### EDITORIAL COMMENT

### Youth Center Needed The idea suggested last week by Cassel-

berry Councilman Arthur Lego that town councils and county officials work together in providing an adequate Youth Center for the area is worthy of serious and immediate consider-

Although summer recreation programs are conducted in one or two of the communities, these take place only for a few hours each weekday morning and are scheduled only for six weeks out of the year. Thus, for a good part of the summer and on weekends during the school term, our South Seminole youngsters are left to their own ingenuity for recreation and enter-

Casselberry officials, recognizing the urgency in providing a continuous program for the rapidly increasing number of young people in their area, last year appointed their first Recreation Commission and provided it with an operating budget.

Since that time a temporary recreation center has been established which is open to various teenage groups in the evenings and is used in the mornings by the elementary age group for the summer program. Plans are to open the center in the after-

noons as well for this age group if sufficient adult volunteers can be found to act as chaperones.

No doubt the future will bring a South

Seminole Youth Center. Until that time, however, it would be encouraging if officials in all municipalities would follow the example of those in Casselberry in providing their young people with a place of their own for supervised recreation and entertainment.

### **Editorial Comment:**

## 'Muddy Water' Is Clearing Up Here

The muddy waters surrounding that bolita raid last Saturday were beginning to clear today as The Herald continued its probe into why the Seminole County sheriff's department had not been asked to take part.

Since this is budget request time, The Herald queried Sheriff J. L. Hobby why he is asking for an increase of \$15,413 to \$194,-000 over this year's budget. His reply is that he wants to increase deputies' and employes' salaries and to add a third investigator to his staff. He previously had been quoted that he had not the money or manpower for an extensive investigation, had offered an "open door" to federal, Orange County and Orlando investigators and, further, had asked for and received co-operation from the Florida Sheriff's Bureau.

Gen. J. C. Hutchison, chairman of the County Commission, said today: "I talked yesterday with a man with authority in the Internal Revenue Service and he said the investigation started in Orange County and the trail led to Seminole County and they followed. He said they didn't need any help and didn't call on Seminole County. He said this is normal federal procedure. I asked if they were fearful ful news of the raid would 'leak out' and he said no, they had enough men. I questioned him bluntly if it was because they had no confidence in the Seminole County enforcement agencies and he answered, 'Absolutely not, we had enough help'."

Commissioner James P. Avery Jr. commented: "This involves police work and I am positive the Sheriff is the qualified authority in this county and I want to say nothing which would endanger any further investigation. I think of all county employes those in the sheriff's department are justified in having salary increases. They work 60 hours a week for less than \$1 an hour. It is my opinion they are entitled to an increase for the job they are doing. They are on the firing line 60 hours a week, and endangering their lives when giving chase."

Commissioner John Fitzpatrick commented: "I am not qualified to make any statement; I know nothing about bolita or raids. I do feel the Sheriff is doing a pretty good job and he has a good record."

### 12 - Follow Through

Don't work at the follow through, one of the more important phases of the swing. It should be kept on a simple plane. Just let the speed and force of the club take the clubbead on through the

Pretend someone is taking your picture at the end of the follow through. That's one of the simplest ways to get a beginner to visualize how he should look at the completion of the swing.

The body is turned, facing the hole. The head and the eyes are up following the flight of the ball. The hands are high, the arms bent in close to the body as the speed of the club comes to a halt. The weight is completely on the left foot, the right heel off the ground.


