Lakefront 'White Way' Pictured

Sanford's waterfront is destined to become a glowing 'White Way' all the way from Melonville Avenue west to the I-4 interchange, if plans proposed by the Lake Monroe development committee receive the same reception from the Board of County Commissioners as it did from the City Commission and the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees Monday evening.

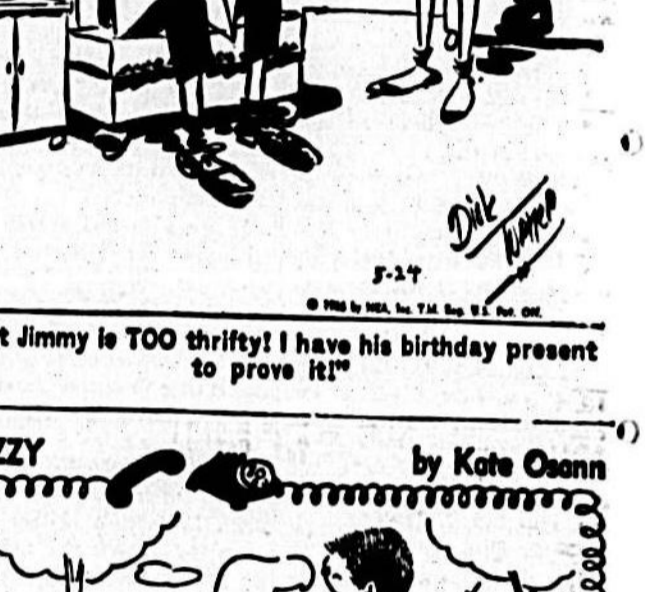

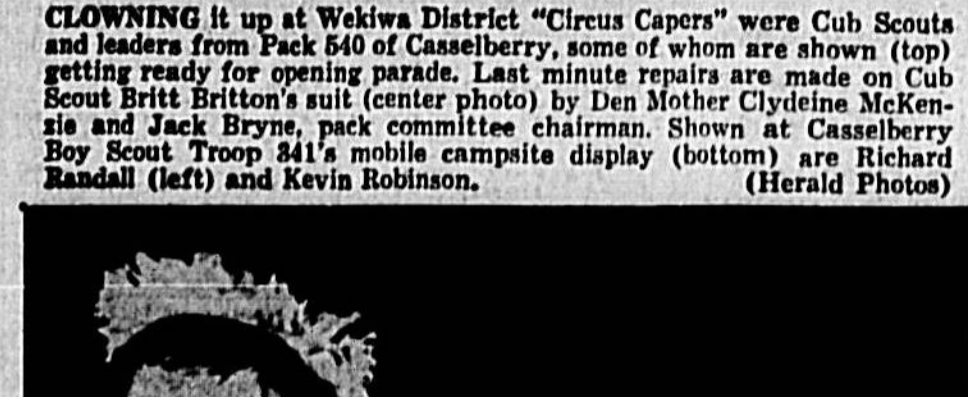

McDonald's election (he is unopposed in November) assures Seminole County of two members in the House who the 1967 Legislature convenes. Mack N. Cleveland Jr., currently a state senator, is unopposed for the Group 2 Lake Seminole House seat.

Running for the Group 1 seat is Rep. W. H. (Bill) Reedy of Eustis, a Democrat, and Charles Brant, a Republican of Clermont.

McDonald rolled up a lopsided 4,271 to 1,682 margin over Thomas in Seminole County and barely lost in Lake County to Thomas by 5,218 to 5,251.

Costly Insurance OK'd For Keys

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Insurance Commissioner Howard Williams today approved a special high-premium program to provide fire and windstorm coverage on real estate in South Florida's storm-swept upper Keys.

The rate in some instances will be double and triple the standard rate in less-developed parts of the state.

Williams called it a real breakthrough and the incentive for other companies to provide similar coverage for the keys and other areas of the state.

He said the special program was filed by Charter Oak Fire Insurance Company, a subsidiary of Travelers Insurance Company.

Up to now, inability to secure insurance on property in the Keys had crippled the economy by stifling construction in parts of Monroe County, Williams said.

It's almost impossible to borrow money on unsecured property.

The approved rate under the filing for dwellings valued under \$8,000 is double the standard rate for fire insurance and triple for windstorm and extended coverage.

For all other property, the standard rate for fire and triple for windstorm and extended coverage.

The higher rate also applies to the number of recent hurricanes that have hit the area and the damage caused.

Williams said a further provision calls for a five percent deductible on buildings and contents with a minimum deductible of \$200 on dwellings and \$500 on all other property.

Williams said he is continuing to work toward development of a voluntary pool of insurance companies to provide coverage when property owners can find no other market.

Kidnaper Shot, Slain; Boy Freed Unharm'd

TERRYVILLE, Conn. (UPI)—A man armed with a shotgun kidnaped a 6-year-old boy from a school bus stop today and then held up in woods where he was shot and killed in a gun battle with police.

The boy was rescued unharm'd but one patrolman was wounded.

Police identified the abductor as Albert Bunn, 35, an employee of the Bristol Water Department.

Authorities said Bunn held his pickup truck at a bus stop in Terryville, where young Michael Albee, 6, and Mrs. Donald Albee, 40, were waiting for a ride to school about 8:30 a.m.

Bunn first grabbed a little girl, police said, and she screamed and squirmed away. He then grabbed the Albee boy and drove to his home near the Bristol-Burlington town line.

He abandoned the truck and took the boy into the wooded hills behind the house.

State and local police closed in and tried to talk Bunn out of the woods with loudspeakers. He refused to answer.

The gunfire broke out shortly afterward. Bunn was killed and Bristol patrolman Joseph Noera was wounded in the face, chest, arm and stomach by a shotgun blast.

The Albee boy, son of Michael and Mrs. Donald Albee, of Terryville, was returned home.

Police said the older boy attempted the holdup while the other youngster acted as a lookout outside the bank. Both were booked on suspicion of attempted robbery.

An uncooperative teller balked the holdup.
