grant reluctantly went along with the 60cent cap, but Uskert said he could not vote for the lower rate because he felt it did not do enough to discourage wasteful water usage.

In other action, the commission effectively told the state to take its search for a site for its crime laboratory

elsewhere. Longwood doesn't want it. The Plorida Department of Law Enforcement is considering several sites in Seminole and Volusia counties on which to relocate the crime lab which has outgrown its quarters at the Sanford

Airport. Chacey said if the city leased two acres of city-owned property on Longwood-Lake Mary Road to the state for a lab site, the value of two additional acres of contiguous city property would be

French Were Treated Well In Iran But Glad To Be Home

PARIS (UPI) — The first group of 117 French citizens evacuated from Iran hugged their relatives in a joyous reunion and said they were not treated "like the American hostages" despite Iran's decision to hold up their departure for five days.

Looking weary but calm, the 57 French citizens flew into Paris in an ordinary Iran Air passenger jet Monday - days after their departure was blocked while the Iranians supposedly checked to see if they were leaving any debts. Another 60 French citizens are alated to loave Iran Wednesday.
"We were absolutely not treated like the American

hostages," said one woman passenger after she and her husband hugged and kissed.

The French were ordered home by President Francois Mitterrand, apparently to avoid another hostage seizure after Iran reacted sharply to France's giving political asylum to ousted Iranian President Abdolhassan Bani-Sadr.

Ayatollah Is Not Worried

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini dismissed the wave of political assassinations and bombings sweeping Iran as "nothing" and labeled exiled leaders plotting to

overthrow his Islamic regime "a bankrupt busich."

The ailing, 81-year-old leader made the remarks Monday as 57 French nationals flew home, fearing reprisals after France granted political asylum to deposed President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr, who has vowed to oust Khomeini.

Para news agency said Monday 14 more rebels were executed at Tehran's Evin Prison, raising to 455 the number of people put to death by the hard-line fundamentalist regime since Khomeini fired Bani-Sadr in

The news agency said the 14 executed Sunday included "six coup plotters, four monarchists, three active members of the Mojahideen Khalq and one

Canadian Postal Strike Ends

OTTAWA (UPI) - The Canadian post office resumed operations today, hours after mail sorters voted overwhelmingly to end a 42-day strike that forced thousands of businesses to close.

Workers voted E3.1 percent in favor of a two-year package that will boost average annual incomes to \$25,000 (more than \$20,000 in U.S. funds). The work stoppage tied the record 42-day strike in 1975.

About 5,700 of the 23,000 inside postal workers reported for the midnight shift to start sorting a backlog of mail but it will take several days before there is full delivery.

Postal officials asked large volume mailers, including banks, department stores and credit card companies to slowly phase in the expected deluge of

More Medflys, More Spraying

Agriculture officials in Florida and California today stepped up their Mediterranean fruit fly eradication programs because of recent discoveries of the crop-killing pest. More malathion spraying was expected to protect the San Joaquin Valley - California's prime agriculture region

Florida officials today hoped to begin spraying malathion over a 16-squaremile area of Tampa where four Mediterranean fruit flies have been found. The spraying was to have started Monday but was delayed because of mechanical problems with the spray helicopter,

Federal teams set up more traps today in Livermore, Calif., where a male fruit fly was found last week.

Richard Steffen, part of the anti-Medfly team, said the find was "a little more serious" because it indicated the pest might be moving toward the agriculturally important San Joaquin Valley about 20 miles away.

Directors of California's eradication program said they were almost certain aerial malathion spraying would be

required in the Livermore area. Los Angeles County officials Monday announced Southern California also has a

crop threat - Oriental fruit flies. County Agricultural Commissioner Paul Engler said he expected swift control of the pest through pesticides, but added the Oriental fly's threat to California agriculture was second only to the notorious Medfly infestation in the north.

In the Santa Cruz mountains near the Northern California coast, a female fly carrying eggs was found near Boulder Creek and a 412-mile quarantine zone around the find was ordered by state and federal officials.

"At the moment, we don't consider that an infestation," Steffen said. "The fly could have been a carry-in. It was found in a trap with five other sterile flies." The fourth aerial application of

malathion over Santa Clara and San Mateo counties resumed Monday, with more spraying today. The spray area will be expanded Wednesday south to Gilroy in Santa Clara County. The Tamps spray area was exhanded

from 9 miles to 16 with the discovery of a fourth fly. The location of the first flies was not far from Interstate 4, prompting officials to speculate a piece of spoiled fruit containing Medfly larvae may have been pitched out of a car window.

"It wouldn't surprise me at all to continue to find flies in the area," said state Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Conner, "We may be closer to the core (of the infestation) with the second find than we were with the first."

Charles Poucher, head of the state's pest control project, said last week tests indicate that for each fly trapped, there is a possibility of 10,000 to 15,000 others being in the area.

In Georgia, agriculture officials set insect trape at stops along Interstate 75 to detect any flies that might be taken into that state from Florida.

'If we have any (flies) coming into the state, it will probably be with tourists, possibly on fruit that comes out of the area in Florida where the flies turned up," said Jim Bridges, assistant commissioner for the markets division of the Georgia Department of Agriculture.

17-Year-Old To Be Tried As An Adult

Legally, 17-year-old-Jerome A. Jowais is a child. But he is: accused of a man-sized crime—plowing his automobile into a group of five young girls, killing one—and he could pay an adult's price for his fatal mistake.

Seminole Juvenile Court Judge Vernon Mize Jr. Monday transferred Jowais' case from juvenile court to "adult" circuit court where the boy faces the possibility of up to 15 years in prison if convicted on a charge of manulaughter.

Jowais, of 1561 Kenlyn Drive, Forest City, is accused of being drunk around 1:20 a.m. on May 16 when he allegedly drove his 1974 Plymouth into a group of girls who were walking along Wekiva Springs Road just north of Altamonte Springs on their way from a slumber party to a convenience store.

One girl - Laurie Anne Hebel, 13 of 101 Shadow Lake Drive, Longwood - was killed in the crash. Her sister, 10-year-old Mary Anne Hebel, was critically hurt with pelvic, clavicle, and

Another sister, Susan Anne Hebel, 15, along with two other girls - Jerri Fockler, 14, of 330 Heather Ave., and Judy Smerlish, 13, of 315 Heather Ave. - were treated at Florida Hospital-Altamonte and released.

In agreeing to transfer the case to circuit court, Mize said he was "particularly concerned with the seriousness of the alleged offense," noting that the crime was committed "in a violent manner against several persons resulting in the death of one individual and injuries to other parties."

Mize said he also took into account that Jowais has been arrested before - June 5, 1969 on a charge of disorderly intoxication - involving the abuse of alcohol.

If Jowais is convicted, the court's criminal division could

retain jurisdiction for a longer period of time because jurisdiction of the child if retained in the juvenile division would terminate upon the child attaining his 19th birthday" which will be one year from today, Mize said. No trial date has been set in the case. Jowais has expressed "extreme remorse" over the incident,

according to court records. In a statement given to a Florida Health and Rehabilitative Services investigator, Jowais said, "I've hurt others. I've learned in a very hard way that I cannot drink and drive. I realize that I get into trouble when I drink, and I don't get into trouble when I don't drink.

"This incident has changed my life. I will never be the same. Hopefully, I'm moving in the direction of becoming a better person. I'm just sorry that something this terrible happened."

It shouldn't have happened at all, according to Mrs. Ralph Fockler, one of the injured girls' mother. The girls "weren't supposed to be out that time of night," she said. "They were supposed to be in at dark. But they had gone out late before. It's just one of those things."

"If a youngster joins the Navy or the Air Force, he's going to get a lot of technical training, which is a marketable skill," Korb told The Times. "But If somebody joins a combat arms in the Army or the Marine Corps, unless you can send him back to school, he doesn't have a marketable skill."

Korb said everyone in military service "is going to get some educational benefits, but we want to give the best package to those who go where we need

even have thought about the military to give us a couple of years in the combat arms," he said.

Although Korb has testified before Congress on plans to provide educational benefits at recruits, the interview gave the first indication of how far the Pentagon is willing to go in attracting manpower to fill the expanding needs of the armed forces.

Continuing Saga Of Howard **Hughes' Estate Goes To Court**

HOUSTON (UPI) — A battery of attorneys, representing various claimants to the fortunes of Howard Hughes, who died without a will, prepared to present their cases Monday before a probate judge in the continuing saga of efforts to determine who should inherit his millions.

The recluse tycoon created a legal problem of monumental proportions when he died in April 1978 aboard an emergency medical flight from Mexico to Houston. He left a tangled estate, variously estimated at \$163 million to \$1.2 billion, no living parents, brothers or sisters and no will, wives or

The scramble for the estate began shortly after his death and has continued ever since. The latest hearing, opening today before Probate Judge Pat Gregory, was to consider some of the stronger claims to the estate, those made through Hughes'

The lawyers will speak on behalf of 15 maternal claimants and the estates of three other maternal claimants who died after Hughes' death.

Ted Dinkins, the court-appointed attorney protecting the interest of unknown claimants, said the lawyers will present testimony, birth certificates, wedding and divorce records, wills and other documents to validate the claims.

Gregory simplified matters Friday by dismissing 35 maternal claimants that all the lawyers agreed had made invalid

In the first phase of the proceedings two years ago, a jury in Gregory's court declared Hughes a Texas resident for estate and tax purposes. Gregory's job now is to determine who the

Earlier this summer, Gregory decided Hughes left behind no wives or children. The maternal issue is a part of that process. Another phase to come up on Aug. 24 is the most complicated - to determine the paternal heirs or relatives on the father's side of Huches' family

Gregory's court will sort through the claims of an estimated 500 to 800 persons who claim lineage through Hughes' father's

Although Gregory two years ago declared Hughes a Texan, his rulings are certain to be appealed and other Hughes estate litigation is pending in federal court and in California, Nevada and Delaware

Whoever divides the estate must stand in line behind the tax collectors. The federal government imposes a 77 percent tax, allowing up to a 16 percent credit for the tax of whichever state ends up winning Hughes as a legal resident.

Hughes was born in Houston and, lawyers say, maintained his Texas residence. California claims Hughes established legal residence there. Estate lawyers have suggested Hughes

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The First **Giant Step**

It is important to realize that President Reagan's immigration reform program, submitted to Congress July 30, is not a comprehensive, final solution. Rather, it should be viewed as no more than an initial step in what is certain to be a long, difficult process.

Although the Reagan administration built upon the foundation laid down by the Select Com-mission on Immigration and Refugee Policy, named more than two years ago by then President Carter, its proposals generally do not reach the Commission's more vigorous remedies. Sharp differences within the administration resulted in compromises and less far-reaching reforms than proposed either by the Commission or by pending legislation in Congress.

But even the watered-down Reagan plan has stirred howls from those who protest that it goes too far as well as from those who argue it doesn't go far enough. Politics being the art of the possible, this early outcry from both extremes of the spectrum suggests the administration, with redeeming realism, has taken the high middle creep," the process that pushes millions of ground on this complex issue and, therefore, has a good chance of prevailing in the long, hard rates that confiacate much of the money struggle for enactment.

Basically, the reforms recently unveiled confirm earlier White House reports. They would : bestow legal status, or grant amnesty, to as many as 6 million aliens who entered this county illegally and have resided here since Jan. 1, 1980, fine employers of four or more persons up to \$1,000 for each illegal alien knowingly hired, admit up to 50,000 Mexican guest workers annually for a two-year test period, double the annual immigration quota for Mexico and Canada to 40,000, legalize refugees from Cuba and Haiti within five years, and provide a slight increase in approach encourages complacency about the Border Patrol.

A previously reported plan to have aliens who falsify records subject to punishment apparently was dropped. And because the administration recoiled from a secure-type Social Security card for all workers that would have cost in excess of \$1 billion, proof of legal residence will depend on such routine documents as birth certificates and drivers' licenses, which can be counterfeited easily. Some critics fear the compromise on identification will sacrifice control over employment of aliens and, therefore, surrender a major restraint on illegal entry.

With a special nod to Mexico, the administration would permit the unused visas from Canada to be claimed by Mexicans. Because only 10,000 Canadians immigrate annually to the United States, this means the Mexican quota would be increased by 30,000 to 70,000 - a quantum leap from the current 20,000 limit.


On the other hand, the 50,000 guest worker figure is widely considered to be preposterously small. Gov. William Clements of Texas believes the figure should be at least 500,000, and Sen. S.I. Hayakawa, noting that 120,000 workers are needed just to harvest the raisin crop in California's Fresno County, is the co-author of legislation for a guest-worker program of 1

Despite its limitations and some of its troublesome provisions, the Reagan administration's immigration package is, overall, humane and generous. And, moreover, in singling Mexico out for special treatment, it goes beyond the recommendations of any commission or previous administration. But its real significance is that, whereas other administrations have debated, delayed and done little or nothing to uphold U.S. immigration laws, the Reagan administration has taken this all-important first step. After enactment, experience can prove where future changes should be made to bring this situation into balance.

The alternative of doing nothing has become increasingly unacceptable, because the United States alone simply cannot solve the population and economic problems of this planet.

A Cure For Tax Reform?

income tax rates to inflation, a process known as indexing, is very dicey business - but it can't be much worse than what is being foisted upon the public in the name of "tax reform" this year.

Proponents of indexing argue that it is one of the few effective antidotes for "bracket households into tax brackets with higher gained through wage or salary increases.

That can't happen under indexing because tax brackets, credits and deductions are automatically adjusted annually to match the rise or fall in the cost of living.

Much of the economy already is indexed. Wages, pensions, contracts, the new adjustable-rate mortgages and benefits disbursed under numerous government programs are tied to the vicissitudes of the

The question of whether indexing represents sound economic policy remains unresolved, with critics arguing that the inflation at a time when there ought to be mounting concern about devalued currency.

"The more indexing an economy has, the more inflation will become built in," two Forbes associate editors argued in that magazine earlier this year. "The more inflation becomes accepted, the harder it will be to drive it out - or even to try."

Opponents cite the example of Israel, where everything from wages and insurance policies to mortgages and calls from telephone booths is indexed - a practice held partially responsible for that nation's annual inflation rate of about 130 percent in recent

But the system currently used in this country clearly hasn't worked well. During the past 12 years. Congress and the president have approved no fewer than six purported tex cuts - in 1969, 1971, 1975, 1976, 1977 and 1978 - yet the tax burden borne by most people has remained virtually unchanged.

In fact, a strong case can be made to support the theory that Washington's politicians have tacitly supported the present approach because it gives them an opportunity to euchre the voters by regularly approving cosmetic tax cuts that appear to be munificant but actually do little more than adjust for bracket creep and inflation.

Moreover, whenever Congress and the president open the Pandora's box of "tax reform," they invariably stray far beyond their stated purpose, carving out new and costly special exemptions, exceptions, deductions and credits for virtually every imaginable interest group.

The current Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981 is worse than most as a result of the fierce bidding for political support involving the White House and Congress, Republicans and Democrats, the House and Senate.

Pendulum-Defense Swings

BURBANK, Calif. (UPI) - The emphasis in American industry has shifted from consumer goods to defense business and the man or woman with experience in defense contracting is becoming the most sought after

to a top executive searcher. Joseph Fowler, president of J.E. Fowler and Associates, said in an interview American industry has come full circle from the 1960s when defense business was deemphasized in favor of consumer goods.

The trend is easily marked, he said, because many major industries now are searching hard for executives with experience in defense contracting. "In 1966 most companies were giving scant

consideration to candidates with a genuine depth of experience in high technology production of weapons," Fowler said.

Between 1965 and 1971, he said, corporate boards put first priority on increased consumer business in an effort at balancing what was then considered the "feast or famine" cycles in the defense field.

Borg-Warner and Olis Corp. set about abandoning defense contracting entirely," Fowler said. "Whittaker Corp., Sanger, Bendix, Textron and Blaw-Knox Co. established programs for reducing defense contracting as percentages of total business."

At that time, Fowler said, many companies saw more profit in commercial markets. "In 1958 after-tax profits from defense

production averaged 10.2 percent of invested capital," he said. "By 1966 profit from defense activities had dropped to 6.8 percent versus 12.4 percent on consumer oriented products."

He said the figures were from a comparative study of defense industry and consumer industry records by Logistics Manage-

At the time, markets in the civilian sector

grew more rapidly than in defense and other government-financed areas. "Now the pendulun, has swung the other way."

While the flatness of the consumer markets' outlook has a lot to do with the shift in emphasis, he said, psychology also has a lot to do

"Our attitudes change from one decade to the next," Fowler said. "The 'merchants of death' syndrome was important in the 1960s when younger people subjected chemical and other companies to severe criticism. "Ever since the hostage crisis, national

defense has been growing in public esteem seems to have no adverse effect upon corporate images."

Fowler, who has conducted executive searches for most of the country's top 100 high technology companies, said the change in emphasis first became apparent in the spring of 1980, well before Ronald Reagan's election.

Fowler said the demand for defenseoriented executives shows up in specifications for people to fill positions as chief executive officers, marketing personnel, contracting officers, compliance officers and operations

"There's basically only one source for people with defense experience, and that's the defense-oriented establishment itself," he

In many cases the emphasis on defense business has become such that consumer oriented companies are acquiring defense skills by acquiring entire companies.

Just to gain entry in the defense arena, he said, Fortune 500 companies are looking for small organizations. "But some of the deals aren't so small."

Fowler said. "Armeo Inc. is acquiring Ladish Co., with its very strong defense and serospace capabilities in valves, fittings, pumps and forgings, for about \$200 million.

Whatever became of Col. Charles Beck-

For those of you who may first want to know who Col. Charles Beckwith is, he was the leader of the unsuccessful operation in April 1980 to rescue the American hostages in Iran. Remember?

The colonel has been out of the news since then and this fall he's going to be out of uniform. He is retiring and, he says, trading his green beret for a businesaman's pinstripe.

Beckwith plans to establish a firm to advise corporations on anti-terrorist tactics. Specialists, recruited initially from among the colonel's former associates in the military, will be available to teach executives how to protect themselves from attack and to devise sabotage-prevention measures for corporate facilities.

Considering the brisk business in terrorism that has developed in recent years, there should be an immediate demand for his services. Especially if he makes it perfectly clear in advance that some formerly very important people in Washington who were also involved in the Tranian operation are not on his board of directors.

One of the more fascinating news briefs of recent weeks - at least for certain specialists among us - comes out of the Washington bureaucracy.

The National Institute of Drug Abuse, which has been dealing exclusively with university botanists for a number of years, is now calling for competitive bids to supply a product it needs for research projects.

The institute is offering a three-year contract to "grow, harvest, store, ship and analyze" some 2,000 pounds of gannabis annually.

Air Crashes Boost Castro's Power

WASHINGTON - Within less than three months, mysterious plane crashes have sliminated two of Fidel Castro's potentially most dangerous rivals in the volatile politics of Latin America: Panamanian strongman Omar Torrijos and Ecuador's President

No one has made a connection between the Cuban dictator and the deaths of Torrijos and Roldos - much less suggested that Castro's agents were responsible for the plane crashes.

But stranger things have happened in the violence-prone political arena of Latin America. And there is no doubt that Castro has profited by the convenient departure of two charismatic leaders who had contested the Cuban's self-proclaimed role as the foremost voice of independence in the Western Hemisphere.

Panamanian officials are still investigating the cause of the air crash that took Torrijos' life. Bad weather over the jungle was a reasonable explanation.

But it may be more than mere coincidence that Torrijos' firm control of Panama - and his successful negotiation of the treaty under which the United States relinquished control

across the Latin American political spec-trum. On grounds of ego alone, that would have been enough to infuriate Castro, But Torrijos had also made no secret of his distasts for the Cuban dictator's support for leftist guerrillas in Central America.

Torrijos' opposition to Castro was especially significant because he had once been one of the Cuban's closest allies. In 1974, for example, Turrijos was the first leader in the hemisphere to recognize Castro's government - over the objection of the Organization of American States. After the Sandinistas' victory over Nicaragua's dictator Anastasio Somoza, Torrijos and Castro jointly agreed to give the new government 'respectful help."

But while Torrijos withdrew his military forces from Nicaragua, Castro sent in still more troops. Torrijos was furious, and cooperation between the two dictators

In a confidential cable filed after Torrijos death, U.S. Embassy political analysts in Panama warned the Rate Department that has absence "weakens the forces of reform and opposition to Cuban influence in the Caribbean area."

State Department sources confided privately to my associate Bob Sherman that they expect U.S.-Panamanian relations to suffer as the result of Torrijos' death. President Aristides Royo is considered a weak leader who may well decide to use the United States as a scapegoat to distract Panamanians from their own very real

Adding to the problem is the fact that Terrijos co-opted a significant portion of his domestic political opposition by giving them jobs in the government. With Torrijos' iron control now gone, these political extremists of the right and left may feel free to pursue their own goals.

Pulling Uncle Sam's beard is always a popular sport among political factions in Latin America, so the chaotic situation left in Panama by Torrijos' death can only hurt the United States. And whatever burts the United States pleases Castro.
The United States saids, Castro can con-

template the post-Torrijes situation in Panama with anticipation. The prospect of political turmoli, as various factions vie to succeed the fallen strongman, can only give Castro hope of yet another Carribbean conquest. Castrolam thrives on chaos.

So while the Cuban dictator may publicly mourn Torrijos, those are crocodile tears running down his beard.

The case of Ecuador's President Roldos is similar, although he didn't live long enough to nchieve Torrijos' status as a rival to Castro. At 39, Roldes was the youngest president ever elected in the Western Hernisphere when he took office in 1979.

Roldos was swept into the presidency by the greatest electoral margin in his country's history. His youth and popularity made him an obvious rival to Castro in Latin America and Roldos was obviously unimpressed with the Cuban's reputation. He atticked Castro for seizing refugees who had sought asylum in the Ecuadoran Embassy in Havana. The two clashed again when Roldos had Cuban-hacked Colombian rebell arrested in Ecuador and turned them over to Colombian

But Roldes didn't survive to become a serious rival to Castro. He died in a plane crash after only two years in office. Though
the crash was listed efficially as an accident,
the Cuban-backed guerrillas actually claimed
responsibility for sabotaging Roldon' plane,
Whether he had anything to do with the
deaths of cliner Torrifos or Roldon, F.M.
Castro profited by both.



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

Court Rules Egging Is Not **Protected By Constitution**

DENVER (UPI) — Tossing raw eggs at a presidential candidate is not constitutionally protected as freedom of speech, a federal appeals court ruled.

The 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, in a decision filed Monday, let stand the assault conviction of a Communist Workers Party member who hurled eggs at former presidential candidate John Anderson while calling him "the bringer of the third world war."

The court declared Jose Calderon was guilty of assault for tossing the eggs at the National Governors Conference in Denver last year.

Calderon had argued throwing the eggs, coupled with the political statement made at that time, amounted to an act of symobile speech protected by the 1st Amendment. The appellate court said Caideron was not accused of a criminal act because of his speech but because he burled the eggs.

"Even if it was meant only to punctuate the communication of a protest, burling missiles at a speaker is not under any circumstances worthy of inclusion under the protection afforded symbolic speech," the

Banker Emerges From Hidina

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - Former banker L. Ben Lewis has emerged from aix months of hiding and pleaded guilty to charges he helped in the \$21 million Wells Fargo embezziement scheme, believed to be the largest fraud in U.S. banking history.

As part of a plea-bargain arrangement, Lewis agreed to appear as the prosecution's star witness against boxing promoter Ross Fields, better known as Harold J. Smith, and another one-time Wells Fargo officer, Sammle Marshall.

Lewis, Fields and Marshall were indicted by a federal grand jury last month for allegedly engineering the embezzlement scheme.

Search Resumed For Woman Attacked By Shark

ORMOND BEACH, Fig. (UPI) - The Coast Guard resumed searching today for a 19-year-old woman left for dead by three friends who said she was attacked by a shark while swimming ashore from a capsized sailboat.

Three Coast Guard cutters and two helicopters were searching the waters off Ormond Beach for Christy Wapniarski, 19, missing since Monday.

The Coast Guard said the drama began Sunday when two young Daytona Beach couples went out for an early evening sail aboard a 18-foot catamaran,

By 8 p.m., officials said a storm had turned the calm sea into a tempest, capairing the boat about six miles off Ormond Beach. The four -- Daniel Perrin, Tanara Ennis, Randall Cohen and Miss Wapniarski - had failed to take along life jackets. After spending a perilous night clinging to a sinking

pontoon without life jackets, authorities said they made a dangerous decision - they would try to swim ashore at dawn Monday. Miss Wapniarski never made

They should never have left the boat, even if it was leaking," said Coast Guard spokesman James Williamson, "We found the boat immediately."

recovery program on track, President Reagan plans to make his position "loud and clear" on social issues - particularly abortion - when he returns to Washington next month, a spokesman said.




