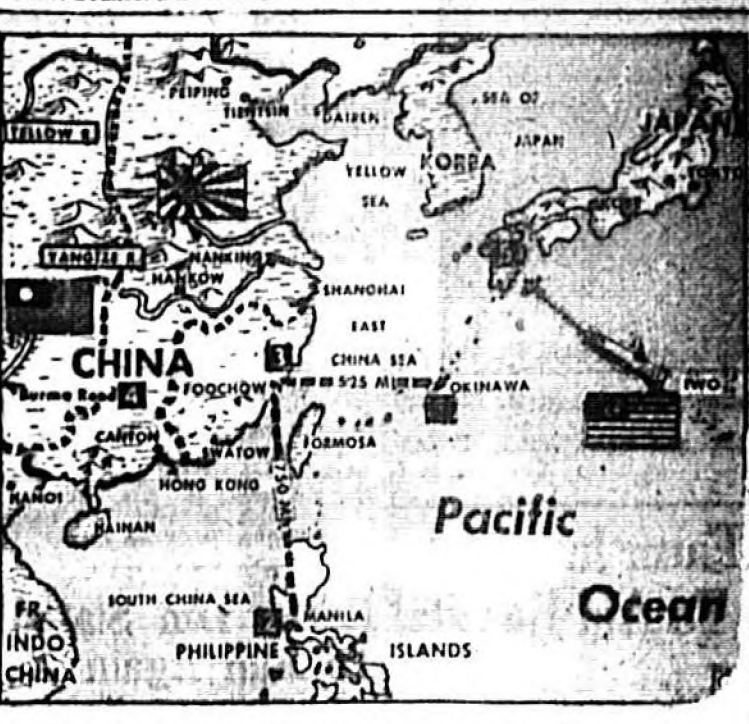

Industrial Opportunities

The South in general, and Florida in particular, have won a tremendous economic victory as a result of the Interstate Commerce Commission's ruling last Saturday...

In addition to this adjustment the railroads were ordered to establish a uniform system of freight classification for the entire nation, and pending in the Supreme Court is a suit instituted by Governor Ellis Arnold of Georgia...

The Commission's ruling is a frank admission that the South has been the object of unjust and unreasonable discrimination ever since the Civil War. Nor can this injustice be blamed exclusively on the railroads since their rate structure has been subject to overhauling by the ICC for 50 years...

To what extent unjust freight rates made the South the nation's "Economic Problem No. 1" may be seen from the fact that it costs \$1.22 per 100 pounds to ship certain commodities 500 miles in the east, but \$1.73 in the South, or 42 percent more. In Florida the disparity is even greater, 15 percent more being charged over other sections in the South.

As a result of excessive freight rates the industrial development of the South has been seriously retarded and has lagged far behind that of other sections of the country. No southern manufacturer could compete against manufacturers in the North and east, favored as they were on freight rates. Those who tried were compelled to pay lower rates for labor.

We do not expect any overnight transition from an impoverished rural economy to a strong industrialized position but the groundwork has been laid and as further inequalities are corrected the industrial strength of the South will grow and many of our former problems embracing low wages, migratory labor, seasonal employment, struggling young industries and impoverished communities, will tend to disappear.

A whole new horizon of hope is opened for Sanford in this freight rate decision and the opportunity it affords for industrial growth in Florida and throughout the South.

Threat of the World

Hermann Goering, delicately fumbling the ornaments which dangle from his capacious chest, gives a curious world the "low-down" on the great human mystery of Hitler and his gang. Adolf himself, says the gorgeous Reichsmarshal, was narrow and ignorant. Von Ribbentrop was a scoundrel, and Hess was eccentric, but a man of tremendous energy. And so on.

Such comments are interesting, and illuminating in some ways, but obviously come far short of telling the whole story. How was it possible for such a little group of men, none of them distinguished or brilliant, to arrive at the point where they could almost swing the world by the tail? Emerging almost from the gutter, in a few years they nearly had the world in their hands, and indeed came near to destroying our present civilization.

What a congenial study this would have been for Thomas Carlyle, the great historian and essayist of the last century, with his rare grasp of men and their minds! It may take another generation for analysts to do historical and psychological justice to this incredible group of rascals who set the world on fire.

Tax Easement

Thousands of small business men are cheered by suggestions for immediate changes in the federal tax laws, tending to improve their "cash position" and relieving them from some of their burdens.

It is realized, of course, that great wars cannot be fought, and governments kept solvent, without imposing higher taxes than usual; but there is always danger of killing the goose that lays the golden egg, and this can be done even more easily with the "little fellows" than with the big ones.

Not only do many small corporations need relief, but many business concerns so small that they lack the dignity of incorporation. Even these have their use and value in the national economy, and in many cases their loss or destruction would seriously discommode larger concerns which they serve in one way and another.

Congressmen Seek Sugar Ban Release

WASHINGTON, May 23. (FNS)—With a world sugar shortage already existing and becoming more acute from day to day, Florida congressmen are working to get Congress to eliminate or modify the quota system of domestic sugar production under which each producing area, such as Florida, is restricted to a certain amount of production...

Speaking before the House Food Investigating Committee, Representative J. Hardin Peterson stated "If it would just be possible for Florida to produce the sugar she can produce, there wouldn't be any shortage." Peterson arranged for Josiah Ferris, Jr., assistant secretary of the United States Sugar Corporation and spokesman for the Florida Cooperative Sugar Association, to appear before the committee and explain the situation as it exists in Florida where production is now far below its potential because of legal restrictions and scarcity of man-power and materials.

Both Representatives Peterson and Rogers filed statements with the committee endorsing Ferris' stand. Ferris told the committee that in the Everglades area sugar cane planting could be increased

TWO LETTERS

Two letters have recently come to me from farm leaders in Florida which I am glad to pass on to you. The first came from the Highlands County Farm Bureau at Sebring, and it touches on matters of serious concern to every Floridian and to every American. Dumbarton Oaks and Bretton Woods. It reads:

I shall soon write a column which will summarize the results of a set of hearings on Fixed Incomes in the War Economy, which deals directly with the incomes of white collar workers during the war. 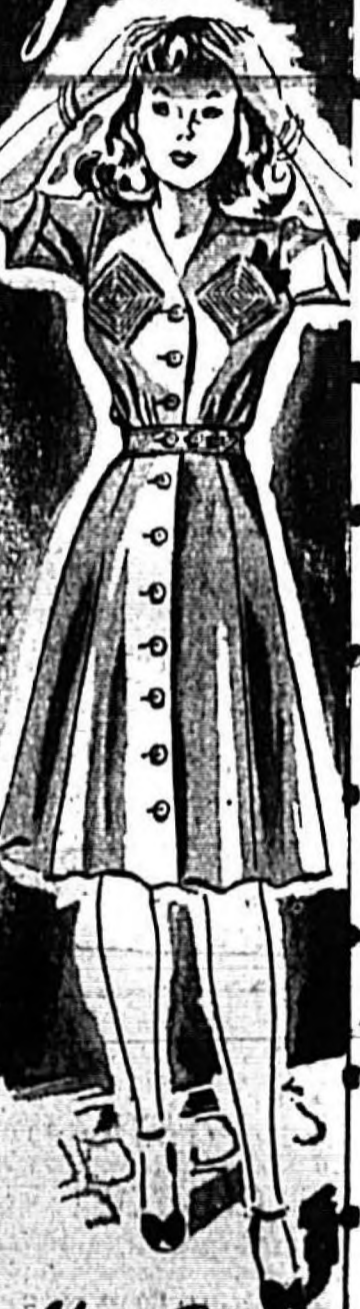

**Business Men Fight New Commission Bill**

TALLAHASSEE, May 23. (FNS) — State business leaders presented a strong argument against Governor Caldwell's proposed Florida Improvement Commission bill at a joint hearing last week.

Harold Cole, executive vice president of the Florida State Chamber of Commerce, speaking with the authority of the Executive Committee, told the joint session:

"It is our opinion that this proposed bill presents a continuation of a socialist trend through its invasion into the field of private enterprise."

It creates a state commission authorized to buy, build or lease for its own operation a multitude of business enterprises including warehouses, refrigeration and freezing plants, pipelines, water supplies, etc., as well as toll roads, bridges and tunnels. It also grants the right to condemn practically any and all types of property for the purpose of the act.

"It is our belief that the creation of this commission would endanger the welfare of the State in that it could be used as a club over existing private enterprises 'engaged' in the various classifications of business enumerated; that it would close the door to future building or expansion by private enterprise in these fields; that project of the commission would be tax free, increasing the burden borne by business and citizens and decreasing revenue of counties and municipalities; and that the unlimited scope of activities authorized would give the commission unlimited and unreasonable power and authority over private business enterprises and citizens."

Other leaders who spoke in opposition to the bill were Carl D. Broder representing the Tampa Chamber of Commerce, V. H. Northcutt, president of the Fla. Bankers Association, T. G. Mixon, Exchange National Bank, Tampa, C. G. McGehee, president Associated Industries of Florida, and Jan. Ellis representing Railway labor organizations.

Life Insurance Paid Florida Families

NEW YORK CITY, May 23. (Special) - Florida families received \$4,515,000 in life insurance death benefit payments in 1944, according to the first three months of this year, compared with \$4,000,000 under 1943 policies in the corresponding period of last year, the Institute of Life Insurance reported today. "These payments reflect the greater war mortality under the intensified activities on all war fronts," the Institute said in announcing the figures. "The payments in this state were 10.5% greater than those of the same period of 1944 entirely due to the war-caused deaths, as the civilian death rate on the home front has shown a material decrease under a year ago. Nationally, this has meant many millions of dollars going to the families of service men killed in action or who died in service. These payments are in addition to those made under National Service Life Insurance." Of the aggregate payments in

Victory Gardens Are Urged As Way To Fight Rationing

WASHINGTON, May 23. (AP Newsfeatures) - This year's Victory Garden effort promises to be the biggest since the program started in 1942. Because of high prices, the shortage of canned vegetables, and the prospect of a meat famine for civilians next summer the Department of Agriculture estimates the number of Victory Gardens will exceed 20 million - the high mark reached in 1943. The War Food Administration says gardens will be more necessary in 1945 than they were in 1944, when some 18,500,000 were planted. Victory Garden interest slumped in March 1944, when the OPA took many canned products off ration lists. Then when the Allies swept across France that summer, many people assumed the European war would soon be over and there would be no need for a big garden program in 1945. This year, however, more food will go to more fighting men overseas. Food authorities say that even after war ends in Europe all the garden stuff that can be grown will be needed. Large numbers of service men will not be demobilized until both Japan and Germany are defeated. Furthermore, people in the liberated countries will need large supplies for some time. The outlook for gardening materials is generally good. Crops of vegetable seeds last year were bumper in most areas. There may be some bottlenecks in deliveries, so gardeners are urged to

order seed, fertilizer and insecticide early. The fertilizer situation is not as good as a year ago but there should be enough for most gardeners.

The Department recommends long-season gardens wherever possible—the planting of early crops and late ones, often for two or three harvests from a single row. Details of succession planting should be settled well in advance of the first planting so the ground can produce continually during the season. Employees are urged to encourage employee's gardening, perhaps providing the land and plowing. The Department emphasizes the importance of experienced local garden leaders. Much of the success of the program is attributed to these old-timers. The average garden should be more productive this year. Gardeners have learned by experience what kinds of vegetables fit the needs and tastes of their families. They also have learned what grows best in various soils and how to fight plant insects and diseases. The tomato is by far the most popular of Victory Garden vegetables. Sampling surveys made last year by the Bureau of Agri-

cultural Economics showed that tomatoes were grown in about 40 out of every 100 war-time gardens. Onions, radishes and lettuce were favorites everywhere. Snap beans, wax beans, beets, carrots and peppers were generally popular.
