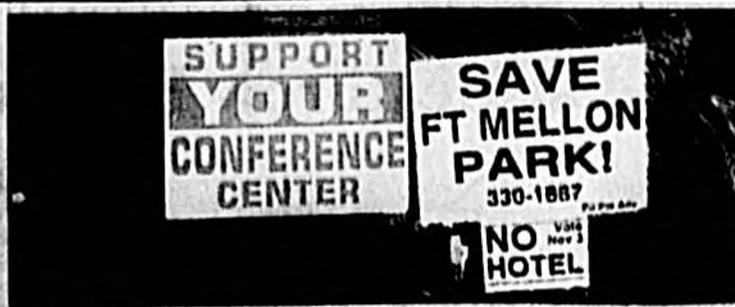

Boo if you don't like Halloween!

A few years ago, Pastor Jim Henry suggested to his congregation at First Baptist Church of Orlando to give prayer tracts to trick-or-treaters.

Now, tell me what kid wouldn't prefer a Tootsie Roll or chewing gum be tossed into his or her bag?

Once upon a Halloween, there was a man who gave away some of his baseball cards. Take a handful, he said. Imagine now receiving a 1952 Mickey Mantle rookie card!

There will be a day - probably sooner than we think - when those prayer tracts will be very valuable, too. But kids can get them at church. Halloween is intended to be a party. Trick-or-treating is more American than pumpkin pie.

Neighborhoods used to be a lot safer, of course, and everyone knew all the trick-or-treaters were no matter how well disguised they were.

Today, hardly anyone knows who the children are that come to the door and say, "Trick or Treat." Most of the callers are small fries, escorted by their parents. They come in bunches - three, four, five at a time. The doorbell rings once every 20 minutes or so.

Some of these little ones seem to enjoy themselves. Others seem very shy - coaxed into the ceremony by parents, who have great memories of Halloweens past. Most of us had good times on Halloween. We liked the treats. We did very few tricks.

Airport plans to advance expansion

SANFORD - The Orlando Sanford Airport Board of Directors is expected to vote Tuesday on a proposal to advance the plans and specifications for airport expansion.

The 69-70,000 square-foot expansion of the airport is expected to cost from \$12-16 million, said Brendan Carmody, president and managing director of Orlando-Sanford International Inc.

"Different people have different crystal balls on how much it will cost," Carmody said. "That's still pretty much up in the air."

He did not give a specific time frame on construction plans.

The Airport Authority plans to build a two-story concourse that will allow passengers to "walk in and out of planes without dealing with the weather," Carmody said.

The lower level will be reserved for parking. The upper level of the concourse, which Carmody said is "on the floor level of airplanes," will allow passengers direct access

Tax collector and clerk pay dividends

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The county's tax collector and clerk of the circuit court have turned in more than \$4 million in dividend checks to the county and taxing authorities.

With this money added to the county's pot, residents should pay less in local taxes the following year.

Tax Collector Ray Valdes wrote checks to the Board of County Commissioners and two taxing authorities for \$3.41 million and Clerk of the Circuit Court Maryanne Morse wrote her largest ever dividend check for \$1,076,654.

In the 10 years that Valdes and Morse have been state Constitutional Officers, they have consistently produced big returns.

Valdes, the Treasurer of the Year in Florida for 1998, has returned \$24.5 million to the general revenue fund of the Board of Commissioners, Seminole County School Board and St. Johns Water Manage-

ment District.

Morse has returned more than \$5.7 million of profits or "excess fees" generated by her office. This is a 13.1 percent return on investment. The \$1,076,654 dividend is the second to top the \$1 million level. She turned over \$1,027,520 in 1994, and has averaged 8.3 percent returns on investments per year.

Morse said the Seminole County Clerk's Office is one of 47 in the state funded entirely through fees generated in day-to-day operations, without any general taxpayer's support. These fee-based offices are required by law to transfer any surplus to the county at the end of the fiscal year.

The Seminole County Tax Office has been rated in the top three of the state's 67 tax collecting offices since Valdes came into office. Valdes credits his staff, which he says, give courteous and good service.

"When residents come to us, our people greet them with a smile and take care of the needs," he said.

YMCA helps build strong youth from the floor up

LAKE MARY - The Tomorrow Project will build a strong foundation for youth in Seminole County, from the floor up.

The project is an expansion of the Seminole Family YMCA, which among other things, adds a gymnasium to the existing complex on Longwood-Lake Mary Road.

"We hope to make this a community building, focused

on serving the youth of the community," said Ed Thomas, executive director of the YMCA branch.

"We hope to have a lot of opportunities where we'll be able to do programs like midnight basketball, working with teenagers, giving them a positive safe environment. A place where they will feel good about coming, and bring their friends, and hopefully stay out of trouble in the process."

Model air show comes to Sanford

SANFORD - The Sanford Aero Modelers are hosting a model Air Show from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday at the SAM Flying Field on Highway 46, eight miles east of Sanford. Plaques will be awarded for the best military fixed-wing model plane, best aerobatics plane, best bi-plane, golden age, and pilots choice.

Food concessions will be available at the site, and there will be a raffle for a free radio system and kit. Spectator parking donation is \$2 per car.

"Every rivet of a real plane is duplicated," Lee Dargue, President of the Sanford Aero Modelers, said. "These are real planes, only scaled down to about 1/3 to 1/4 the size of the actual plane. The gas caps and name plates are even real. We have combat type action planes, among other models. Most planes have about a seven to eight foot wingspan, with usually a minimum of 80 inches."

The Air Show will take place on a 5,000 square foot runway. A 900 square foot shaded pavilion will be provided for spectators. Hot Dogs will cost \$1. Quarter-pound hamburgers "loaded with all the trimmings" will

cost \$1.50, Dargue said. Spectators can also buy a can of soda.

The Aero Modelers work with boy scouts and cub scouts, Dargue said he would like to get more youth in the area active in building model airplanes. The group teaches novices about aero dynamics and other principals.

"We teach a great deal of math, science, and electronics," Dargue said. "We make sure kids know why their planes are doing what they do in the air. We teach Ohm's Law, signal strength,

the range of the transmitter, and move up from there. This also teaches kids how to deal with frustration, anxiety, and satisfaction in accomplishments. We provide free instruction as well as entertainment."

Planes are controlled using joy sticks controlling the rudder and the throttle on two transmitters. A "buddy box is used," Dargue said, "to prevent crashes." Whenever a person loses control of the plane, an expert takes control of the plane from a different

Dugan is best-qualified

Three candidates would like to fill the open Group 6 seat on the bench of the 18th Judicial Circuit, which serves Brevard and Seminole counties. For a number of reasons, David Dugan is best.

Mr. Dugan knew when he was 10 that he wanted to become a lawyer. At law school his specific goal was to become a trial lawyer, which is why he specialized in criminal defense during his three-year Army service.

A lawyer for 20 years, he has handled the gamut - complex civil litigation, as well as criminal, probate and family law - while living most of that time in Melbourne. Yet there has always been time for family and community.

Mr. Dugan's community service has been stellar: Boy Scouts, chamber of commerce, Rotary, church, youth sports. Through such service those who aspire to the bench come to know the many parts of their communities and those they would judge.

Two other candidates seek the same seat. Though the judge sits in Brevard County, all voters in the two counties, regardless of

party affiliation, make the choice.

Jeff Thompson has been a lawyer for 15 years, all of that time in Brevard County. He served three years as an assistant prosecutor, then entered private practice that includes the full range of legal work. He, too, has found time to serve his community in a number of volunteer efforts.

Michael Bross has practiced law for 12 years in a wide assortment of areas, though much of it has been in criminal defense.

Unfortunately, Mr. Bross was charged early this year by the Florida Bar's grievance committee with mismanagement of client trust accounts, for which the state Supreme Court has ordered his practice closed for 10 days and placed him on probation for a year. That is not conduct worthy of a judge.

Neither of the later candidates has the length or breadth of legal experience to match that of Mr. Dugan. Nor can they match his community involvement.

In short, Mr. Dugan is best-qualified. Thus, he is the *Sentinel's* choice for Judge, Group 6, 18th Judicial Circuit.

Among the items necessary in a well-equipped gym are backboards and hoops, but Thomas wanted to make sure there was a good foundation, a wood floor, for the health of the teenagers that would be using the indoor courts.

"It's a maple wood floor. It's tongue and groove," said Thomas. The installation system gives the floor bounce. "It will be a very safe and healthy floor."

The expansion project is going well. The floor will be installed last. It is Thomas' hope that it will be paid for by the time installation is completed.

"We had actually purchased this floor over a year ago," said Thomas, because the Y could get it for a good price. "The wood has not been paid for yet. It was purchased on a promissory note. This floor actually cost us \$45,000, which we don't have right now."

The YMCA took out a \$1.5 million loan for the building, but has looked to other funding sources for equipment and items such as the floor. The "Wall of Light", a glass block wall with etched names of contributors, will pay for part of the cost of the floor, but Thomas hopes to get \$25,000 from a Rotary International grant.

Thomas and YMCA building committee chairman Brian Overby are members of the Lake Mary Rotary Club. With the help of President Mike

gather at the Seminole Family YMCA. The club hopes to win a grant to help pay for the wood floor being installed in the Y's gymnasium.

McLean, they hope to win funding from the Rotary's "Children's Opportunity Grants."

McLean said there is a pool of \$20 million, available to Rotary clubs throughout the country, with a \$25,000 maximum for each award.

"(The project) will benefit the children and the greater community of Central Florida," said McLean. "It will enable the Seminole County YMCA to expand its reach of services to a greater proportion of the population, particularly children that may have cultural or economic disadvantages."

Thomas, McLean and Overby will be filing the grant application within the week. Thomas said the installation of the floor should begin in mid-November.

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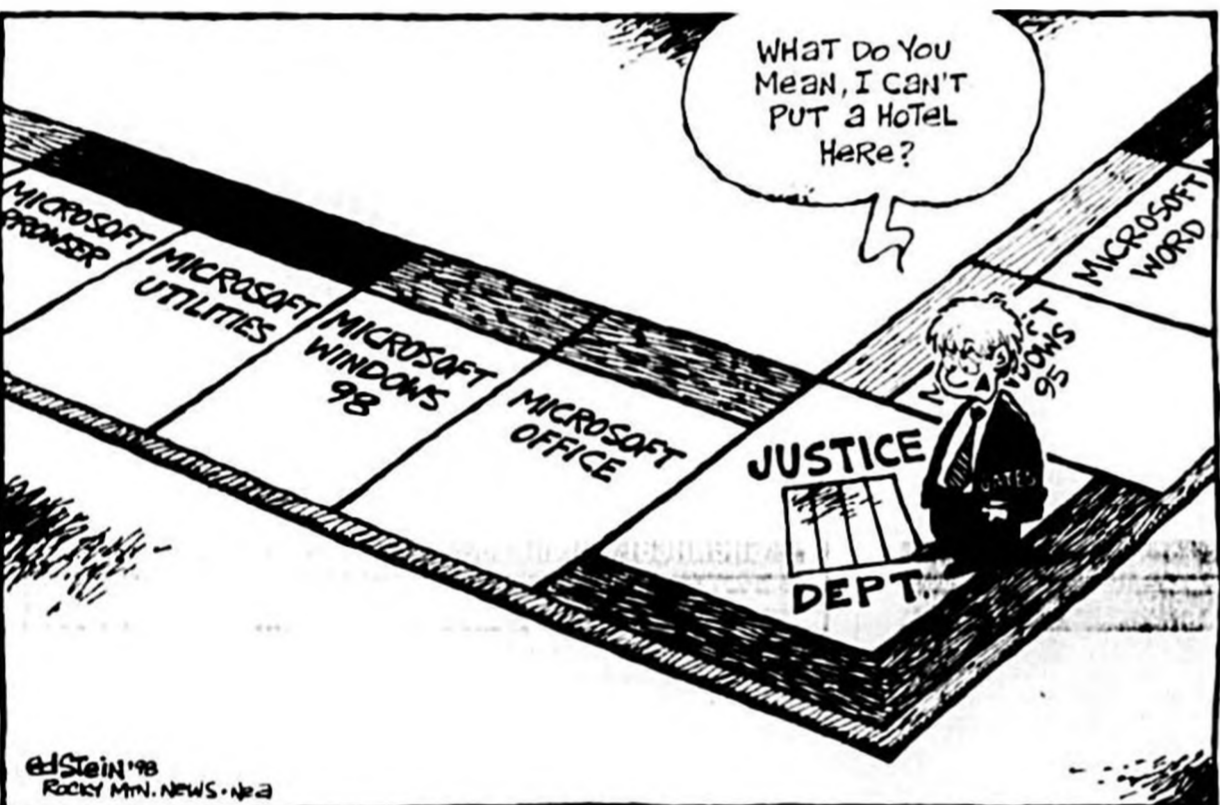

"We can do acrobatics with the planes," Dargue said. "We can turn planes all around in the wind. But, it's also safe."

There is a pond near the air field for floating sail boats and small powered boats, Dargue said. The Aero Modelers plan to build a track for racing model cars.

Dargue said the Air Modelers encourage people who are interested in model airplanes to take a test flight with the group before investing any money in a plane.

"We get a lot of retirees who want to do this as a hobby," Dargue said. "The trouble is, a lot of people buy a plane, a radio, an engine, then drop the hobby before too long. We want you to know this is something you want to pursue before you spend any money. We want to work with people to alleviate any problems."

The group has a club plane novices can use. Membership in the Sanford Aero Modelers is \$10 for youth under 14 years old. The price is \$20 for youth 14-18, and \$100 for adults. Dargue said the group will pay for the cost of youth to join for free when there is a financial hardship. Often, a plane will be donated by

members to help out a youth interested in model airplanes, Dargue said.

Adults can pay for membership with installments, Dargue said.

from planes to the terminal.

During the initial stage of expansion, there will be six gates added, Carmody said. Final expansion will add a seventh gate. The exterior of the airport will have "pretty much the same stucco finish," as it currently has, Carmody said. The interior will also have the same finish.

The Airport Authority expansion has several packages, Carmody said. There is a "vertical circulation package" that would improve elevator service. There is a "steel package" for purchasing the steel that will be needed in construction, and a "loading bridge package." There also is a "civil package," which would include new ramps, and a "general construction package," Carmody said.

The Orlando-International Airport, Inc., is also planning an expansion that will cost approximately three million dollars, Carmody said.

This planned expansion would enable the domestic terminal to be used by in-

ternational flights when it is not being used for domestic flights, Carmody said.

The concourse would be expanded, with more waiting space, windows, and improved lighting. "It will be more utilitarian," Carmody said.

The Airport Authority's \$12-16 million expansion and the OSI \$3 million expansion "are two different projects" that "can be viewed as complementary to each other," Carmody said.

Rent-to-own (RTO) businesses are using such ads to attract customers. There are a host of local RTO establishments and a few nationwide franchises, and the number is increasing rapidly.

RTO's are in regulatory limbo because their unique marketing approaches do not fit into the traditional merchandising methods. Are they retailers who extend credit to high risk borrowers, leasing agencies offering long term leases, or are they rental agencies?

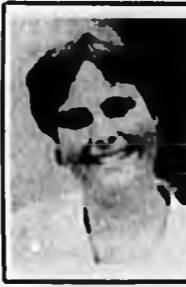
Although RTO merchandising has only recently gained considerable attention, it is not a new concept. It originated with an English piano manufacturer who wanted to increase his business by making it easier for customers to buy pianos. He created the "hire-purchase" marketing concept in 1846. This concept has been used for years by music companies in cooperation with band teachers enabling beginning students to rent their instruments. If a student lost interest the rented instrument was returned and payment ceased. If the student continued in the band and kept up the payments, eventually the instrument became his.

The "hire-purchase" or RTO merchandising method has now been extended to the sale of a wide variety of merchandise including things such as furniture, appliances, jewelry, electronics and even office equipment. The use of the RTO concept to sell a wider variety of products has resulted in the development of a new type of retailer who targets a different kind of customer, using a different sales appeal and possibly with a different merchandising objective. RTO's have generated consumer complaints regarding the amount and clarity of rental/purchase information, high prices, severe penalties for late payments, and repossession and debt collection practices. Some consumer groups want more state or federal regulation. RTO's contend they serve a group of customers rejected by other sellers and their actions are reasonable and essential for economic survival.

RTO CAUTIONS

There are certain precautions that any consumer should consider before buying from a rent-to-own (RTO) retailer.

The total cost of ownership through RTO should be compared with the cost of merchandise sold outright. Try to locate conventional credit. Consider lay-away plans, or, buy used merchandise from a

the merchandise, and you have no equity in it.

Learn what will happen if your payments are late and the merchandise is repossessed. If there is no grace period, what will happen if a payment is late?

Be sure the contract carries an accurate description of the merchandise and if it is new or used. Do not accept substitute merchandise with the promise it will be replaced later.

Find out who pays for repairs. Also, find out if you will receive a loaner, or if payment stops while the item is being repaired.

Make sure the contract describes conditions under which you may end the rental purchase agreement. Are there penalties for canceling the agreement?

Find out if there is an early purchase option where you may buy the merchandise without waiting until the end of the contract.

Find out if your payment records will be reported to a credit reporting agency (credit bureau).

Before signing, make sure you understand everything in the contract. Ask questions and, if needed, either take a copy of the contract to someone who can help you to understand it or bring this person

with you.

Do not sign a contract with blanks. Either mark through them or have them filled in. Get a copy of what you sign at the time that you sign it.

If you do not know the reputation of the company with whom you will be dealing, call your local Better Business Bureau, Chamber of Commerce or Consumer Protection Agency. Find out how long the company has been in business and if there are unresolved complaints against the company.

Comparison shop between different type sellers of the merchandise you are considering. If a RTO company is your choice, comparison shop more than one company if there are more in your area.

There are advantages and disadvantages to rent-to-own companies. The most important question is whether the advantages outweigh the disadvantages. Consumers need to make informed decisions, not decisions made out of apathy or lack of understanding. Consumers do have buying options.

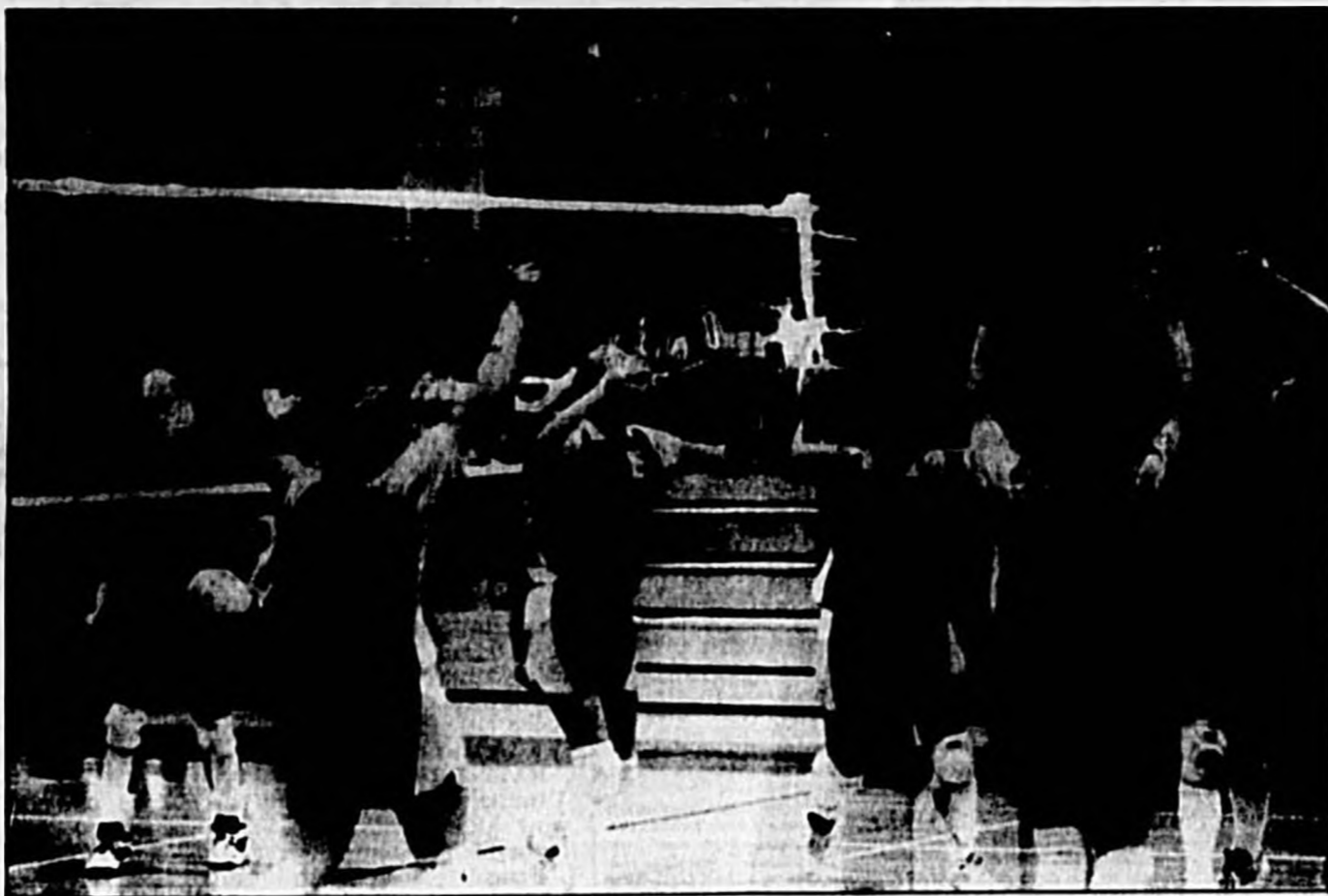

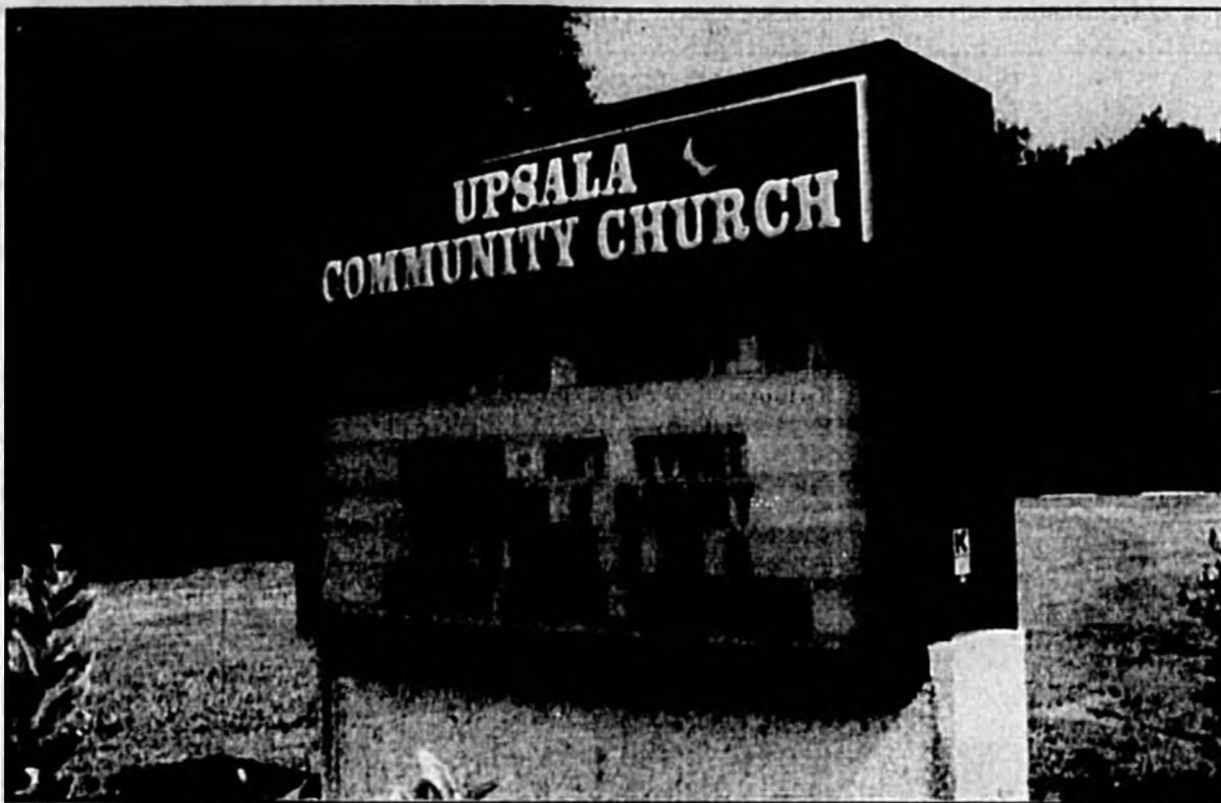

Good news, bad news for spinal pain

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 88 years old and have been diagnosed with advanced osteoporosis, causing multiple vertebral fractures. I have constant pain and use Fosamax daily. Will these fractures ever heal? I have been told by two back surgeons that with the exception of progressive paraplegia, any attempt at reconstruction would require extensive, futile surgery. Is my spine ever going to improve?



important for women after menopause and women with a family history of osteoporosis. If the test shows normal bone-calcium, fine. Repeat it in a year or two. If it shows significant demineralization, however, immediate steps should be taken to avoid the very complications that you are experiencing.

DEAR READER: You are in an unenviable position. Because of extensive osteoporosis, the spinal bones have begun to fracture, causing pain and disability, even though you are already being treated for brittle bones.

This is why I urge most of my patients over 60 or 70 years of age to have bone density examinations. These simple tests are particularly

The bottom line is that osteoporosis is preventable. It can occur even in physically active women in their 50s. Women in their 80s are almost certain to have it. Early diagnosis is crucial.

The bad news: No, your spinal fractures are permanent.

The good news: You can be helped. To begin with, you have been prescribed Fosamax, the only anti-osteoporosis pill that can reverse the process and even strengthen your bones. Hormones and other drugs cannot do this; they only arrest the disease or, when given early enough, prevent it. If you continue to use Fosamax, in a year or two bone density studies may show substantial improvement in your bone-calcium level. While this will undoubtedly prevent further fractures, it will not — unfortunately — affect the fractures you already have. In this instance, the bones have literally been crushed and are unable to reconstruct their original shapes, unlike bones elsewhere in the body.

In the second place, you might benefit from a program of aggressive rehabilitation, administered under the supervision of a physiatrist (an M.D. specialist in rehab medicine). Using a combination of active and passive exercises, pain medication, muscle strengthening, ultrasound therapy and other techniques, these professionals could — in all likelihood — reduce your pain and improve your independence. Of course, nothing in this world is guaranteed, but I urge you to ask your physician for a referral.

Surgery is probably not an option. I agree with your back specialists who stated that an operation is dangerous and chancy, unless you develop unmistakable signs of nerve compression or deterioration.

I am sorry to say that you reflect an increasing problem in this country: the consequences of osteoporosis. If you had received therapy years ago, you might not be in the straits you are today.

WIN AT BRIDGE

Not sometime — it's now or never

Would Thomas Jefferson have made a good bridge player? Perhaps not, because in a letter to George Washington on May 16, 1792, he wrote, "Delay is preferable to error." That is often true, of course, but at the bridge table, delay can be an error.

By way of example, take this deal. You reach four spades. The defenders cash their two club tricks, then switch to diamonds. How do you continue? Also, what do you think of the bidding? Some players would open that East hand with one diamond because they don't like the rebid after a one-spade response by partner. That is not my style. I prefer to bid my longest suit first. (I would rebid one no-trump over one spade, cauliflower-shaped skin

grows and all.) With South looking at six winners and a decent seven-card suit, his three-spade overall is "text-book." Yet a Young Turk would bid four spades. West wants to act, but is just too weak. Opposite a Young Turk, North should pass. But facing a more conservative bidder, four spades is a reasonable gamble. North has fit and controls (aces and kings).

You start with nine tricks: seven spades, one heart and one diamond. You must establish dummy's heart nine for trick 10. And you must head that way without delay, before drawing trumps.

Win with dummy's diamond ace, cash the heart ace, and ruff a heart high in hand. Return to dummy with a trump, ruff another heart high, cross to dummy with a trump, and ruff a third heart high. Finally, play a spade to dummy's king and cash the heart nine, discarding a diamond. Dummy's trumps are vital entries.
