GLASS SPEAKS IN OPPOSITION TO PRESIDENT

Virginia Senator Delivers Formal Declaration of Democratic Resentment to President's Amazing Arrangement of Senate—Intervened in Pinchot-Heney-Mellon Row by Message to Senate.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 16.—The cross fire of senate controversy that has raged for three days about presidential intervention in the Pinchot-Heney-Mellon row, continued unabated Tuesday with Senator Glass of Virginia, delivering what his Democratic colleagues hailed as the formal declaration of their resentment at the president's language.

Senator Glass delivered his address with the greatest earnestness and no senator on either side sought to interrupt him. Republicans and Democrats alike gave him the closest attention throughout.

When Senator Glass had concluded and the bustle made by his congratulating colleagues had died away, Senator Reed berated the senate for delay in action upon the immigration bill which had been two weeks before it, less than half that time being given to debate on the bill, while "hour after hour" the fire of partisan criticism had raged from the Democratic side.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 16.—Having failed in another attempt to call Howard Mannington before it, the senate Daugherty committee today questioned George Storck, department of justice investigator, whose story swung a back into the grave charges of irregularities with the Wilson administration. It is charged that Martin Keen, supervisor of the Bosch magneto property, paid \$10,000 to Joseph Jeffer, Democratic leader in the senate, to secure the property custodian, A. Mitchell Palmer.

John Langley Will Be Tried on May 6

Langley, Kentucky, under indictment with five others charged with conspiracy to defraud the government in connection with alleged liquor withdrawals in a distillery in Lawrenceburg, Ky.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A politician is a congenial optimist. He lives on hope, on expectation. He is never satisfied with admitting mere reasonable likelihood of success. Only the absolute certainty of triumph ever is conceded.

A NON-POLITICAL person from the middle west, however, who has traveled in 23 states in the past three months, leaves this thought with Washington's political seers: "The Republicans have a candidate, but no ammunition. The Democrats have odds of annihilation, but no candidate. How either side can set down the result from these two one-sided situations the folks in the streets can't figure out. Three months from now, if the Republicans have located some ammunition and the Democrats have selected a candidate, then one side or the other may have reason for optimism. But a third party ticket with both a candidate and an arsenal of high explosives, may even then block any reasonable reason for rejoicing."

was announced that orders for pipe and other equipment necessary for the construction of the distribution system had been ordered to be shipped at once. This means that the commission is leaving no stone unturned in its efforts to have the work begin as soon as possible on the water plant. It was further announced that orders for the machinery for the pump house had also been placed. No announcement was made regarding the pump house and reservoir and it is not known what action was taken in this matter.

The commission, it is also understood, requested F. Joseph Raehn to proceed with the drilling of a 12-inch well near the city as a test well. After going down to a depth as far as the first rock, a four-inch pipe will then be used provided an adequate supply is not attained before hand.

Although not a great deal of information was forthcoming on this session, it is understood to have been held for the purpose of questioning Mr. Craig in regard to the proposed plant and also in regard to whether or not it would be possible for the city to take over any part of the local plant provided the Southern Utilities Company would sell. Just what would Mr. Craig's answers along that line was not announced and neither was it stated whether or not the Southern Utilities had agreed to dispose of any of its holdings.

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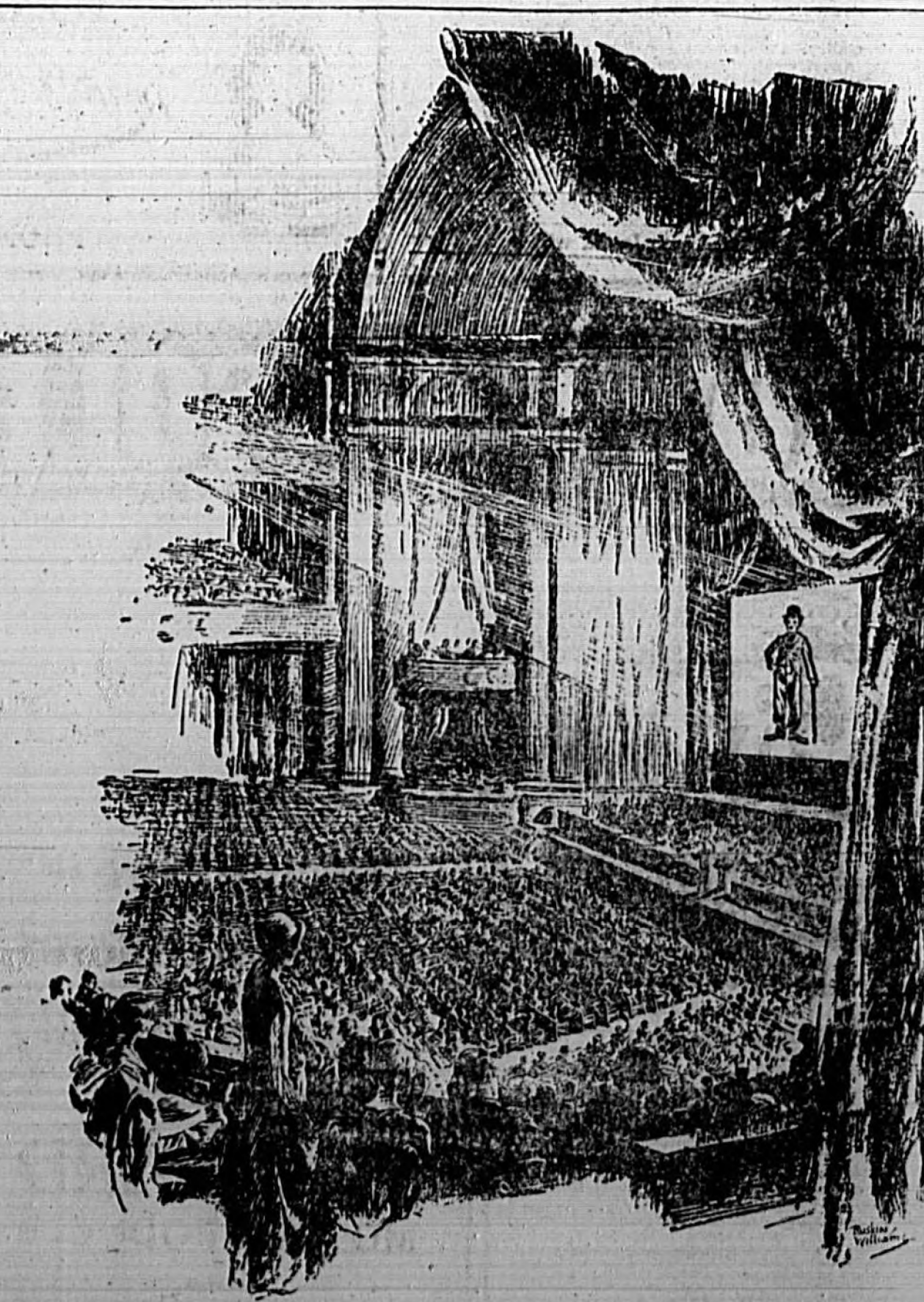

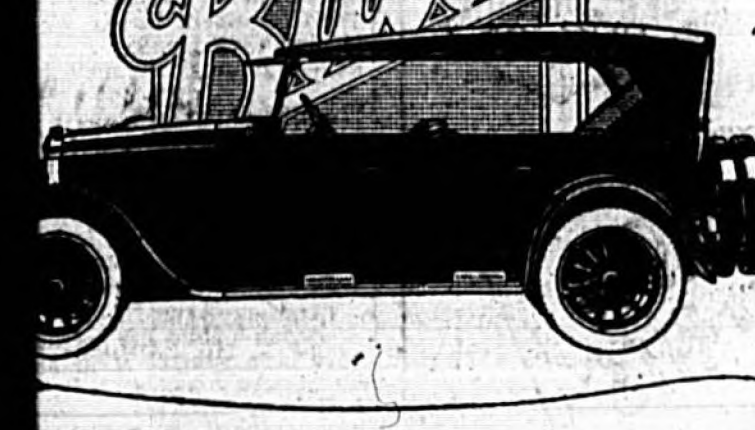

Mrs. Cumber is anxious to get started in Florida, teaching Floridians what they can and cannot grow, that if we could obtain a federation of garden clubs we could obtain more knowledge, for there are a great number of native shrubs that could be used for the beautifying of public as well as private grounds, if we only knew them and had a knowledge of transplanting, she says learn the botanical names as everything has a meaning.

Jacksonville is to have a garden show on the 24th and 25th of this month, and Mrs. Cumber has asked that anyone send flowers that has them. Special booths are to be arranged for instruction alone, education as well as beauty being the aim in Florida. They are anxious to use some means for the preservation of Holly, asking the public to use mistletoe and cherry laurel for decorating purposes instead, as 60 per cent of the holly has disappeared in the southern states, and it is of slow growth; also to work to prevent devastation of forests.

There are now four garden club organizations in Florida, these are at Winter Park, Ormond, Jacksonville and Miami.

Mrs. Cumber stated that she was anxious to see a garden club show in Sanford soon.

After the conclusion of the address questions were asked and answered.

Mrs. Wight then asked Mrs. Tular, the retiring president, if she thought the time ripe to organize a garden club in Sanford. The reply was favorable, and it would seem that at an early date "The City Substantial" will have such an organization.

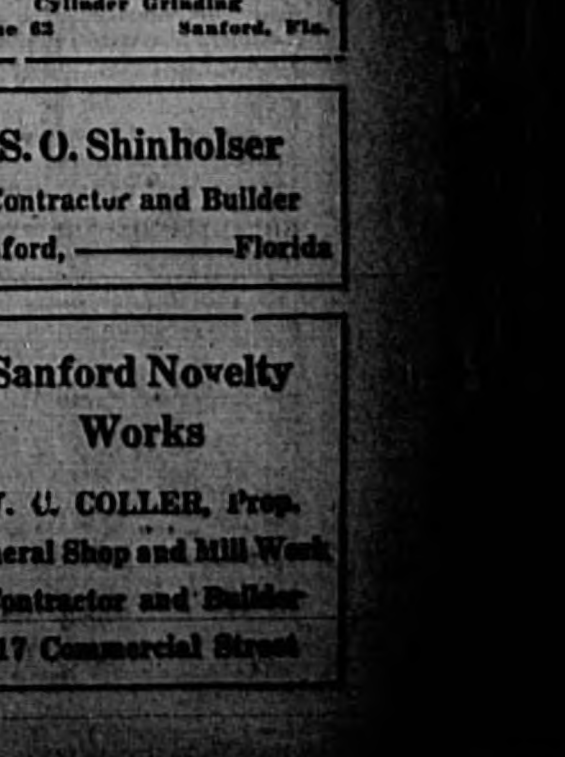
