'Axis Attempts To Close El Alamein Line Gaps Stopped

Allies Shoot Down 7 Enemy Planes, Hammer Rommel's Forces In Egypt

(By Associated Press) In the Egyptian desert, the British army beat off Axis attempts to close gaps driven into the El Alamein line. An Allied plane hammered at Rommel's forces, United States airmen shot down four of the seven Allied bag.

Italy claimed Allied frontal assaults had been repelled and said a landing attempt on the supply Port of Matruh was turned back.

Berlin reported 104 British planes were destroyed in the El Alamein skirmish.

Captured along by the first rush of the Germans to crush Marshal Erwin Rommel's African force, the Allies in Britain's Eighth Army have driven through gaps in his main El Alamein defense line and have fanned out to the rear of Axis "soft-shelled" infantry and artillery divisions from the front said last night.

With the support of an American and Allied air force that was supreme in the skies, and massed artillery which awoke the desert with the most innumerable barrage of fire, the British, Australians, Indians, New Zealanders, South Africans, and snouting Greeks smashed through advance enemy lines at one point in their first lunges before dawn Saturday and rolled over his main artillery, minefield, and other points.

The Allied forces took up positions behind these unarmored forces, front line dispatches said, and presumably the purpose was to cut them up piece-meal.



Main British Blow Is Yet To Fall In Egypt, Says Cairo

U. S. Pilots Credited With Good Desert Fighting, 1,450 Axis Prisoners Taken

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27. (AP)—Two new bombing raids on Japanese installations including a submarine base on Kaka Island in the Aleutians were reported today by the Navy. The commandant of the naval air base was the first reference to such installation in island chain reaching westward from Alaska.

Both bombing assaults were made by Army planes. No report of the latest incursion was given. The Navy said anti-aircraft batteries were active in both raids but no aerial resistance was encountered.

(By Associated Press) A Cairo dispatch today said the main blow from the British eighth army is yet to fall in the Egyptian struggle. British troops are moving cautiously.

American pilots over the desert were credited with doing an "excellent job". Behind the lines, the first batch of 600 Germans, including 1,100 Axis prisoners, were moved to the rear for internment.

An early dispatch reported German Field Marshal Rommel's frantic efforts to rush reinforcements and supplies across the Mediterranean coast him further heavy losses as Allied planes shot down four Junkers-52s carrying planes and damaged several more, and blew up a munitions ship near Tobruk, a port so vulnerable to air attack that Rommel would not use it unless his needs were desperate. (DWB, official German news agency)—(Associated Press) Cited in Berlin as saying that the Allies are using 1,000,000 men, 1,000 tanks and "enormous numbers" of planes in their Egyptian offensive, so that the turning point of the war will be reached on the El Alamein line in Egypt, and on the Stalingrad and Tuyap fronts in Russia.

Tanks made in the United States and Britain, and British, Indian, Australian, South African, New Zealand, Greek and Fighting French troops are storming ahead side by side through the break in the Axis barrier in the sand and mine fields under artillery barrages that rock the buildings of Alexandria, 80 miles away. Offering protection overhead are U. S., RAF and SAAF air forces that completely rule the skies.

Our tanks, following the infantry spearheads, met one force of Rommel's which fled in a sharp duel leaving many blazing tanks on the field, according to a front dispatch from United Press Correspondent, Richard D. McMillan. The clash was in a gap held by British and Australian troops. The main tank battles are yet to be joined, however, as Rommel so far has risked only groups of "mediums."

Holland Urges Quick Action On Gas Tax

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 27. (AP)—Governor Holland said last night that ratification of the gasoline tax amendment to the state constitution "is absolutely necessary to lift the debt burden from our roads and bridges on a solid financial foundation."

Speaking here in the first three Florida radio broadcasts he will make this week, urging voters to go to the polls in the Nov. 3 general election, the governor also asked for ratification of an amendment permitting quaker conscientious objectors to serve in the regulation of hunting and fishing under a constitutional agency.

He did not discuss the other six amendments on the ballot because he said, "I feel it is proper to confine my discussion to those twelve amendments which are recommended to the 1942 legislature."

Liquor Prices Will Rise November 1

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27. (AP)—With the sole exception of draft beer, the consumer will begin paying more for alcohol, beer, wine, distilled spirits and tobacco Nov. 1.

The Office of Price Administration disclosed that October is continuing services to non-discriminatory, moderate and reasonable measures to control the manufacture, importation, distribution and sale of liquor in the non-metropolitan areas.

Taxi Ordinance Passed By City Commissioners

Requirements Of Cab Drivers Altered Slightly In Bill

Following considerable discussion during past meetings, the City Commission at their meeting last evening, passed an ordinance regulating the operation of taxi cars and fares charged with City Clerk, N. W. Gandy city clerk revealed today.

A formerly considered part of the ordinance, that of requiring taxi owners to furnish liability coverage for passengers, was eliminated, and in its place it is provided that all owners not having such insurance must post in their taxis a sign having letters of one-half inch stating, "This vehicle is not protected by public liability insurance."

It is required that all persons or firms operating taxis within the city, must obtain a written permit at the City Clerk's office within the next 30 days in order to operate taxis here. The penalty for violation of this law is stated as a fine of up to \$200 or imprisonment for 90 days.
