

Congress Faces 'Guns Or Butter'

War In Vietnam, War On Poverty Pose Problems

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The second session of the 90th Congress opened for business today with cautious lawmakers seeking a balance between guns and the Great Society that will win voter approval in November.

The opening gavels were sounded at noon at opposite ends of the Capitol where members had assembled to climb what promised to be an uphill road.

Many sought God's help earlier. Along with President Johnson, they attended a special congressional service at National Presbyterian Church.

Dominating classrooms and hallways, this morning, the war in Vietnam and its effect on the one against poverty at home. Answers to both issues must be made before this fall's elections.

After routine opening ceremonies with the House and Senate planned to forego any real business until Johnson delivers his televised State-of-the-Union address to a joint session at 9 p.m. Wednesday.

The big question is a hotly debated issue—how to strike between spending at home and abroad.

But the political jockeying in Capitol Hill had already begun.

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Senate GOP Leader Everett S. Dirksen fixed his economy sights especially on the home-front anti-poverty war. He said such domestic welfare programs just getting cranked up should be "cut back or put on ice—maybe cut out entirely."

In light of soaring costs of the Vietnam fighting, Democratic leaders called their forces against crippling appropriations cuts in home domestic front programs.

They concurred with Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield's judgment that the new domestic legislation would be pushed to enactment.

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It's time to stop, look and listen now," the Montana Democrat said in a House strategy session Friday.

House Democratic Leader Carl Albert agreed that money, not legislation, would be the main concern of the Congress. He and Speaker John W. McCormack forecast continued financing of great social efforts, despite the war, though possibly on a smaller scale than originally planned.

Chairman Dr. Nathan Peltaner indicated there had been some narrowing down on all issues except the key one—money.

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Solons Cautious With Election Day In Offing

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Hopeful Republicans and cautious Democrats today began a congressional session that will bring 425 House members and 35 senators on an election day accounting with their constituents Nov. 8.

With history indicating the GOP has an edge, the Republicans hope the Vietnam war's impact on the voter will increase the usual midterm gains of the party which does not hold the White House.

Democrats were wary of being blamed for the Vietnam situation and any reductions in domestic spending that might be needed to meet the costs of the conflict.

As Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois put it today in an interview:

"Parties do not defeat each other. Generally speaking, parties defeat themselves."

Dirksen was setting the tone for his GOP associates who hope the Democrats might be hit hard by public disenchantment with the Vietnam situation, should peace efforts fail.

Dirksen believes the GOP has a good chance to make substantial gains in the 1966 elections, wiping out some of the losses it felt in the Johnson landslide of 1964.

House Republicans already were talking about picking up 30 seats in the chamber where Democrats now have 253 seats to their 100.

Anything less, the Republicans said, would be a defeat. On the Senate side, the GOP is much more cautious.

Thirty-five seats are up for election in the Senate. Democrats now hold 21 to them.

Hanoi Silence On U. S. Bid Dims Hope For Vietnam Peace

Red Ack-Ack In S. Vietnam, Yanks Discover

SAIGON (UPI) — American troops operating along the Cambodian border have uncovered evidence that Communist North Vietnamese anti-aircraft batteries have infiltrated the South, a military spokesman disclosed today. It was the first such evidence to the war.

The spokesman said the Communist force, known as the H-13 anti-aircraft unit, was equipped with 18 heavy guns capable of shooting down fighter planes and jet bombers. The guns also are effective against troop-carrying helicopters.

The spokesman said the information on the anti-aircraft battery came from three North Vietnamese captives captured during "Operation Matador" in the Central Highlands west of Pleiku near the Cambodian border.

A multi-battalion force from the U.S. Army's 1st Air Cavalry Division is involved in the sweep. The spokesman quoted the prisoners as saying their battalion was equipped with the Chinese Communist version of the U.S. 50 caliber machine gun.

As the disclosure was being made, the U.S. mortar-lance on bombing raids against Communist North Viet Nam on its 18th day.

The U.S. Cavalrymen have been sweeping the area west of Pleiku for the past six days with little significant contact with the enemy. Several times, American soldiers have spotted North Vietnamese troops across the St. James River which forms the border between Cambodia and South Vietnam.

At times the Americans have dared the Communists to open fire across the river, but no fighting has resulted.

World Mourns India's Shastri, Man Of Peace

United Press International The world today mourned the passing of Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri of India, who died attempting to bring peace to his country.

From Washington to London to Moscow to Tokyo, messages of condolences poured into New Delhi.

Shastri, 61, died unexpectedly of a heart attack in Tasikent, in the Soviet Union, where he had been engaged in a summit conference with President Nehru of India.



Lal Shastri, his death over the disputed state of Kashmir. The conference ended Monday after Shastri and Khan signed a declaration recognizing the use of force.

Home Affairs Minister Gulzarilal Nanda, 47, was sworn in earlier today as interim Prime Minister, a sorrowful task he undertook one before the death of Nehru. There was a possibility Nanda would be named officially to succeed Shastri later this week when the ruling Congress party meets to elect the new Prime Minister.

Soviet Premier Alexei Khrushchev, who acted as mediator during the Pakistan-India conference, immediately issued a statement saying the Indian people honored their leader for Shastri, a man "whose life was beautiful."

In Washington, President Johnson called Shastri's death "a grievous blow to the hopes of mankind for peace and progress."

Johnson named Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, Secretary of State Dean Rusk and two former ambassadors to India, John Kenneth Galbraith and John Sherman Cooper (R-Ky.), to represent the United States at Shastri's funeral.

The Chinese Communist New China news agency today reported Shastri's death with the comment in its broadcast: "A great loss to Asia and to the world."

In Rome, Prime Minister Aldo Moro of Italy sent his condolences and said the Indian leader died "while on a mission for peace."

A spokesman for the West German government called the death a "great tragedy."

Earl Mountbatten of Burma, the last British viceroy of India, said he was "inexpressibly shocked and deeply grieved" when Shastri's death was announced to represent her at the funeral.

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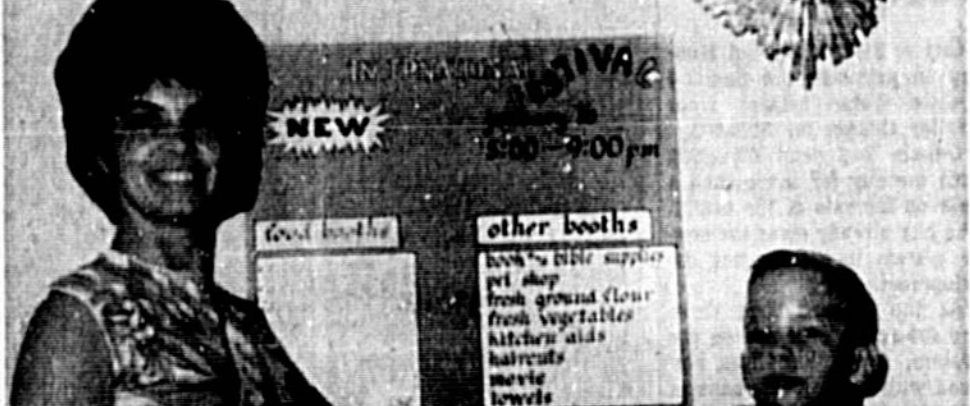
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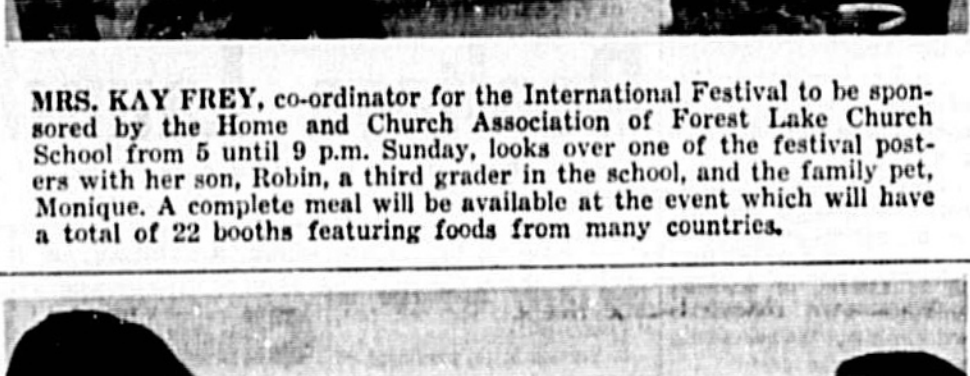

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'Direct' Contact Of Diplomats Made Week Ago

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A peace bid delivered at a face-to-face meeting between diplomats from the United States and North Vietnam has so far failed to spark any official reply from the Communists, administration sources said today.

It was disclosed Monday night the United States sent a note to Hanoi more than a week ago clarifying its position on negotiations on the war in Vietnam and seeking to persuade the Communists to go to the conference table.

Administration officials said the U. S. communication was handed to a North Vietnamese official by an American diplomat at one of the capitals in which the two countries both have representatives.

The message sent to Hanoi apparently was the only such "direct" contact that has been made between the two governments. Hanoi's failure to answer is further dimmed hope for turning back the tide of war in Southeast Asia and moving closer to the conference table.

Disclosure of the meeting between U. S. and North Vietnamese diplomats followed a general statement by White House Press Secretary Bill D. Moyers it was a "safe declaration" the United States had been in direct contact with Hanoi during the course of the "peace offensive" launched by President Johnson last Dec. 26.

Several factors apparently motivated the administration's decision to disclose its direct approach to Hanoi. Among these were:

—President Johnson's desire to bring the public and Congress into the peace efforts for delivering his State of the Union address Wednesday night.

—The assertion by assistant secretary Stoughton Lynd of Yale University that he was visited by North Vietnamese Premier Pham Van Dong that the U. S. government had made contact with his country and this was "quite disturbing."

—Moyers said Lynd, who returned Sunday from an unauthorized trip to Hanoi, was "incompletely informed."

—The desire to convince U. S. allies, neutrals and European Communists that the president was exploring no possibility in his effort to find a peaceful solution in Vietnam.
