TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Gov. Bob Graham said Monday students and teachers with AIDS should be barred from the classroom, but added that state government should leave the matter up to local school boards.

"I know it's difficult because the child who might have the disease should not carry a moral onus." Graham said. "But the fact is that we do not know what we need to know about the communicability of this disease to other children. I think we have to err on the side of safety."

Four Florida counties - Daval, Lee, Orange and Dade - have barred students diagnosed as having AIDS or as having been exposed to the malady from their classrooms, citing the risk to classroom teachers have died of AIDS in the past students.

Aquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome, which researchers believe is spread through the

exchange of body fluids, ravages its victims's immune systems and leaves them vulnerable to deadly "opportunistic" infections.

Florida has had about 600 diagnosed AIDS cases thus far and 18 of the patients were children under age 5. Doctors say most caught it from their mothers before birth or through blood transfusions.

Ten of Dade County's 16,500 public and private five years - a rate higher than the general population. Of the 1.7 million Dade residents. 225 have died of AIDS.

The Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta has said there is no proof the disease can be spread through casual contact. And the Florida Medical Association recommended on Sept. 15 that children suffering AIDS be permitted to attend class as long as they do not exhibit open sores. fevers, coughs or diarrhea.

Graham said he saw no need for a statewide AIDS-in-the-classroom policy because "it appears as if local school districts are responding appropriately and utilizing the best scientific evidence and guidance in reaching judgements on this matter.

Water Bill Increases May Be Less Steep

Sanford residential customers who don't use a lot of the city's water or tap into the sewerservice much may be getting smaller increases than in the past in their sewer and water

City commissioners and City Manager Frank Faison discussed alternative methods for raising those rates and Falson pointed out to the commissioners that historically the city has persecuted small families who have tried to conserve water.

The city code shows that water rates are charged per thousand gallons of use to residences and that there are discounts for average-consumption users and much larger discounts for those who use a lot of water, such as businesses.

'The small family working hard to conserve their water is paying a higher rate," Faison

Some of the alternatives sugother areas of Florida with a large degree of success. Faison said, Those alternatives include reducing the rates charged to small users, such as families, who try to conserve water, and making up the lost revenue by increasing impact fees and connection charges, and also increasing monthly charges for those whose demand on the system is greater.

In one example that Falson showed commissioners, monthly charges for residences and small users were \$21 for water and \$31 for sewer, while the same charges for a hospital were \$1,633 for water and \$2,450 for sewer. Those were monthly charges for making the system available to the user.

"Don't think in terms of putting all the cost on consumption," Falson warned commissioners. Faison said there should be a charge for putting demand on the system, a charge for using the system and a charge for any impact that growth would have on the system.

Although Commissioner David Farr suggested a charge for growth impact may discourage growth in the city, Faison said that his research showed that wasn't the case.

Islamic Group Says It Killed Soviet Hostage

anonymous caller claiming to represent a besieged Islamic fundamentalist group in Tripoli said today his group has killed one of four Soviet embassy officials kidnapped by the Islamic Jihad organization.

The underground Islamic Jihad had said earlier it would "start killing" the Soviets three diplomats and the embassy doctor — at 1:30 p.m. (6:30 a.m. EDT) unless Moscow forced a halt to a Syrian-backed onslaught against its Tawheed Islami movement allies in the northern port city.

In a brief telephone call just minutes before today's deadline, the anonymous caller told a Beirut radio station the death sentence had already been carried out on one Soviet.

"At 1 p.m. (6 a.m. EDT) today the kidnapped commercial attache of the Soviet embassy was executed as threatened by the Islamic Jihad Organization and the Tawheed Islami. God is the mighty one, the all knowing." the telephone caller told the Christian Voice of Lebanon.

There was no immediate confirmation by police or officials of the report, which at first identified the executed Soviet as the cultural attache, Arkady Katkov. The Lebanese Communist newspaper Al Nida identified the commercial attache as Oleg

"At 3:30 p.m., we will execute consular attache Arkady Katkov if a comprehensive cease-fire is not declared in Tripoli," the caller said. "We will destroy all

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - An Soviet and Syrian establishments as long as a cease-fire is not arranged in Tripoli."

More than one hour after the second deadline there was still no news of a second killing.

Soviet Charge D'Affaires Yuri Suslikov visited Lebanese President Amin Gemayel today in an attempt to help secure the four men's release.

In Washington, the State Department said it had no immediate confirmation of the death of Soviet attache. "If the report proves to be true, we would deplore, and indeed, condemn such violence, spokesman Peter Martinez said.

The earlier warning, which stressed the Islamic Jihad was coordinating its moves with the Khaled Ibn al Walid Forces of the Islamic Liberation Organization, listed three conditions it said would have to be met if Moscow wants to save the lives of the four Soviet officials.

They are an immediate cease-fire in Tripoli, withdrawal of all hostile forces from around the city, and condemnation by Moscow of the war against Tripoli and a promise the war will not be resumed if the four Soviets are released.

The Islamic Liberation Organization, a previously unknown underground group that has also claimed responsibility for the kidnapping, sent statements and copies of the diplomatic identification papers of two of the kidnapped Russians to Beirut newspapers.

Captains' Job Switch Routine, Polk Says

"Nothing's permanent in life. I just wanted to rotate them." Seminole County Sheriff John Polk said of his recent decision to switch the duties of jail administrator Capt. Luke A. Stallworth and Capt. Jay Leman, head of support services of the sheriff's department.

Leman, who was included in an August rotation of these of the sheriff's four captains. moving from head of investigations to support services said, "I don't want to talk about it," when asked about the latest change.

However, Stallworth, 46, said he was surprised on Sept. 20 when Polk told him of his job change, which is effective Nov. 1.

Stallworth, who started as a corrections officer at the jail 13 years ago, and who within two months had been moved into the sheriff's department as a deputy and advanced through the ranks, said, "I had anticipated not being reassigned for quite some time ... if at all."

The August switch was the most major ever among captains, Polk said, adding, it is common for deputies, sergeants and lieutenants to rotate.

Rotations, which are at his discretion, he said. give officers broader experience and increase their effectiveness. "It all depends on need. It's for

Polk the betterment of the individual and the department and makes it better for the citizens to have better rounded law enforcement people." Polk said.

Leman, 39, with a master's degree in criminal Justice from Rollins College, has no experience in corrections, but has headed all other divisions of the department in the past. A Casselberry resident. Leman has been with the sheriff's department 15 years, personnel records show.

"He's a captain and I wanted him there (in the jail)." Polk said. "I feel he's qualifed."

Polk, who in August also ordered Capt. Roy Hughey and Capt. Beau Taylor to switch jobs, with Hughey replacing Leman as head of

investigations and Taylor taking Hughey's old post as head of patrol, while Leman moved from investigations to support services and Stallworth remained as head of the jail, said, "All my captains are capable of fitting into any slot."

A recent pay raise would seem to indicate that at the time the new pay scale was established officials were considering Stallworth as an administrator and not as a sheriff's captain. After the raise goes into effect, as of today, the three other captains, including Leman, carn \$37,648 a year, while Stallworth, whose salary increase was figured on the percentage of increase granted to county administrators, makes less at \$37,081. sheriff's spokesman John Spolski said.

Stallworth, of Forest City, has been a captain since 1983 and has headed all divisions of the department except patrol. He has, he said. extensive experience in patrol and it appeared to him that he was groomed to replace James Shoultz when he retired as jail administrator in the spring of 1984.

He also has a master's degree in criminal justice from Rollins College and before stepping into Shoultz's position twice attended an intensive corrections training program in Colorado. There, he said, he was exposed to information

AIDS Vaccine Seen Unlikely For At Least 15 More Years

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Public Health Service backed off from its optimistic prediction made a year ago and now says a vaccine to protect people from AIDS probably will not be available in 10 years.

Instead, the agency announced a new long-range plan to combat the deadly disease by setting a goal to eliminate transmission of the AIDS virus by the year 2000 and thus reduce the number of AIDS cases.

The plan, outlined Monday in a journal published by the Public Health Service, said that as the AIDS virus spreads through the population before preventive measures begin. "the harder it will be to bring it under control."

Other goals are to reduce the increase in the transmission of the AIDS infection by 1987 and to reduce the increase in the incidence of the disease itself by 1990. It sometimes takes a few years for the disease to develop after infection has occurred.

Soviet Arms Proposal Unattractive

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The White House, leery of Soviet intentions and motives, has warned that the Kreinlin's new offer of a 50 percent cut in nuclear weapons may not be as attractive as it appears.

After welcoming the new proposal over the weekend as a possible basis for negotiation, the administration sounded a sudden note of caution Monday as the offer was put before U.S. negotiators at arms talks in Geneva. Switzerland.

"Look very closely at what you hear and see regarding this offer." White House spokesman Larry Speakes told

"It's a rotten proposal," he groused, "The way they define 50 percent is not the way the Americans do.

Pilot Saw Bad Weather: Tape

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Transcripts show the Delta Airlines jetliner that crashed near the Dallas airport in August killing 136 people ran into a tornado-like disturbance that may have been visible from the control

A transcript of the cockpit recordings of another plane that landed minutes before the doomed Delta jetliner crashed Aug. 2 showed the pilot — his plane safely on the ground — observing. "It looks like a tornado or something: I've never seen anything like it.'

The air traffic control tower, which had a view of the same developing weather as the plane on the ground, did not report that information to Delta Flight No. 191 as it approached the airport through a thunderstorm.

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) - Under a blanket of secrecy. launch engineers stood by today for the start of the shuttle Atlantis's countdown to blastoff Thursday on a flight to reportedly carry two defense satellites into orbit.

Under a Defense Department policy established for the first military shuttle mission in January, NASA officials said they would not announce when the countdown began. but it was expected to start at 5 a.m. EDT.

If all goes well. Atlantis, the fourth and final member of NASA's shuttle fleet, will take off on its first flight — the 21st shuttle mission in four years - sometime between 10:20 a.m. Thursday and 1:20 p.m. The exact launch time is classified.

The bureau said there was an estimated 7 percent increase in the number of households in the four-year period compared to a 4.2 percent rise in the population.

The report also estimated the number of households in the United States at 86 million, compared to 80.3 million in April

The estimates ranged from 9.5 million households in California, the most populous state, to 165,000 in Alaska, the least

"The more rapid growth in households than in population is partly due to changes in age structure as well as to changes in living arrangements," the report said.

The population 18 years of age and older, which includes virtually all householders, increased by 6.6 percent between 1980 and

changes in the nation's living arrangements—age 18 declined by 1.7 percent and dropped from 28.1 percent to 26.5 percent of the

An earlier bureau report showed a statistically sharp drop in the average number of persons per household - from 2.76 to 2.71 — and the new report noted the drop was "entirely due to the drop among persons under age 18."

Two weeks ago, the bureau said in a report on marital and living arrangements that there was a large growth in the number of unmarried-couple households, which it said has been growing by an average of 105,000 a year and now totals nearly 2 million. That report said 70 percent of those households are childless.

At the same time, the bureau showed that young people are postponing marriage and as a result there has been a decline in the annual number of births. In 1984, there

Junk The Job Corps

The Job Corps is one of the most expensive and least effective job-training programs in the United States. Nevertheless, Congress has given this Great Society boundoggle a new lease on life by funding the program next year at its current level of \$617 million.

Established in 1965 as a centerpiece of President Lyndon Johnson's War on Poverty. the Job Corps was designed to aid disadvantaged school dropouts between the ages of 16 and 21 who have no prospects for advancement. In theory, the corps removes these individuals from their negative environment and then provides them with food, shelter, spending money, clothes, health care, counseling, education, and vocational training. After a year or two, they are supposedly ready to enter the work force with a renewed sense of responsibility.

Trouble is, that rosy scenario is largely a sham.

It is estimated that two-thirds of the enlistees quit the corps before completing their training course. Many of the graduates. moreover, are no better off than when they entered the program.

In fact, several studies by the General Accounting Office have concluded that Job Corps trainees do not perform materially better than other youths who applied for but declined participation in — the program. Indeed, the GAO found that corps trainees who dropped out within the first 30 days had higher earnings afterward than did those who remained in the program up to six months. And a 1981 UCLA study documented that the trainees who received corps assistance in finding work actually had a lower employment rate than the trainees who tried to find work on their own.

More often than not, the graduates are unable to find jobs in the field for which they have been trained. For example, the Job Corps's mail clerk program places fewer than one in six trainees. The corps is still producing would-be railway clerks despite the dwindling job opportunities in this field. Only recently has the corps offered a limited program for word processing, even though this is one of the fastest-growing job fields.

Meanwhile, the Office of Management and Budget estimates that each of the Job Corps's 40.000 training slots cost \$15,000 per year more than three times the cost of other types of federal, state, and local training programs.

One case in point is the Reagan administration's Job Training Partnership program.

The JTP, which began three years ago. assists approximately 600,000 disadvantaged youths at a cost of about \$3,200 each through federal subsidies to businesses. To date, the program has placed 68 percent of its trainces in private-sector jobs.

President Reagan asked Congress to climinate funding for the Job Corps next year. Unfortunately, the Democratic-controlled House came to the program's rescue, and taxpayers are stuck with the corps for fiscal 1986. Clearly, the continuation of this profligate program is a depressing testimonial to the triumph of hope over expectation.

Liberals Lose Liberal-Town: New York?

Not for the first time, political writers have all policy issues: in New York, everyone but ignored the national significance of a story right under their noses.

Consider: The Democratic Party is the more liberal of our two major parties. Several weeks ago, this more liberal party held a primary election for mayor in what is often called the most liberal city in America — New York. It is a city heavy with allegedly liberal voting groups blacks, Hispanies, Jews, activist women.

Liberal party, liberal city, liberal constituencies. In addition, two of the three candidates in the primary were clearly liberals: the activist City Council president, Carol Bellamy, and Herman Farrell, a black assemblyman. The third candidate in this contest in a liberal party. in a liberal city, with liberal constituencies was the incumbent mayor, Ed Koch, Mayor Koch, oddly enough, is often described as a neoconservative.

In New York, Koch has been pummeled by liberals for eight years now as being too tough on crime and too insensitive and harsh on minority and women's issues. He has been accused of "polarizing" the city. He has even been attacked for being too hard-line on foreign including the mayor - is allowed to have a foreign policy.

So who won the race in liberalism's capital city? Why, the neo-conservative, Ed Koch, Not only did he win it - he got almost two-thirds of the votes! He got more than three times the number of votes as his closest competitor. According to an NBC exit poll, he got about as many black votes as the black candidate, and carried the Hispanic vote by 3 to 1. He beat feminist Carol Bellamy by more than 3 to 1 among female voters. He swept the votes of those who describe themselves as liberals. He also won by a landslide in Manhattan, which is the most liberal borough in the most liberal city with the most liberal constituencies, in the more liberal party. In the words of Richard Scammon. America's premier elections analyst, Koch put together "a neo-conservative Rainbow Coali-

What's going on here? Well, of course, Koch was the incumbent. He raised much more money for his campaign than his opponents raised for theirs. He's been a good mayor. He's an irrepressible personality. All that helps.

But his main opponent, Ms. Bellamy, was no unknown. She raised about a million dollars. She received plenty of free media publicity in the media capital of the world. There were five public debates.

Roch could have been seriously challenged if only one condition had been met: if the voters disagreed with him. If the voters had disagreed with his views, there would have been electoral profit to be made by attacking all his alleged neo-conservative hard-line sins. That such a campaign never successfully materialized should give us a clue about the status of the old knee-jerk liberalism.

Clue: It is deader than a doornail. It should be remembered that the "new politics" strain of liberalism began in the overheated political climate of New York City, and had real strength for a while. But today, even liberal constituencies don't support the sort of liberalism that is perceived to be soft on crime, pro-quotas, pro-welfare-giveaways, pro-militant feminism. As a New York observer with a harsh but alliterative way with words put it to me: "The limousine liberal, lemming left — was liquidated."

Currency And The **Deficit**

The meeting of the finance ministers of the five major Western democracies - the United States. Great Britain, France, West Germany, and Japan — on Sunday, September 22 was historic in purpose, if not in effect. It marked the reversal of the Reagan Administration's philosophical unwillingness to intervene in world financial markets in order to manipulate, or try to manipulate, the demand value of currencies. primarily the dollar. The other nations, who are our strategic allies but economic rivals, agreed to help however they could to push down the dollar and prop up their own

Since 1981, the real rate of exchange for the dollar has risen as much as 70 percent. That translates tato a 70 percent surcharge on American exports and a similar discount on foreign-made goods in this country. Thus Americans buy products made by Toyota and Sony, the British national steel corporation, an textiles from nearly every East Asian country. American tourists crowd the cities and shrines of Western Europe. Meanwhile, foreigners invested some \$90 billion in the United States by purchasing commercial and Treasury bonds, stocks, and capital assets such as plant and equipment, between 1982

Foreign investors in U.S. bonds usually enjoy higher rates of return than they can get elsewhere. As the thinking goes, they have bid the dollar up in their clamor for U.S. currency with which to make those investments.

This theory, like others available to explain the extraordinary strength of the dollar, is tentative, Some U.S. rates are now lower than those available say, in Britain. The dollar has been strong when rates are high and when they are lower. skewing the theorists toward the "safe haven" argument that the U.S. is on all counts a more secure investment whatever the return.

Ironically, the faster economic growth means higher rates, reflecting increased demand for capital by business for expansion and purchase of stocks and bonds by individuals and institutions. The 15 percent decline in the dollar since February - welconabed by U.S. durable goods manufacturers as a sign of relief from pressure by imports - reflects the general collapse in economic growth to an average of 1 percent for the first two quarters of 1985.

The football team at Columbia University no doubt bulks very small in the minds of readers of this column, but recent events involving the coach there raise interesting questions of wider importance, about winning in college sports. about what winning means educationally — which is not nothing and about the price you have to pay sometimes to win or even be competitive.

In its first game of the season. Columbia led a favored Harvard 17.0 into the third quarter, whereupon the roof fell in, and Columbia ended up losing, 49-17.

The new head coach, Jim Garrett. blew up in public. He stated that his players had the kind of addiction to losing that dope addicts had to drugs. He said that once his team had met with adversity on the field. it went "back into the sewer." His punter a senior, had performed badly, his low line-drive kicks with little "hang time" had given Harvard ample opportunities for big run-backs - and 49 points. The coach said, in public, that the punter was off the team. He said that the student, if he performed that way in business, would be a fathure.

Perhaps it would have been all right if he had said all of that in the locker room, but he said it in public, it was reported in the press, and, of course, the university officials said

that he had gone much too lar. which, indeed, he had done. Garrett said that he was given to understand that this sort of thing could not happen again, and he apologized for his remarks.

All right, but there's another side to this story. Mr. Garrett had been brought in this year as a form of shock therapy for a Columbia football program that had not been competitive for a generation. Last year, in a brand new stadium, the team lost every one of its games every one!

Last year, when Columbia was playing Dartmouth at Hanover, my own seats were on the Columbia side, and I observed the attitudes of some players on the Columbia bench. Throughout the game, they were relaxing and chatting, not paying much attention to the game. No one seemed sad when Columbia fell behind by some enormous score. When Columbia receivers dropped passes, some of the players thought it was funny. Dartmouth won 49-0, playing mostly subs during the second half, and Dartmouth itself did not have much of a team.

That is the situation Garrett was brought to Columbia to "lurn around." He conducted practice sessions that he himself described as "hell."

Mexico's People Boom

WASHINGTON (NEA) - For those concerned about the rising tide of illegal immigration into this country from Mexico, here's a discouraging forecast: You ain't seen nothin' yet.

In the 50 years between 1930 and 1980, Mexico's population in creased more than four-fold, from 17 million to 70 million. By the end of this century, it's projected to stand at 105 million to 120 million. Mexico City, whose population was less than 15 million in 1980, is expected to more than double in size by the end of the century, when it will have more than 30 million residents.

Approximately 40 percent of Mex ico's current work force is unemployed or underemployed - and the gap between job-seekers and work opportunities is expected to widen dramatically until well into the 21st

"The growth in (Mexico's) gross national product... will not be sufficient to supply enough jobs for the potential labor force," warns Dr. Tomas Miklos, a Mexico City foundation executive. "The United States will continue to serve as our escape valve, with much of the immigration being illegal."

As recently as the early 1970s. Mexico's birthrate was so high that the population could double every 20 years.

In 1972, however, a government-sponsored family planning program was inaugurated. This was followed in 1974 by enactment of the General Population Law and creation of the National Population Council.

As a result, the birthrate has declined markedly during the past decade. Nevertheless, Mexico's population today includes millions of young people born prior to the shift in the public's attitude and the government's policy.

Indeed, fully half of Mexico's current population is under 20 years of age. In the coming years, the men will be entering the job market and the women will be having babies, further complicating an already difficult situation.

The U.S. Census Bureau expects Mexico's working-age population to double within the next 20 years. creating an unprecedented demand for more than I million new jobs every year in a country that created an average of just under 500,000 new jobs annually during the

Bureaucrats Travel In Luxury

WASHINGTON - Some luxuryloving State Department and U.S. Information Agency employees have been taking advantage of permissive travel regulations to book passage on posh cruise ships when they take their families on home leave between assignments.

The taxpavers foot the bill for these vacations, which cost several times what the airfare would be.

Travel records of the two agencies show that in fiscal years 1982 to 1984, a total of 260 employees and dependents elected to travel by sea. as the rules allow. The cost was \$556,232 — more than \$400,000 higher than airline tickets would have been.

The public first heard about this abuse of federal travel regulations last year, when the General Accounting Office reported to Rep. Jack Brooks, D-Texas, that one

USIA employee being transferred to Washington from Uruguay included a \$14,440 ride up the Mississippi on the riverboat Delta Queen as part of his family's travel arrangements.

Brooks was so outraged that he asked the auditors to do some more research. They found that the Delta-Queen wasn't the only floating royalty favored by Foreign Service and USIA employees. Out of the 260 seafaring travelers, 120 chose to go - first-class all the way - on the pride of the British passenger fleet. the Queen Elizabeth II.

The total cost for the QEII trips was \$289,305. Airfare would have been roughly \$81,000.

Our associate Tony Capaccio found these examples among the records of the Queen's travelers:

- One State Department employee with six dependents flew from India to Spokane, Wash., for home leave. Then the family completed their circumnavigation of the

globe by flying to New York, taking the QEII to Southamptom and continuing on to India by air. The five-day cruise across the Atlantic cost the taxpayers \$18,407; airfare from New York to London would have been \$4,732.

- A State Department employee and his wife headed home to Los Angeles from Pakistan by flying to Bangkok and embarking on a 19day cruise aboard the Queen Elizabeth to Hawaii, where they took a plane the rest of the way home. The cruise aboard the luxury liner alone set the taxpayers back \$15,050; the couple could have flown from Pakistan to Los Angeles for less than \$3,000.

- A State Department employee going on home leave from Bombay took his three dependents to London by air. They caught the QEII at Southampton, arriving five days later in New York. The Atlantic crossing cost the taxpayers \$10.718, instead of the \$2.704 it would have cost to fly.

 A group of six USIA employees and dependents being transferred to Washington from posts in Pakistan and India sailed on the Queen Elizabeth for \$16,576, or \$12,520 more than airfare would have cost.

The official Foreign Affairs Manual encourages employees to take the most direct and economical routes to and from their foreign posts. But the regulations don't prohibit traveling by sea, and many employees evidently assume that a leisurely cruise on a luxury liner is just one of the perquisites of serving abroad. While USIA employees may go by ship only one way, the State Department lets its people travel by sea both homeward and outward

State Department Comptroller Roger Feldman did not return our calls. A USIA spokesman declined comment on grounds that a legal case on the matter is pending.

Middy Expelled, Sentenced In Academy Court-Martial

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (UPI) - A midshipman, who tearfully admitted stealing \$5,000 in goods from the Midshipman's Store, was expelled and sentenced to three years in prison Monday in only the third court-martial in the 63-year history of the Naval Academy.

"I view you as an individual ... who has snatched defeat from the jaws of victory." military Judge Lt. Col. H.S. Atkins told Clayton Lewis, 20, during sentencing.

Lewis, of Roanoke Rapids, N.C., asked for clemency in a 10-minute plea before sentencing.

"I've brought shame and discredit to my family, my friends. I've already had to suffer the worst punishment ever. I've lost everything I've held dear," the second-year midshipman said.

Lewis could serve no more than 14 months in prison under a pre-trial agreement reached between prosecutors and academy Superin-

tendent Rear Admiral Charles Larson. Lewis is only the third midshipman in the academy's history to be court-martialed and the

first to serve time. "Everything I held dear was lost or crushed by my actions. There is no way I could ever express the remarke Heel," Lewis said.

Under the plea bargain, Lewis pleaded guilty to conspiracy to commit largeny at the store, theft of elothes, record albums and appliances between October 1984 and April 1985.

Lewis also pleaded guilty to twice being absent without leave - between May 4 and May 20 when he learned he was under investigation and again between July 22 and August 15 when he fled the night before his scheduled court-martial.

Lewis was apprehended in Los Angeles Aug. 14 on a misdemeanor charge after he allegedly failed to pay a \$14.86 restaurant tab.

Lewis origionally had been charged with taking \$8,000 in merchandise from the Midshipman's Store. Under the plea agreement, it was disclosed that Lewis had already paid \$2,000 in restitution. and other merchandise was confiscated by the

A Painful Lesson For A Future Star

I have watched Jeff Blake do so many wonderful things on an athletic field that I guess I'm spoiled. When the Seminole High sophomore doesn't do wonderful things I am surprised.

But then again, I have patience and I know that in time Jeff Blake will do wonderful things again. Why? Because Jeff Blake is just 14 years old and possesses all the ingredients of a superb quarterback, except one - experience. He's 14 playing against young men 17 and 18.

I wonder if Jeff Blake knows how hard his job is? He should. Every time one of those 18-year-old behemoths throws him down, it has to hurt. Every time he throws an interception, the pain is etched across his face.

This is tough for Jeff to accept. You see, Jeff has never known much failure or frustration on an athletic field. Jeff has lived a storybook sports existence since he was a little star. Any team that he has played on has been a winner, primarily due to his efforts

During his days in Sanford's Little Major League, Jeff was a strong-armed catcher and a power hitter. He was an all-star as a 10-year-old. During his 11- and 12-year-old years. Sanford played in the state tournament both years. He was one of the best players in the state.

During his days in the Seminole Youth Sports Association football league, Jeff was somewhat of a mini-legend. His powerful arm launched many long scoring bombs to speedy receivers. Lakeview won most of its games by 20 or 30 points. The opposition was overmatched.

Yes. Jeff Blake is everything any coach would want as a quarterback. But he has one thing that a coach doesn't want — he's stubborn. Because things came too easily for Jeff during his younger years, he was given too much freedom by his coaches. He was allowed to improvise to his heart's content. It was nothing for Jeff to change a play at the line of scrimmage or to devise his own strategy on the baseball field.

This improvisation was usually overlooked, though, because it was usually successful. All of Jeff's coaches speak highly of him. They say he will do everything that is asked of him. But they also say he has a mind of his own and wants to do

"Jeff will do everything you tell him but he'll question you, too." Sylvester "Slick" Franklin Jr., who coached the state-tournament teams, said. "Sometimes you have to remind him who is the coach. That happened a couple of times when I was coaching him."

This is not to say that Jeff was never right with his opinion. On occasion, what Jeff did worked better than the coach. How else could Jeff form the notion that his way was better than the

That is where the problem started. Strategy is a very important ingredient for a successful team. When a player thinks he is above the strategy, there is a problem. In the same vein, there is nothing wrong with a player questioning a coach's strategy. The questioning, however, should be done at the correct time, when it cannot disrupt the system.

Jeff Blake has found that out the hard way this fall. Things do not come easily for him anymore. He is a Dec. 6 sophomore playing a game with

At times, he has been brilliant. He has thrown touchdown strikes of 41 and 57 yards. He has broken loose for long gains on the option. He has shown poise behind an inexperienced line.

At times, he has been awkward. He has overthrown wide-open receivers. He has thrown the ball too hard at short distances. He has been intercepted five times in three games.

Jeff Blake must now learn it is a different ballgame. He cannot improvise to his heart's content anymore.

One very big example of that occurred Friday night It's a reminder that Jeff should file somewhere deep inside until he gains the experience that is necessary to be able to change a play at the line of scrimmage.

And whenever the urge to do something impromptu arises, he should call on this painful

There's no hurry Jeff. Everybody on your team and in your town is behind you. They know the great player you can be. Just let nature take its normal course. They'll live while you learn. Besides, I've already reserved my state playoff tickets for next year.

Mattingly's Blast Saves Yankees; Saberhagen Hurls KC Past Angels

Don Mattingly has locked up the American League MVP award, and Bret-Saberhagen has a firm grip on the Cy-Young Award.

It doesn't take a Sherlock Holmes to figure that out. It's strictly elementary.

If those two don't win baseball's most coveted awards, then their respective teams have every right to call in a super sleuth to investigate.

Mattingly, having the best season by a Yankees slugger in nearly a quarter century, came through with another dramatic hit Monday night, lashing a two-run homer in the ninth inning to trigger a three-run rally that gave the New York Yankees a 5-4 victory over the Baltimore Orioles.

The triumph enabled the Yankees to climb within five games of first-place Toronto in the AL East.

With 34 home runs and 142 RBL Mattingly would appear to have no serious challenger for MVP honors.

While Mattingly has breathed some life into the Yankees, Saberhagen is making the Kansas City Royals breathe a little

The 21-year-old right-hander pitched a five-hitter and struck out 10 in leading Kansas City to a 3-1 victory over California. The triumph enabled the Royals to move into a first-place tie with the Angels in the AL West.

Saberhagen improved his record to 20.6 and, at 21 years, five months and 19 days, became the fifth youngest pitcher in baseball history to win 20 games in a season. He ranks behind Dwight Gooden, Bob Feller, Christy Mathewson and Al Mamaux and just ahead of Babe Ruth on the list of baseball's youngest 20-game winners.

Saberhagen ranks second to Ron Guidry of the Yankees in American

League victories (Guidry has 21) this season, and lowered his earned run average to 2.79 to rank third in that category.

"I know the guy in New York (Guidry) has had a heckuva year." Kansas City manager Dick Howser said, "but I don't see how anybody under the circumstances can pitch any better than Saberhagen has this year. He went from a questionable guy last year (10-11 as a rookie) to a 20-game winner. He should win the Cy Young."

Saberhagen struck out Ruppert Jones. Daryl Sconiers and Bobby Grich twice apiece, and ended the game by striking out Reggie Jackson on three pitches with a runner on first base. Jackson never took his bat off his shoulder in the game's final at-bat.

"Winning 20 games is great," Saberhagen said, "but what makes it really nice was beating the first-place Angels down the pennant stretch. This was a very big game for us."

Calm Restored In Britain

LONDON (UPI) - Calm returned to the city's mostly black Brixton neighborhood, devastated by two nights of rioting in which 91 people were injured and 220 arrested.

Police said although the rioting began "completely spontaneously as a genuine protest" against the accidental police shooting of a black woman, local militants and agitators from other parts of the city whipped up the crowds and "criminal elements took over."

Some 220 people were arrested in riots Saturday night and Sunday night and 91 people - including 10 police officers - were injured, a Scotland Yard spokeswoman said. But the neighborhood - just 2 miles south of the Houses of Parliament - was calm Monday night and early

More than 25 people appeared in court Monday and were charged with theft, assault, arson and looting. Seven were held without bail.

Officials said damage from the riots could exceed \$7 million - equalling the losses from riots that swept Birmingham, the nation's second-largest city, earlier this month, leaving two people dead-

The Brixton rioting was sparked by the accidental shooting of a black woman. Cherry Groce, 38, by police who were searching her home for her son in connection with an armed robbery charge.

Little Offered To End Apartheid

PORT ELIZABETH. South Africa (UPI) - President Pieter W. Botha, in what was expected to be a major policy address, offered only one specific concession to the country's disenfranchised majority of 24 million blacks.

"He knows what has to be done. He just does not have the heart to do it." one Afrikaner analyst said after the Monday night speech.

In a 55-page address to 1,300 supporters and delegates at the Cape Provincial Congress of his ruling National Party. Botha, 67, gave the impression of a reluctant reformer being dragged along by events out of his control.

Last month. Botha failed to announce major race law reforms in an address to supporters in Durban. Analysts had speculated he might deliver a significant message in Monday's speech - delivered amid rumors Botha will be forced to step down in a year to 18 months.

But Botha's only specific concession to black frustration underlying a year of violence that has claimed some 720 lives was a conditional promise to "reconsider the structuring and functions" of his advisory President's

It said Syria and the Syrianbacked leftist militias attacking Moslem fundamentalist defenders of Tripoli were "responsible for the lives" of the four Soviet hostages.

"We will execute them all, and we will also strike with force." the statement warned.

Despite the death threats, the pro-Syrian Lebanese communist and leftist forces continued their assault early today against Moslem fundamentalist Tawheed Islami militiamen defending Tripoli.

Witnesses, who declined to be identified, said one Soviet official in Moslem west Betrut slept with an air pistol on his bedside table following Monday's kidnapping ef the four Soviets - the most foreigners ever kidnapped in one day in Lebanon.

The Soviets, who have maintained their large diplomatic mission in Moslem west Beirut despite closure of nearly all foreign embassies following a spate of kidnappings last year.

Monday's four victims were identified by police and Beirut's Communist party newspaper Al-Nida as: Spirine, Katkov, Second Secretary Valerie Kornley and embassy doctor Nikolai Svirski.

Katakov and Svirski were in one car and Korniev and Spirine were in another car when they were kidnapped, a police report said. It said one of the cars contained spent machine gun shells but there were no traces of







Most post-op patients need a day or two of observation to make sure, at least, that their bladders are emptying properly and they can attend to themselves.

In my opinion, insisting on same-day discharge following hernia surgery is a barbaric practice that reflects badly on the insurance company and on any authority that mandates such a proposal. Perhaps your friend should scream bloody murder or look for other, more civilized insurance coverage.

DEAR DR. GOTT - Is it true that autistic children don't feel pain, or at least have a much higher pain threshold than normal kids?

DEAR READER - Each of us has a varying threshold for pain. These thresholds may be modified by many factors and may even change, from moment to moment, within us. WIN AT BRIDGE


It was lucky that North and South had falled to find their 4-4 diamond fit, since the outstanding diamonds split badly. Six clubs had a chance, but declarer had to play with care. But first a word about the auction.

Two clubs was strong, forcing and perhaps artificial. The two-diamond response was a bld waiting for South to clarify his type of two-club bid. Three clubs showed a long club suit and a hand good enough to play game. Three spades was natural, and South bid the no-trump game. Finally, after North had invited slam with four no-trump, South bid six clubs.

I don't like the nine of hearts as an opening lead. If declarer needed to dislodge the spade ace for his contract, the best chance for the defense might be to set up a quick diamond trick. When

the heart was led, declarer won in his hand, drew trumps and ducked a diamond. East won the jack and returned a spade. South ruffed, played a high diamond (revealing the bad split) and then proceeded to make the contract on a squeeze. He cashed all his clubs, discarding a diamond and two more spades from dummy. and then played the heart king and a heart to dummy's ace. West had the choice of chucking the spade ace or unguarding the diamonds.

If West's opening lead had been a diamond, declarer would have won that trick, drawn trumps, and then probably ducked a diamond as before. But West, not East, would be on lead. West could continue the sult, knocking out South's other high diamond and depriving declarer of the communication needed for the squeeze to work.
