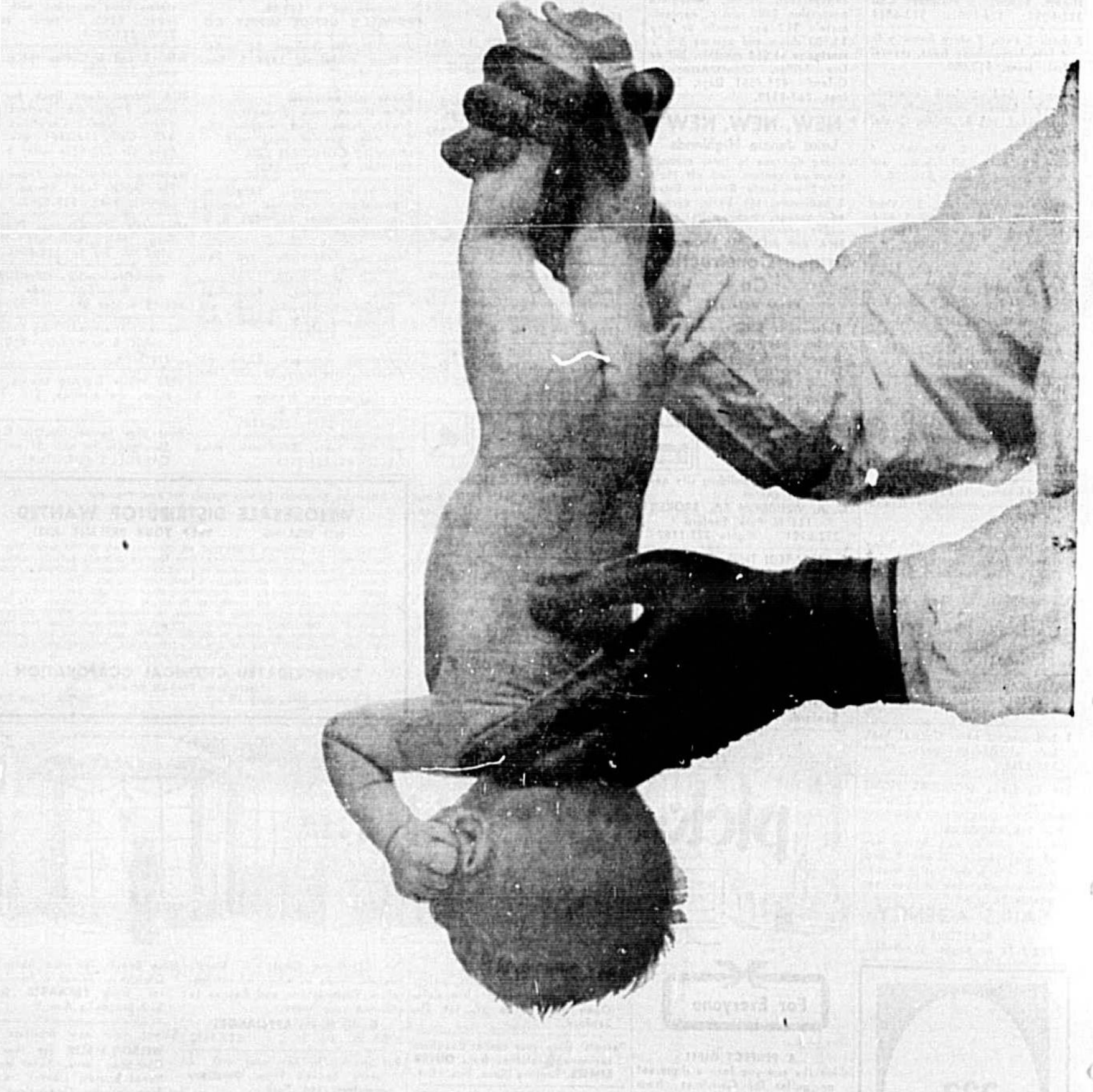

Shootout Suspect Trial Set; Delay Granted 4 Others

Trial date was set this morning by Circuit Judge Dominick Salfi for only one of the five suspects charged in a five-count information resulting from a drug shoot-out on Dec. 6.

Each of the five, John Cooper, George Johnston, Ricky LaValley, Eddie Sanders and Gary Herndon, is charged with three counts each of conspiracy to commit a felony and one count each of attempted robbery and possession of marijuana. All are in custody in lieu of \$15,000 bond each.

Herndon entered a not guilty plea today, and trial is set for Feb. 7. His attorney, John Holmes, made an oral motion for reduction of bond contending that it is unreasonably high. The court ruled that the only time an oral motion is considered is with state agreement; otherwise the procedure of filing a written motion is followed.

The other four defendants were granted postponement of arraignment until Dec. 21 for procurement of counsel. Cooper told the court he could not pay

Income Tax Deadline Changed

BOCA RATON, Fla. (AP)—Individual federal income tax forms won't have to be filed until June 15 next year, but taxpayers still have to ante up what they estimate they owe by the regular April 15 deadline.

Johannie M. Walters, U.S. commissioner of the Internal Revenue Service, announced the two-month extension of the deadline at a conference of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants Thursday.

Those who take the extension and estimate their final tax bill too low will also face late payment penalties and 6 per cent interest on the unpaid balance, she said.

Walters said the late payment penalty will apply if the total tax owed is more than 10 per cent above the amount paid by April 15. No penalties will be assessed, he said, if the difference is less than 10 per cent and if the balance due is remitted with the final tax return.

He called it a milestone in tax administration.

More than 50 per cent of all individual income tax returns are now prepared by someone other than the taxpayer, Walters said.

But he added that the Internal Revenue Service will be watchful through its regional offices for unethical preparers of tax returns and misleading advertising.

For Mr. Ivey, civic minded leader who served in the highest posts in the Sanford government and in its civic clubs, was early the promise of this lake-side city.

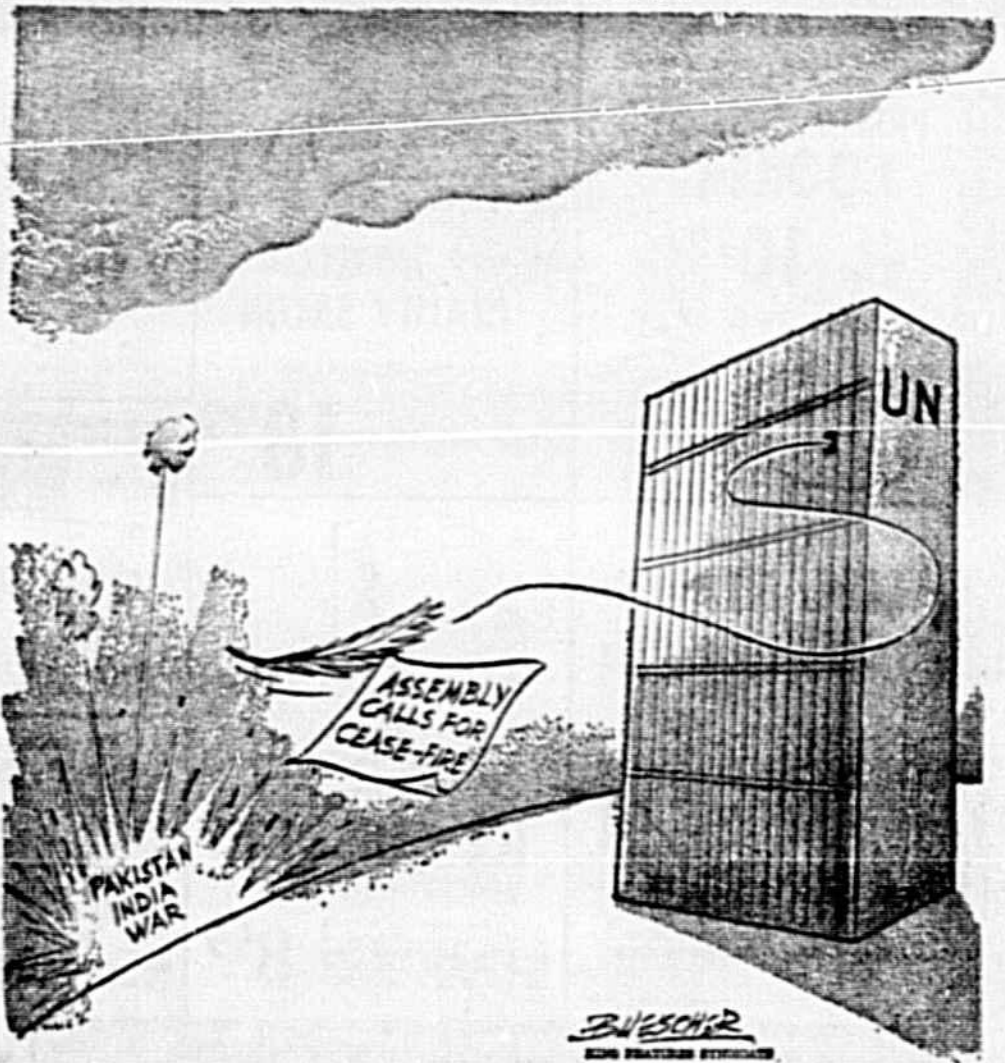

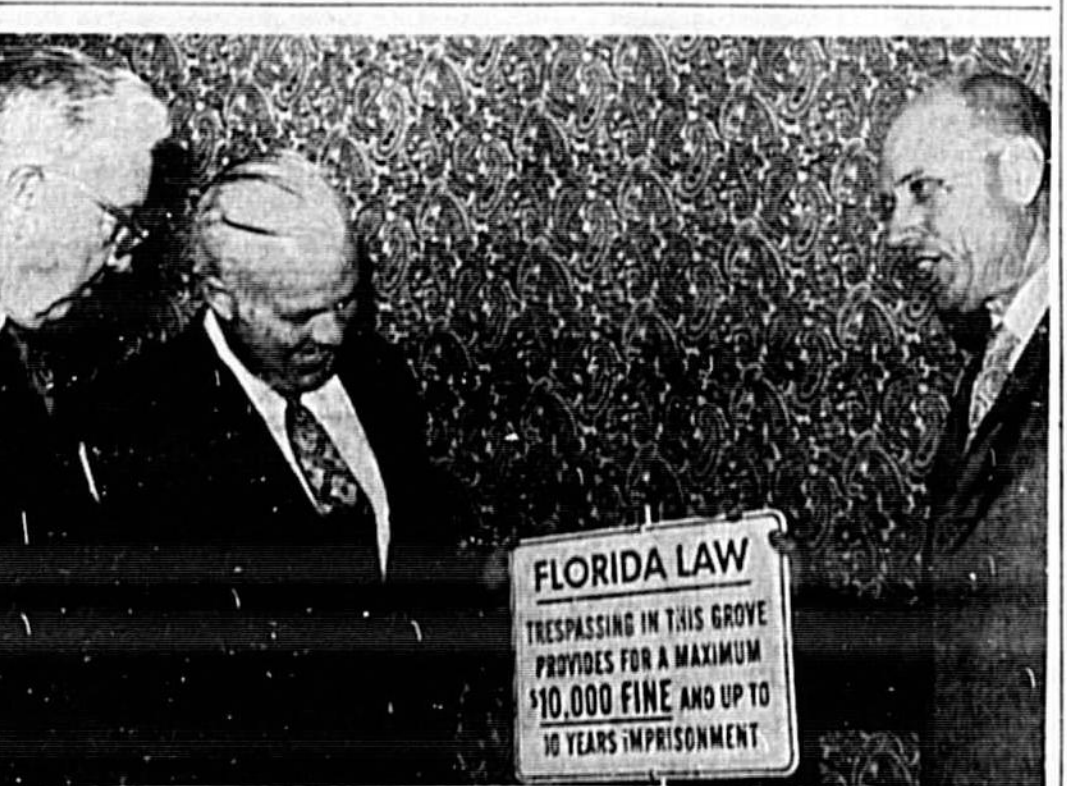

Three-Pronged Attack On Dacca

Indians Fire On E. Pakistan Capital

Indian artillery opened fire today on military targets in Dacca, the East Pakistan capital and the last redoubt of the Pakistan army, an Indian military spokesman said.

Defense Minister Jagjivan Ram told India's Parliament, "It is our hope that the process of liberating Bangla Desh will be completed soon." Bangla Desh is the name given East Pakistan by the secessionists.

Lt. Gen. A. K. Niazi, Pakistan's commander in East Pakistan, vowed to fight to the last man. Foreign correspondents in Dacca reported, however, that his staff was in a state of "total depression."

The army spokesman in Calcutta refused to give any details about how far Indian troops are from Dacca.

The military briefings mentioned no advances in the past 24 hours in the arrows designating Indian troop positions—last reported to be only six miles from the capital.

The spokesman said, however, that a three-pronged infantry-armor-artillery attack on Dacca "is progressing well."

"All three advances are within artillery range of Dacca," added the spokesman. He said that the heaviest artillery being used by the Indians are 130mm guns with a range of a little more than 15 miles.

An Indian government spokesman in New Delhi reported the advances were on the north, northwest and east.

Radio Pakistan continued to claim that the Pakistani troops were putting up stiff resistance. But the political advisers to East Pakistan's military government and others in Dacca reportedly tried to arrange a cease-fire with the Indians.

There were indications that President Agha Mohammod Yahya Khan of Pakistan at first agreed to the proposal.

The defense minister said Indian forces have offered more than 8,000 casualties in 10 days of fighting, including 1,978 killed, 5,025 wounded and 1,063 missing.

"I have no figures for Pakistani losses, but I know they are much higher than ours," Ram said, adding that Indian forces have captured more than 4,000 para-military forces, most of them in East Pakistan.

He claimed 83 Pakistani planes shot down and admitted the loss of 41 Indian warplanes, along with nine pilots and three navigators.

Ram also reported that 18 of 1700 Indian soldiers were missing in the sinking of the Indian freighter Eshwar, which was hit by Pakistani fire in the Arabian sea.

Gen. Sam Manoharshaw, the Indian chief of staff, sent his third surrender appeal in a week to Niazi on Monday, and Niazi rejected it.

Summeret Homeowners' Association president Robert Godard questioned McIntosh's opinion here, saying, "How long does a structure have to be constructed before it becomes part of the property?" His contention was that the patio had become part of the club, and therefore the city had some responsibility in seeing that it was replaced. Godard also presented a list of items that he and the Association felt need to be repaired in the club before the city accepts it. These include faulty valves and several safety hazards around the pool area. "We'll certainly look into those matters," said Bergman, "but the city cannot expect to receive a brand new pool."

Hospital Employees Given Pay Increase

Seminole Memorial Hospital trustees Monday granted a three per cent pay raise for all hospital employees and set up an employer-personnel policy committee.

Trustees acted after John Schirrad Jr. explained his commission's recommendation which came after a study of the medical facility's salaries and salaries schedule for employees.

Under the plan, all hospital employees starting Feb. 1 will receive raises not to exceed three per cent. This was explained by Robert Besserer, hospital administrator, who said some raises would amount to five and six per cent, depending on previous salaries. He estimated the overall costs of the raises at between \$50,000 to \$57,000.

All hospital employees will be given a three-week vacation after five years of employment, the trustee recommendation approved by the trustees.

In addition, an employee personnel policy board will be selected by Besserer to meet with hospital officials to discuss grievances and other personnel matters. Besserer said the recommendations were made after seven other areas had been reviewed.

Dr. John Johnson, chief of the hospital medical staff, brought before the trustees a recommendation that the hospital not involve itself at present with computerized electrocardiograph readings.

Dr. Johnson said the medical staff decided that since the procedure is still experimental, it was the decision not to proceed with computers at this time.

Dr. Johnson also complimented the trustees for their efforts to expand the hospital during the past year and advised that Dr. C. F. Brooke Smith will be the new chief of staff effective January 1, 1972.

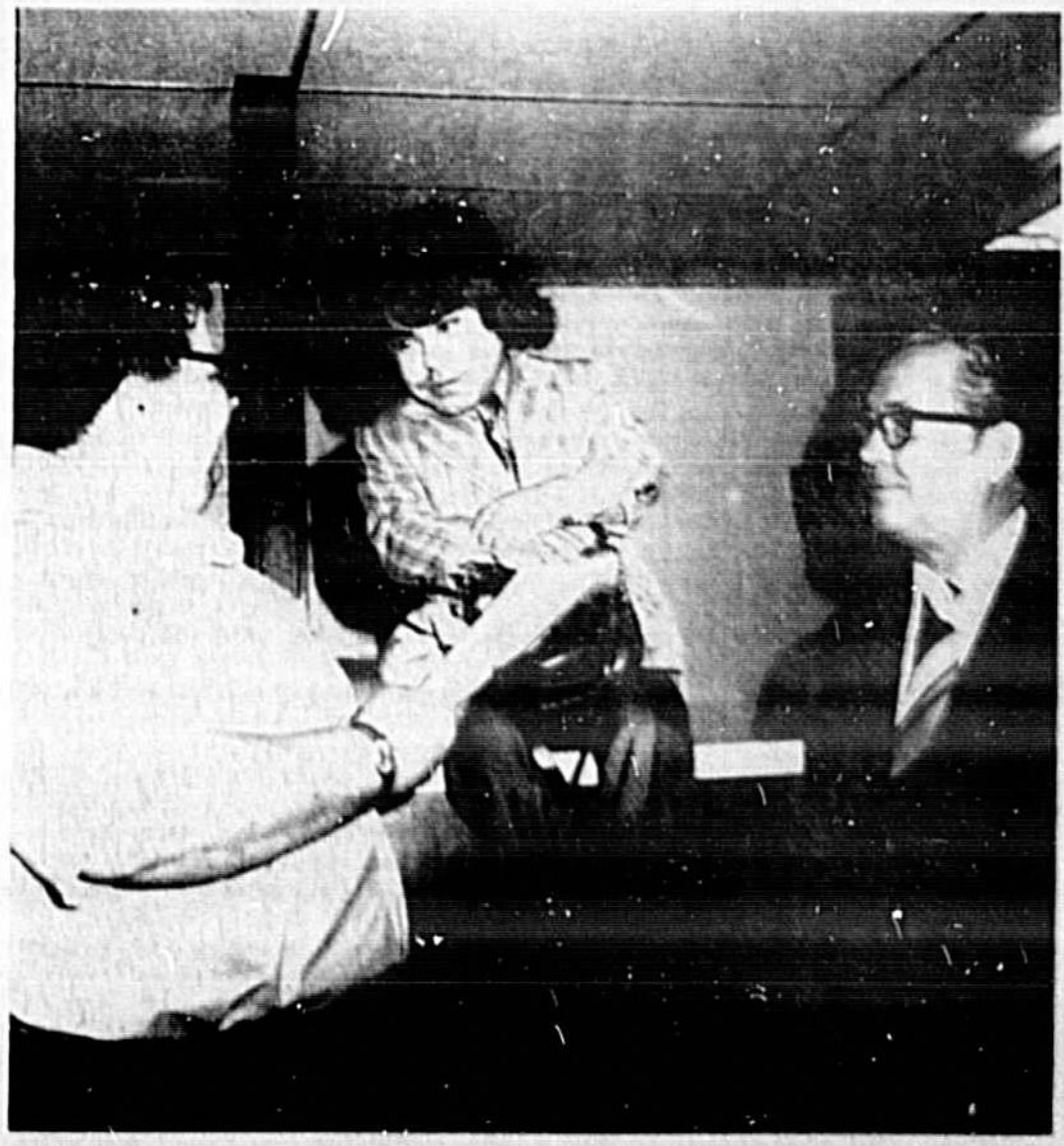

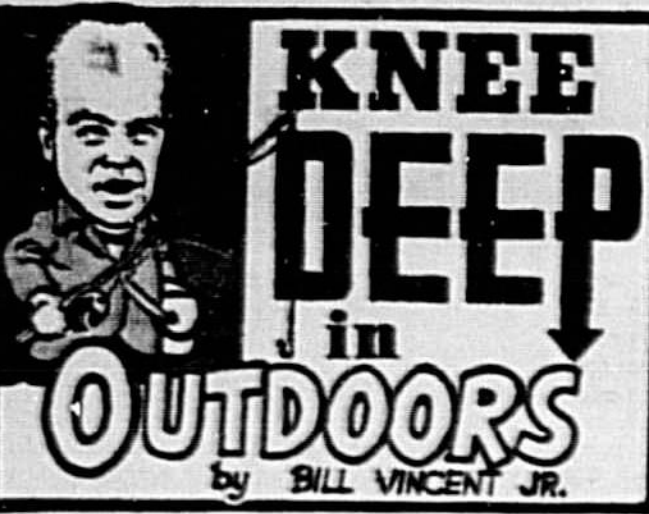

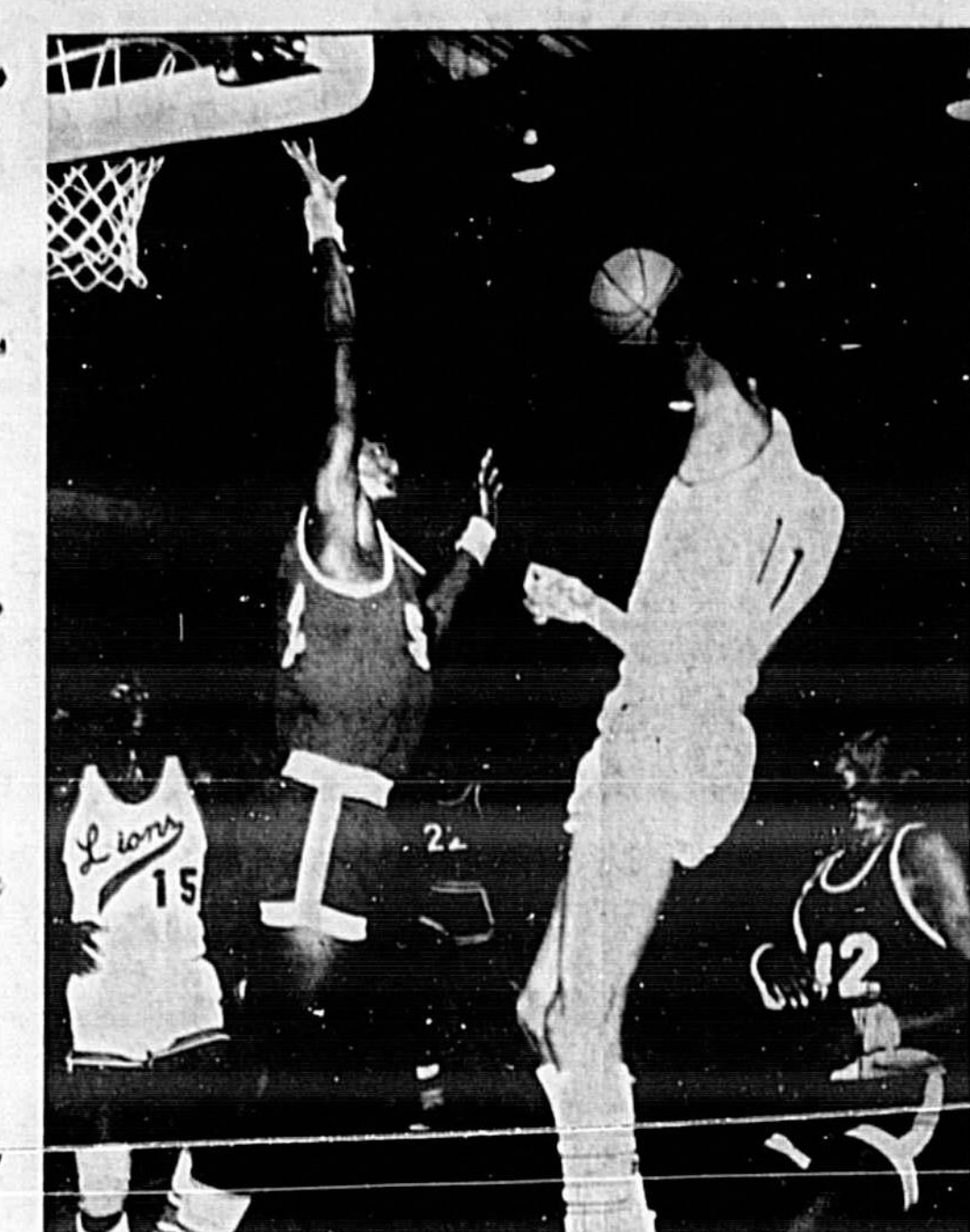

Rupp Predicts Trouble For His Kentucky Quint

By BERT ROSENTHAL Associated Press Sports Writer In Adolph Rupp's first 41 years as basketball coach at the University of Kentucky, the Wildcats never had a losing season.

This could be the first. "We haven't got it this year," Rupp Monday night after the seventh round Wildcats were upended by Michigan State 91-85 for their second consecutive setback after three victories.

Michigan State Coach Gus Ganakas concurred with Rupp's observation. "Kentucky certainly is not as strong as it has been in the past," said Ganakas.

Since Rupp became Kentucky's coach in 1930, the Wildcats have won an amazing total of 658 games while losing only 183. They also have won the NCAA title four times, the National Invitation Tournament championship once and the Southeastern Conference crown a record 26 times.

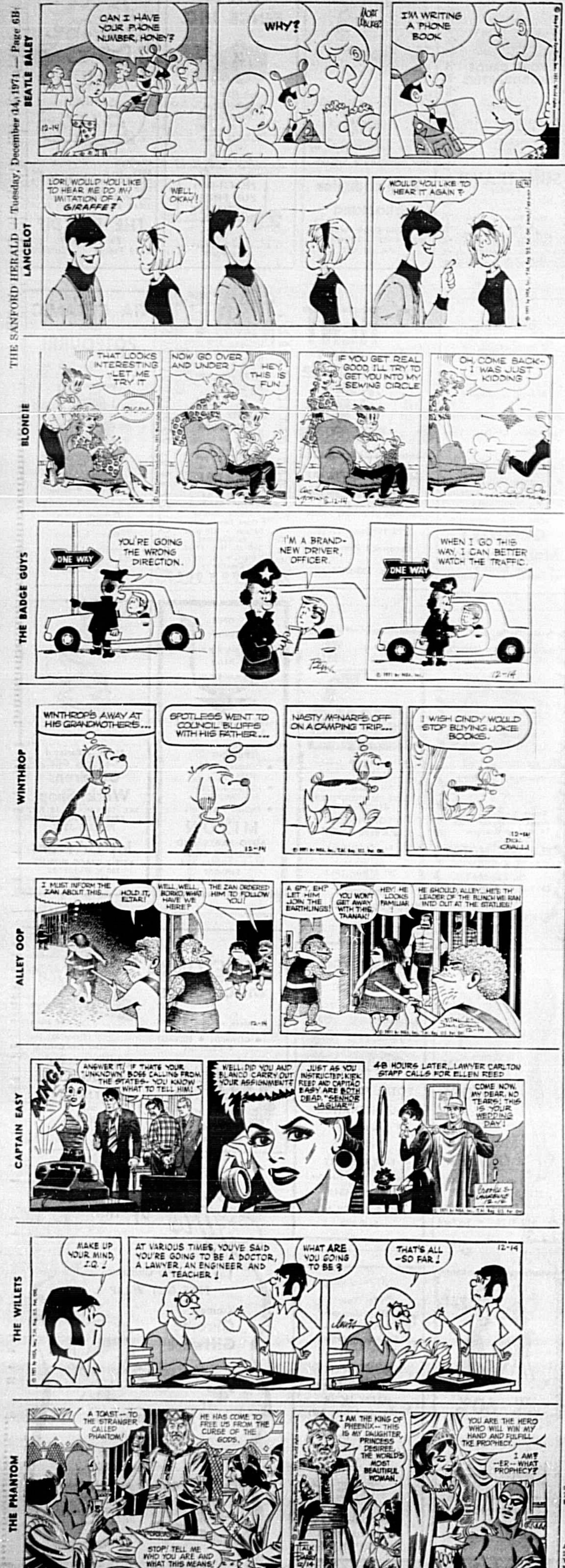
