Steelworkers Start Parley With Attack On Administration

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (AP)—The 1,200,000 member CIO United Steelworkers' union today launched a sharp attack on what it called the "collaborator" Eisenhower administration.

A report by the union's three top officers claimed Eisenhower had not delivered on promises to revise the Taft-Hartley Act, long hated by organized labor.

The five-man National Labor Relations Board and its three Eisenhower appointed members were also assailed for "pro-employer bias."

An estimated 3,000 delegates met in convention hall amid a noticeable tension between the union and the parent Congress of Industrial Organizations.

CIO President Walter Reuther was not scheduled to address the convention, nor were any other CIO officials listed on the program. Yet in size, the steelworkers are second only to the United Auto Workers among CIO unions.

The 101-page officers' report ignored USW CIO relations and rarely mentioned the CIO.

Earlier this year, there was some indication the USW might want to quit the CIO. USW President David J. McDonald held talks with John L. Lewis, United Mine Workers head, and Dave Beck, President of the AFL Teamsters Union. They were believed to have looked into the possibility of uniting in a "united labor group" to rival the AFL and CIO.

There was no official word today on whether the steelworkers plan to move out that direction at this convention. USW officers had no comment.

Cited Miamians Request Release

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—Five more Miami residents cited for contempt of court for refusing to answer Dade County grand jury questions about subversive work today.

The Florida Supreme Court didn't rule immediately.

The five were Walter Marks, Abraham Sokin, Maurice Carroll, Emanuel Graf and Augustus Birnberg.

Last week, the Supreme Court set oral arguments for Oct. 1 on the habeas corpus petitions of nine other Miamians cited for contempt.

(Continued From Page One) to answer questions. He pleaded the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution which provides that a man may not be forced to give evidence against himself.

Benny Awaits Court Edict

On Firm Sale

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Jack Benny, who said sale of a million-dollar entertainment corporation gave him "a chance to make some money for the first time in my life," awaits a court decision on how much of the money he can keep.

U. S. Judge Stephen E. Brown took the case under advisement after the comedian appeared at his tax appeal hearing Saturday to explain that he sold the corporation against his own judgment.

Benny owned 60 per cent of Amusement Enterprises, Inc., which was sold to the Columbia Broadcasting System for \$2,500,000. He tried to convince the government his share of the sale should be taxed as capital gain instead of income.

Tax on the capital gain is 25 per cent, tax on the sum as income would run up to 75 per cent.

Tilo Opposes Entry Of Nation NATO

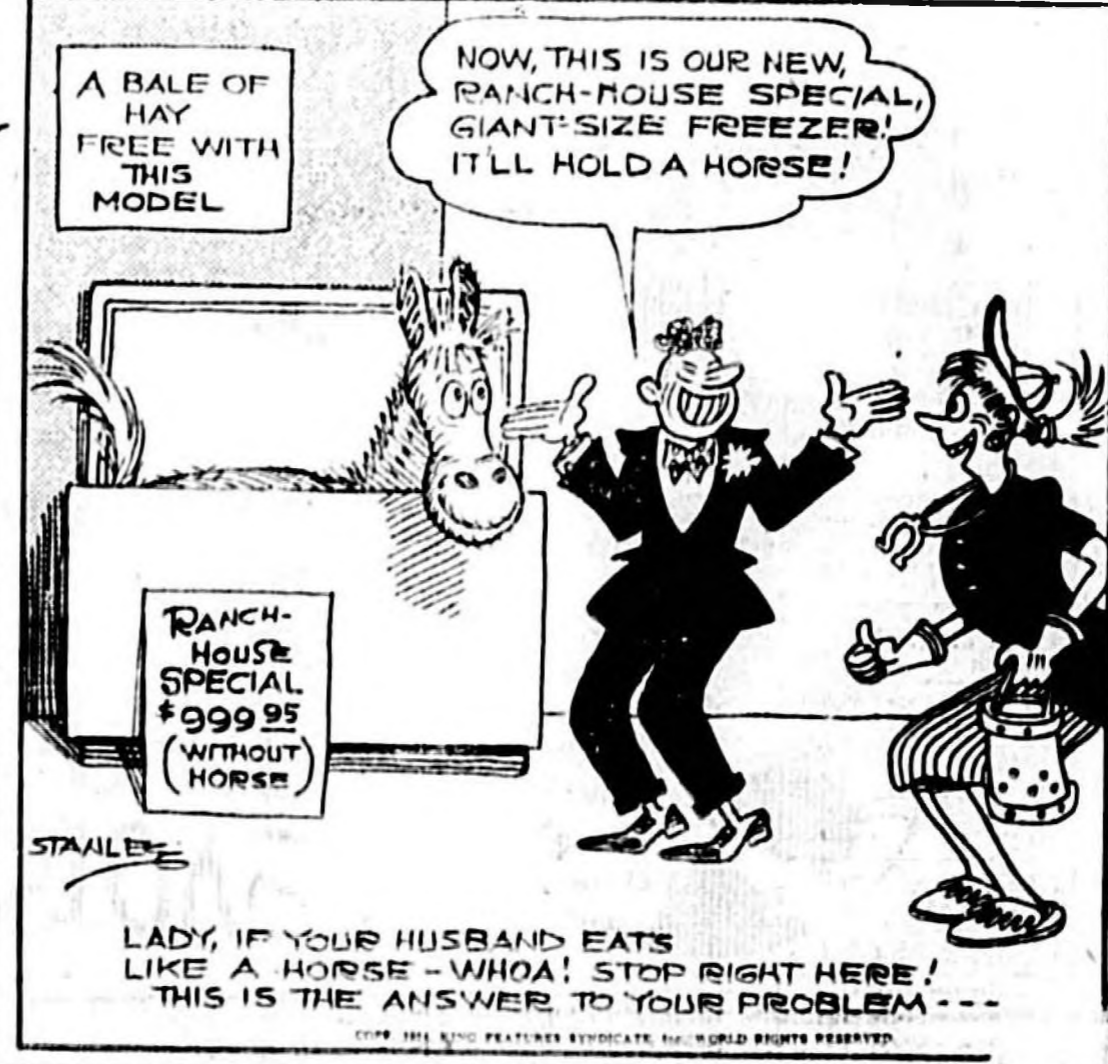
BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)—President Tito says Yugoslavia would open any invitations to join NATO because the Atlantic pact "is increasingly assuming a political hue—a struggle against communism."

"We are painted a Socialist hue," he told a rally in the Slovene village of Celje yesterday, and "there is no place for us in a bloc which has an anti-Socialist tendency."

He added, however, that cooperation with the North Atlantic Treaty organization was possible and would be continued by his government. In addition to receiving Western military aid, Yugoslavia is allied in a mutual defense pact with Greece and Turkey, both NATO members.

Referring to his Communist regime's relations with Iron Curtain countries, Tito said he would "gladly accept any gesture of good will" by Russia.

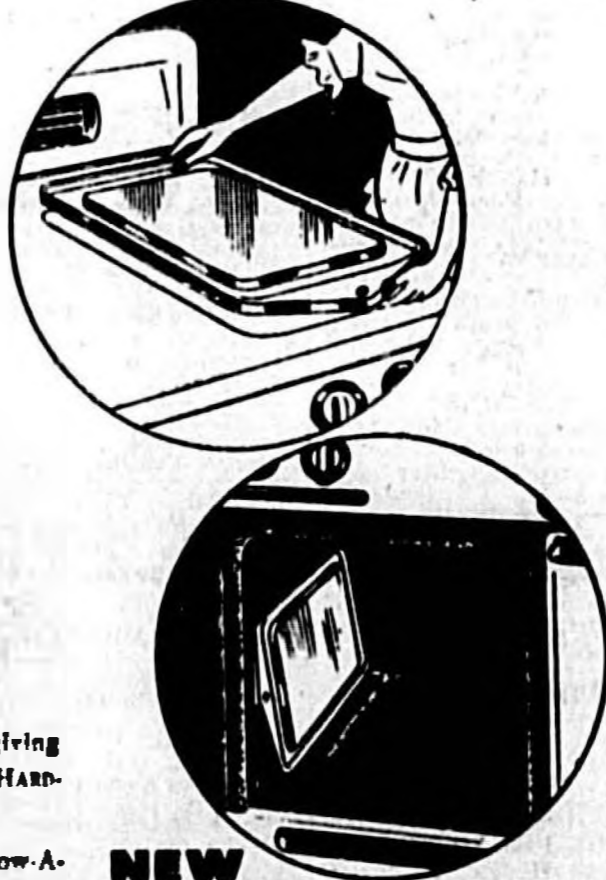

MATTON, Ill. (AP)—One person was killed and 28 others were injured yesterday when a New York Central steam engine plowed into a truck at a crossing and went off the tracks. The NYC's developed-power Southwestern Limited, bound for New York with an estimated 95 passengers, struck the truck and the second unit of its diesel engine was derailed. Nine cars following it derailed from the tracks and came to a screeching, sending half an acre of burning wreckage into the air. The last two cars remained on the rails. 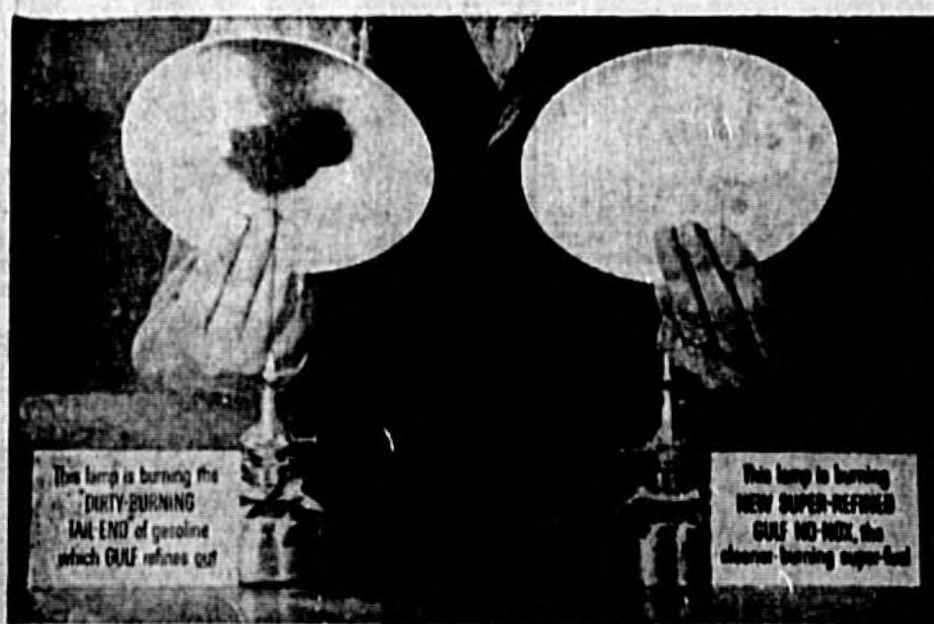

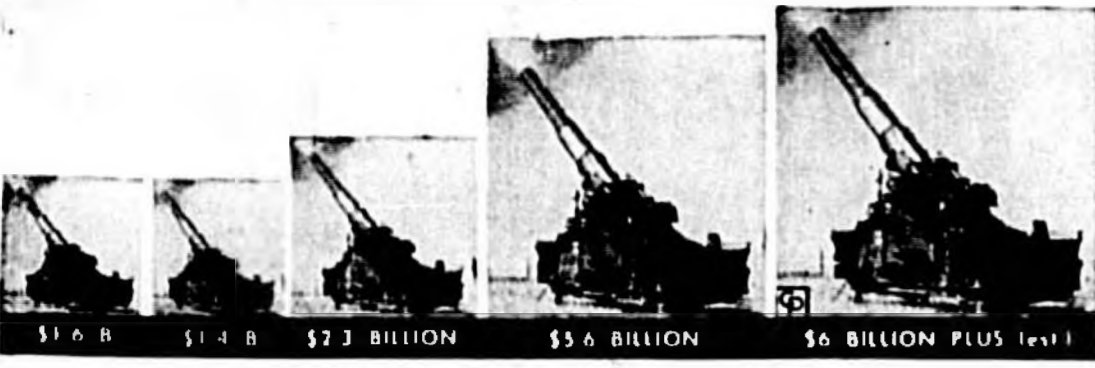

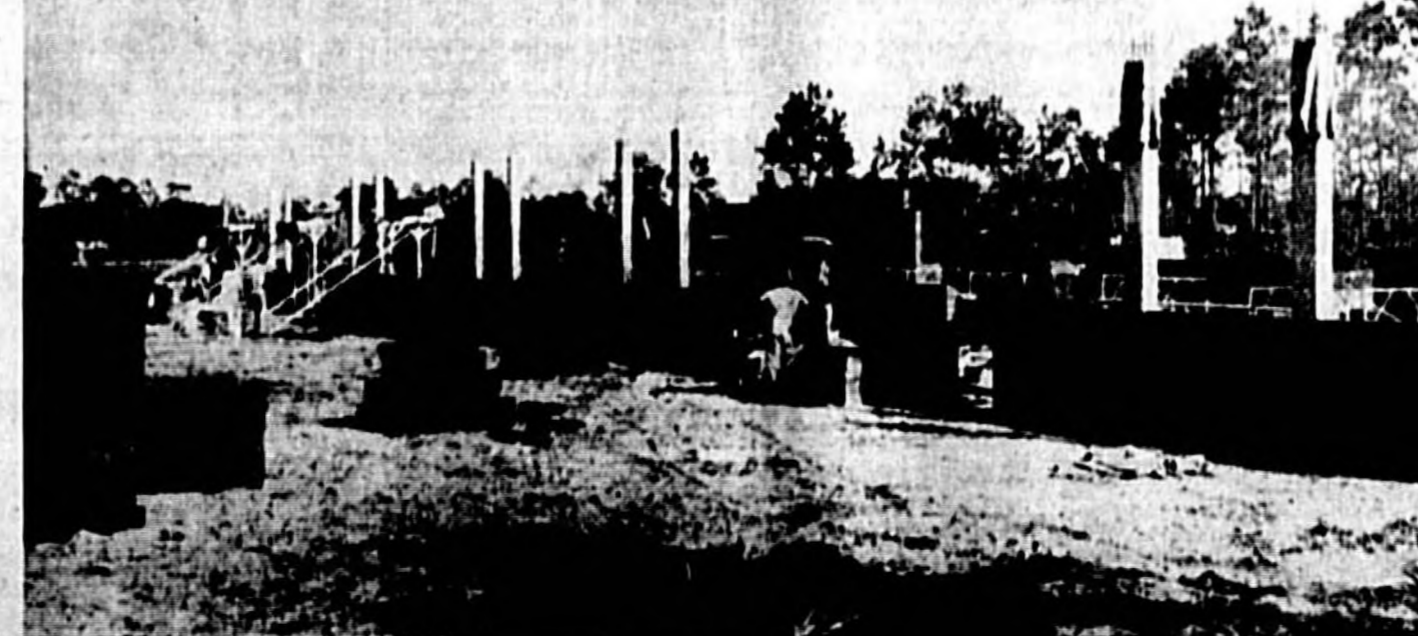
