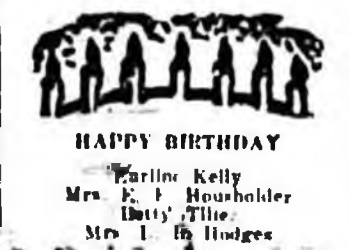
Immediately following the style show, Miss Dorothy Punell announced that instruction in names will be offered next Tuesday evening at the Service Men's Club.

Main British Blow Is Yet To Fall In Egypt, Says Cairo

U. S. Pilots Credited With Good Desert Fighting, 1,450 Axis Prisoners Taken

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27. (AP)—Two new bombing raids on Japanese installations, including a submarine base on Rikish Island in the Aleutians, were reported today by the Navy. The mention of the submarine base was the first reference to such installation in island chain reaching westward from Alaska.

Both bombing assaults were made by Army planes. No report of the damage inflicted was given. The Navy said anti-aircraft fire in both raids but no aerial resistance was encountered.

A Cairo dispatch today said the main blow from the British eighth army is yet to fall in the Egyptian struggle. British troops are moving cautiously.

American pilots over the desert were credited with doing an "excellent job". Behind the lines, the first batch of 1,450 Axis prisoners, including 600 Germans, were moved to the rear for internment.

An earlier dispatch reported German Field Marshal Rommel's frantic efforts to rush reinforcements across the Mediterranean coast in heavy losses as Allied planes shot down four Junkers-52 troop-carrying planes and damaged several more, and blew up a munitions ship near Tobruk.

Port so vulnerable to air attack that Rommel would not use it unless his tanks were supported. (DNR) Official German press reports said that the German army in Berlin is saying that the Allies are using 1,000,000 men, 1000 tanks and "enormous numbers" of planes in the Egyptian offensive and that the turning point of the war will be reached on the El Alamein line in Egypt, and on the Stalingrad and Tuapse fronts in Russia.

Tanks made in the United States, and Britain, and British, Indian, Australian, South African, New Zealand, Greek and Fighting Force troops are being moved to the front by air through the breaks in the Axis barbed wire and mine fields under artillery barrages that rock the buildings of Alexandria, 80 miles from the front.

Offering protection overhead are U. S. BAP and BAAF air forces that completely rule the skies. Our tanks, following the infantry spearheads, are a force of Rommel's panzers which fled after a sharp duel, leaving many blazing tanks on the field, according to a dispatch from United Press Correspondent, Richard D. McMillan.

The clash was in a gap held by British and Australian troops. The main tank battle was yet to be joined, however, as Rommel so far has risked only groups of "medium."

Holland Urges Quick Action On Gas Tax

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 27. (AP)—Governor Holland said last night that legislation to raise gasoline tax amendments to the state constitution "is absolutely necessary to lift the burden from our people and put our country on a solid financial foundation."

Speaking here in the first of three Florida radio broadcasts he will make this week urging voters to go to the polls for the November general election, the governor also asked for ratification of an amendment permitting quicker changes of the constitution and for voting regulation of hunting and fishing under a constitutional agency.

He did not discuss the other six amendments on the ballot because, he said, he felt it is proper to confine his discussion to those three amendments which he actually recommended to the 1941 legislature.

Liquor Prices Will Rise November 1

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27. (AP)—With the new crop of draft beer, the consumer will begin paying more for alcoholic beverages, a straight distillation beginning Nov. 1.

The Office of Price Administration announced today that the price of distilled spirits will be raised to the maximum level of 10 cents per gallon, effective Nov. 1.

The maximum change of price for the Pacific Northwest is 10 cents per gallon.

WPB Appreciates Herald's Help

A telegram of thanks to the Sanford Herald which has aided in promoting the scrap metal drive, was today received from Donald M. Nelson, chairman of the War Production Board. The wire stated:

"I feel that the nation owes the newspapers a debt of thanks for the invaluable service they have rendered through the newspaper-united scrap metal drive. I am reluctant to call on you further at this time. The results of the newspaper campaign, however, have been so great and more industrial scrap is so essential to solve the nation's winter supply problem, that I am asking you to give that effort you feel is appropriate towards its collection along the lines outlined recently to your national committee. Taxi Ordinance Passed By City Commissioners

Requirements Of Cab Drivers Altered Slightly In Bill

Following considerable discussion during past meetings, the City Commission at their meeting last evening, passed an ordinance regulating the operation of taxicabs and fares charged within the City of Sanford. The city clerk revealed today:

"The ordinance considered part of the ordinance that requiring taxi owners to furnish liability bond for passengers, was eliminated and the ordinance required that all owners not having such insurance must post in their taxis a sign having letters of operability. The sign on the vehicle is not protected by public liability insurance."

It is required that all persons operating taxicabs within the City must obtain a written permit at the City clerk's office within the next 30 days in order to operate. The penalty for violation of this law, it is stated, is a fine of up to \$200 or imprisonment up to 90 days.

The ordinance also provides for the following: laborer, taxicab electrician, janitor, lead painter, plumber, operator of gas line distributing system, electrician, mechanic, pipefitter, office helper, man, hoisting and portable generator, chauffeur, fireman, supervisor of pumping plant, automotive mechanic, pipefitter, office helper, men and women interested in employment will be required to fill out civil service Form No. 57 if they are tradesman and Form 57 if they are clerical workers.

There is an urgent need for classified laborers at Post Office. Mr. Wright explained that information concerning pay for positions on this post may be secured from the Post Office.

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United States Army, Marines Resist Japanese Assaults By Land, Sea And In The Air

NEW YORK, Oct. 27. (AP)—The Japanese broadcast of their versions of the big naval and air battle yesterday in the Solomon Islands area, claiming the invaders' ships, United States warships, including our aircraft carriers and one battleship, Washington Navy Yard, Navy, confirmed that the Japanese were going on another of their "island-hopping" expeditions.
