SANFORD — The question is, regardless of what Phil may have seen, does it really matter in Central Florida? The nation's premier groundhog, Punxsutawney Phil "saw" his shadow this morning, and gave the message, "Let it snow, let it snow, let it snow."

According to the old legend, if Phil doesn't see his shadow, spring is just around the corner, but if he does, everyone faces six more weeks of winter.

At 7:28 a.m., handler Bill Deeley yanked Phil from the fake tree stump that serves as his burrow as fireworks went off to simulate a sunrise. Clouds obscured the real sun.

A crowd of about 10,000 gathered at Gobbler's Knob greeted the prediction with boos and huses.

Of course most groundhogs don't venture out of their holes Feb. 2. Almost all of them are hibernating, unlike Phil, who lives in a heated burrow with two pals at the local library.

As a final comment, whether or not people agree with Phil's predictions, it must be noted that groundhog hunting in Pennsylvania is allowed during the entire year.

## Rates dip, mortgages hot



SANFORD — Central Florida homeowners are reportedly jumping on the nationwide bandwagon to arrange for home refinancing. The drive is being encouraged by ever-falling interest rates.

Without exception, every Sanford area home financing business contacted by the *Sanford Herald* this morning in an informal survey, revealed that refinancing is up, and mortgage rates are dropping.


Wayne Keeling, vice president of ECN Mortgage & Lending Assn. at 800 French Avenue in Sanford, said he believes the rates may drop by at least another half point in the near future. "I expected the rates to drop mostly because this is a presidential election year," he observed.

## St. Johns River cleanup needs you

SANFORD — The excitement is building. One of the state's most beautiful natural resources will be the target of a huge cleanup effort on Saturday, March 2 and a large portion of the work will be done in Seminole County.

The St. Johns River Cleanup Celebration will take place along the 310 miles of winding shoreline that make up the river. Starting in the prairies in Brevard County, flowing north through Lake Monroe and finally emptying into the Atlantic Ocean at Jacksonville, the St. Johns River has been a favorite recreation spot for centuries.

Unfortunately, it has also become a favorite dumping ground for those who care little for the environment, said Bill Graf, public outreach coordinator for the St. Johns River Water Management District.

WINTER PARK — Parents, students and administrators at Lake Howell High School are divided over the monologues some young thespians have been preparing for an upcoming competition.

While some are upset over the content of the speeches, others are concerned the school has made an effort to force the students to change them.

School officials told the students Thursday they needed to clean up their language and subject matter before the monologues were presented at the regional competition coming up this weekend in Satellite Beach.

The students, all members of the International Thespians Society, have been preparing for the contest since early in the school year. Thursday's administrative decree was the first complaint they'd had about their choice of speeches.

The monologues, mostly taken from published plays, have been performed during speech club meetings under the direction of faculty advisor Olga Campbell. They were performed for the student body at large and some parents and faculty yesterday.

Under protest from several parents, students and members of the faculty, principal Don Smith ordered that changes be made before the competition began at Satellite Beach High School this afternoon.

## Tough trucker rolls on to Citrus Bowl

SANFORD — You've probably heard the commercials by now. "Monsters are coming to Central Florida."

This year crowds are expected to arrive in record numbers to the Citrus Bowl on Saturday. Twelve of the biggest and fastest four by four trucks will invade the football field.


Names such as Gunslinger, Carolina Crusher, Gravedigger, Bearfoot and the Equalizer will compete with metal crushing, glass breaking speed over numerous cars positioned on the track.

One such participant in the tough truck division will be Randy "Boomer" Coomes. This Altamonte Springs hometown boy will challenge other trucks through the "tough truck track."

Although no cars will be available for crushing, the course consists of various dirt hills that the trucks will climb and sail airborne at times to break other participants' scores. Essentially the truck with the fastest time wins.

Coomes has enjoyed the sport of trucking for six years. He and his wife, Terri, sometimes even

### Bank robber's plan bombs

**GULF BREEZE** — A man accused of trying to rob a Florida Panhandle bank after phoning in a bomb threat found himself locked out after employees evacuated the building, police say.

James Larkin was charged with attempted armed robbery after a Santa Rosa County sheriff's deputy spotted him, still wearing a ski mask, as he fled the Regions Bank, according to Chief Deputy Wes Cummings.

"He goes to rob it and there's nobody there," Cummings said. "Let's just say he's not one of our brighter criminal minds."

Larkin, 27, of nearby Navarre, was charged with attempted armed robbery and making a bomb threat. He remained in the county jail in Milton on Thursday.

The bank was the second in Santa Rosa to receive a bomb threat Wednesday. The first call was made to another Regions Bank in Navarre about 15 miles away.

"We always, with this sort of thing, stake out other banks in case it's a diversion," Cummings said. "Well, sure enough, 20 minutes after the first call, there's a call at the Regions Bank right outside of Gulf Breeze."

### NAACP: shooting not justified

**PENSACOLA** — The fatal shooting of a teen-age suspect by a sheriff's deputy during a pizza delivery robbery was justified, Escambia County State Attorney Curtis Golden has ruled.

But the NAACP disputes the decision.

The shooting occurred on Dec. 13, when two Escambia County deputies, one posing as a pizza delivery man, killed 15-year-old Anthony Wayne Gee in the yard of a neighbor north of Pensacola.

The deputies say they shot the black teen after he pointed a shotgun, which investigators later found to be unloaded, in the face of the undercover officer.

"I have determined that the shooting was justified," Golden said at a news conference where reporters were given copies of a 1 1/2-inch thick report on his investigation.

The Rev. B.J. Brooks, president of the Escambia chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, has accused the deputies of using excessive force. He said witnesses claimed Gee was unarmed and with two other youths when the deputies chased him more than 100 yards, firing wildly.

### Four drown in car

**BELLE GLADE** — Four youths drowned when their car flipped and partially sunk in a canal.

It appears that the vehicle was parked or stopped on the side of the road, the driver accelerated, lost control of the car and flipped into the canal," Florida Highway Patrol Lt. Pembroke Burrows said Thursday.

It was not immediately known whether the incident was alcohol-related, Burrows said. The accident happened sometime between 7 p.m. Wednesday and 7 a.m. Thursday, when the car was found.

Those killed were: Francisco J. Garibay, 15, of South Bay; Fernando Garibay, 20, also of South Bay; Reyes Menendez, 19, of Belle Glade and Oscar Perez, whose age and hometown were not immediately available.

### Trucker killed in I-95 crash

**BUNNELL** — A traffic backup from a previous accident on Interstate 95 became deadly when a trucker pulling a double trailer crashed into other trucks, causing a series of chain reaction collisions.

Tim Michael Abrams, 46, of Lexington, N.C. was killed in the accident early Thursday, said Cpl. Patrick Morrissey of the Florida Highway Patrol.

Abrams was in the sleeping berth of the Billings Freight Systems truck that ran into the vehicles and was partially ejected when the truck overturned, Morrissey said.

The freight truck driver, Carl Myers, 48, of Linwood, N.C., and the drivers of three other trucks and a car were injured, but their injuries were not life threatening, FHP said.

### Alleged teacher killer faces charges

**BROOKSVILLE** — A youth indicted in the shooting deaths of two Hernando High School teachers faces arraignment next month on charges of murder, carjacking and attempted murder of a police officer.

Jimmy Dale Smith, 19, will enter an innocent plea at the March 5 proceedings, said Alan Fanter, chief assistant public defender.

Smith was arrested about 90 minutes after the Jan. 11 slayings of former head football coach Mike Imhoff, 40, and mathematics teacher Joseph Michael Bristol, 41, on a rural road north of Brooksville.

Smith was indicted Wednesday on two counts of first-degree murder; two counts of carjacking; two counts of openly carrying a firearm; and one count each of attempted murder of a police officer, resisting an officer with violence and leaving the scene of an accident.

# Senate president considers a ban on legislators' free meals

**TALLAHASSEE** — Florida Senate President Jim Scott wants the public to think better of the Legislature.

But when Scott aired a proposal to end the free meals lawmakers can enjoy during the spring regular session, he sparked a clamor from lobbyists who pick up the tabs and Tallahassee restaurateurs who get the business.

"Part of my fear is what comes up next: If it's not good to have dinner with us — it's not good to be seen with us?" said lobbyist Guy Spearman, who represents Anheuser-Busch, tobacco makers and other clients. "Does that mean we are not good

citizens?"

Chris Kalig, an owner of the Silver Slipper restaurant, a favorite hangout of lobbyists and lawmakers since 1938, said the 60-day session that begins March 5 "are kind of gravy months. It's like Christmas for the merchants."

Scott, R-Fort Lauderdale, said he pays his own way at lunches and dinners and is increasingly convinced that all legislators should do the same.

"I'm concerned about the public's perception," he said. "I'm looking at lobbyists and what they do and what gets reported. I want to find a way to restore public confidence in the Legislature."

State law prohibits lawmakers

from accepting gifts worth more than \$100 from lobbyists or the special interests that hire them. But legislators can take all the free food and drinks they can consume in one sitting.

Scott hasn't decided how he will proceed with his image-building ideas, said spokeswoman Karen Chandler. Lawmakers claim they are not swayed by the free meals.

### State attorney: no charges to be filed in movie boat stunt

**NAPLES** — A movie stunt boating accident that killed one person and injured four others won't lead to criminal charges.

An investigation into the fatal accident Dec. 19 during filming of the Disney movie "Gone Fishin'" did not show enough evidence of negligence to file charges, Assistant State Attorney Michael Provost said Thursday.

Janet Wilder, 29, an extra from the Woodland Hills section of Los Angeles, was killed. Her husband, stunt man Scott Wilder, was one of the four people injured in the accident in the Big Cypress Swamp.

Marine investigators found that several factors contributed to the accident, including a lack of boating experience by the stunt boat operator and the stunt coordinator.

Lar Gregory, a spokesman

for the Florida Marine Patrol, said marine investigators also blamed the accident in part on "a lack of planning for calculating the required boat speed" and other factors needed to pull off the stunt.

"Gone Fishin'" is being made by Fish Tale Productions and stars Danny Glover, Joe Pecci and Rosanna Arquette. The stars were not hurt.

In the scene, a boat operated by stunt doubles for Glover and Pecci had to go up a ramp, fly over a hedge of mangroves, land between two boats and stop in the water.

But the boat came off to one side of the ramp instead, flipping upside-down and hitting the two boats, which then rammed into the extras, authorities said at the time of the crash.

In Washington, Cheryl Byrne of the federal Occupational, Safety and Health Administration said the agency was still investigating the accident.

### Judge: OK for EEOC to intervene in bias suit

**TAMPA** — The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission may join the legal team representing eight women in a sex discrimination suit against Publix Super Markets Inc., a federal judge has ruled.

The suit, brought by former and current female employees in July, accuses the Lakeland-based supermarket chain of systematically discriminating against women in assigning jobs, promotion and pay.

But U.S. District Judge Henry Lee Adams stopped short of allowing the suit to be expanded to include job applicants.

In his ruling on Tuesday, Adams agreed with Publix that including applicants would add different issues and an enormous number of people to the case after preliminary proceedings already were completed.

Publix has more than 470 stores in Florida, Georgia and

South Carolina.

The women claimed the Fortune 500 company puts women in dead-end cashier and clerk positions while promoting male employees along a better-paying career track. They had also filed previous complaints with the EEOC.

The EEOC began investigating the supermarket chain in 1992.

Angelo Filippi, the EEOC's regional counsel in Miami, said Thursday that many women hired by Publix "were basically given dead-end jobs."

No decision has been made yet on class action status.

Both sides found something positive in the judge's decision.

"We view it as a good sign," Sam Smith, attorney for the women, said Thursday.

Publix maintains it does not have a policy against promoting women, claiming it is the victim of an organizing attempt by the United Food and Commercial Workers Union.



# Lake Mary still airing water woes

LAKE MARY — Concerns about water problems continue to flood the Lake Mary city commission. In addition to an earlier meeting specifically to discuss high water problems yesterday afternoon, the matter continued to be brought up at the regular city commission meeting.

The 5:30 p.m. meeting was a joint session with the city commission and members of the Water Quality Management Committee. While many citizens stepped forward to voice their complaints and concerns about high water in some residential areas, no formal decision on resolving the problem was made.

Commissioners and committee members listened intently to citizens. Some blamed the St. Johns Water Management District, others blamed developers for building houses at levels which may flood during high water. The present city commission was blamed for not acting swift enough to divert water to other areas. Previous city commissions are also being blamed for approving residential developments without concern for the potential of flooding.

While some citizens offered what they believed to be solutions to their particular flooding problems, responses often revealed that fixing one problem could easily lead to an increase

in other problems.

As a result, no official decisions were made during the called meeting, which lasted well beyond the scheduled time for the beginning of the regular scheduled meeting at 7 p.m.

"From this point," Mayor Lowry Rockett concluded, "we'll compile all of the information we have discussed at this special meeting, have our staff study it, then, as soon as possible, see what can be done to help alleviate these problems."

When the citizen participation period started at the regular commission meeting, more citizens stepped forward. Again, the blame for the flooding was placed against the various parties.

"I think it's time for the commission to reopen dialog with the St. Johns Water Management District," said Doug Forner. "Perhaps, by working together, you can come up with some alternative plans."

Forner said he had a number of others, said he wanted the water level in the Crystal Lake Basin to be kept at the 40 foot level, with the city arranging for some type of runoff of the high water into another area.

Forner, who has spoken about the problem several times in the past during regular commission meetings, is also a member of the Water Quality Management Committee.

Following public discussion, water problems were brought up again later in the meeting by

several individual commissioners. Commissioner David Meador suggested, "If we are going to do anything in any of these areas," he said, "I think the first thing we should do is start sampling water in the Timacuan and West Crystal Lake areas so we know exactly where that matter stands when we are ready to get under way."

Mayor Rockett responded that the Timacuan area already is required to test its water on a quarterly basis. Regarding a suggestion that the city should test water in the affected areas perhaps once every two weeks, Rockett said it would cost approximately \$1,000 each time, and he believed statistics which may already be available should be obtained and examined before the city launches into the expenditure of additional money for testing.

Commissioner Shella Sawyer added the suggestion that information should also be obtained regarding any chemicals or fertilizer being used in the Timacuan area golf course, which may also affect the quality of standing water.

During a previous city commission meeting, a decision was made to begin planning and work on several areas in the city affected by flooding, with an estimated \$100,000 allocated to begin the project.

Commissioner Gary Brender suggested the city publish a list

and have it made available to the public, regarding any time schedules for work which was approved at last month's meeting.

City Manager John Litton said such a list is being compiled and will soon be released.

While another special called commission meeting is expected to be called for further discussion on flooding and high water problems, no specific date was immediately determined.

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## Sheriff releases photo of suspect in murder

The Seminole County sheriff's office Major Crimes Section has released a photograph of one of the suspects wanted in connection with the double shooting Monday, Jan. 22, near Winter Springs.

Sheriff's spokesman Ed McDonough said the suspect is 22 year old Jose Cristobal Ramirez of Orlando. He said there are active warrants for Ramirez for principal to first degree murder, attempted murder, kidnapping, and armed robbery.

According to McDonough, Ramirez is believed to be one of five Hispanic men who shot and killed 25 year old Luis Guzman, and shot and wounded his sister, 29 year old Evelyn Guzman, shortly after midnight, Monday, Jan. 22, near Railroad Road, near SR-434.

McDonough said the two victims were driven to that location, placed in the trunk of their Honda Accord, and shot.

Miss Guzman was reportedly wounded in the neck, but managed to walk to a nearby convenience store in the 1200 block of SR-434 to call for help. She was subsequently airlifted to Orlando Regional Medical Center.

Sheriff's office investigators say the Guzmans were apparently lured to a house at 3399 South Saint Lucie Drive in the Hollowbrook subdivision near Casselberry, under the premise of making a drug deal.

Investigators say once inside the house, they were overpowered by the suspects and

was tied up with duct tape before being driven to the Railroad Road location.

Ramirez is originally from Guanica, Puerto Rico. He has one prior arrest in Orange County for theft of the U.S. Mail.

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# When you're wishing it's zero degrees, it's cold

How cold was it? Consider tow truck driver Jay Krantz's wardrobe as he tried in vain to start cars that broke down in wind chills down to 86 below zero in Bismarck, N.D.

Under his coveralls, Krantz wore two pairs of long underwear, jeans, a T-shirt, two more shirts, an insulated flannel shirt, his service station uniform shirt and a winter coat.

"The wind blows right through everything," he said.

As deadly arctic cold settled across the Plains and Midwest this week and threatened to dump a thick blanket of snow on the East, pipes froze, over-worked heating systems broke down and car batteries quit.

The cold snap should last through the weekend over the northern and central Plains, the Midwest and New England, with as much as a foot of snow expected in parts of New York state.

The cold even stretched to the Gulf Coast, coating roads in Arkansas and northern Louisiana with ice and prompting officials to open more homeless shelters in New Orleans, where lows tonight could dip into the 20s.

A state of emergency was declared Thursday from Alexandria, La., north to the Arkansas border, a region included in an ice storm warning. Dozens of traffic wrecks on icy roads were reported.

Up to an inch of snow expected today in north Louisiana could cover at least a half-inch of ice already on the ground.

"Enough is enough already," said Sherry Herndon, who was forced to halt repairs to her Shreveport home that was severely damaged by a tornado last week. "This is devastating. It's really worrying me."

Cloud, Minn.; and minus 25 in Briggdale, Colo. Fargo, N.D., matched a 103-year-old record of 39 below.

"Even zero looks good right now," said Steve Perkins, who was reading a newspaper and drinking coffee at a cafe in Bismarck.

In North Dakota, Gov. Ed Schafer declared today "Warm Winter Woolies Day" and told state workers to dress down to lift their cold spirits.

A Bismarck TV weatherman held a wet T-shirt outside on a hanger during the Thursday night newscast, and it froze as stiff as a board within 2 minutes.

And in Minnesota, about 750,000 public school students got the day off. The last time schools closed due to severe weather was January 1994.

"I don't remember a winter this harsh," said Bill Slaughter of Ely, Minn. "We have more snow than we know what to do with. I'm waiting for the day we see 10 below (as a high)."

## Jumping to conclusions

It is often surprising how many people become upset over a news story, simply because they read only the headline and/or first few paragraphs. This isn't anything new, it's been going on since the days of Benjamin Franklin.

In recent times there have been a number of situations. People reading about Seminole County Circuit Judge O.H. Eaton Jr.'s ruling regarding a call for the re-trial of Joseph "Crazy Joe" Spaziano, reading just the first few words, get the false impression Eaton is setting the stage for Spaziano to eventually go free.

Such is not the case. Spaziano is already serving a life sentence plus five years for another crime. Even if this particular conviction ends up getting overturned, Spaziano will not be set free.

Learning that a local business has "filed for reorganization under Chapter 11 of the federal bankruptcy code", doesn't mean the business is ready to close. Unfortunately, people get the immediate impression that a major business is collapsing. The key word is "reorganization," and that's exactly what is under way. It, in no way, should ever be allowed to reflect on products or services provided by any business so involved.

Stories about hearings or discussions on the part of various governmental bodies should never be misunderstood as being set in concrete until a final and official vote is taken. Just because someone proposes something and it is scheduled for a hearing, doesn't mean the government body endorses it.

Even in crime related stories, the use of words such as "alleged" or "charged with," do not indicate that person is guilty. The guilt should only be connected with the results of an official court decision. It's the old axiom of "innocent until proven guilty," yet people tend to read what they want to and overlook the actual verbiage.

We are not, in any way, referring to what is written in today's newspapers. We are, however, suggesting that people try to pay more attention to an entire story or situation before making a judgment.

The same holds true for television, radio, periodicals, and other means of news dissemination.

Perhaps it can be compared to the way we treat each other on a personal level. We would be much better off by listening more closely to what others say, and hear the entire thing before jumping to conclusions.

# Just say no to drug legalization

My old colleague on National Review, Bill Buckley, has long personally believed that the best way to handle the problem of drugs would be to legalize them. Now he has taken the added step of putting National Review itself on record as favoring legalization.

Well, Bill is the owner of all the voting stock in the corporation that owns the magazine, so that's his privilege. Speaking for myself, however, I have never favored drug legalization, and I probably owe it to my readers to assure them, in view of this latest development, that I still don't.

It is certainly an issue concerning which reasonable people can differ. I can understand the arguments of the legalizers, and even agree with them -- up to a point. It is true that the laws against drugs, and all the efforts made to dry up or interdict the drug trade, have thus far failed to eradicate the problem. And it is also true that making it legal to buy drugs under controlled conditions (e.g., from federally licensed stores) would to some extent undercut the criminal network that currently supplies them -- just as ending Prohibition undercut the bootleggers.

But the legalizers, it seems to me, make far too light of some serious objections to their proposal.

In the first place, it seems to me indisputable

that decriminalizing drugs would effectively end their current social condemnation, and therefore lead to an increase in their consumption. That is precisely what the repeal of Prohibition did -- and don't let anybody sell you the false extension of the analogy, that since we managed to cope with that increase we will manage to cope equally well with this one. Alcohol is one thing; hard drugs are quite another.

Second, it is simply untrue that legalizing the sale of drugs will put the illegal purveyors out of business altogether. The unstated assumption of the legalizers is that a drug user would be allowed to buy enough of his favorite drug to satisfy his

own craving; but what if he wants to buy a much bigger quantity, to spread around among friends not yet acquainted with its joys? And presumably there will be strict limitations on how old a person must be before he can make even a small purchase. In both cases, do you doubt that there will be somebody on a nearby corner, ready to sell (for a suitable markup) what the licensed store won't?

In the February Reader's Digest, Daniel R. Levine reports that there has recently been an alarming increase in teen-age drug use.

That's the bad news -- but what was that about a steady decline of teen-age drug use during the 1980s? According to Dr. Robert DuPont, the first director of the National Institute on Drug Abuse, marijuana use dropped steadily for 13 years "because an unrelenting, unified chorus of parents, schools, the media and national leaders made sure teens understood that drugs, starting with marijuana, were dangerous and unacceptable." Nancy Reagan's "Just Say No" campaign, for example, was far more effective than her detractors were willing to admit.

But then the messages faded away, while "popular culture, especially music, has portrayed marijuana as a normal, even glamorous, aspect of teen life. Drug use began to climb."

### Black male achievement

WASHINGTON--Prince George's County, Md., school officials had a serious problem. Black male students--a third of the enrollment in the suburban Washington county--constituted the majority of the system's discipline problems. They were at the top in suspensions, expulsions, special-ed placements--and dropouts. They were at the bottom in academic performance.

The trends aren't unique. The county's response may well have been. Officials began with the notion that there was no biological or intelligence-based reason for the pattern--that whatever was happening might be addressable by a carefully designed school program.

Thus, after a period of study and review, Prince George's started its Black Male Achievement Initiative, a program that included everything from male bonding opportunities, intensive mentoring and system-paid trips to cultural events. By all accounts, it was working quite well.

But now the entire program is threatened by a ruling from the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Civil Rights that BMAI unlawfully discriminates against female students--and perhaps against white male students as well, though some of the latter have long been participants in the program.

And my first thought was: Here we go again!

Since then, I've been having second--and third--thoughts to the point that I'm not sure what I believe is the right thing to do.

I can argue, as I did when Detroit was considering a public all-male academy to address the same problems that motivated the Prince George's officials.

My analogy was that of an accident in which some family members are critically injured, others escape with cuts and bruises and still others walk away largely unscathed. Would those hospitalized for contusions be justified in complaining that they were getting less treatment than their critically injured siblings in the intensive-care unit? And what of the uninjured who required no treatment at all?

Ah, but (to return from hospital to schoolhouse) much of the "treatment" doesn't look like treatment. The Men of Madison, like other participants in the Black Male Achievement Initiative, seem to be having a great time. Field trips, devoted mentors, early access to the gym for "bonding" exercises. Imagine your buddies, but not you, having regular access to the pingpong table. Would you feel better being told that they were being treated for Hand-Eye Coordination Deficit from which they, but not you, were suffering?

The idea of special treatment for those with special problems is easiest to accept in family settings. The sister whose back-injury therapy requires regular trips to the swimming pool may inspire in you a certain amount of sympathy. The neighbors with money for membership in the pool club are more likely to inspire jealousy. And the thought of people swimming whenever they like because of who they are may inspire outrage.

The trouble with the BMAI program is that its benefits are available not to the academically injured but to groups who, statistically, may be more prone to injury. As Marcy Canavan, the school board chairman who has opposed the program, told me: "By no means are all black males in trouble, and by no means are all white and female students not in trouble."

Now in his third year at the Citrus Bowl Tough Truck competition Coomes cited that "it's the excitement of the sport" that keeps him coming back.


He admitted that his own enthusiasm keeps him interested and coming back for more. He had to confess that the money won is a slight incentive too.

boats and heavy equipment," he said of a place along the shores of Lake Jeaup in eastern Seminole County. "The thing is is that people see that it's already been polluted and think 'what the heck, what's a little more?' If we clean it up, people won't mess it up we hope."

In charge of the cleanup effort in Seminole County is Sherry Newkirk, the county's coordinator for Recycling and Solid Waste. She is excited about the effort.

"We're working really hard and we want to get everyone involved," she said. "We've got plenty of jobs for everyone."

Newkirk and her staff have created a video that shows the natural beauty of the river as it flows through Seminole County. It also shows the pollution and the need to clean it up.

"We'll show our video to whatever group wants to see it," she noted.

In addition to the video, Newkirk and her staff have spoken to school children, have sent brochures home with more than 50,000 students in the Seminole County public schools,

have sent fliers out in every county utility bill, and have contacted every marina in the county in an effort to get boat owners involved in the cleanup effort.

There are jobs for everyone who wants to get involved, Newkirk said.

"There are things for people in boats, for people who want to walk along the shore, for people who'd rather stay on land," she noted. "There is something for everyone, I promise."

In addition to retrieving refuse from the water, groups will be scouring the shore for bottles, cans and other trash that has washed up. There will be others separating out the recyclable items for reuse. And others who can work farther inland stenciling markers on stormwater drains.

At each of the 19 sites in Seminole County, there will be captains assigned who will provide gloves and heavy trash bags to the volunteers and assign them to a position.

"Seminole County is very organized," Graf said. "We are very impressed."

Of course, all work and no play makes Jack a dull volunteer, so

Newkirk and her staff have planned a celebration following the 8 a.m. to noon cleanup effort at L&L Acres in Lake Mary.

From noon until 6 p.m., there will be a number of live bands playing a variety of styles of music providing the entertainment while volunteers have the opportunity to visit educational booths set up by environmentally concerned agencies.

There will be plenty of refreshments at the event and Newkirk hopes it will be a party to bring the volunteers together with a lot of fun and some useful information.

"That's the celebration part of the 'cleanup celebration' and we think it will be great," she said.

The St. Johns River Water Management District hopes to have more than 50,000 people statewide involved in the cleanup effort, Graf said.

# States rethinking some restrictive rules on jurors

WASHINGTON — The judge's warning to jurors is a standard part of courtroom dramas, both real and fictional: Do not discuss the case with anyone while evidence is being presented.

But not in Arizona.

Jurors in civil cases there are being told just the opposite: Go ahead and talk about the evidence among yourselves. It's one of many changes enacted in an effort to improve Arizona's jury-trial system.

Arizona jurors are allowed to submit questions. Judges give legal instructions in plain English. If jurors become

deadlocked, the judge can allow lawyers to offer additional arguments or even present more evidence.

"I put a lot of importance in getting as much information to the jury as possible," said Judge B. Michael Dann, of the Maricopa County Superior Court, who helped work out the changes. "Judges and lawyers should take the lead to improve the jury trial for everyone's benefit."

The American justice system may not be broken — despite complaints of people unhappy with O.J. Simpson's murder acquittal — but Dann and others think at least some room exists for improvement.

"The task of a juror is awesome, but somehow they manage to get through it," trial lawyer Fred R. Joseph of Greenbelt, Md., said at a recent panel discussion sponsored by the Annenberg Washington Program and the Courtroom Television Network. "The Simpson case is an aberration."

Picking an impartial jury is difficult. Many courts use questionnaires to learn jurors' views on a variety of topics, but Valerie P. Hans, director of the University of Delaware's legal studies program, said some of the questions are useless.

"The best predictors of impartiality are very specific

## O.J. update

LOS ANGELES — Less than two hours before Nicole Brown Simpson was slashed to death, O.J. Simpson telephoned her and demanded to speak to their daughter, according to sources who recounted Simpson's deposition.

Simpson testified last week that he talked with his daughter Sydney about her dance recital earlier that evening and avoided talking to his ex-wife, sources told The Associated Press on Thursday.

The call from Simpson's mansion, never disclosed during his trial, was made between one and two hours before the time prosecutors contend Ms. Simpson and her friend were killed, according to the sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Simpson testified that all he said to his ex-wife was, "Let me speak to Sydney." He said he was trying to avoid talking to Ms. Simpson because he — not she — had broken off their relationship a month earlier.

## Gingrich on the defensive

WASHINGTON — Thrown on the defensive in the budget fight with President Clinton, House Speaker Newt Gingrich says he would consider shrinking the proposed Republican tax cut and shortening its duration.

The GOP also moved on two fronts Thursday to shield itself politically in its debt-limit battle with Clinton, another arena where Republicans have been bruised of late.

Republican leaders wrote Clinton pledging they would not allow an unprecedented default to occur and would send him legislation "acceptable to both you and the Congress." The letter underlined previous verbal promises by GOP leaders not to provoke a veto-fight with Clinton by adding provisions he opposed to the bill.

In addition, Congress unanimously approved legislation ensuring that Social Security recipients would get their benefits, even in the event of a federal default. With Republicans planning to vote to extend the debt ceiling in late February after a winter break, they feared Clinton would send the month warning that without that extension, the Treasury might not be able to mail March Social Security checks.

## Whitewater poll

NEW YORK — Only 25 percent of Americans think Hillary Rodham Clinton is telling the whole truth about Whitewater, according to an Associated Press poll taken after she testified before a grand jury.

Twice as many Americans, 52 percent, believe Mrs. Clinton is hiding something, and most of those people are not brushing it off as trivial, the poll found. The distrust is hurting Mrs. Clinton's image, and only four in 10 hold a favorable opinion of the first lady.

At the same time, a substantial minority is withholding judgment. And Americans are split almost evenly on the potential political impact of Mrs. Clinton's legal situation, with 43 percent seeing a serious, long-term effect on President Clinton's future, and 47 percent expecting no such effect.

 questions about the case, not general attitudes," she said.

Several legal experts were skeptical of proposals to reduce the use of peremptory challenges, in which lawyers can eliminate prospective jurors without having to explain why.

"The peremptory challenge offers protection to African-American defendants," said Paul D. Butler, associate law professor at George Washington University. "Racism is still very real in this country."

And only rarely should jurors be sequestered, panelists said.

Kelli L. Sager, a Los Angeles lawyer who represents news media, questioned "the idea that you have to keep the jurors ignorant of everything that is going on. Jurors in communities in historical times knew everything about a case."

Courts in states besides Arizona have tried innovations. Some states, including California, Delaware and New Hampshire, have named committees to study possible changes in their jury systems.

Arizona's changes, approved by the state Supreme Court, are the most comprehensive. The idea is to make jurors more knowledgeable and active, instead of nodding off in their chairs.

In civil cases, Arizona jurors are allowed to talk about the evidence among themselves during the trial, before deliberations begin.

Some lawyers fear this may lead jurors to make premature judgments before they hear all the evidence. Discussion of evidence by jurors in criminal cases is not allowed before deliberations because of constitutional concerns about depriving a defendant of an impartial jury. But Judge Dann in Arizona said jurors in civil cases seem to recognize the difference between discussing the evidence they've seen at a particular stage of the trial and ultimately rendering a verdict on the entire case.

In both civil and criminal cases, jurors can submit questions about the case in writing to the judge and get an answer, if the question is allowed under rules of evidence.

The Arizona changes "strike me as so obviously good common sense," federal Circuit Judge S. Jay Ploger said. "Am I the only one who wonders why it has taken two millennia for us to come around to these ideas?"

"A legal education: I think that is part of the problem," Dann quipped.

# Buckets pose risk to toddlers

The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services has sent the following information to help out consumers. Very young children's curiosity, combined with their desire for crawling and pulling up while learning to walk, can lead to danger when large buckets are used around the home. Buckets containing even small amounts of water or other liquids can pose a drowning hazard to children.

Various types of buckets and containers have been involved in child drownings. But of particular concern are 5-gallon buckets intended for commercial use that are brought into homes by consumers for re-use. The 5-gallon buckets are usually white-colored plastic that were originally intended for industrial purposes. Most of these buckets

originally contained bulk or commercial-sized quantities of a variety of products, including paint, detergents, construction materials and food.

Consumers frequently re-use these types of containers for cleaning and other purposes around the home. But parents with toddlers should be aware of the drowning hazard associated with using these containers and take precautions to reduce the

potential for tragedy.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) estimates that 36 toddlers drown each year in 5-gallon plastic buckets. The victims are generally under 14 months of age and have just learned to walk, or are pulling themselves up by holding onto furniture or other objects - such as buckets. Small children tend to be top-heavy, so a curious toddler leaning into a bucket can easily fall in head first. The weight of liquid in the bucket can keep it from tipping over when a child falls in, causing the victim to drown.

This hazard is not readily apparent to parents and caretakers, so buckets are often left within reach of vulnerable small children. To reduce the risk of child drownings and in-

juries, parents should:

• Discard all unused buckets or containers.

• Keep children in a visible area, but away from housework that involves the use of buckets or containers.

• Empty all buckets and containers after each use and store them out of reach of children.

# Allergies cause more than sniffles

DEAR ABBY: In a recent column, a few of your readers shared the effects of their allergies. Unfortunately, an estimated 60 million Americans suffer from some type of allergy, including hay fever, eczema, hives, contact dermatitis, and allergies to foods such as eggs, milk, nuts and seafood.

People with allergies have super-sensitive immune systems that react to seemingly harmless substances. The most common of these include plant pollen, dust mites, cockroaches, stinging insects, animal dander, mold and mildew. Multiple sensitivities are common, and many people with allergies are also sensitive to irritants - tiny airborne particles that irritate the nose, eyes and lungs. Common irritants include strong fumes from perfume, cleaning fluids, wood smoke and cigarette smoke.

Many people are unaware of the link between allergies and asthma, which is a serious and sometimes life-threatening disease. In approx-

mately 70 percent of the 13 million Americans with asthma, allergy is the primary trigger. The asthma death-rate in the United States is more than 5,000 per year, and growing - especially in urban communities and among children and the elderly.

Asthma is characterized by an inflammation and/or an obstruction of the airways. Symptoms vary, and may include coughing, wheezing, shortness of breath, chest tightness or excessive mucus. In addition to allergies, asthma can be triggered by respiratory infections, exercise

and dry, cold air.

The fact that asthma and allergies are so common causes their impact to be overlooked or trivialized. If you suspect you have asthma or allergies, see a doctor for a proper diagnosis. You can help your doctor by keeping a diary of your symptoms and the circumstances when reactions occurred. Your doctor can conduct tests that may confirm your suspicions. Asthma and allergies can be controlled by eliminating allergens at home, work and school, and by strictly adhering to a medical treatment plan that may include regular medication.

DEAR DAWN: Thank you for an important letter and for pointing out the seriousness of allergies and asthma. Readers, lest you think that Ms. Marvin is overstating her case, read on for a letter I recently received:

DEAR ABBY: About three

months ago, "Barbara," a special friend of mine, went into a coma. A week later, she was declared brain-dead. She died on Nov. 13, 1985.




Opening for Acappella was the group, AVB, which represents Acappella Vocal Band. The energetic quartet provides a rap style and also perform several ballad type songs.



**Blood counts are key with leukemia**

DEAR DR. GOTT: About five years ago my doctor told me I had chronic lymphatic leukemia, for which my blood is checked every three months. So far, I haven't had any problem but if I should in the future, what can I expect?



**PETER GOTT, M.D.**

DEAR READER: Chronic lymphatic leukemia is a type of blood cell cancer involving the infection-fighting white blood cells called lymphocytes. The cause is unknown. The disease is marked by swollen lymph glands, fatigue, fever, loss of appetite, breathlessness, anemia, and malfunction of the immune system. Symptoms may take years to appear.

The diagnosis is made by blood tests and bone marrow examination. In general, the prognosis is favorable: Survivals of up to 20 years are common, which isn't bad considering that most patients are diagnosed at or above the age of 60.

Therapy with anti-cancer drugs, radiation and cortisone is usually effective but need not be used unless patients develop progressive symptoms or until the lymphocyte count exceeds 75,000 per microliter (normal 4,000-10,000).

You seem to be following a relatively typical pattern. You should continue to be monitored at the discretion of your physician. When you develop symptoms or if your lymphocyte count rises, he can refer you to a hematologist for treatment.

signs of cardiovascular toxicity. Clearly, any one of these side effects is serious. Fortunately, all are rare.

Nonetheless, most authorities recommend that patients taking imipramine have baseline cardiograms before beginning therapy and — if any abnormality is present — close supervision thereafter.

Your rapid pulse is probably not solely related to imipramine. As you know, panic disorder can also cause a high pulse rate. Nevertheless, you should bring this symptom to your doctor's attention, because you may need an adjustment in dose, a change to another anti-depressant, or the addition of a second drug, such as Xanax, to control your anxiety attacks when they are especially bothersome.



**WIN AT BRIDGE**

**Seeing the one chance**

By Phillip Alder

When you are declarer at the bridge table, how do you anticipate the lie of the opponents' cards? I do it pictorially, seeing in my mind's eye the cards in each opponent's hand. But whatever works for you is fine.

In today's deal, South visualized a layout that would allow him to make the contract, played for it and was duly rewarded. Playing in three no-trump after East had opened one spade, South received the heart-six lead, four, king, ace. How should South have continued?

South had seven top tricks. Assuming the heart king was an honest card, West was marked with the heart queen. This meant East needed

all the other honors for his opening bid. So South, via the spade finesse, was looking at eight tricks: three spades, one heart and four diamonds.

True, as West hadn't led a spade, there was a danger that the suit was breaking 6-0. And if it was, declarer's only chance was to sneak a club to his king. But as East wasn't sound asleep, South knew this stood no chance.

Instead, South saw that he could get home if West had the singleton eight or nine of spades. After winning the first trick, declarer played a diamond to dummy's nine and called for the spade 10.

If East hadn't covered with the queen, South would have continued with a spade to the jack and taken nine tricks: four spades, one heart and four diamonds. When East did cover, South won with the king and smiled as the nine dropped. Declarer played a diamond to dummy's 10, finessed the spade seven, played a spade to his king and claimed his contract.
