Casselberry Sgt. meets Bush at Baghdad airport

Seminole County Government Television's Andrew Cardona was surprised to hear from his son based in Baghdad early Friday morning. He was even more surprised to hear what he had done for Thanksgiving.

Staff Sgt. Steven Cardona of the U.S. Army 1st Armored Division was ordered to wait Thanksgiving Day on the tarmac at the Baghdad International Airport for the arrival of a dignitary. That dignitary, of course, was President George W. Bush arriving secretly into Iraq to rally the troops for a special Thanksgiving treat.

"All he was told was that someone important was coming in," Andrew said. "When he saw the plane he realized it was someone really high up."

"He called and said 'guess what I did,' Andrew continued. "He had a photograph taken with the President. It was one of those disposable cameras that we sent him."

Previously stationed in Germany, Steven, a senior medic, has been in Iraq for about a month. Steven has been in the military for about seven years, and is following his father's footsteps as Andrew, of Casselberry, also served as a medic during the Vietnam period.

Married last year, Steven and his wife, Kim, an MP in the military, are based out of Frankfurt, Germany.

Steven graduated from Forest Lake Academy in Apopka and Seminole Community College.

"He said he is really enjoying his army duty," Andrew said. "He really is a strong believer in what we're trying to accomplish in Iraq."

Suspected Sanford shooter in custody

SANFORD — It didn't take Sanford investigators long to find their suspect in a Monday shooting at Pine Avenue and Third Street.

A day after police issued an arrest warrant for Levoris W. Hickman, 19, of 2180 Church St., in connection with a murder attempt of Danny Wimberly, 20, of 613 E. Third St., police had him in custody.

Sheriff's deputies catch 19-year-old suspect wanted for Monday's shooting in stolen car

At about 2 p.m. Wednesday, Seminole County Sheriff's Deputies responded to the area of 13th Street and Southwest Road as they had information Hickman was driving a stolen vehicle. Deputies were instructed to stay "out of sight" until Hickman left a nearby park-

ing lot. The deputies positioned themselves in the area of Old Lake Mary Road and 20th Street.

When deputies moved in to stop the Green Honda Civic on Country Club Circle, the driver of the vehicle reportedly sped away with authorities in pursuit.

"During this time the rear door on the Honda was opened several times in an attempt to leave the vehicle while it was still moving," wrote Corporal Paul Pratt in a police report. "We then turned east on 20th Street and drove one and four-tenths miles the 2002 green Honda

lost control and left the road, hitting a mailbox and a no parking sign at 810 20th Street."

The badly damaged vehicle came to a rest at 826 20th St., and three occupants reportedly bailed. Law enforcement officers were able to corral two of the suspects, including Hickman, but the third escaped.

Officers were unsure who was driving the stolen

Rose out as theater director

SANFORD — The man who helped guided the Helen Stairs Theatre since it's re-opening in 2000 has resigned his position.

Ron Rose, who was the first full-time paid employee of the theater, submitted his resignation Nov. 21 to David Scott, vice president of the theater's executive board.

Citing his belief that the theater is "one of Sanford's greatest assets," Rose said it was time for him to move on to another career.

"... I will always consider the Theatre experience to be an important and rewarding chapter in my life," Rose wrote in his letter. "It has come time, however, for me to make a change. I am ready to fly, I am ready to soar. I am ready to embrace new challenges."

Those new challenges include a position as a sales associate for Stairs Property Management and Real Estate and Stairs Signs and Graphics. Both companies are owned by Mike Stairs, son of the theater's namesake Helen Stairs.

Rose was hired as the theater's development director in July 2001, but his association extends well beyond his hire date. He was a volunteer and a member of the board of directors that secured private and public funds to restore the theater, a project spearheaded by Helen Stairs. He also produced the May 2000 gala that marked the re-opening of the theater that had been vacate for many years.

As development director, Rose not only booked performances, he was

Geocaching: Global treasure hunting craze prevalent in Seminole County

When the word "geocaching" is mentioned, most people wrinkle their foreheads in a puzzled frown. Unless a person is tech savvy they probably have never heard the term, and yet it is steadily becoming all the rage.

Geocaching, also called GPS Stash Hunt, is a game that goes beyond video or computer gaming, and gets an individual physically

involved in the quest of hunting down "caches," or treasure boxes, via Global Positioning Systems (GPS).

To play you will need a GPS of your own. A GPS unit is an electronic device that uses satellites to determine global locations based on coordinates that are feed into the hand-held computer. In other words, it's a high-tech and very accurate compass. Consumer GPS units can pinpoint any location in the world within a few feet. These devices are

used in all kinds of situations where determining strategic positions is crucial, such as in military operations, police pursuits, and outdoor sporting events.

The GPS acts on a triangulation system, which simply means that it does not broadcast your location, but rather uses satellites to bounce back geographical information from their orbits in space. A GPS unit can run between roughly \$100 to several thousand dollars, depending on the

complexity of the system that you prefer. The devices can be found at department stores and camping supply shops.

In order to use your GPS to participate in the geocaching quest, you will need to be familiar with your unit's instruction manual. Additionally, there are two ways for a participant to be involved in this interactive adventure game of geocaching. The first way is for

Iraqi Diary: Operation Iron Hammer in full swing

Editor's note: Staff Sgt. Charlie C. Carlson III, son of Sanford historian Charlie C. Carlson II, is deployed in Baghdad as part of the 549th Military Police Company. He is providing the Herald with a journal of his experiences.

16 Nov. 2003 Everything has been real busy here night and day with Operation Iron Hammer underway. It is like a renewal of the whole war again. We have gone the full circle, from combatants to conquerors to liberators to occupiers and now back to combatants.

I think May 1 was used to

divide this war into two parts for political reasons. Hey, this is the same war, May 1 means nothing, except allows for lower casualty reports since most of the TV news now only reports the casualties that have happened after May 1. If we split World War II in half and reported only the casualties from one half, it would look less horrible too. So instead of reporting over 400 killed in the

Iraq War, they only report 170 or so killed since May 1. Sounds like a political scheme to me. They should always report the total numbers of the entire war because American citizens have a right to know the truth — that large numbers of people are killed or hurt in battle.

As for major combat ending on May 1, well that depends on your definition of "major combat." If you could have

seen Iraq in the last few weeks, you'd know that we are still in major combat. Everything has been used in Operation Iron Hammer, heavy tanks, artillery, air strikes, 500-pound bombs, infantry assaults, MP raids, siege strategies, special operations, mortars, you name it. I hate to see this, but it is what I have been saying all along, that things were a hell of a lot worse than people were hearing on the news.

We have been under strength since the beginning, and really had no choice but to bring out the heavy firepower. Our backs were against the


wall, it was a matter of us or them and if anybody is going to get hurt I'd rather it be them. I say "them," but no one seems to be certain as to who "them" are.

"Them" are insurgents according to our commanders, a generic term for not really knowing who is who. I've heard everything from it is terrorists from Syria and Iran, to Saddam's loyalists, to thugs who were released from prison, to unemployed Iraqis working as mercenaries trying to kill U.S. soldiers for the

There's no business like show business especially when there's a diva involved. No, not that diva. Sara Jacobson, of course, is the Downtown Diva. But nothing says diva quite like putting your own name on a community theater.

Helen Stairs, she of theater name fame, is raising heckles once again. Stairs drew the ire of many in the community four years ago when the historic Ritz Theater was renamed in her honor. At the time, detractors said the change was inappropriate despite Stairs' efforts to restore the decaying theater. They also said she would try to control the theater as if it were her own.

That accusation is again being made this week upon the news that Ron Rose has resigned his job as the theater's development director. But this time, several of those who defended the name change are saying Stairs has overstepped her bounds. In addition, they're saying they regret ever suggesting the name be changed.

It's been quite some time since *The Clock*

Keeper has been overwhelmed with the volume of calls, e-mails and letters regarding a local issue. Even Jacobson's recent attempt to high-jack the city's Christmas lighting didn't draw the massive response.

The gist of most of those communications — including pages torn from a textbook describing the profile of "dictatorial" personality types —

was that Stairs ran Rose off because she wants absolute control. To prove the point, one board member pointed out in a confidential e-mail that Stairs, who hails from Canada, is both the president of the board of directors and maintains the theater's financial records (wonder if the IRS knows about that?). Furthermore, several board members said the Canadian Diva barred Rose from attending any board meetings, despite the fact that Rose was supposed to take his direction from the entire board.

It's not all roses for Ron, however. Rose has his share of detractors. As the president of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce, Rose was criticized for not growing membership and failing to establish business organization that could operate without city funding. Failure to increase the number of season ticket holders is one of the complaints against Rose. The former director points out that the number of people attending the theater has nearly doubled since it first opened. That's true, but the number of performances offered has also nearly doubled.

Rose, who's a bit of a prima donna himself (though not quite a diva), isn't saying much. He admits he's "truly happy not to be in that situation" and says his stomach is no longer "crawling through his rib cage." Other than that, he's mum on the reasons behind his resignation.

"I'm not going there," Rose said. "I don't want to do anything to hurt the theater because I think it is an important asset to Sanford."

Stairs says there is no rift between her and Rose, but her statements to the Sentinel's Jill Duff-Hoppes have Rose supporters calling Stairs a hypocrite.

"I don't really think we're going to be thrown under the bus too badly," Duff-Hoppes reported Stairs as saying. "We don't feel panicked or anything."

Thrown under the bus? Not exactly the words one would use when describing the surprise departure of a dedicated employee, as Stairs describes Rose.

"That's a phrase I use all the time," Stairs said. "Maybe I used it incorrectly."

Not so said a board member who e-mailed *The Clock* Keeper.

"It is obvious she wanted him gone and he wanted to leave," wrote the board member who demanded anonymity. "She lost control of Ron, so now she is saying things to make him look bad."

Adding further intrigue to this drama is the fact that Rose is going to work with Stairs' son, Mike. Rose said the arrangement is not so strange because "we've always been very, very good friends, even before I began working at the theater."

"I know blood is thicker than water, I'm not stupid," he added, "but Mike and I never talk about his mother. We don't discuss her or the theater."

So what's the deal? Is Helen the controlling Canuck, or are Ron's supporters looking through rose-colored glasses? I'd bet on the former, though some of the praise Ron is getting is a bit too rosy for me.

Helen Stairs is a demanding woman. She reportedly fired her own daughters from a family business. If board members have a problem with a demanding diva, they need to do something about it. (Sending anonymous e-mails and letters ain't what I'm talking about.) Helen may have led the charge to restore the Ritz, but she doesn't own it. If there truly are problems with the management of the theater, it's the board of directors responsibility to correct them.

Otherwise, leave the drama to the actors on the stage.

Then too, remember — these clerks, at some time during the holidays, will be customers as well, out doing their gift shopping and possibly encountering the same situations in which you may find yourself.



There is also holiday shopping anger in parking areas. How about that car that cut into the space you were ready to occupy? Oh well, why not take a space further out in the lot. (You may need the exercise anyway).

What it all boils down to, is exactly what I said at the beginning of this column. Practice the Golden Rule, and treat others with respect. They are human beings and every one of them deserves humane treatment, regardless of the circumstances.

Finally, this has nothing to do with being angry with a clerk, but do exercise extreme caution in your holiday shopping. There are many snatch-and-grab incidents which could cause you to lose your purse, and a great deal of shoplifting. If you take some gifts out to your car, then return to buy more, keep the gifts hidden in your vehicle. Some people are just waiting to see a car packed with gifts that they can burglarize.

Prescription drug plan is absurd and expensive

Certain myths live large in American politics. Black voters are liberal. "Christian" means evangelical or biblical literalist. The elderly struggle to pay for their prescriptions. All are demonstrably false; nevertheless, all are so deeply rooted in our political culture that they can't be pulled up or killed off. But it's the last one that will bankrupt your grandchildren.

Even though statistics show that American children, as a group, are poorer than the elderly (who receive Social Security and Medicare), there has been no long-running and noisy campaign to pay for their prescriptions. Instead, the AARP has managed one of the best public relations scams since the leisure suit, persuading Democrats and, more recently, Republicans that a prescription drug plan should be added to Medicare. It's a complex piece of legislation chock full of giveaways to industry, mostly drug companies.

And it's going to cost plenty. Forget the \$400 billion over 10

years that you've been hearing about. Focus on the costs after that. By the time the drug companies finish jacking up their prices, the price tag will be well into the trillions.

By some estimates, the prescription drug benefit will cost \$1.5 trillion between 2014 and 2023. The Medicare hospital benefit is already expected to run out of money by 2026, after the baby boom generation has retired.

This bill is so wrongheaded that it's hard to know where to begin. Lobbied heavily by pharmaceutical companies, which make substantial contributions to political campaigns, the Republican leadership decided not to allow Medicare to use its buying power to negotiate lower prices with drug companies. That borders on insane. It's something that huge private insurers and companies (like Sam's Club) do every day. But Medicare won't be allowed to do it, virtually guaranteeing that prices for prescription drugs — already high — will soar into the stratosphere.

Here's another bit of insanity: The bill pays private insurance companies to take elderly patients. You know how one of the tenets of conservative philosophy is that private companies can always deliver a product better and cheaper? So why does the Medicare bill offer billions in subsidies to private insurers to induce them into the market? That's not competition; that's corporate welfare.

Worse yet, the next generation will be stuck with a massive bill for an entitlement that meets no critical need. Many retirees can afford not only their prescriptions but also tours to New England to see the autumn leaves and cruises to Alaska. (Sorry, Mom.) According to recent estimates, 68 percent of seniors spend less than \$1,000 per year in out-of-pocket costs for prescriptions. Fifteen percent spend between \$1,000 and \$2,000.

The other 17 percent have soaring out-of-pocket expenses and may genuinely need help, if they are poor. Congress should have set aside funds to help that small group only. Instead, middle-class retirees get a prescription drug benefit, and the poor and sickly,

oddiy, may be worse off.

A small group of low-income elderly and disabled patients qualify for both Medicare and Medicaid, enabling them to get their prescriptions either free or at very low cost. Under the new bill, many of them will end up paying more for their prescription drugs, according to the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities.

Meanwhile, some 43 million Americans shy of retirement age — many with young children — have no health-care coverage at all, not for office visits or prescription drugs or preventive care such as mammograms. From middle-class professionals who cannot find full-time employment to poor workers shoveling from Medicaid rolls by state budget cutbacks, crisis of the uninsured is getting worse.

So is the nation's debt. Grandpa's prescription bills will be paid by his grandchildren.

Which way to getting out of Iraq? Sorry, there might not be any

How do we get out of Iraq? We don't.

Last Wednesday, the *International Herald Tribune*, published here for more than 100 years, printed a column by Leslie Gelb advocating the dividing of Iraq into three parts. Gelb, a former *New York Times* columnist and former president of the Council on Foreign Relations, argued closely that Iraq was never a real country. It was, and is, lines drawn on a map in 1921 by a British colonial official named Winston Churchill.

Gelb's idea was to break up Churchill's country and remake it into what it always was, three nations: the Kurds in the north,

the Shiite Muslims in the south, and Sunni Muslims in the center.

There is one problem with that, one among many: The United States has promised not to do that. American policy for years, including most of Saddam Hussein's years, has been to maintain a unified Iraq as a buffer between Iran and Israel.

But, of course, the United States has promised a lot of things out there. The White House's ever-changing plans for Iraq's future are creating a cottage industry for outsiders with ideas for rationalizing the irrational. On the same day the *Herald Tribune* essay was published, *The*

Guardian in London published eight "exit strategies" by a line-up of historians and other interested parties. There are a few common threads in most of these plans: The United States should cede political control to the United Nations or to NATO; more troops are needed; and the United States is going to be out there for a long time.

Paul Kennedy, the Yale historian, says more troops are needed because the American occupiers may have to go door-to-door to make Baghdad secure, which is what British forces are doing in the south.

David Owen, the former British foreign secretary, answered *The Guardian* by saying that what is needed is a "staying strategy." He, too, calls for a

decentralized state separating Kurds, Sunnis and Shiites.

One of the attractions of this new federalism is that if a united Iraq ever became honestly democratic, voters, two-thirds of them Shiites, would almost certainly choose a Shia theocracy something like Iran's today. One of the Iraqi respondents in *The Guardian*, Mustafa Alwafi, editor of the *New Iraq Today*, discusses real and honest elections, and says: "If the coalition is going to make a success of its venture in Iraq, it has to bite the bullet and let the chips fall where they may." He then adds: "No fledgling Iraqi government could run the country in its first few years without the presence of the coalition troops."

James Rubin, State Department

spokesman during the Clinton years, says foreign troops (us) will have to stay at least until the end of 2005. He proposes that political control be shifted to NATO or the United Nations, perhaps with a Frenchman, Bernard Kouchner, as civil governor, and that U.N. arms inspectors be recalled into Iraq to free a thousand Americans (including most of our Arabic speakers) looking vainly, so far, for weapons of mass destruction, to do intelligence work on the insurgency in the Baghdad area.

The most discouraging *Guardian* commentary came from Said Alourish, the author of "A Brutal Friendship: The West and the Arab Elite." He argues that in using force in the Middle East, President Bush is bringing the world to "a cultural confrontation

of unimaginable proportions."

Then he concludes: "What can be done? The options are limited. The American-backed governing council bears a striking resemblance to the doomed monarchy the British created. The Hashemite monarchy imposed on the country in 1921 was rejected by the Iraqi people, who saw it as a subsidiary of a foreign power."

Going back to Paul Kennedy, he tells a story of two swells — George Bush and Tony Blair — getting lost while walking in the Irish countryside. They ask a farmer how to get back to Dublin. He scratches his head and says, "Well, if I were you, sir, I wouldn't start from here."

But there is where we are now.

The Way We Were: Old Sanford Herald was full of news

Someone left a few old *Sanford Heralds* at the Sanford Museum for me and I'd like to share the Monday, Jan. 25, 1965 edition with you. There is so much information in this paper that it will take three columns to do so.

The editor and publisher was Walter Gielow with Frank Voltoline as circulation general manager. Managing editor was Harry Johnson along with society editor, Doris Williams; city

editor, Dottie Austin; county editor, Judy Wells; advertising manager, Roy Green; business manager, Janie Shoemaker; staff photographer, Bill Vincent. There were 14 area correspondents listed with their phone numbers. Home delivery cost was 35 cents per week for five daily papers.

World Honors Sir Winston
The above was the front page headline and the article contains accolades on Winston Churchill's life and information in place to honor him following his death the previous day at age 90.

"He will be buried like a king" according to a BBC commentator, "the first commoner in English history to be accorded such an honor."

Queen Elizabeth commanded a state funeral and Parliament ratified her decree. And it was announced that the queen and members of the royal family would attend the funeral at St. Paul's Cathedral on Saturday. Royalty rarely attends funerals except for other royalty.

Starting on Wednesday, the body would lie in state for three days in Westminster Hall at the Parliament Building.

According to Churchill's wishes, he would be carried on a gun carriage to St. Paul's Cathedral, and following the funeral he would be taken across the Thames River on a barge. His body would then be placed upon a train to be carried to the town of Bladon where he was born. His grave would be beside that of his father and his American born mother, Jennie.

United States of American Flags across the world would fly at half staff this week in an unprecedented salute to this honorary U.S. citizen, Sir Winston Churchill.

President Lyndon B. Johnson issued an executive order to that effect from his hospital bed on Sunday. He said that it was a symbol of respect for the memory of Churchill who he eulogized as "history's child."

(For you young people who do not remember Churchill, get out your history books, or log on to the Internet and read about this outstanding man).

President requests \$99 billion budget

President Johnson sent Congress a request for a \$99.7 billion budget heavily emphasizing welfare programs essential to his "Great Society," and providing for small military cutbacks.

"It is aimed," he said, "at improving our way of life and it is aimed at insuring that all Americans share in this way of life."

'Geneva jottings' from the past, present and future

Thanksgiving finds us looking back at history a bit, so I've chosen to highlight the activities of the Geneva Historical & Genealogical Society (GH&GS) this week.

What do the names "Alligator," "Heck," "Maple Leaf," "Waunita," "Arrow," "Pioneer" and "Gussie" all have in common? They are all the given names of steamboats that once navigated the waters of the St. Johns River, bringing commerce and travel to even the remotest of stops along the way.

The GH&GS free "Steamboat Days" presentation in October was a 'boatload' of such information — every bit of it interesting. Included in the narrative were quotes taken from turn of the century newspaper articles in the *Sanford Herald's* "Geneva Jottings," such as:

"15 November 1908 — On Friday the steamer 'Alligator,' Capt. Paganhart, took a large party of our people on a trip down the river from Lake Harney. The bright moonlight night was an ideal one for the trip. A bountiful lunch with hot coffee was served aboard the steamer, and all declared on returning that they had had the time of their lives."

For those who could not make the

evening's narrated slide show, a booklet has been compiled by host Mal Martin that takes the reader on the same journey as those who attended. Titled "Steamboat Days of Geneva, Florida, Traveling on the St. Johns from Lake Monroe to Lake Washington," the publication is available for a \$5 donation to the GH&GS at the Geneva Museum, or by writing Cindy Simonton, Geneva Historical Society, P.O. Box 91, Geneva, FL 32732. (Please add \$1.50 shipping and handling if mailed.)

Also available from the dedicated folks at the GH&GS is the 2004 edition of the Geneva Historical Calendar — a 5-by-7 inch collector's item.

Leo Rehbinder, son of Russian immigrants, donated a "Magic Lantern" and glass slides to the Geneva Museum. The black and white 4-by-4 inch glass slides, that were illuminated by coal oil,

were taken around 1900 and later sent to Chicago to be "colorized."

The slides are scenes of Florida and, as Leo was from Geneva, many are of the Geneva area. This year, thanks to the talents of Genevieve Richard Simonton, these slides have been restored and digitized, and now grace the pages of the 2004 Geneva Historical Calendar. The calendars can be obtained for a \$4 donation to the society at the museum, or by mail per the instructions above.

The Annual Geneva Community Yard and Craft Sale, sponsored by the GH&GS, is Saturday, Dec. 6, at the Geneva Community Center.

The sale will take place from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Reserve a space now and sell off a few of those outgrown or unused items hanging about, or simply come and shop for some guaranteed bargains.

The society handles all of the advertising and provides the space. Inside spaces rent for \$15 and include a table. (Sorry, all inside spaces have been rented.) event included more than 55 sellers!

Desegregation begins in county schools

Initial desegregation of county schools would begin the next day for Seminole County students as announced by the school board.

The board had approved two of three applications for African American students to attend schools closer to their home.

Applications were approved for Ingrid Burton, 14-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. U.S. Burton, and Jocelyn Harold, daughter of Mrs. Juanita Harold.

The request of Charlotte Ringling, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. J.C. Ringling, to attend Southside School was denied on the grounds that her home was closer to Hopper Elementary.

Ingrid Burton would transfer from Crooms to the ninth grade at Sanford Junior High and

Jocelyn Harold would attend Southside School in the second grade.

Seminole County had complied with the federal law that required the filing of desegregation plans by March 3. This was done to remain eligible for federal funds.

Hospital wing rites slated

Ground would be broken the next day for a new \$1 million wing for the Seminole Memorial Hospital.

A host of city and county officials were expected to be on hand for the ceremony.

The board of trustees had a bid of \$770,000 from the Development Corporation of America, and the county commissioners allocated one-third of the cost of the addition. The other two-thirds would be paid by the federal government under the Hill Burton Act. The difference between the \$1 million estimate and the actual cost would be used for hospital furniture according to Hospital Administrator Robert Besserer.

Lakefront plans to be discussed

A discussion of financing programs for the lakefront development project would highlight the city commission meeting that evening. The city's fiscal agent, Loomis Leedy, would present his findings on the financial situation. Those who had expressed backing of the marina plans and the general public were urged to attend, city manager W.E. Knowles had said.

Also on the agenda was consideration of a plan by the chamber of commerce for a botanical-zoological area on the lakefront with relocation and expansion of the city zoo.



Longwood man faithfully attends Sunday school for 50 years straight

On Nov. 2, Wayne Joiner taught the senior men's bible class at Central Baptist Church in Sanford as he reached his 50th year of perfect Sunday school attendance.

He graduated from school in a small southwestern Georgia town of Meigs. When he was 16 years old, he was in a car and train wreck and was in a coma for six weeks. His mother was killed and he was laid up for two years recovering from multiple surgeries.

Joiner learned to speak and walk again, and went on to earn bachelor's and master's degrees from Mercer University in 1955 and 1969. In 1989, he retired from a teaching career in Seminole County after 30



Joiner taught social studies at Sanford Junior High for 9 years and was an American History teacher at Teague Middle School when he retired. During his college and early days as a Seminole County educator, he faithfully attended Sunday school. He taught many Sunday school classes and often became the assembly or church pianist at many places, including First Baptist Church in

Washington, D.C. and Atlanta First Baptist. He also played at churches across Central Florida and Georgia.

As the Sunday school director at the First Baptist Church in Longwood, he initiated many activities to improve attendance and worship, such as competition for members to read the Bible and memorize verses and Sunday school attendance rewards. In 1981, he wrote a 90-year historical account of the First Baptist Church of Longwood, "Our Heritage, 1891-1981."

Even during vacations throughout the United States, Canada and Western Europe, Joiner and his wife, Nancy would conduct Sunday school classes among travelers of different denominations. Even on their honeymoon in Charleston, S.C., the couple found a Sunday school class to attend.

On April 20, 1999, Joiner suffered a terrible heart complication after entering the hospital for a knee replacement. Members of the Sanford church and the deacon visited him in the hospital and conducted Sunday school near his bed.

Members of the Central Baptist Church in Sanford continued to visit him as he recovered and went through rehabilitation. When he left the hospital, members of the church would visit him at home and conduct Sunday school.



bounty that is on our heads. There may be a combination of groups against us. Whatever they are, they all have one thing in common, they don't like us being here and they don't mind killing us.

One of the big problems I see in Baghdad, is unemployment. It is so high that it is almost off the scale. In the beginning, these people believed that their economy, security and employment would improve when the Americans got here, but that has not happened. As a matter of fact, unemployment is way higher than before we invaded their country and security has been dwindling away ever since the first tank rolled into Baghdad. I think that has a lot of Iraqis mad at us who would

otherwise support us.

The U.S.A. has been its own worst enemy in Iraq, mainly because we did not deliver what we promised or else we have been late in doing so. I think we should have started putting together a new Iraqi army right after we arrived here instead of letting hundreds of thousands of ex-Iraqi soldiers roam around unemployed and getting into trouble. We could have weeded out the bad ones and put the good ones under U.S. command. They are now doing this, but if you ask me, we're a "day late and a dollar short." But, that's just the opinion of a simple soldier, not to be confused with the elite wisdom and straight forward planning of our experts in Washington that got

simple soldiers like me into this mess.

17 Nov. 2003 It is really cold at night but warms up in the daytime. Real dry and dusty outside on the streets.

We are conducting patrols, nothing really hot to report on that. We still stay on edge because you never know when that small pile of garbage on the side of the road might blow up as we drive by. They are crafty at hiding IEDs (improvised explosive devices). It could be a basket of fruit on the side of the road or wooden crate. You constantly watch for anything along the sides of the roads and streets, especially those things that don't have any people standing around, or groups of people standing in a huddle some

distance away like waiting spectators wanting to see the show.

The problem that I have to stay aware of is when we go through a period of lull where nothing happens. This can easily cause us to become complacent. I think the enemy uses that against us also. They like to hit you when you don't expect it.

We still monitor the police stations and take our turn on perimeter guard in the towers around camp. For us, the danger factor ranges from none to high, depending on what mission we are doing. Sometimes I feel perfectly safe, but anything can change in a flash here.

vehicle. Deputies reported about \$2,000 damage to the vehicle.

Hickman was wanted for allegedly shooting Wimberly Monday at about 10:30 a.m. According to eyewitnesses,

Wimberly was shot near his home and then stumbled out into Third Street between Pine and Chapman avenues. Wimberly was airlifted to Orlando Regional Medical Center and is reportedly in stable condition.

Hickman's motive in the shooting was allegedly over a girl or a purchase of vehicle rims, said Chris Woehr, Sanford police investigator, earlier in the week.

"(The argument was) not per say between those two people, but between Wimberly and a couple of the suspect's friends," he said. "I guess the shooter was kind of sticking up for one of his friends."

According to authorities, the shooting incident was a lengthy "feud" between the two parties that eventually boiled over to violence.

"From everything our investigation has determined it has been ongoing for a couple weeks. It has just taken a couple weeks to reach this point," Woehr said.

According to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, Hickman was in the juvenile detention center several times before turning of age, and more recently, he spent time in jail this year for charges of battery to a law enforcement officer and grand theft auto.

a person or organization to become a stasher by going online to register a cache, or treasure box, that they have compiled.

These boxes can contain several simplistic things such as rubber bands, paper clips or jacks, or they can even go so far as to contain travel tickets, jewelry or other high value items.

Once the box is ready for registration, the participant then decides where they will hide the box and figures out the GPS coordinates for it, recording it in the registration. They will always include a log book and a pencil for those who will eventually find the box.

Which brings us to our second type of participant: the cache hunter.

Hunters will also go online and register their name and contact information. Then they will select a particular area or a particular cache that they wish to search for.

Using the GPS coordinates listed online, the hunters will pursue the booty, but don't think that finding it is so easy. The GPS device is only accurate to a radius of 6 to 20 feet, and depending on the type of terrain it is hidden in, finding the box can be rather challenging.

Once a seeker finds a cache, they are free to remove one item from the box as their reward, leaving an alternate item for each item they remove.

The last step is for them to simply record their contact information and thoughts in the log book for others who find the cache after them.

The rules of the game are simple: number one, take something from each cache that you find; number two, leave something in each

cache box that you find, and number three, record it all in the log book.

Obviously, items in the cache should be legal and non-harmful to participants, and food is a bad idea as animals often get into the caches due to their keen sense of smell, in which case cache box hunters will never be able to find their intended target.

When a cache is hidden, careful consideration should be given to the entertainment value of the search. Stashers should make it as fun and challenging as possible, without causing it to be purposefully dangerous.

Some hiders even leave instructions in the log book for finders to move the cache to a different location upon discovery, but these type of instructions will require the hunter to go online and reregister the new coordinates so that others can pursue the treasure as well.

There are even interesting variations to the game that make it increasingly intriguing.

For example, one variation is called a hitch hiker, which requires one item in the cache to be moved from box to box, and then participants track its travel all over the world.

Other variations are offset caches, multi-caches, and virtual caches, all which require some sort of scavenger hunt or solving of a riddle in order to find the cache.

Geocaching can be found in over 180 countries, and there are several caches located in the Seminole County and greater Central Florida area.

responsible for the day-to-day operations of the theater. His resignation came as a surprise to Helen Stairs, who serves as president of the theater's executive board. However, she said Rose's departure would not affect the operation of the theater.

"It will be business as usual," Stairs said. "The season's already in place, so it's a matter of (husband) Carl and I, with the help of the board, filling in the gaps. We truly have a working board. We also have one lady who works part-time in our ticket office and another part-time employee who helps with stage management."

Stairs said she already has two "excellent resumes" for the position, including "one girl who I would hire in an instant if the board approves it." Stairs anticipates that a search committee will be formed and a new director hired by mid-January.

While Rose's resignation came as a surprise to Stairs, that was not the case with some board members. Several board members said Rose had approached them in recent months with multiple concerns about Stairs micro-managing theater affairs, manipulating board decisions and undermining Rose's credibility. These board members would not speak for the record.

"Ron just got tired of Helen trying to run everything," one board member said. "It's her way or the highway."

For her part, Stairs said she is unaware of any conflict Rose might have had.

"I think the long hours were a factor," Stairs said, noting that particularly on performance nights, Rose worked past midnight. "What I'm gathering from some of the board members is that Ron has been unhappy for about six months."

Asked if she and Rose and a falling out, Stairs said, "Certainly not from anything I have done."

The theater, which has served as the city's longest functioning performance hall, opened in 1923 as the Milane. The name was later changed to Ritz Theater. During restoration of the theater four years ago, the name was changed to the Helen Stairs Theatre for the Performing Arts.





Woman cited for keeping tiger cubs in home

An Orlando woman faces two misdemeanor charges for illegally keeping two tiger cubs in a dog kennel in her backyard. Hart Leygh Cupples, 42, (DOB 6/1/61), of 1510 N. Ferncreek Ave., was cited for Possession of Class I Wildlife (Tigers) Without a Permit, and Failure to Provide Standard Caging for Class I Felidae (tigers).

Cupples was issued the Notices to Appear after Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) wildlife inspector, Lt. Rick Brown, investigated a tip he received that the tigers may be located at the Orlando address.

Cupples was keeping the male and female tiger cubs in a chain link kennel-type cage that was too small, not made of heavy enough gauge wire, and did not have a chain link roof, as is required for safety purposes. In addition, Class I predators, such as tigers, may only be kept on property that is a minimum of five acres, and cages must be at least 35 feet from the property line.

The tiger cubs, named McGraw and Faith, are currently being housed at an undisclosed facility that is permitted to possess tigers. McGraw, the male, weighs 49 pounds and Faith weighs 37.

TEN FACE WILDLIFE POACHING CHARGES IN MARION COUNTY

Ten individuals from Marion and Citrus counties face 40 felony and misdemeanor charges of wildlife poaching for deer and alligators they killed in Marion and Lake counties over the past year or so.

The charges resulted from an ongoing investigation by Officer Washburn Wear and Lt. Gregg Eason, state law enforcement officers for Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), who work Marion County and the Ocala National Forest.

The officers recently presented their investigative findings to the state attorney for the Fifth Judicial Circuit in Marion County, who charged the nine men and one woman for violations including illegally killing alligators and deer, shooting deer from a road, killing doe deer out of season, and not lawfully tagging alligators during the public waters alligator harvest.

The individuals were charged as follows:

* Travis P. Cahill, 22, (DOB 12/19/80), of 545 NE 167 Ave., Silver Springs, was charged with one count of Illegal Taking/Possessing/Capturing of Alligator (M2); one count of Unlawful Possession of Alligator (M1).

* Deborah A. Dyal, 30, (DOB 4/11/73), of 3435 SE 164 Terrace, Ocklawaha, was charged with one count of Taking Deer During Closed Season (M1); one count of Taking Deer by Unlawful Method (M2); one count of Taking Deer From Right of Way (M2).

* Randall E. Dyal Jr., 34, (DOB 4/20/69), of 3435 See Outdoors, Page 2B

SCC men pick up road win

The Seminole Community College men's basketball team showed off its entire repertoire in picking up its first road win of the season, 66-60, Tuesday night at Pasco-Hernando Community College in New Port Richey.

The win not only was the first on the road for the Raiders, it also broke a four-game losing streak and improved the locals' record to 2-4 on the season. The Conquistadors saw their three-game winning streak snapped as they fell to 4-6.

Coach Stan Cromartie's were buoyed by the return of Nicolas Rollins to the starting line-up after a knee injury and the 6-foot-8 freshman center responded by knocking down two three-pointers in the opening half.

In fact, that was the story for SCC in the opening 20 minutes as six different players hit 'treys' on the way to building a 38-23 halftime lead. The Raiders actually made more three-pointers, eight, than two-pointers, five, in the first half.

And while it was not unusual to see SCC make three-pointers, it was unusual to see who made them. In addition to Rollins, 6-foot-11 Will Greene also hit one from deep.

The story was completely different in the second half as the Raiders only hit six field goals, including one three-pointer, and won the game from the free throw line despite not hitting a very good percentage.

SCC only made 15-of-25 from the charity stripe in the second half, but that was still more points than it made from the floor, 13, in the second half.

Freshman Vince Mosley, a 6-foot-5 freshman from Ft. Lauderdale, was the star of the second half for the Raiders, going 5-for-5 from the free throw line and scoring all 11 of his points in the second half to equal Rollins for team-high honors.

Travis "TJ" Jones kept his personal streak alive as he finished in double figure scoring for the sixth consecutive game with 10 points.

SCC showed incredible balance as nine of the 20 players scored, finishing with between three and 11 points.

In addition to their 11 points, Mosley also had eight rebounds and two steals and Rollins pulled down five rebounds.

Also having big games were Jovian Forestier, the freshman from Lake Howell, who got the start at point guard and handed out a team-high seven assists to go along with five points, and 6-foot-11 Kernaime Samuela, who scored only four points but grabbed a game-high 13 rebounds.

Other contributors for the Raiders were Thomas Williams with nine points, Greene with seven points, sophomore Rushawn Johnson with six points, and William Graham with three points.

For Pasco-Hernando Tory Harris scored a game-high 20 points, with Mike Welch and Zach Ingles chipping in with 11 points each.

SCC is playing in a tournament at St. Petersburg College this weekend and will play their final home game of 2003 on Tuesday (Dec. 2) when they host Manatee Community College. Game time is set for 7:30 p.m. at the SCC Health and Physical Education Center and admission is free.

Roberto Morentin posted a career high 21 points to lead all scorers, but it was not enough as UCF fell to the College of Charleston 72-63 at John Kresse Arena Wednesday evening.

UCF (1-1) opened a 4-0 lead following a tip-in by Marcus Avant, but Charleston (2-1) came right back scoring five unanswered points to take a 5-4 lead. Morentin, who hit for 14 points in the opening stanza, went on a personal 8-0 run, to give UCF a 12-8 lead. The Knights then clamped down defensively and were able to push their lead to 17-10 following a bucket by Josh Peppers with 10:53 remaining in the first half.

UCF continued to play stingy defense holding the

Cougars without a basket for nearly eight minutes and were able to open up a 22-10 lead following a triple from Troy Lindbeck. Stanley Jackson finally ended the scoring drought by canning two free throws with just over eight minutes remaining in the first half. Lindbeck answered with his second three to make the score 25-12 and Charleston went without a field goal until the 7:43 mark when Dontaye Draper connected to bring the Cougars to within 25-14.

Charleston put together a run in the remaining minutes of the first half and following Robert Swain's second triple the lead was cut to 38-29 with 1:30 left in the opening half. Morentin scored the Knights final four points of the half and Charleston hit its sixth trey of the first half at the buzzer to cut the UCF lead to 40-37 at the intermission.

Following the break, Charleston assumed the lead 41-40 following a dunk by Mike Benton. The Knights hit just two field goals in the opening five minutes of the second half, but following a

tip-in by Morentin UCF had the score knotted at 45. With the score again tied at 47, the Cougars went on a 7-0 run to take a 54-47 advantage.

UCF continued to battle and with 3:39 left to play Morentin missed the free throw on a three-point play opportunity, but the Knights snared the rebound and Gary Johnson connected from long range to cut the UCF deficit to 62-61. Tony Mitchell then hit a shot with just over one minute remaining to push the lead to 66-63. The Knights could not convert scoring opportunities late in the game and turned the ball over with 16 seconds and were forced to put the Cougars at the line for the final margin of victory.

Other scorers in double digits for UCF included Josh Bodden with 11 and Dexter Lyons with 10. The Knights connected on just 4 of 17 shots from three-point range and shot 42 percent (23-54) from the floor for the game. Morentin and Lyons each recorded double figures in rebounds to post a double-double as the duo grabbed 13

and 10 respectively. UCF out-rebounded the Cougars 38-33.

Both Jackson and Draper, who finished with 11, led the Cougars. Charleston finished hitting 42 percent from the floor and hit just 6 of 20 from behind the arc.

The Golden Knights remained in Charleston, S.C. as they prepare to take on The Citadel on Friday.



PROPOSAL TO ALLOW REDFISH TOURNEY "CATCH, HOLD & RELEASE"

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) Thursday approved a draft rule that would allow participants in qualified catch and release redfish (red drum) tournaments to catch, hold and release fish under certain conditions. This means that tournament fishermen would be able to release a live redfish possessed in a live well or re-circulating tank aboard a boat for the purpose of harvesting another redfish.

Redfish tournament organizers have asked the FWC to allow an exemption to an existing redfish rule that prohibits the catch, hold and release of redfish. Current rules allow all recreational fishermen to possess only one redfish between 18 and 27 inches in total length per day.

The FWC proposed rule would allow redfish to be caught, held and released only by tournament anglers for several reasons: 1) the rule would apply only to catch-and-release redfish tournaments, whereas many recreational anglers who catch, hold and release redfish would want to keep the fish; 2) tournaments represent a very small percentage of the overall harvest in comparison to recreational anglers; and 3) fishing tournaments use recovery tanks, in addition to live wells and re-circulating tanks aboard boats, to revive redfish before releasing them into the wild.

The FWC has worked with representatives from the Redfish Cup, the Redfish Tour and the Audubon of the Americas - New Orleans Aquarium to develop a tournament redfish catch, hold and release rule. The draft rule defines "catch, hold and release" to mean the intentional release of a live redfish, possessed in a live well or re-circulating tank aboard a boat, for the purpose of harvesting another redfish. The proposed rule also defines a "fishing tournament" as a fishing competition involving 50 or more participants that has written rules and regulations, requires an entry fee and awards prizes to competitors.

In addition, the draft rule specifies that the

executive director of the FWC, or a designee may issue permits to catch-and-release fishing tournaments to allow catch, hold, and release of redfish provided that:

- * Tournament competitors and staff attempt to release all redfish alive, including those fish that are weighed in
- * Tournament boats contain aerated or re-circulating live wells
- * Dead redfish are not discarded when fish are caught, held and released
- * Redfish are placed in recovery tanks after weigh-in before being released
- * The tournament provides the FWC with a description of the release location (as a condition of the exemption permit, the FWC may specify the tournament release location)
- * The tournament submits a post-tournament report

The tournament agrees to allow the FWC the opportunity to conduct research and onboard monitoring, as needed

Other draft rule provisions include specifying that tournament catch, hold and release permits will only be issued to catch-and-release redfish tournaments that agree to all permit conditions; all tournament competitors must possess a copy of the tournament catch, hold and release exemption permit during the tournament; and participants use a 25-gallon minimum live well. The Commission will continue working with redfish tournaments to develop rules specifying recovery tank size and minimum salinity and water temperatures for recovery tanks and addressing the use of chemical additives to maintain fish alive.

FWC POSTS SEASONAL SPEED ZONES TO PROTECT MANATEES

Florida manatees are on the move to warm-water sites around the state, and this is the time to give a little extra consideration to Florida's official marine mammal. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is working on a variety of manatee projects ranging from art contests and educational programs to posting signs and enforcing year-round and seasonal speed zones.

Manatees generally start traveling to warm-water sites when the air temperature drops below 50 degrees or when the water temperature dips to 68 degrees.

FWC bureau chief and manatee biologist Kipp Frohlich advises boaters to scan the water near or in front of the boat for swirls that look like a huge footprint, a repetitive line of half moon swirls, a mud trail or any breaking of the surface by a snout or a tail.

To help ensure manatees have a safer migration this year, boaters should stay in marked channels, wear polarized sunglasses to improve vision, abide by posted boat speed zones and pole, paddle or use trolling motor when in close proximity to manatees.

"If you see a manatee, give it plenty of room. The manatee may not be alone—it may have a calf or be traveling with other manatees that are close by," Frohlich said.

Injured, dead, orphaned or tagged manatees, or any that are harassed, should be reported to the FWC Resource Protection Hotline at 1-888-404-FWCC, or #FWC on a cell phone.

In Volusia County there is a 25 MPH zone through March 31st in portions of the Tomoka River and Spruce Creek; you must run at slow speed in the St. Johns River, south of Lake Beresford to Channel Marker 67; and through April 15 motorboats are prohibited in Blue Spring Run.

Thousands of students from Florida and 40 other states are participating in November's Manatee Awareness Month activities through a Web-based manatee field trip.

"The eFieldTrip experience is a wonderful way to provide students with information about manatees. It is especially meaningful in Florida, where the manatee is our official marine mammal and a symbol for marine conservation to many of our school children," said FWC project coordinator, Bonnie Abellera. The field trip is available until June; teachers can register their classes at www.efieldtrips.org/manatees. Classroom journals are available to use with the field trip. Another manatee project underway at the FWC is the art contest for a new manatee license plate. The FWC is considering redesigning the current tag, which is 13 years old. Artists can get details about submitting artwork at www.floridamarine.org. The deadline for submitting artwork is Dec. 19.



Division titles on the line

The battle for both divisional titles in the Southeastern Conference comes down to the final weekend for only the second time in the last 11 years. The Eastern Division is still a tight three-team race among Georgia, Tennessee and Florida, and the Western Division boils down to LSU and Ole Miss.

The third-ranked Tigers obviously have a huge advantage after beating the No. 17 Rebels 17-14 last week in Oxford, Miss. All LSU needs to do is take care of business and beat Arkansas at home Friday, but the Rebels can certainly add a bit of pressure by taking care of intrastate rival Mississippi State on Thanksgiving in the annual Egg Bowl.

The last time one of the teams from Mississippi was involved in the chase for the division title this late was in 1998, when the Bulldogs took the Western crown with a 28-6 victory that gave them the title over Arkansas and a chance to play Tennessee in the SEC championship game.

This will be the grand finale for Coach Jackie Sherrill and the regular-season finale for Rebels senior quarterback Eli Manning, who will get to play at least one more game after this before heading to the NFL. Manning and company will look to revive a powerful offense that was completely shut down by the Rebels' stout defense last week. Getting a little confidence back and earning their 10th win of the season will be motivation enough, but when you add a title race and state bragging rights there is more than enough motivation for Ole Miss to get up for this game.

Last year, the Rebels took home the Golden Egg trophy — which has gone to the winner for the last 75 years — with a 24-12 victory at home in the 99th meeting between the two teams. Both teams were struggling, with Ole Miss snapping a five-game skid to become bowl-eligible and earn a bid to the Independence Bowl.

Key for Mississippi State: Limit turnovers. The Bulldogs had eight last week, leading to 31 points, and this is a team that can hardly afford to play catch-up.

Records: Florida State 9-2 (7-1 ACC); Florida 8-3 (6-2 SEC). **Series:** Florida leads 27-18-2. **Coaches:** FSU's Bobby Bowden (341-98-4); Florida's Ron Zook (16-8). **Kickoff:** 3:30 p.m. EST. **TV:** CBS.
Key for Florida State: Get that run going early. Let big Greg Jones batter the Gators' defense in the first half, and as Florida's defense gets tired of getting hit, he'll be able to pop some big runs.
Key for Florida: Get pressure on FSU QB Chris Rix and watch him turn it over, just like he did when the Hurricanes got in his face earlier this season. Collapse the pocket and limit his running room, and the interceptions will come, especially with super-corer Keijuan Ratliff romping the secondary.
Arkansas at LSU
Records: Arkansas 8-3 (4-3 SEC); LSU 10-1 (6-1 SEC). **Series:** LSU leads 29-17-2. **Coaches:** Arkansas' Houston Nutt (83-48); LSU's Nick Saban (79-39-1). **Kickoff:** 2:30 p.m. EST. **TV:** CBS.
Key for Arkansas: Keep the chains moving, and keep the Tigers' offense off the field. The Razorbacks can do that by sustaining drives the way they did last week, when they had five drives of 65 yards or more.
Key for LSU: The Tigers need to stuff Arkansas tailback Cedric Cobbs, and force QB Matt Jones to beat them with his arm. If Jones gets time to find George Wilson, he can be dangerous, but reducing the threat of the run will take that time away.
Georgia at Georgia Tech

Key for Georgia Tech: Hammer away at the Yellow Jackets' suspect offensive line, and make RB P.J. Daniels beat you on swing passes. When Daniels can't run, QB Reggie Ball loses all effectiveness, and starts to turn the ball over.
Alabama at Hawaii
Records: Alabama 4-8 (2-6 SEC); Hawaii 7-4 (5-2 WAC). **Series:** Alabama leads 1-0. **Coaches:** Alabama's Mike Shula (4-8); Hawaii's June Jones (38-24). **Kickoff:** 7:45 p.m. EST. **TV:** ESPN.
Key for Alabama: Last week, Alabama faced the ultimate ground game against Auburn; this week, the Tide will see an aerial display from the Warriors. Alabama needs sure tackling in the secondary, because Hawaii throws a lot of underneath routes and tries to count on the yards after catch (YAC) to do most of the damage.
Key for Hawaii: Let Timmy Chang do his thing. The shifty QB didn't get 12,191 career passing yards without producing big plays. Chang will try to find wideout Chad Owens on crossing routes with room to roam, and if he is not there, Chang will just keep it and pick up the first down anyway.

Records: Tennessee 9-2 (5-2 SEC); Kentucky 4-7 (1-6 SEC). **Series:** Tennessee leads 66-23-9. **Coaches:** Tennessee's Phillip Fulmer (112-27); Kentucky's Rich Brooks (95-116-4). **Kickoff:** 12:30 p.m. EST. **TV:** Jefferson Pilot.
Key for Tennessee: QB Casey Clausen needs to start a new streak of passes without an interception. He had his school record snapped at 143 last week, but as long as he doesn't give the Wildcats a short field or easy points, this game should be a breeze.
Key for Kentucky: With nothing to lose, try some more trick plays. Last week, a fake field goal and fake punt led to the Wildcats' first 10 points against Georgia.

2-MINUTE DRILL

ALABAMA Brandon Brooks' 96-yard kick return to start the second half of Alabama's 28-23 loss to Auburn was the first time either team had returned a kick the distance in an Iron Bowl since 1969.

ARKANSAS Arkansas' 46-point victory over Mississippi State ties for the second-largest margin of victory in head coach Houston Nutt's career at Arkansas. The Razorbacks thumped Louisiana-Monroe 52-6 in 2000. The Hogs' largest victory margin was 52 points, when they beat Middle Tennessee 58-6 in 1999.

AUBURN Carnell Williams' 80-yard touchdown run on the first play of the game was the Tigers' longest play of the season. And school officials also believed it to be the first time Auburn has scored on its first play from scrimmage since 1957.

FLORIDA Sophomore tailback Clatrick Fason rushed for a career-high 190 yards on 20 carries against South Carolina, but that still isn't enough to lock up the starting spot against Florida State this week. The Gators have two other tailbacks in their rotation, with Ran Carthon, who started against South Carolina, and DeShawn Wynn, who came in on the third series of the game. The rotation the rest of the way will be based on their effectiveness.

GEORGIA Billy Bennett kicked three field goals last week to become the SEC's career scoring leader with 382 points. His 81 career field goals also set an NCAA record, passing Washington's Jeff Jaeger, who tallied 80 from 1983-'86. Bennett is 81-for-104 in field goal attempts, including four in last year's Nokia Sugar Bowl victory over Florida State.

KENTUCKY The Bulldogs scored 30 on Kentucky, snapping the Wildcats' streak of nine straight games in which they held their opponents under 30 points in regulation. That means they fall three games shy of matching their run in 1988-'89, during which they held 12 consecutive opponents under 30 points (the last six games of 1988 and the first six games of 1989).

LSU The Tigers' defense still has not allowed a point on the road in the first half all season. Ole Miss scored early in the game, but it came on an interception return. As a team, the Tigers have now allowed only 26 points in the first half all season.

MISSISSIPPI The Rebels' offense, which led the SEC in scoring and is second in overall offense, was held to a paltry 98 yards in the first three quarters and only 27 rushing in the loss to LSU. And Ole Miss didn't even manage an offensive touchdown until 10 minutes remained in the game.

MISSISSIPPI STATE The Bulldogs have now dropped eight straight on the road, 13 straight SEC games on the road, and their last eight games against Western Division opponents. It's not difficult to figure out why they are stacking up these losses, when you see that they turned the ball over eight times in the blowout loss to Arkansas. It was the most turnovers since the Bulldogs gave it back to LSU eight times in 1992. And the six interceptions were the most for Mississippi State since six against Cincinnati way back in 1949.

SOUTH CAROLINA Clemson scored its most points ever in the 101-game series with South Carolina, blowing out the Gamecocks 63-17. For the Gamecocks, it was the most points surrendered in the rivalry since the Tigers' 51-0 win in 1900.

TENNESSEE The Volunteers have now won 21 in a row against Vanderbilt, which is the third-longest current streak by one team over another in Division 1-A. The Vols last lost to Vandy in 1982, and they have blanked the Commodores three years in a row.

VANDERBILT Losing rarely helps increase attendance, and in the case of the Commodores, it has really hurt them this season. 
