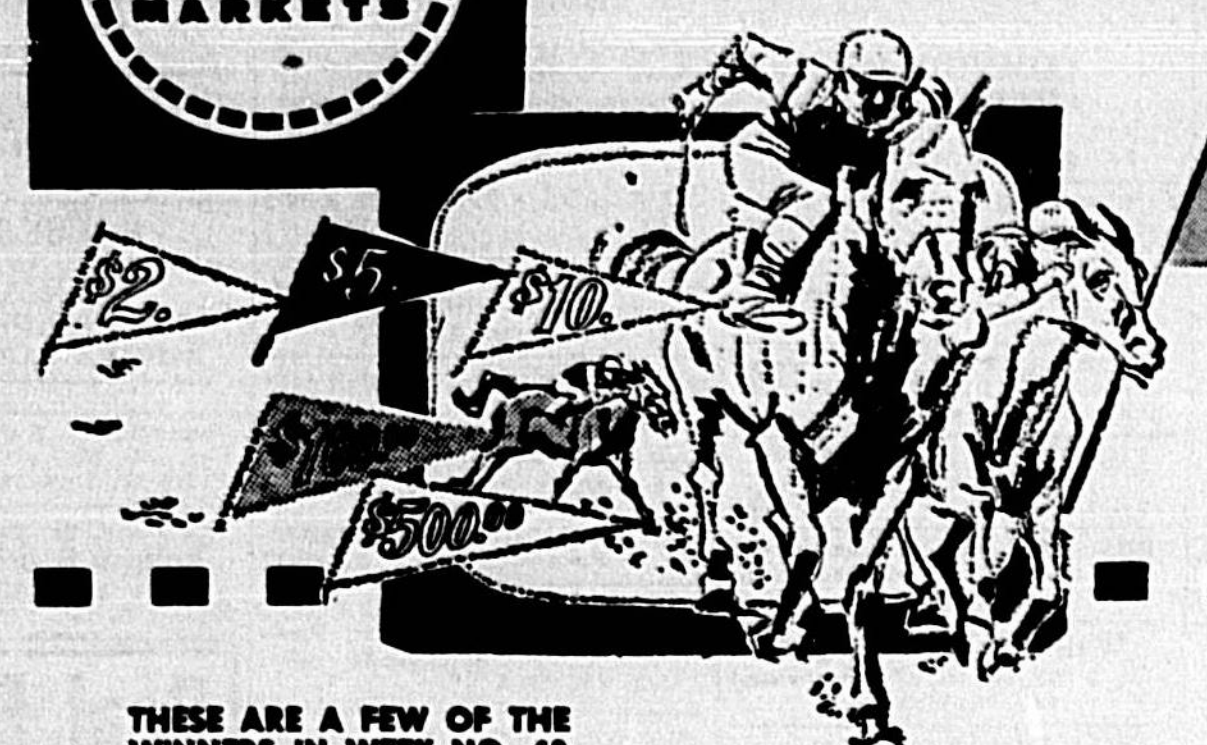

County 'Holds Off' On \$3 Million Issue

The County Commission today held off action proceeding with a \$3,000,000 bond program for needed rights-of-way pending the word from the State Road Department on what primary projects would be included in the five-year program.

The board agreed to contact Willard Peebles, State Road Board member, of the status of the program before going ahead with any rights-of-way projects.

However, Peebles, at noon today the Herald that SR 46 from 14 west to the Lake County line, SR 46 from 14 to the Orange County line and SR 41 realignment for a new Osteen bridge was "definitely" in the five-year program.

The SRD informed commissioners by letter today that costs of rights-of-way for SR 46 would run to \$85,000; SR 436 rights-of-way, \$230,000 and SR 415, \$30,000.

Right-of-way costs for other projects were included in the letter which totaled \$1,883,000.

At the meeting this morning, both John Fitzpatrick and Ed Yarborough wanted to wait on the bond issue pending finalization of the road program expected in June. However, they were outvoted and the board agreed to contact Peebles, Commissioner Lawrence Swoford rapped the board for waiting so long.

"Every day we delay, the longer Seminole County will suffer," Swoford said.

Costs of other rights-of-way projects included were:

- SR 46 Mellenville east to the proposed Osteen Bridge approach, \$125,000; SR 425-SR 419 to S-427, \$120,000; SR 419-SR 420 to SR 425, \$65,000; SR 420-Orange County line to SR 419, \$100,000; University Road-Goldenrod to State University via SR 426 and Orange

Oviedo Set To Purchase Water System

The Mead Garden water system owned by Central Florida Utilities Inc. will be purchased by the Town of Oviedo for \$14,254,400 as soon as perpetual agreements with present users are terminated by the utility, the Oviedo Town Council decided last night.

Councilman Robert Ward was authorized to seek the termination of the utility in order that final papers work on the purchase can be speeded up.

When the new \$600,000 water system for the town is completed, the Mead Garden system will become part of the Oviedo municipal waterworks.

In other business, the board: Agreed to pay \$225 as the town's share of the comprehensive plan for the city's growth which is being done by the Florida Development Commission. The federal government has already given a grant of \$3,550 for the project.

Heard announcement by G. Alcorn Spoor, town attorney, that validation proceedings for the bond issue for the water system will take place May 25 with Circuit Judge Vassar Carlton presiding.

Named a committee to consist of Councilman T. L. Lingo Jr. and Mayor Lee Gary to have the Doctor's Drive right-of-way surveyed south of the Seminole Housing Authority.

Gave B. Ward permission to clear the "big" of way at the south end of South Lake Jessup to Mitchell Hammock Road.

Discussed possible purchase of a new truck for the Fire Department with Lingo to submit a recommendation by the next meeting.

For Port Legislation A 'Trade' Of Votes

Tallahassee sources told The Herald today "a lot of vote-trading in smoke filled rooms" will be necessary before the Port Authority main bill is introduced and its passage assured.

The major bill calls for guarantee of \$60,000 from race track funds for the Port Authority to insure construction loans.

Sources say the bill has the full backing of the Seminole-Orange legislative delegation but that it has not been introduced, as yet, awaiting a favorable time to "make a deal" with the big county bloc.

It also was reported the delegation will kill the county's minimum housing bill and the bill calling for creation of a local government study commission.

The reason given for the death of the local government study commission bill is that with expected passage of the new constitution, home rule will be assured.

Sen. Robert Elrod and Rep. John Ducker stated opposition to the minimum housing bill during the legislative hearing here. The revised version of the bill, apparently, still was not acceptable.

Day Mr. Firestone Came To Sanford

 Great things are in store for downtown Sanford if the purchase of the Strickland-Morrison properties on First and Commercial streets by Russell A. Firestone Jr. can be taken as a token for the future. In an interview with this reporter the new owner made it unmistakably clear that he sees possibilities which will continue the progressive steps already taken in the march ahead by Sanford. The sale was consummated yesterday afternoon with Douglas Stenstrom of the law firm, Stenstrom, Davis and McInnis, representing the buyer and A. Edwin Shiloholzer of Shiloholzer and Logan, representing the seller. But the prime move in this was Ernest Southward, a man of whom Firestone spoke with confidence and respect, and William Kirk, who will be in close touch with the development of these properties.

What precise form this new construction will take is not yet definable. But Firestone did not deny an earlier statement to the gathering of business and professional leaders who met him at a reception when he told them that he would be in town frequently, hoped to know all of you by the first name" and was delighted at the opportunity.

The name Firestone is, of course, well known to Sanfordians. The new owner, however, is not. But he will be. In our conversation the early years when he was a little boy and remembered the great trio of Americans who changed the life of our era were recalled. There was Thomas A. Edison, who was but faintly remembered; Henry Ford, who was much clearer and his own grandfather Harvey A. Firestone, the pioneer tire maker. Thus there comes into the economic life of this city a man whose family-line is identified with keen business judgment. As a matter of fact, Russell Firestone came here from a trip to Hong Kong where he had the responsibility of inspecting an apartment complex of about 12,000 units.

The new owner is not a stranger to Florida or Sanford. And he is especially enthused over the possibilities in this county. He expressed appreciation of the way the lakefront is coming along, the progress of the marina and the start of construction on Holiday Inn. With a smile he noted that he also was interested in breeding horses and referred to this area as a good one for that sport.

But this was not a man who would go it alone. Local situations need local knowledge to be handled expertly and with good results for all concerned. And this is what Firestone is most desirous of accomplishing. "It would like to do what I can for the people of Sanford and this county. We will move ahead as we are sure that what we are doing will be to the best interests of all."

The business and professional men who met Firestone at the buffet lunch in Jim Spencer's restaurant were those who have been working to bring Sanford into the mainstream of business and economic activity. In talking with some of them it was evident that this move of Firestone was accepted as the third of their recent important developments.

These are the announcement of the Winn-Dixie expansion on the block east of Sanford and First Streets, the ground breaking for the motel on the marina and now the presence of the Firestone main building injected into the Sanford area.

Forest Fire

MIAMI (AP) — Tinder dry Pulk County, heartland of Florida's drought-ridden peninsula, today reported its biggest fire of the season. Flames raged through 1,500 acres of planted pines.

The Governor replied that any road planning for Seminole County is entirely in the hands of the State Road Department. He commended Willard Peebles, of Wildwood, the Democratic holdover on the State Road Commission for this district. Water and air pollution, he said, is a matter to be taken care of from the state level.

He said the first event is planned for late May in Miami but he was uncertain when the Central Florida event would be held, or where. In fact, he said he knew of no plans now for his appearance in Seminole County in the near future.

Yank Jets Smash MIGs

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. fighter-bombers inflicted the heaviest aircraft destruction of the war on North Vietnam Monday, destroying 11 Communist MIG interceptors in the air and on the ground, the American command reported today.

As the North took another pounding in the intensified air war, heavy fighting flared across South Vietnam from the central highlands to the Mekong Delta. American infantrymen suffered their heaviest losses in the delta fighting, where 16 were killed and 40 wounded.

The ground forces were supported by fighter-bombers that attacked Communist positions in the South with a record 625 sorties Monday.

In a delayed report, the American command announced the loss of three U.S. Air Force F-105 Thunderchiefs during raids over North Vietnam Sunday, including two shot down by SAMs and one from unknown causes. The four crewmen were listed as missing. This brought to 523 the number of American planes reported lost over North Vietnam, including 15 shot down by MIGs.

Samuel radioed claimed the North Vietnamese air force shot down three U.S. planes Monday while ground forces downed a fourth during the second day of MIG kills. But the U.S. command did not announce any losses for the day, and a spokesman refused to comment on a Peking claim that the Red Chinese air force shot down two Navy A4B Skyhawks over the Chinese mainland Monday.

Peking made a similar claim of downing two American planes over South China April 24, a claim which the U.S. command in Saigon denied at the time. The Chinese also claimed April 29 that they brought down a pilotless American reconnaissance plane.

east of Hanoi. Navy pilots claimed downing two MIGs in the air and damaging another. Navy pilots said they spotted seven MIGs on the airfield. They claimed they destroyed three of them, damaged another and heavily damaged the field and its support facilities.

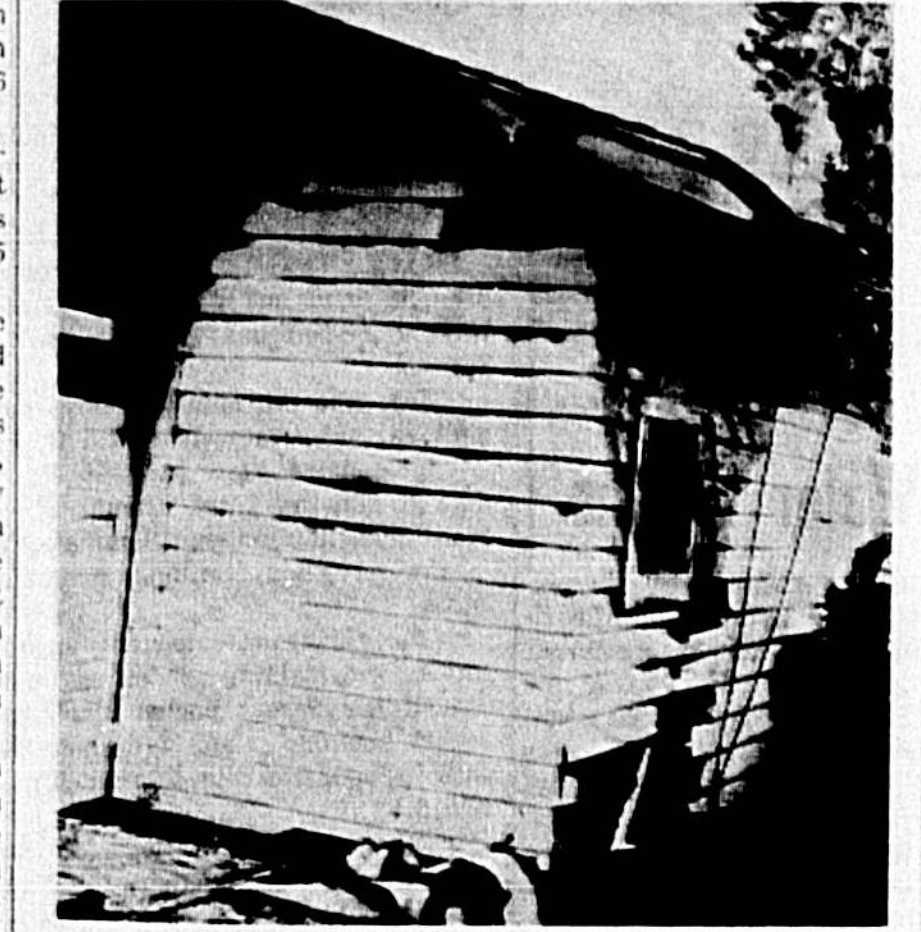
In the first attack on Kep April 24, there apparently were no MIGs on the ground.

Air Force pilots attacked the Hoa Lac field 20 miles west of Hanoi. They reported destroying five MIGs on the ground and another during a 15-minute aerial dogfight. Pilots said they left numerous fires and secondary explosions throughout the aircraft parking areas.

"We saturated the aircraft parking ramps," said Maj. Robert X. Piper, 36, of Salt Lake City. "The ground was obscured by smoke and dust."

The previous report for MIG kills in one day was seven shot down on daylight last Jan. 2. The Communist losses Monday raised to 17 the number of Red interceptors reported knocked out in the past week—nine in the air and eight on the ground. It brought the total number of MIGs claimed by American pilots in the war to 56.

North Vietnam is reported to have had from 75 to 125 MIGs, most of them MIG-17s which are not as maneuverable as the later MIG-19. However, Hanoi reportedly has been replenish its air force from Red China and the Soviet Union.

Spring Drought Burns Into May

Biggest Fire Hits Polk Forest

MIAMI (AP) — Tinder dry Polk County, heartland of Florida's drought-ridden peninsula, today reported its biggest forest fire of the season. Flames raged through 1,500 acres of planned pines.

The fire broke out late Monday on land owned by the Agric Chemical Co., between Highway 37 and the Fort Green Road, about 20 miles south of Lake Land.

The cause was undetermined. After fighting the blaze until 2 a.m., the Florida Forest Service reported it had burned 171 million gallons. That has cut pressure in nearby water tables, are losing leaves and fruit.

Johnston said, "Pasture grasses are in very poor shape. Beans and some other shallow root crops are in bad shape."

He said the orange blossoms for a second crop have been delayed by lack of water. He pointed out that cold weather sweetens the fruit but the water has been mild.

In farming areas near Miami time crops were threatened. "We're irrigating like crazy in our fruit crop," said Seymour Goldweber, Dade County agricultural agent in Homestead.

"The drought is definitely affecting our fruit crops and making production of the crops more expensive," he said.

"And not all our groves are irrigated yet," Goldweber said.

Veto Threatened If Budget Upped

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Gov. Claude Kirk said, "All elements of leadership," including the use of a veto if needed, will be used to keep the Legislature from increasing the record budget.

But, he said, "It should not be presupposed that they won't go along with the will of the people."

Kirk made the statements Monday as he defended his budget get out recommendations, announced progress on a project which includes a \$93 million pipeline and a \$80 million natural gas contract and again denied that he was seeking the vice presidency.

"I haven't misread the formula," Kirk said when asked about his proposed \$21 million budget cut for junior colleges. "Our homework has been done."

State School Sup. Floyd Christian and others have said Kirk apparently misunderstood junior college financing and misread the complicated financing formula.

Kirk said he would be glad for educational officials who disagree with him to hear and study it out for themselves.

The governor also said Florida "would be wise" to delay implementation of "Medicaid" or Title 19.

"It should not be implemented until the very 11th, 11th hour," he said. "We don't even know who will be president in 1968 and Paris' famous Eiffel Tower was built to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the French Revolution of 1789."

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — House Speaker Ralph Turington has indicated the Democratic-controlled Legislature may seek a spending compromise with GOP Gov. Claude Kirk, except on certain education issues considered "essential."

In an interview with the Associated Press, the Gainesville Democrat said the leadership recognizes Kirk's power to sustain a veto.

"Anything which becomes law would have to be with the concurrence of the governor — or members of his own party in the Legislature," he said, the latter a reference to possible Republican support for overriding vetoes.

The speaker said he took "no particular issue" with Kirk's call for budget cuts in Cabinet and other executive agencies other than the education department.

The governor's proposal in that area call for cutting "less than one-fourth of one percent" out of Budget Commission recommended budgets, he said, adding that some were inclined to begin with.

Turington commented that the "issues about" with which Democrats would be unlikely to compromise with Kirk include support for junior colleges, school textbooks, the sizes of first grades, pay for school lunchroom workers, 11 library units in large counties and vocational-technical school programs.

Kirk proposes cutting budgets in all these areas.

"His proposal for junior colleges doesn't just cripple, it maims," said Turington. Kirk proposes cutting \$21 million—or 28 percent—from the junior colleges budget by applying a new formula, which the speaker contends is a "mistake in budgeting."

Turington said Kirk's budget proposal "reminds me of the way some people describe Lyndon Johnson's budgeting."

Kirk probably will be "persuaded" to modify his proposals in some areas, he said. Opportunity to make a deal with legislators would "have an opportunity to express themselves" on individual appropriations bills, he added.

Withdrawal OK'd For U.S. Troops

WASHINGTON (AP) — In agreement with Britain and West Germany, announced today plans to withdraw up to 35,000 of its armed forces and four squadrons of combat planes from West Germany.

Johnson administration officials estimated the transfer of soldiers and Air Force personnel—along with thousands of dependents, to bases in the United States—would mean saving of around \$100 million in the next year.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Embarking on a government career at 51 after making a name in acting and television work, Betty Furness has been sworn in as special assistant to the President for consumer affairs.

She'll start earning her \$26,000 salary before the week is out by testifying before a Senate subcommittee. President Johnson said Monday at the oath-taking ceremony.

When it was announced earlier this year that the President was naming Miss Furness to the job she had hardly set foot in a kitchen or supermarket for years and would have to do some cramming to acquire a consumer's viewpoint.

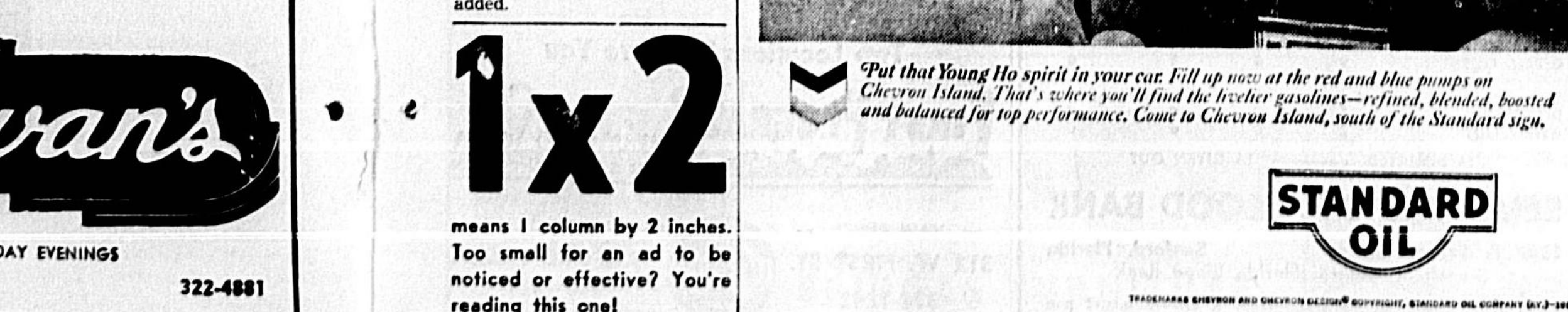

A "SILVER FOX" IN ACTION



Supporting the widespread land war in Viet Nam is a vigorous and unrelenting air assault that is spearheaded by pilots of the U.S. Navy. Deployed on five aircraft carriers off the coast of Viet Nam, 400 Navy aircraft attack the enemy almost daily to seek out and destroy his bases, depots and vehicles.

Called Task Force 77 or the "Attack Carrier Striking Force" of the Seventh Fleet, this armada of 30 ships—including missile-firing cruisers and destroyers—is assigned the difficult task of cutting off war supplies flowing from North Viet Nam to enemy forces in the south.

A key unit in the armada is a bomber squadron best known as the Silver Foxes, and a pilot who has served with distinction in the Silver Foxes is 26-year-old Lieutenant Albert R. Hyde of Constantine,

Mich. In 20 months with the squadron Al has made 211 missions and earned 17 Air Medals, three unit commendations and the Viet Nam Service Medal, plus a recommendation for the Distinguished Flying Cross. Though he doesn't read or speak Vietnamese, Al finds his way in North Viet Nam more easily than in California, where he has lived two years. He flies his missions without maps, but knows the country so well he is often able to elude enemy fire.

Al's plane has been hit nine times, but he managed to land his A-4E Skyhawk jet safely aboard each time. He was more scared trying to land a damaged jet on board his carrier, the USS Constellation, one night than he was at being hit.

As for the future, Al is to be reassigned soon: "I hope to go to a test pilot school and continue my career on that line."

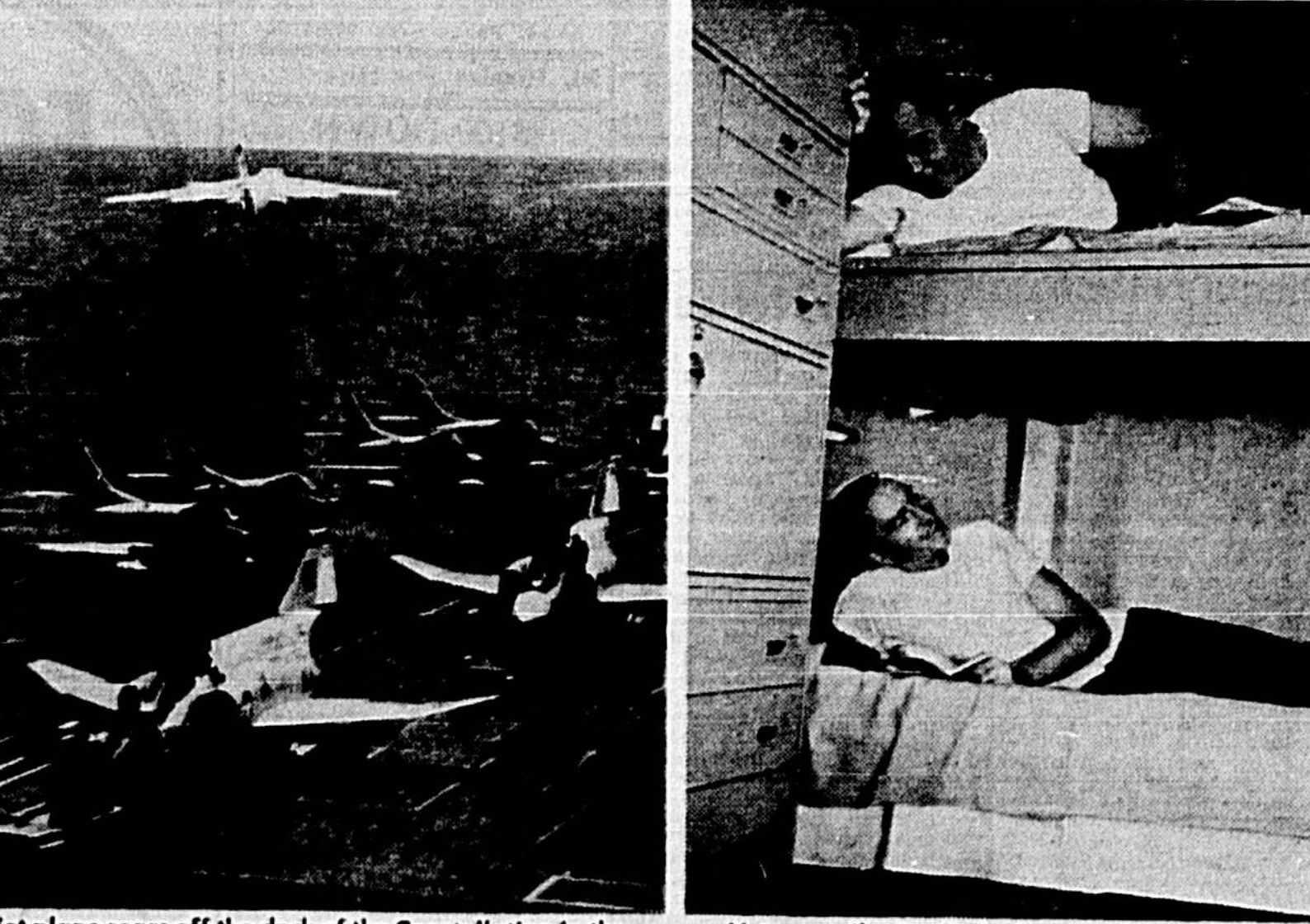

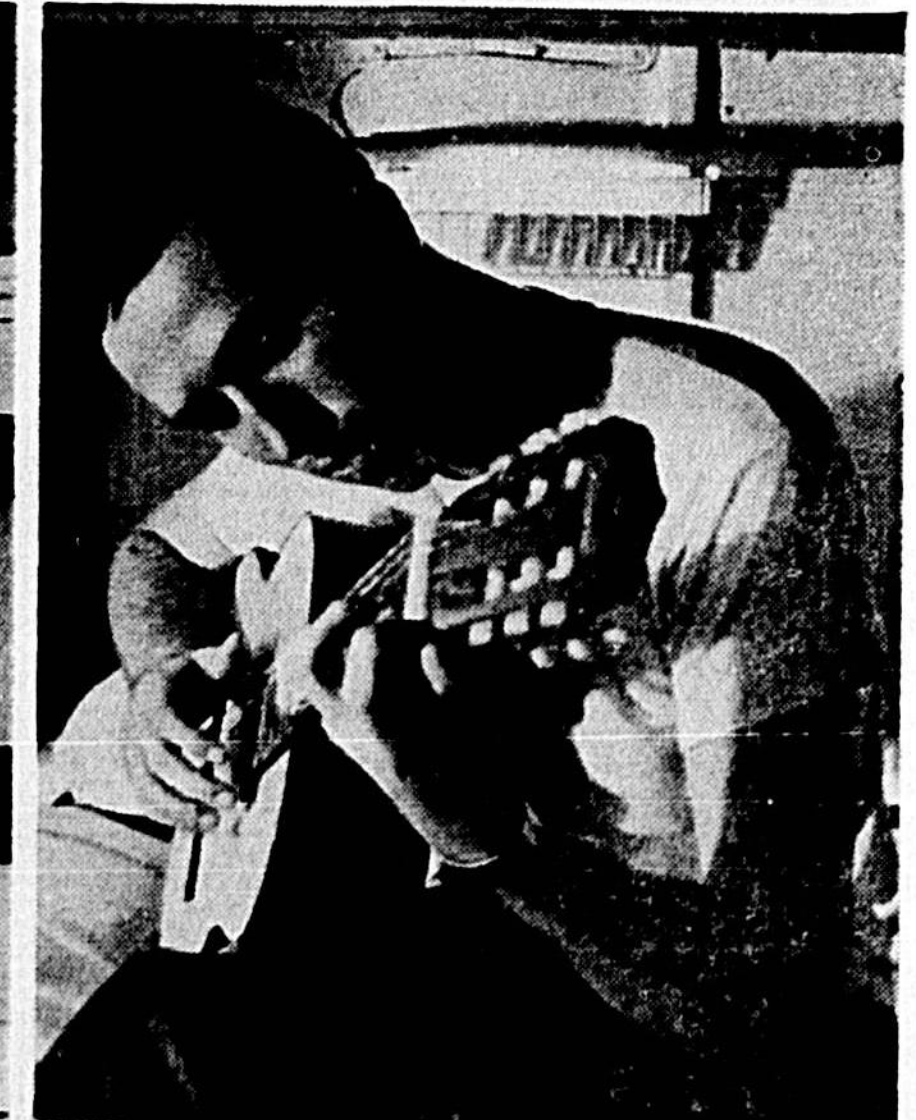

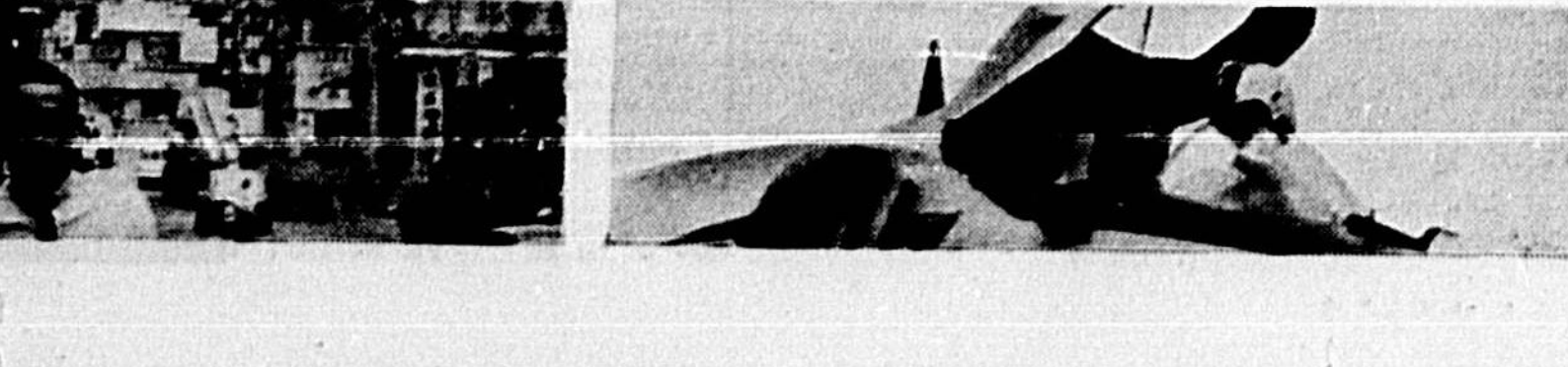

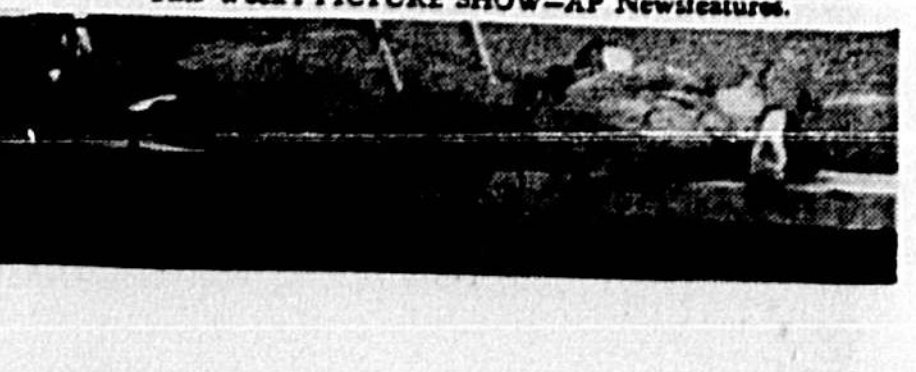

OTIS AIR FORCE BASE, Mass. (AP) - The lone survivor of the Air Force today picked blame which crashed on South Tule Island says he is ready to fly in the same type of plane again as soon as he is able.

Joseph L. H. Guenet, 29, of Lansing, Mich., at a hospital news conference Sunday, "I believe the aircraft is basically a sound aircraft."
