Man not guilty of child rape

SANFORD — A Seminole County jury Wednesday found Roger Anthony Menefee, 28, 1185-A W. 18th St., Sanford, not guilty of sexual battery on a child, in a Sanford trial, court records show.

Menefee was arrested by Sanford police Feb. 12, based on allegations from a pre-teenage girl who reportedly said she was raped by Menefee at his house that morning, police records show.

Long goodbye costs \$10,000

CHICAGO — Rebecca Burke's fare well kiss to her husband turned out to be an expensive one.

Police said it cost Burke \$10,000 in jewelry and luggage in a mixup as she left the posh Lake Point Towers condominium Tuesday on her way to Union Station.

Burke's husband, William, 73, and the building doorman had put the luggage belonging Burke and her son in a cab as they prepared to leave on vacation.

The husband returned to the lobby of the luxury high-rise to say goodbye to his wife, who was waiting inside. About 10 minutes later the woman and son got in a cab — but it was the wrong one.

When the Burkes asked for their luggage at the train station, the cabbie told them they never had put anything in his trunk and offered to take them back. They declined, saying they would miss their train.

"When he kissed his wife goodbye he didn't realize he was also kissing her jewelry goodbye," said detective Fred Stone.

Yellow Cab, meanwhile, was trying to track down the missing luggage.

Soap box check-in begins this evening

SANFORD — Length, cockpit padding, and turnbuckle tension will all be part of the checking process between 6 and 8 p.m. tonight and tomorrow night at Sanford City Hall as final technical inspections are held in preparation for Saturday morning's second running of the Central Florida Soap Box Derby.

Practice runs beginning at 7:30 a.m., and the main racing at 8 a.m. Saturday, will be held on U. S. Highway 17-92, French Avenue, from 10th to 13th streets. Sanford Police will be blocking off through traffic at 5:30 a.m., and normal north- or southbound traffic will be rerouted. Although traffic control will begin early, the extra time is needed in order to prepare the race course area. Cross traffic will be permitted at selected times before and between the races.

At 9 a.m., a break in the racing heats will bring on a parade of the cars entered in the race, with the parade route on French Avenue from 10th to 13th streets.

Jeff Monson, recreation superintendent, said as of this morning, eight entrants had been signed for the Masters Division, and 14 for the Kit Car.

Bigger firefighter staff shot down by county

SANFORD — Seminole County commissioners balked at spending the \$1 million amount needed to add a third firefighter to fire trucks during the first day of budget reviews Wednesday.

Faced with a potential need to increase the property tax by more than 1 mil, commissioners said they preferred to stretch out the hiring of 30 firefighters and six lieutenants

over a period of three to five years to reduce the tax increase this year.

Commissioners also refused to pay for the nearly \$250,000 first-year cost to lease and man an emergency helicopter for the Public Safety Department.

Seminole County commissioners are facing a request by county officials to increase the tax rate from \$4.55 per \$1,000 of taxable property to \$5.89 in order to balance the \$212.5 million budget. For owners

Elementary school to build with proceeds of land sale

LAKE MARY — The Seminole County school district will soon receive a check for \$228,782 from Seminole County for nearly five acres of land purchased for the purpose of widening Lake Mary Boulevard to the north of Lake Mary Elementary School, 132 Country Club Road, Lake Mary.

Money from the sale will be used to purchase some land adjacent to the school and to build an art and music suite that was financially impossible during recent construction at the school.

"This works out well for everyone involved," said Richard Wells, assistant superintendent for facilities. "They get the land they need to expand the road and we get the property and facilities."

Who should pay for cost of health care?

WASHINGTON — A new Gallup poll released today shows there is no apparent consensus on who should pick up the nation's huge health care tab.

"The results of this survey show that, as a nation, we're still at odds over the future direction for this country's health care system," said Bernard Tranowaki, president of Blue Cross and Blue Shield Association, which commissioned the poll.

"When considering the issue, Americans are torn between the social value they place on equal access to care and the economic reality of paying for that care," he said.

Of the 2,000 randomly selected adults interviewed, 49 percent said government should provide health care regardless of the cost to taxpayers, while 43 percent said expanding the government's role would be a costly mistake.

Chronic Conditions

The 10 most commonly reported chronic conditions among the general population



Fifty-three percent said they would be willing to pay additional taxes to provide health care to all; 42 percent said they were not willing to do so.


Twenty-nine percent said they would be willing to shell out \$500 more each year, while just 10 percent said they would ante up \$1,000 more annually.

Gallup took the survey results and identified six types of health care consumers:

• "The Young and Skeptical" — 15 percent of the adult population. These are well-educated men and women not happy with the health care they receive and are distrustful of the medical profession. They support increased governmental involvement but are skeptical about government's ability to run major programs.

• "The Self-Reliants" — 15 percent of the adult population. These are typically well-educated, upper-income men in their 50s who are strong supporters of American business and adamant that government be restrained from increased involvement in health care. They feel individuals should bear the responsibility for paying for additional health care spending. They are diligent.

Fatal accident closes Seven Mile Bridge

MARATHON - A fatal car accident on the Seven Mile Bridge connecting Marathon with the southern Florida Keys closed the bridge Wednesday to traffic for more than six hours.

At about noon, a dump truck blew a tire, swerved into oncoming traffic striking a passenger car and then vaulted through the bridge railing into the water, said Florida Highway Patrol Trooper C. Marshall Davis.

The truck driver was killed and divers called to the scene were not able to pull him from the truck's cab, he said.

A passenger in the car also was killed and the car's driver was in an area hospital. His condition was not available.

One lane was opened at about 4 p.m. so some of the traffic stalled on either side of the bridge could cross, but it was soon closed. Traffic was backed up about 5 miles on the northern side of the bridge and about 3 miles on the southern side.

Authorities had hoped to open the bridge by 6 p.m., but postponed the opening while engineers tried to determine if the bridge was sound enough to stand the stress of having a giant crane positioned near the break in the bridge railing.

McGee jury selection moving slowly

FORT MYERS - Attorneys whittled down an initial group of 33 potential jurors to just six Wednesday during the second day of jury selection in the trial of a man charged in the toilet training death of his 2-year-old stepson.

Most of the 33 potential jurors questioned during the first day of jury selection Tuesday said they were familiar with the first-degree murder case of Thomas Cor, who is charged with repeatedly dunking toddler Bradley McGee headfirst in a toilet as punishment for soiling his pants.

By Wednesday, attorneys had dismissed 26 potential jurors. Prosecutors and defense attorneys were expected to select a dozen jurors and two alternatives from a pool of 250 people.

The trial was moved from Polk County to Lee County because of publicity.

Bradley's mother, Sheryl Coe, pleaded no contest to second-degree murder in March and was sentenced to 30 years in prison. She is expected to testify against her husband.

Company closes plant

LOWELL - A soil-decontamination plant suspected of exposing its neighbors to elevated levels of lead has been shut down permanently, the company president said Wednesday.

"There is no lead problem in Marion County. We put out less lead than just about any industry of which I am aware," said David Kibler, president of Mid Florida Mining Industries. "We're simply responding to an acute misperception. The easiest thing to do in our Lowell location is simply to withdraw."

High concentrations of lead can attack a person's nervous system, causing mental retardation and even death.

Mid Florida had asked the state Department of Environmental Regulation to allow it to expand its soil decontamination unit, but Tuesday night it withdrew that request and notified DER it shut down the soil operation about two weeks ago, Kibler said.

The 2 1/2-year-old decontamination unit amounts to about 5 percent of the company's business, which includes mining clay and manufacturing kitty litter, Kibler said. He would not say whether the shutdown would result in layoffs.

Neighbors, especially nearby thoroughbred horse breeders, had accused the plant of lead contamination.

Bosch conditions won't be negotiated

MIAMI - The Justice Department said Wednesday it will not negotiate on the conditions it set down for anti-Castro militant Orlando Bosch's release from federal prison.

"Mr. Bosch's lawyers have told us that Mr. Bosch has formally rejected the conditions, therefore Mr. Bosch will remain in jail. There is never any question of negotiating," said Dan Eramlian, a Justice Department spokesman in Washington.

On Tuesday, Bosch's attorneys notified the federal government that Bosch would accept 13 of the 14 conditions the government set for his release. But Bosch refused to keep a log of his visitors, saying that would make him appear to be a government informant.

Bosch agreed to the other conditions, which included wearing an electronic monitoring device, staying at home 21 hours a day, requesting permission to leave Dade County at least 72 hours in advance and notifying immigration officials of any change of residence.

Angry contractors jeer Martinez

OCALA - About 100 contractors upset by the state's new workers' compensation law picketed and shouted at Gov. Bob Martinez as he made a campaign appearance Wednesday.

The demonstrators, waving signs that read "Bob, Save Our Jobs" and "Workmen's Comp Equals Welfare," stood outside a Shriner's club as Martinez spoke to a group of supporters inside.

Martinez ignored the pickets when he arrived, but an aide said the governor later met with a representative of the group for about five minutes.

One protester, Marion County contractor John Mays, said he can't get building permits until he has evidence he's paid his premium, so that's virtually shut him out of work. Under the old law, his status as a one-man company exempted him, but now he must pay an \$8,000 premium, he said.

But state officials in Tallahassee said Wednesday that relief for contractors like Mays will soon be on its way.

An emergency statewide rule aimed at reducing the impact of the controversial law on small contractors is expected to take effect by next week, they said.

"We're moving as quickly as we can to put something together that will be acceptable," said Chuck Magalian, deputy director

of the state Labor Department's Division of Workers' Compensation.

The rule being drafted by the departments of Insurance and Labor would provide some relief to sole proprietors and partners who have protested dramatic increases in their new workers' comp rates.

The measure would be in effect for 90 days and give officials time to develop a long-term solution. It would also help the Legislature avoid a special session to deal with the situation.

The outcry over the changes began almost immediately, with many small contractors complaining that the costs of additional coverage will harm them and could cause some firms to go out of business.

Seafarer takes on historians over de Leon

FORT LAUDERDALE - A seafarer who retraced Juan Ponce de Leon's initial voyage to Florida said the Spanish explorer probably landed near Melbourne Beach, not St. Augustine as historians have long thought.

Ponce de Leon discovered the "island" of Florida in 1513. History books record that he made his initial landing in St. Augustine during his quest for the fabled Fountain of Youth.

But Doug Peck, a sailor and navigator who retraced the explorer's voyage in a homemade 31-foot sloop, said Ponce de Leon probably landed about two miles south of Melbourne Beach, about 125 miles farther south on Florida's Atlantic coast.

Peck, 72, used the explorer's notes and found what he said are glaring historical mistakes - partly Ponce de Leon's fault, but mostly historians' errors.

"I hate to take credit away from the old bastard, 'cause he was such a hard-luck guy," said Peck.

Ponce de Leon never found his Fountain of Youth and was fatally wounded by an Indian arrow during a later attempt to establish a colony near Charlotte Harbor.

Peck, a crusty, rum-swilling adventurer who travels with a cat named Hooker, lives in Bradenton.

Defense lawyers want to pay bill for Florida electric chair repairs

TALLAHASSEE - Two state lawyers defending a death-row inmate said Wednesday they will donate \$4,000 of their own money to repair an electrode that was blamed for the botched execution of cop-killer Jesse Tafero.

Capital Collateral Representative lawyers Billy Nolas and Julie Naylor, who are representing inmate James William Hamblen, made their offer in a letter to Florida Assistant Attorney General Carolyn Snurkowiak.

Hamblen is scheduled to die at 7 a.m. Tuesday, July 17, for the 1984 murder of a Jacksonville lingerie shop operator. He is on his second death warrant.

"Nothing about this is a challenge to capital punishment," Nolas said. "The purpose is not to have clients burned up

in executions."

In the letter to Snurkowiak, Nolas and Noyles claim the Department of Corrections "is not competent to carry out an execution by electrocution humanely, particularly since the Department's authorities have

not repaired the known defects."

Snurkowiak, who said she received the letter Wednesday, declined comment, saying it would be unethical for her to respond to any questions while the Hamblen case was still under litigation.

Convicted killer receives stay

MIAMI - A Circuit Court judge granted a 45-day stay of execution Wednesday for convicted killer Roy Allen Stewart, agreeing with the defense that police may have failed to investigate other suspects in the case.

Stewart, 34, had been scheduled to die Thursday in the Florida electric chair at Starke for the murder of an

elderly Dade County woman.

Dade County Circuit Judge Michael Salmon made his decision after issuing two one-day stays and hearing testimony at a two-day hearing. Salmon based the stay on the testimony of former Assistant Attorney General Calvin Fox, who originally prosecuted Stewart. Fox testified that police had thrown away evidence at the murder scene.

Ocala teenager charged in son's death

OCALA - The parents of a teenager charged in the beating death of her newborn never knew the girl was pregnant, and were unaware that their daughter was giving birth in her bedroom Saturday while they were in another room, investigators said.

Louann B. Wagner allegedly gave birth to the 5-pound boy about 8 a.m. Saturday, investigators with the Marion County Sheriff's Office said.

Wagner, 17, is accused of sneaking the child outdoors into the Ocala National Forest in a plastic garbage bag, clubbing the infant to death and setting the bag on fire on a dirt road in the forest, authorities say.

Gordon and Linda Wagner told deputies they never knew their daughter was pregnant.

"(Her parents) said they were home (when the

child was born), but they did not know what was going on," said Sgt. Brian Jarvis.

The bag also contained household garbage, bloody rags, an umbilical cord and afterbirth, authorities said.

Wagner allegedly hid her pregnancy from her family and friends by wearing baggy clothes, officials said.

Investigators linked her to the baby's death after she was spotted standing over the smoldering bag Saturday afternoon by Greg Varn, a Dunedin man visiting relatives in the area.

"She was burning the baby to destroy it," said investigator Bruce Munster of the Marion County Sheriff's Office. "She was hoping it would go away if she burned it."

Wagner was arrested Monday and charged with first-degree murder.

Distributor arrested in 'Nigerian prince' oil scheme

FORT LAUDERDALE - A vacuum cleaner distributor who claimed to be friends with the prince of Nigeria persuaded investors to buy into an oil deal with the prince that would make them rich, police said.

But Nigeria has a military government with no royalty, and the man had no connection to the oil industry. He kept the money, police said.

James Bona, 28, was arrested Wednesday on charges of organized fraud and grand theft. Police said he defrauded at least two Florida businessmen of \$45,000.

"We may have a lot more victims out there," Detective Kevin Allen said.

Allen said the investors were victims of a persuasive performance by Bona.

"He said he had met the prince of Nigeria in New York City and they established a strong relationship," Allen said. "He told them the prince would sell them crude oil at \$5 (a barrel) below the market price."

Bona, who operated the J.P. Bona Company, told his victims that he had invested \$650,000 of his own money and that previous investors had earned as much as a 400 percent return on their money. Allen said.

"It sounded rather intriguing," said Clark Brozowski, one of the investors. "He was very energetic. He just had answers for every objection we threw at him."

Bona said he needed \$50,000 right away for travel expenses to Nigeria, England, Houston and New York to consummate the deal with a prince, Brozowski said.

Brozowski said Bona showed him all kinds of authentic looking documentation and threw around a lot of names.

Permanent 9-5 watering ban urged

CAPE CANAVERAL — The staff of the St. Johns Water Management District has asked its board to enact a permanent 9 a.m.-to-5 p.m. ban on lawn watering, a move that could spread statewide in the next few months.


The staff of the South Florida Water Management District was expected to make the same proposal to its board at a meeting Thursday, said Ann Overton, spokeswoman for the South Florida district.

Last month the Southwest Florida Water Management District enacted a year-round 9-to-5 ban.

"We're looking for something to save water all the same," said Barbara Vergara, director of ground water programs for the St. Johns district, which includes Seminole County. "And this is kind of catchy."

"I don't think it's too much of a hardship. I think it's an excellent idea," Chairman Sandra Gray said at Tuesday's meeting in Cape Canaveral.

Water use restrictions have been enacted by the state's three biggest water management districts: South Florida, Southwest Florida and St. Johns.



Residents of even-numbered houses may water their lawns only on Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday from 4 a.m. until 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. until 9 p.m.

Residents of odd-numbered houses may water on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday during the same hours.

No lawn watering will be permitted on Fridays.

Restrictions are in effect for private wells as well as city water systems and also include car-washing as well as lawn-watering.

Businesses on five acres or less may water grass with automatic sprinkler systems from 4 a.m. until 8 a.m., following the same even-odd address system.

Businesses on lots larger than five acres may irrigate on their three-day address schedule from 12:01 a.m. until 8 a.m. for automatic systems.

They are in place in 11 of the St. Johns' 19 counties. Under those restrictions, residents are allowed to water their lawns only three days a week and only from 4 a.m. to 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. to 8 p.m.

"We need to make this simple enough to understand," said Gray. "No! If you have blue eyes, you water on one day, or if you have brown eyes, you water on another."

Naomi Whitney, a St. Johns district administrator, said staff members from the state's five water districts have met several times to discuss a statewide plan to save water. The state is in the midst of a two-year drought.

Before any plan could be enacted, districts would have to hold public hearings in a process that could take up to six months.

South Florida and the state's two remaining districts — the Northwest Florida Water Management District and the Suwannee River Water Management District — are expected to adopt a 9-to-5 ban.

Vergara said that people who water during mid-day hours lose 75 to 80 percent of their water to evaporation and the wind.

She said it was not clear how much water the St. Johns district would save with the 9-to-5 ban but called it "a significant amount."

Hunter planes 'essential' to tracking hurricanes

MIAMI — While the Defense and Commerce departments haggle over which agency should operate Hurricane Hunter planes, a weather expert said Wednesday that tracking storms without them would have "devastating" results.

"It would be devastating, in our estimation," said Jerry Jarrell, deputy director of the National Hurricane Center.

The Air Force confirmed Tuesday that Defense Secretary Dick Cheney ordered the military to end flights of WC-130 Hurricane Hunter planes by Oct. 1 and to turn over the mission to the Commerce Department.

"We are not in a position to accept planes either financially or infrastructure wise," Reed Boatright, spokesman for the Commerce Department's National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration in Washington, D.C., said Wednesday.

If the Air Force dropped the mission and NOAA did not take it over by Oct. 1, Jarrell said the hurricane center would be left without invaluable information for the rest of the 1990 Atlantic-Caribbean hurricane season, which ends Nov. 30.

"We only know that we need the information, we really don't care who goes out and gets it," Jarrell said. "Presumably, if the Air Force went out of the business, everything that they had would be transferred to NOAA. I can't say I feel confident about anything. It's been such a long battle."

State elections attorney Phyllis Slater said Wednesday because Fess's mayoral term does not end until Dec. 2, 12 days after he could take office as a county commissioner, Fess was required to submit the letter to the city clerk no later than July 6. Fess, if he does pursue his county commission bid, will force the remaining Lake Mary commissioners into the position of having a vacant seat for 4½ months or appointing a replacement. Deputy Mayor Paul Tremel will become mayor on Fess's resignation. Tremel said Wednesday the city could be "embarrassed" by the apparent oversight by Fess.

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Orlando girl is fourth car crash victim

LAKE BUENA VISTA — A 17-year-old girl critically injured in a high-speed car crash died Wednesday afternoon, raising the death toll to four.

Barbara Rarden of Orlando was pronounced dead at 2 p.m. at Orlando Regional Medical Center, said hospital spokeswoman Cindy Baker. Rarden had been in critical condition with head and internal injuries since the crash very early Tuesday morning.

Three other young people were pronounced dead shortly after their Mustang crashed into the rear of a Walt Disney World bus.

Lt. Randy Harper of the Florida Highway Patrol said the car was traveling at a minimum of 85 mph in a 45 mph zone.

Killed were Rarden, driver Joseph Bollinger, 19, of Windermere, and passengers David Simon, 16, and Gabor Delneky, 19, both of Orlando.

The bus driver, Gary Rivet, 27, of Orlando, the only person on the bus, was unhurt.

Gleaning glitter from S&L disaster

Centrust Savings Bank in Miami cloaked its pauper's condition well. Its dining room boasted of everything from 1,450 Baccarat crystal goblets and sets of Limoges china to gold-plated ice tongs and an unusual mutton serving dish. The office of then bank chairman David Paul was just as dazzling. Rare books, including a collection of H.G. Wells' books signed by the author, and valuable paintings graced the walls.

But all that luxury failed to impress federal regulators, who eventually looked beyond the glitter and saw a thrift institution awash in red ink. They seized Centrust, gave Paul his pink slip and then auctioned off his booty.

Paul indulged his taste for finery, regulators say, by dipping into the depositors' funds. But the Centrust auction hardly indicates that ostentation is going out of style. More than 400 people showed up, sometimes bidding above the listed value, to take home a souvenir from this museum of S&L excess. The artworks alone raised about \$25 million.

At least, the buyers could go home content in the knowledge that they performed a community service by reducing the taxpayers' federal bailout burden.

As auctioneer Jim Gall told them, "Every dollar raised lessens the cost of the S&L crisis for the taxpayers."

Compassion needed

The financial plight of millions of terminally ill persons would be eased considerably by congressional approval of a plan to allow such patients to receive life insurance benefits tax-free before they die.

The measure, sponsored by Sen. Bill Bradley, D-N.J., and Rep. Barbara Kennelly, D-Conn., would exempt early payouts of life insurance from federal taxation. This would allow recipients to apply these funds toward medical expenses, including nursing care at home, in a hospice or in a convalescent home.

Several private insurance companies, prompted by consumer demand, now offer options allowing policyholders to receive prepayments in the event of a terminal illness or a severe disability requiring long-term care. This increases the resources available to terminal patients, permitting them to pay for their care and live out their days in relative comfort and dignity. Regrettably, however, these resources are being whittled away by the federal government.

Under current law, when a policyholder dies the benefits paid to survivors are not subject to federal taxes. Prepayments to the policyholder are considered income, however, and taxed accordingly. The Bradley-Kennelly bill would change this.

The law needs changing, particularly in light of the congressional retreat on catastrophic health insurance last year. The elderly should not live in fear of having their savings wiped out by the staggering costs of long-term medical treatment, particularly confinement in a nursing home.

Private life insurance is virtually an untapped resource particularly suited to ease this problem. About 65 percent of men and 57 percent of women 65 or older own life insurance, with a total value of roughly \$70 billion. The percentage of ownership is even higher for Americans aged 55 to 64.

The Bradley-Kennelly measure should be expanded to encourage the use of life insurance to cover catastrophic illnesses. By passing this bill, Congress can help ease the financial worries of millions of terminally ill patients and their families.

A stinging new tax

It's enough to make George Bush's lips quiver. Here's a new tax that could make him a hero.

It started in Miami, but there's no reason it couldn't happen in a few dozen American cities. The idea is to tax drug dealers.

Undercover federal agents opened a money-laundering business, taking in \$22.07 million in a yearlong sting from street-level drug dealers. They have made only one arrest so far in the sting, but what the heck? Twenty-two million, in free money. That could bankroll a few battles in the cash-strapped war on drugs.

But even that's a small potatoes compared to the potential: Open up undercover money-laundering operations in the United States' top 20 cities. If they netted \$22 million in Miami, think what they could tally in New York or Los Angeles. If agents could put in a little overtime, they could easily average \$25 million (or more) per year per city. That's a half-billion dollars a year in revenue.

Let's put the sting into taxes.

Southeast Asian drugs flow into U.S.

WASHINGTON — While U.S. drug cops continue their hot pursuit of Latin American cocaine kingpins, the heroin bandits of Southeast Asia are taking advantage of the distraction to smuggle record loads into the United States.

The lucrative heroin trade has become big business for Chinese mobs based in Hong Kong. But top drug experts tell us that there are culprits in every Southeast Asian country.

The most notorious heroin peddler is Burma's brass Gen. Kuhn Sa, who once offered to help the United States win the war on heroin by selling all his output to the federal government.

Kuhn Sa was indicted by a New York grand jury last December and is now near the top of America's most wanted list. In May, at a secret meeting in Thailand's northern city of Chiang Mai, U.S. and Thai officials huddled about how to capture Kuhn Sa. The United States is not yet willing to stage a Noriega-Lyle capture of Kuhn Sa, who boasts an army of 30,000.

The Bush administration claims Kuhn Sa is difficult to track, constantly changing locations and hideouts. But our associate Jim Lynch traveled to Kuhn Sa country and was told that if the United States really wanted Kuhn Sa, he could be found at home in the border town of Mae Hong Son with his feet propped on the sofa.

Kuhn Sa allegedly burst out laughing when he heard about the New York indictment. And he didn't take to the jungle to hide from the sly United States.

Like the charismatic drug dealers of Colombia, Kuhn Sa has mastered the art of double-talk, which he uses to distract the common people of his province from his criminal activities. Instead, they listen to his political talk and have come to believe he really wants a better life for the people of the Shan state of southern Burma.

Kuhn Sa is revered throughout the Golden Triangle of Burma, Laos and Thailand as a romantic outlaw. But the fact is,

he is a greedy drug merchant who stands to get richer with this year's bumper crop of Poppies. Justice Department sources say 40 percent of the heroin arriving in America comes from Kuhn Sa's crops.

Kuhn Sa poses as a man of the people. Members of the democratic resistance, suffering under a repressive Burmese government, wish that Kuhn Sa and his considerable army would join their rebel cause. He publicly claims he will, once he is sure they have a fighting chance. But privately, many sources told us, Kuhn Sa is tight with the government and benefits by having the current regime stay in power. Burma stopped all heroin interdiction efforts two years ago.

Most of Kuhn Sa's crop is smuggled across China and out to the world through Hong Kong. In May, U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration officials in Hong Kong arrested four key members of Kuhn Sa's drug syndicate after they had allegedly arranged for 21 kilos of heroin, worth \$30 million, to be sent to New York.

Thailand is the United States' best ally in the Golden Triangle drug war, but a dubious ally at that. The Thai government refuses to spray poppy fields, preferring to dig the poppies up plant by plant. It is hard for rural Thais to understand why the United States is so fired up about drugs.

Gorbachev's charm wearing thin?

MOSCOW — All week in the Soviet capital, my mind has turned back 16 years. In the spring of 1974, just a few months before Richard Nixon was forced to resign from the presidency because of Watergate, I made my first reporting trip to Eastern Europe, visiting Czechoslovakia, Hungary and Yugoslavia. The question an American journalist — especially one from The Washington Post — was asked incessantly was, "Why are you hounding this man Nixon, who has done so much for world peace?"

Today, an American reporter in Moscow is constantly challenged by Soviet citizens who ask why Washington officialdom and U.S. public opinion put Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev "on such a pedestal," as one man put it.

The Soviets living under Gorbachev see his faults and shortcomings in a way most Americans from President Bush on down have chosen to ignore. To them, his fabled charm has worn thin. Ever his diplomatic successes shrink in comparison to his domestic failures.

The other afternoon, while Gorbachev was delivering his opening address to the 28th Congress of the Soviet Communist Party, I took an interpreter and wandered up and down Arbat Street, with its shops and vendors, interviewing people. One of them was a woman of about 40 named Galina. Like most others, she declined to give her last name. She was visiting from her home in the Caucasus. Galina is a physician who supervises a laboratory where biopsies are performed on patients suspected of having cancer. She is a Communist Party member.

But when I asked her what her expectations were of the Party Congress, she shrugged. "I would just like the situation to stabilize. There has been so much turmoil," she said, referring to the infighting between Gorbachev and his critics and also to the breakaway movements in the republics comprising the Soviet Union.

"I feel we have reached a dead end," she said. "The relationship between the party leadership and the people has no place to go. People no longer believe the leadership."

"Do you include Gorbachev in that statement?" I asked.

"Of course," she said. "He is not separate from the leadership."

That last sentence explains the difference between the internal and the external perceptions of Gorbachev. In America and elsewhere in the West, Gorbachev is seen as this unique, historic figure — a man utterly unlike any of his predecessors in the party chairmanship: gracious, accommodating, reasonable, rational, eager for peace and seemingly ready to incorporate large elements of democracy and capitalism into his country.

At home, Gorbachev's emergence is not seen as miraculous at all, but rather as the predictable adaptation by an entrenched

bureaucracy that faced a rising public demand for change. He does not stand alone in the public eye but is linked — as Nixon was linked to Haldeeman, Ehrlichman, Mitchell, Magruder and Dean — to a regime whose failures are all too evident to those who live here.

"The Party is responsible for where we are," said Vitaly Korotych, the witty editor of Ogaryok, the weekly magazine that is the voice of reform. "Stagnation was not created by Mickey Mouse."

Economic failure dominates daily life. Shortages are endemic. Wjatcheslav Nikonov, a political scientist on the staff of the central committee, recited public-opinion poll figures demonstrating that "most people say they lived better five years ago than they live today."

The five years coincide with the period of Gorbachev's rule. He has been in power long enough that he cannot escape being blamed for what has gone wrong — and much has, in the eyes of Soviet citizens. Young radicals, like Sergei Odarich, a 23-year-old organizer I met in Kiev, speak of Gorbachev as if he were a criminal.

Older people view him more tolerantly — but without awe. "At the moment, he is needed," said theater director Les Tanluk, 52. "But he does not give us the same thrill he does you."

My favorite comment came from 85-year-old Oksana Meshko, a Helsinki Watch human-rights activist who was arrested early in her life by Stalin and again, at age 75, by Brezhnev. Asked about Gorbachev, she said:

"Despite the enthusiasm everyone felt for his words, there have been no visible results of his decisions. This great statesmanship leaves many of us cool to him. But we see no one to replace him — at the moment."

The loss of public confidence puts Gorbachev between a rock and a hard place in the current Party Congress. If he can hold on as party secretary, it would give him control of a giant bureaucracy — but one that is increasingly discredited in the eyes of the public. But if he chooses, or is forced, to abandon his party post and attempts to govern solely as an unelected president, his only support would be public opinion — which is no longer reliably in his corner.

FOWR wants clarification

The Friends of the Wekiva River, Inc. (FOWR) are writing in response to Mr. Mark Barfield's June 19 article in the Sanford Herald.

For the most part we concur with his article about the illegal road, dock and overlook which Mr. Roche had built at Alauqua, a development along the Little Wekiva River. Mr. Barfield quoted me as saying "I don't think a dock is going to have that much impact on the river." I would like to clarify this remark, which has been written somewhat out of context.

FOWR opposes all after-the-fact permits along the Wekiva River. Little or no study is being given to the cumulative impact of the existing docks along the river, and the practice of allowing unpermitted structures to remain by paying a higher fee to the county, is in essence no regulation at all.

Mr. Barfield has done a fine job in his reporting on the issue of the Alauqua dock. We commend him for his thorough investigation. It is important to reiterate that FOWR does not now, nor have we ever, supported the illegal structures which were built at Alauqua.

We have encouraged the St. Johns River Water Management District to pursue the issue and to insist that the dock and all illegal structures be removed and the natural habitat be restored. We continue to oppose the placing of man-made structures within sovereign lands. It is our hope that the laws which were put in place to protect our natural resources will be upheld by Seminole County and all appropriate state agencies.

Thank you for the opportunity to clarify our position in the matter.

we need for the school."

The land, in two narrow strips along Lake Mary Boulevard and Country Club Road, includes a retention pond on the northeast section of the campus.

"That retention pond was basically useless as far as the school as concerned," Wells said. "It couldn't be put to any use."

The land on Lake Mary Boulevard is a 1,500-foot-long narrowing strip which is as wide as 45 feet on its eastern edge and as narrow as 15 feet to the west. A 600 by 17 foot portion of land was sold on Country Club Road.

Wells said the district is currently seeking the best price on two pieces of property that are next to the school.

"There's one south of the school on Country Club and another between the school and the interstate (east of the campus) and we're going to see who will give us the best deal," Wells said.

Wells explained the land would be used to replace a portion of the playground which will be taken to build the art and music classroom.

"Right now, between the building, the playground and the portables there's no room for anything else," he said.

There are presently 13 portable classrooms on the Lake Mary Elementary campus. District projections indicate there could be 1,041 students enrolled at the school in the fall. The facility is designed to house 684 students.

"We're not going to buy a full five acres to replace what we've sold," Wells said, "because we wouldn't have enough money to build the classroom."

Wells added that which ever piece of property they purchase, it would be able to be put to better use for the school than the land they sold.

Bible feud still waging between Kiwanis and civil libertarians

of 675,000 homes with \$25,000 of homestead exemptions, the increase would amount to \$57 next year.

County taxes do not include school, city or water management district taxes which add to the overall tax bill.

County officials had recommended increasing the county fire tax paid by unincorporated residents for fire protection to help pay for the three-man plan and other department expense rises. Last year's rate of \$2.10 would be increased to \$2.60 or \$130, \$25 higher, for owners of the 675,000 homes. By reducing the number of three-man engines, the tax increase will be reduced.

The county building department still shows nearly an \$820,000 deficit that commissioners will address later this week. County consultant Roger Neiswender said both fee increases and staff cuts will be considered.

Public Safety Director Gary Kaiser said the three-man engine crews would match other fire departments in the county who complain the county's service level doesn't match theirs. Sanford has four firefighters assigned to each engine and all other fire departments in the county staff their engines with three firefighters. Seminole County is the only department locally with two firefighters to each engine, Kaiser said.

Although Kaiser said more property and lives might be saved with three-firefighter crews, commissioners said the county doesn't suffer with the two-firefighter system.

"We've done a good job, an efficient job with two men," said commissioner Fred Streetman.

Kaiser said Sanford and Altamonte Springs fire officials have

amount of time needed to transport an injured person from the Geneva area to the Orlando Regional Medical Center.

While commissioners were receptive to the request, they said under the current tight county fiscal constraints, the request would have to be considered next year.

Commissioners also agreed to add one attorney to the county attorney's staff to handle increased workload. The additional attorney, needed for an increase in matters needing legal review by the county, will cost \$46,455. The county attorney's staff was reduced by two positions two years ago after commissioner Pat Warren urged commissioners to be less confrontive with cities.

Since then, annexation and other litigation with cities stopped, but other work increased.

- "The Secure and Satisfied" — 24 percent of the adult population. These are highly educated, financially secure men and women in their mid-40s who are happy with the way they receive health care. But they strongly support a federally funded health insurance program and are more willing than most to pay additional taxes for it. They are above average in terms of political activity.
- "The Passives" — 13 percent of the adult population. These are young men and women with less education and less income than average. They are less satisfied than others with the way they receive health care. They support increased federal spending, but are less willing than most to pay higher taxes for a health care program.
- "The Coping but Concerned" — 18 percent of the adult population. These are people in their 50s and 60s with low incomes and feel they have little control over their lives. They are pro-business and believe government should be responsible for taking care of its citizens. Yet they express doubts about the desirability of large, federal programs.
- "The Struggling Singles" — 15 percent of the adult population. These typically are single mothers in their late 30s who worry about money and often cannot make ends meet. They look to government as the source for health care funding. They are interested in keeping up with government and government affairs but are not terribly politically active.

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Evolving world cracks alliance

HOUSTON — President Bush hailed the first post-Cold War Economic Summit as "positive and unanimous," but the historic changes in the world also have cracked allied unity on some key problems.

In the past, when the leaders of the seven most powerful industrial democracies faced a common and formidable adversary — the Soviet Union — they closed ranks and papered over their differences.

But communism's collapse in Eastern Europe and a reduced Soviet threat prompted some splits among the participating nations, particularly on foreign aid and efforts.

For example, the United States and Great Britain opposed direct aid to the Soviet Union until Moscow progresses on economic and political reform, while West Germany supported such assistance.

The president restated his position for only technical assistance to the Soviet

Union. He managed to put the issue on the shelf until the end of the year by winning support for a study conducted by the International Monetary Fund and other banking institutions to survey the Kremlin's economic requirements to establish a free market economy.

Even so, the president told reporters at a post-summit news conference, that he was "not particularly" committed to accepting the recommendations emerging from the study.

Bush said he has problems supporting aid when the Soviets have missiles pointed at cities in the United States and when Moscow continues to support regional conflicts.

It was a sign of change that Bush could not stand in the way of West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl, who seeks Soviet support for a unified Germany's participation in NATO, from providing \$15 billion in credits to Moscow.

On aid to China, Japan confirmed that it would resume lending to Beijing, but failed in its attempt to convince the United States to lift its economic sanctions imposed after last year's bloody pro-democracy crackdown.

Japan won support for its policy of aiding China and managed to get the summit leaders to bow to World Bank loans for Beijing. All the president could do was urge Japan to limit the funding of China and to go slow on the loans.

Although Bush insisted there were no winners and no losers, the U.S. claimed victory in pushing the richest nations in the world to make "substantial, progressive reductions" in farm subsidies.

At first, some of the European leaders appeared to be inflexible on the elimination of farm subsidies, particularly on the issue of protecting their agriculture constituencies.

And the accord was expected to boost the so-called Uruguay Round.

Jesse Jackson urges Bush to call civil rights summit

LOS ANGELES — Jesse Jackson said if President Bush can hold economic summit meetings to help the Eastern bloc, he should be able to hold a similar meeting of U.S. civil rights leaders aimed at reaching a domestic economic aid policy.

"If Mr. Bush can have a summit meeting with the G-7 leaders, with Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev and with the African National Congress, is it not time to ask Mr. Bush to have a domestic summit meeting of the civil rights leadership in this country?" Jackson said in a

speech Wednesday before an audience of 3,000 people at the NAACP's national convention.

Jackson told reporters he plans to formally submit his summit proposal to the White House this week, when Bush returns from Houston where he has been meeting with the leaders of the United States' six major allies. Together, the allies make up the G-7, or Group of Seven major industrialized democracies.

Delegates to the NAACP convention adopted a controversial resolution urging Congress to repeal the employer sanction provisions of the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986.

Senate approves anti-crime bill with assault-style weapons ban

WASHINGTON — The Senate approved a sweeping anti-crime bill that would extend the death penalty to 34 federal crimes, ban military-style assault weapons and give life prison terms to "kingpins" of the savings and loan scandal.

The Senate, which almost surrendered the legislation several weeks ago to a stubborn Republican filibuster, passed the bill 94-6 Wednesday and sent it to the House where prospects for its provisions — especially the death penalty — remained uncertain.

Voting against the bill were Sens. William Armstrong, R-Colo., David Durenberger, R-Minn., Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, and William Roth, R-Del.

Sen. Joseph Biden, D-Del., chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, said the measure "is the toughest, most comprehensive crime bill in our history" and Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., the ranking Republican, added, "This will go down in history as one of the greatest pieces of legislation ever passed."

Attorney General Dick Thornburgh said, "While there are some provisions in the Senate-passed bill which the administration opposes, I am convinced that with continued bipartisan cooperation the 101st Congress will help achieve the president's goal of assuring that those who commit criminal offenses — whether violent or white collar offense — are held

fully accountable for their actions."

Biden again criticized President Bush for playing politics with the crime bill and urged him to "put aside partisanship on crime and drugs" and in the future work with Congress on those two issues.

The key features of the anti-crime bill extends the federal death penalty to 34 crimes; bans the importation or domestic manufacture of nine assault weapons; speeds up the appeal process for death row inmates assuring execution in almost all cases within a year; increases federal law enforcement personnel sharply; and cracks down on those criminally involved in the savings and loan scandal.

The Senate all but finished action on the anti-crime bill just before leaving for the July Fourth recess but, under an agreement worked out earlier, adopted 99-1 an amendment to crack down on culprits involved in S&L fraud. Armstrong voted against the amendment.

The amendment would provide stiffer sentences, up to life imprisonment for "kingpins," for criminal convictions in fraud cases, provide about \$180 million for more FBI agents and

prosecutors, create an S&L fraud division in the Justice Department; and provide bounties for private persons who provide information leading to a conviction.

"This is designed to recover money for the taxpayers and to punish those who used savings and loans as a personal piggy bank," Sen. John Heinz, R-Pa., said. "It's a simple fact that American taxpayers have had their pockets picked clean."

"It is high time Congress declares savings and loans crooks public enemy No. 1. ... It is time that Congress makes the recovery of funds for the American taxpayer job No. 1," Heinz said.

Biden said the government should "go after them just like we do with drug dealers. We should throw the key away for some of those who have bilked the S&Ls."

The most bitterly contested provision was the three-year prohibition on the importation of and the domestic manufacture of assault weapons, which carried on three separate votes. It was a major defeat for Bush and the potent National Rifle Association gun lobby.

Although not fully requested by the Bush administration, the Senate provided funds for 1,000 more FBI agents, 1,000 more drug enforcement agents, 500 border patrol officers and 480 federal prosecutors. The Senate also voted \$800 million for local law enforcement.

Other parts of the bill create a new approach to fighting child abuse with more training for police and prosecutors.

Soldier's widow seeks peace through burial

SAVANNAH, Ga. — A Georgia soldier killed nearly 45 years ago on the war-torn fields of France is finally coming home for burial, and his widow hopes she now can put to rest the haunting memories of their life together.

Theo Wilburn Underwood was a 24-year-old Army private fighting in his first battle when he was killed Sept. 10, 1944, by a shell that collapsed his foxhole. The Army notified his 21-year-old pregnant wife, Ernestine, two weeks later that he was missing in action.

The Jeff Davis County native was declared officially dead July 20, 1945, but his remains were not found until last month, when metal detectors wielded by two French youths picked up the soldier's helmet. The youths began digging and found the body, the Army told his widow.

"When someone is missing like that, you have a feeling that it could happen. And a lot of times it would run through my mind when I thought about him it could happen. But you never really expect it to happen," Mrs. Underwood said Wednesday.

"When it does happen, it's a whole new ballgame. It didn't depress me. It made me sad," she said of the memories that flooded into her mind when the Army notified her June 6 that her husband's remains had been found.

The irony of the Army phone call's timing did not escape her. Theo Underwood left New York City aboard the Queen Mary on June 6, 1944, bound for the battlefields of Europe.

"He never came out of his first and only battle. I felt like that when the boys came home in 1945 and 1946, they received recognition. Now, he's coming home 45 years later and I feel like he deserves recognition," she said.

Ernestine Underwood had known all along that her husband was dead. Another soldier, Dale White of Bluefield, W.Va., saw Underwood buried by the collapsing foxhole and told her. But, without a grave to visit, it was difficult to let go.

It also was difficult to convey to her daughters — one 5 years old when Underwood died, the other not yet born — and later, her grandchildren, that Underwood had truly existed.

Gold treasure may be worth \$2 billion

NORFOLK, Va. — A fortune in sunken treasure from a 19th-century shipwreck at the center of an intense legal struggle may include twice the amount of gold previously estimated, a member of an Ohio research team said.

Barry Schatz, a member of the Columbus-America Discover Group, revealed Wednesday that researchers now believe the U.S. Central America could have been carrying up to six tons of gold. Previous estimates had put the load aboard the ship at three tons.

The value of the gold has been estimated as high as \$1 billion. No one has assessed what the treasure haul would be worth if it was six tons and a new estimate would have to take into account the condition of any gold found.

Schatz said the new estimate is based on historical assessments.

MONTREAL — Heavily armed Mohawk Indians vowed to maintain their 4-month-old blockade of a proposed golf course expansion next to their reservation, where an officer was killed during a police assault.

Police said reinforcements have been brought in, but refused to say how many and whether they were planning another offensive in Oka, Quebec, 25 miles west of Montreal.

Spokesmen for the federal and provincial governments said they were monitoring the situation, and a federal mediator familiar with the dispute said he was waiting for the Mohawks to call him in.

The Mohawks of the Kanesatake reservation are protesting the expansion of a community golf course onto about 1 1/2 square-mile plot of land



Shaw case back in court

BOSTON — Lawyers for the Boston Celtics and Brian Shaw were back in court Wednesday, as the hedge fund appealed a court order to sever his contract with Italy's Il Messaggero and return to the NBA team.

U.S. District Court Judge A. David Mazzone last month upheld an NBA arbitrator's ruling that Shaw's contract with Boston is valid, and Shaw's attorneys asked the U.S. Court of Appeals Wednesday to overturn the decision.

Shaw's attorneys said he should have been entitled to a legal discovery procedure and to interview witnesses in the contract dispute, an opportunity they say has been denied.

Shaw has said he signed with the Celtics without consulting an attorney and thus did not realize he would become a free agent in the NBA in 1994 if he stayed in Italy for a second season.

Both sides expected a ruling from the court within a week, and Celtics general manager Dan Volk did not rule out trading the guard.

Seek counseling from a family counselor. Parenting skills can be learned. It's not unusual for an adult to feel awkward and bored with a child he hardly knows. Start now to build a good father-son relationship. The rewards are priceless, and this letter is a giant step in the right direction.
