County **Studies Gun Law**

The Seminole County Commission will decide whether it will provide a workable procedure whereby an applicant for a gun permit may be licensed to carry a concealed weapon in this county.

At Tuesday's commission meeting, Sid Vihlen Jr., said he is studying the issue and hopes to provide a procedure that will allow private investigators to carry concealed weapons because it is "one of those coming things." The issue was prompted by

an application from Harvey Morse, a private detective in South Seminole. Morse filled out all the necessary paperwork only to find that the commission for eigh: successive weeks has failed to address itself to the

Sheriff John Polk said Tuesday that it is his opinion that no governmental agency has the authority to issue a permit to carry a concealed weapon to anyone other than a law enforcement officer.

"I have to respectfully disagree. The Board of County ommissioners does have the authority," Vihlen told Polk. Asst. County Atty. Robert Pierce said he was under the impression, like Vihlen, that the Pierce promised to

the matter and come up with an opinion by next week. Meanwhile, Vihlen says he is

working on a "comprehensive" program which would replace the county's present policy. Vihlen said his procedure would not require a recom-

mendation from the sheriff Instead it would place the authority in the hands of the county commission.



Rice did not say whether Seaboard Coast Line would donate the depot or help provide for its move and installation in Sanford, but Mrs. Colbert said she hopes the depot would be donated. Enthusiasm for the project was also expressed in




Food Stamp Use A On The Increase

Teamsters Union Strike To Begin At Midnight

ARLINGTON HEIGHTS, Ill. (AP) - Teamsters union and trucking industry negotiators remained "far apart" on crucial money issues today as the midnight deadline for a nationwide truck strike approached, federal labor officials said.

Labor Secretary W.J. Usery Jr. said contract negotiations were bogged down over four or five economic issues. Although he declined to elaborate, those issues reportedly include a difference of 75 cents an hour in wage increases, \$6 a week in other benefits and cost-of-living allowances.

Usery and James Scearce, acting head of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, planned to continue meeting with both sides today in anticipation of the midnight expiration of the National Master Freight Agreement.

The current contract covers about 400,000 truckers and warehousemen who move about 60 per cent of the nation's total output of manufactured goods.

Railroads To Merge

WASHINGTON (AP) - When seven financially weak railroads are merged into a new government-backed railroad today in the largest corporate reorganization in U.S. history, such well-known railroads as the Penn Central and the Erie Lackawanna will cease operating. The other carriers whose names will disappear are the Reading (of Monopoly game fame), the Central of New Jersey, Lehigh and Hudson River, Lehigh Valley and the Ann Arbor.

Taking their place is a railroad known as Consolidated Rail Corp., or ConRail, a private corporation supported by a government investment of nearly \$2.1 billion. ConRail will be the largest railroad in the nation in terms of revenues and the second largest in terms of route miles.

Storms Sweep South

Southern states, clobbered by tornadoes, flooding and storms the past two days, received more severe weather early today as thunderstorms spread from southern Texas into Louisiana, Mississippi Alabama and Georgia. Severe thunderstorms developed early in Michigan,

which was also hit by tornadoes on Tuesday. The National Weather Service said 24 tornadoes were reported on Tuesday, compared with 41 tornadoes on

Monday. Tuesday's twisters included eight in Texas, five n Mississippi, seven in Louisiana and two each in Alabama and Michigan. The tornado death toll so far this week was six killed in

Arkansas, three in Mississippi and one in Michigan.

Callaway Meetings Probed

CRESTED BUTTE, Colo. (AP) - The Crested Butte Development Corp. controlled by former Army Secretary Howard H. Callaway held a board meeting in Callaway's Pentagon office five months after he was sworn in as secretary

That meeting was one of a number of instances in which Callaway acted in connection with the Colorado ski resort he owned while he was holding the high Pentagon post.

Callaway resigned as President Ford's election campaign manager on Tuesday as several government investigations involving the Crested Butte resort proceeded, but he said in an interview, "I'm confident there will be complete exoneration."

Budget Gains Support

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Ford's record defense budget is picking up initial support in Congress with some congressional defense critics expressing concern over Soviet military buildups.

The Senate Budget Committee approved by voice vote a \$113-billion defense spending target for the fiscal year starting Oct. 1 which it said is only \$300 million less than Ford wants.

The House Budget Committee, by a vote of 13-12, set a target of \$112 billion, rejecting a proposal by its own chairman, Rep. Brock Adams DWash., that the figure be cut to \$107.7 billion.

Cocaine Possession Charged

GREENWICH, Conn. (AP) - Federal investigators Tuesday arrested and charged a 25-year old man with possession of 47 pounds of cocaine that police said could be worth about \$6 million.

Carlos Catano, of Greenwich, was arrested on a federal warrant "without incident" and charged with possession of narcotics and possession of narcotics with intent to sell, police said.

Greenwich Det. Capt. Thomas Keegan said federal officials had seized the cocaine on May 16, 1975 in the Miami airport during a narcotics smuggling probe.

Morton Takes New Title

WASHINGTON (AP) - Rogers C.B. Morton takes a new title and moves four blocks to a new office Friday, but his job is the same: trying to help President Ford win a full term in the White House.

His appointment to succeed Howard H. Callaway as manager of the Ford campaign is not expected to bring major changes to the President's political operation.



The County Needs Action, Not Talk

There has been a lot of talk recently - but very little action - among the County Commissioners on the subject of impact fees

These fees have been the topic of much debate between members of the commission and the county attorney and, in fact, the whole issue become just another political football.

We feel it is high time that the commission faces the fact that there is a problem; that there is a serious issue facing them that is of vital interest to Mr. Average Taxpayer; and that it is time that they climb off their collective swivel chairs and get down to business

The issue isn't going to solve itself.

Heretofore, impact fees have been paid developers on what has been termed a "voluntary basis. The county attorney says that this is illegal. He says that the Supreme Court has ruled that the mly way the county can collect such fees from uilders legally is for them to be called for by or-

dinance. Seminole County has no such ordinance. The solution, if indeed it proves to be in the best interest of the taxpayer, seems to be: pass an orinance. Instead, the commission is wasting time bickering, crying politics, and doing very little else other than making headlines.

It just seems to us, that no matter how you turn it, someone is going to have to come up with the to do those things that impact fees, or oluntary contributions from developers, as they are sometimes called, now do.

The Seminole County school system is the largest benefactor of these fees now. And, the fact s that builders are providing these funds and there is more than \$5-million on the books to be collected Not to mention that in the past two years builders came up with a quarter of a million dollars, most of which was used for repair of old school

Perhaps this is over-simplifying the issue, additional expenditures should pay for them and that's exactly what the term impact fee implies a fee a developer pays to offset the future impact of his development upon county services, includin

And, maybe this, too, is an over-simplification But it seems to us that if the developers don't pay then Mr. and Mrs. Average Taxpayer are going to have to dig a little bit deeper and come up with those funds somewhere down the road.

If impact fees aren't the answer and the county commission finds a better way to come up with the needed revenue without shifting the burden to the already overburdened county taxpayer, well, then for heaven's sake, let's get with it.

This is an issue that vitally concerns everyone who shares the tax load in this county. A little less talk and more action is certain to be most preciated by the taxpayers.







Governor's Proposals Could Mean 7,000 New Jobs

By JOHN VAN GIESON Associated Press Writer

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - If you're one of 350,000 unemployed Floridians, the 1976 legislature's emphasis on economic development could mean the difference between being on the payroll and the welfare roll.

With Gov. Reubin Askew seeking huge increases in Florida promotional spending, and powerful legislators inclined to give him even more than he wants, Department of Commerce analysts

said Florida could gain more than 7,000 new jobs. And that's not counting the benefits of Askew's request for a 100 per cent increase in funds promoting tourism, an \$8.8 billion in-

justry that produces \$500 million a year in state revenue. Askew has proposed a \$4.5 million economic development program, a \$3.4 million increase, and \$4 million in tourism expenditures, a \$2 million hike

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - Israeli police patrolled in force in tense but quiet Arab villages in Galilee today as magers in northern Israel prepared to bury six Arabs killed by police and army gunfire.

There were fears that the funerals would ignite new rioting. But Police Minister Shlomo Hillel ordered security forces not to shoot unless lives were threatened and lifted a curfew imposed on villages north of Nazare'h. Police reported that Arab youths stoned police in four

villages during the night but said there was no serious Five of the Arabs were killed Tuesday during riots that

accompanied a 24-hour strike by Arab citizens of Israel which the Israeli Communist party called to protest government purchase of some 1,600 acres of arid Arab land for housing and development projects. Another Arab was killed in a prestrike riot Monday night.

War On Terrorism Declared

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) - President Jorge Videla, in an outline of his new military government's goals, gave first priority to a war on terrorism to achieve the stability necessary for reconstruction of the Argentine economy.

Videla, making his first speech since he and other mili-tary leaders ousted President Isabel Peron a week ago, said Tuesday night that his government "will monopolize the use of force."

"We will use that force as many times as necessary to ensure the full observance of social peace. Toward this goal we will combat, without truce, subversive elinquency in any of its manifestations until it is totally annihilated," the 50-year-old general said in a radioelevision address.

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP) - Former Watergate prosecutor Archibald Cox says those who supplied "that gossip" for a book about former President Richard Nixon's last days in office "should be ashamed of themselves" - and so should those responsible for publishing it.

"It's not surprising any man would disintegate under those circumstances and I don't see any gain in peddling those stories in books and news magazines." Cox said

The book, scheduled for publication next month, is "The Final Days" by Washington Post reporters Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein. Excerpts published in Newsweek magazine say Nixon spoke indirectly of suicide and drank heavily during his last days in office.





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Veins In Head **Become Dilated** By Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB: Have you ever seen dilated veins in the head near the temple and above the eye (forehead) and below the eye (lower lid)? When I bend over this area swells. When I stand up gravity brings the blood back to the heart.

My doctor says this is abnormal and due to poor circulation, the same as enlarged veins in my legs. I would like your comment and advice on this problem.

DEAR READER- At the risk of being facetious I would suggest that you not bend over so much. Of course these veins will stand out if you bend over. Blood is a liquid and it tends to run downhill.


Why don't you do little experiment? Hold you hand out at the level of your stomach and look at the veins fill up over the back of the hand, now hold your hand up just above the level of your eyes and watch the veins drain out. It is not abformal for the veins to fill in the back of the hand when you hold he hand sufficiently lower than he level of the heart. It is not bnormal for the veins in your neck and head to stand out if you're going to bend over so that your head is lower than your heart.

Now you may have some ocal condition that concerns your doctor that I wouldn't be aware of without seeing your physical features but I can assure you that all the normal people I have ever seen who stood on their head or bent over far enough have their veins tand out through the influence of gravity.



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

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

Undefeated against junior college competition and only four losses to prominent four-year schools marring their record, the Raiders rate in the upper crust of tennis society in Florida. They are 14-4

overall and 11-0 against junior college competition. In one of its closest tennis matches against a Juco foe, Seminole blasted Central Florida of Ocala last week, five matches to two. CFCC was 16-0 before meeting Seminole.

No. 5 for the Raiders is Buddy Gonzalez, who lacks technique, but compensates with endurance and character. He is also undefeated in JuCo play.

JuCo tennis fans won't see kangaroos jumping around from court to court when they come to see Seminole. No supermen. The Raiders leave their red "S" capes in the locker room.

In effect, sheer tennis is the name of the game. and the combination of talent, hustle and desire separates this team from others. Berango or not.

> Since the time of the Aztecs, man has loved the taste of chocolate - but he hasn't always loved its price. When chocolate was introduced to Europe it sold for \$2.50 to \$5 per pound, and prices remained high into the 19th century.

But the demand for chocclate was there and prompted several inventions, using water power and later steam power, that allowed chocolate makers to produce more and more chocolate at lower and lower prices. The quality and variety of the product also improved considerably. Two landmark discoveries in Europe - the production of cocoa powder in 1828 and the creation of milk chocolate in 1875 - stimulated the public's taste for chocolate and spurred its production and consumption both in Europe and America.

The latter part of the entury was the glorious period of penny candy, when chocolate was produced in huge "planks" 18 inches long, two inches thick and 12 inches wide. A shopkeeper had to use a small hammer and chisel to break the mammoth bar into pieces to fill a "penny" bag!

Chocolate-covered candies were born in 1870 when a confectioner, trying to sell more candy creams, hit on the idea of covering the creams with chocolate. Housing Program Studied By ED PRICKETT Herald Staff Writer

The ever increasing flow number of persons unable to could be stemmed by a \$200,000 proposal from the state, County Planner Bill Kercher said

"There is a shortage of low and moderate income ousing. There are a number of families that could use assistance," Kercher smid.

One grogram Kergh- ha nder study is a proposal made to the Seminale County Commission on Tuesday. At that meeting, Judith A. Truett of the Department of Community Affairs explained a state program that would loan \$200,000 to this county to develop homesites which would sell for a maximum \$4,000 instead of the \$6,000 presently being charged.

More than a year ago the county produced a study which said there is a pressing need for low and moderate income housing here.

"That need has increased because of economic conditions," Kercher said today. The state program under the Department of Community Affairs is designed to provide a shot in the arm to the ailing construction industry in addition to low-cost housing.

The way the program works, according to Kercher, is that the state loans the money to Seminole County. Then the county loans the money to developers who find suitable property and prepare a site. The fully prepared site is sold

to homeowners. If homeowners aren't interested, builders who promise to construct low-cost housing will be allowed to purchase the site. The \$200,000 loan, at three per cent interest, (Continued on Page 2-A)

All the architects are donating their services during the preliminary stages. According to DDC Chairman Sara Jacobson, there has been no discussion of fees, privileges or priorities.

"They are doing the preliminary work with no strings attached, and no commitments have been made to any of them," said Miss Jacobson. "They are working with us because of their concern with

community development." The facelift is still a long way off, Miss Jacobson explained, but the cooperative has been formed to do some early planning which will help the DDC meet certain impending deadlines. The most pressing in the May 1 deadline, by which time all applications for federal grants covering historical preservation and restoration

must be made. A preliminary requirement in making this application is registration on the national register of historical places. An historical survey to this end

has already been completed. Included in the historical survey report and grant application must be architectural projections of plans and costs for Downtown Sanford's facelift.

"Therefore we appealed to the local architectural community for help," said Miss Jacobson. "After reviewing the Downtown history and potential, they became interested and
