
In computing his exclusion, subtract the 30-day waiting period. For the remaining 10

Adday exclusion. After deducting the seven-day waiting priod he has 23 sick days for which he can exclude his pay at a \$75 weekly rate. His pay for this period was \$340. In computing his exclusion he multiplies the amount received (\$340) by 75 (\$25,500) and divides by the weekly rate of pay (\$100). This gives him an exclusion of \$255 for those first 30 days.
