

REORGANIZATION OF STATE ROAD DEPARTMENT The State Road Department was created ten years before he became Governor. He reorganized the Department and put in capable, efficient men who believed with him that the people wanted service and as a result in the three years he has served there has been built more than a thousand miles of hard-surfaced roads, from 18 to 22 feet wide on a 30-foot road bed. REDUCTION OF STATE TAXES


