#### Saved Vines From Snails.

An account was published some years ago of the coming out of a celebrated vineyard known as the Clos de Vougeot in France, from which no fewer than 120 bushels of snails were removed at a cost of labor of more than one hundred francs less than the price obtained by the sale of the snails. It was estimated that these snails would have damaged the vines to an extent represented by the value of \$500,000 to twenty pipes of wine.

#### Preparing Snails for Market.

The food provided for snails in captivity consists mainly of lettuce, raw cabbage, dandelion leaves and chopped kohlrabi. These vegetables are raised on a considerable scale for this purpose. The food is laid upon the mow and care must be taken to remove all portions of decayed food and other undesirable matter—a precaution essential to the health of the snail.

The United States government is not seeking war with Germany. The President is not seeking war. There can be no war unless Germany commits an overt act of war and if that is what Berlin is determined upon nothing that the United States can do will prevent it, except at a price in shame and submission that no great nation will ever pay for if it pays it has ceased to be a great nation and has forfeited its rank.

Serious as the situation may be it is serious only because of what Germany has done in violation of law and of neutral rights, and the American people can face it in proud consciousness that their hands are clean and that no blood guilt rests upon them.

Men who believe in peace at any price may be disturbed by the outlook. Republican politicians like Representative Mann of Illinois, Representative Cooper of Wisconsin and Senator Sherman of Illinois who are more concerned about the German vote than about the honor of their country, may view the President's action with an affection of horror, but we refuse to believe that they speak for the American people. If they do, then the American people have forfeited their birthright and abandoned their inheritance from the fathers.

### GIANTS IN OLDEN DAYS

Roger Connor Was One of Greatest Batsmen in His Day.

"Orator" O'Rourke Also Played on New York Team. Each Managed Team in Little Connecticut Valley Circuit.

At the age of 18 the two Roger Connor, the famous old-time first baseman of the New York team, made three base hits in his first at bat in a game between Springfield and Meriden of the Connecticut Valley League and one of them was a three-bagger. The famous old man of National League fame was one of the greatest batsmen in his day and generation. For 12 seasons he batted well over the .300 mark and his statistics were of the sensational order.

James O'Rourke was the big name in the same league holding the office of secretary of the league, also manager and catcher for the Bridgeport club and he had been playing ball for 12 seasons previous to this. "Orator" O'Rourke was a professional ball player when Roger Connor was a raw recruit. These two grand players were on the New York City team in 1873 and twice the 1874 national champion. The Giants were allowed to continue their organization for they were weaker in more ways than one.

After many years these veterans again on the diamond green and both well over the half century mark.
