





Indeed, this presidential drive produced a surprising result in Florida where the then Gov. Claude A. Kirk, first GOP governor since reconstruction, had dreams of vice-presidential glory and provided a none-too-helpful offshot.

> this Republican convention promises to continue to note the presence of "Democrats For Nixon," a labor executive, young politicians and several attractive and appealing women among the 12 seconders of the Rockefeller nomination to see how the Nixon planners are winding up a package of support that the Democrats will have a hard time to dislodge.

If Nixon as a president deserves the "four more years" his enthusiastic supporters are now chanting, as a wise, skillful and successful politician the laurels are even greener.

UN Gripes: Bombings To Parking

NEW YORK - One of the United Nations' most interesting and most important committees meets in the building's basement and rarely gets any public at-

Yet it is where U.N. delegates put the squeeze on the United States for the unfriendly treatment some of them receive in New York. Many of their gripes are well-

founded. Six French diplomats were mugged on city streets within the last 18 months; fire bombs have been tossed into arab missions; the wives of Soviet diplomats have been harassed; a pipe bomb tore a hole in the wall of the office of the South African Consulate General; and in one particular case a Spanish diplomat got into a hassle with a truck driver and got his nose bashed Ambassador Wissam Al-Zahawie of

Iraq suggests, diplomatically, that it would be beneficial to all concerned, including U.S. citizens, if the glorification of violence ceased in the United States. Ambassador George J. Tomeh of Syria went him one better. There was only one recourse, he said, and that was "for the United Nations to get out of New York and for the United Nations ultimately to get out of the United

Global View Capitalism Edging Toe in China Door

WASHINGTON (NEA) Hong Kong friends report that in recent months Mao Tse-tung has taken a few timid steps toward capitalistic

free enterprise in China. . Following Communist theory, managers during Mao's Cultural Revolution were ordered to give their workers equal pay regardless of how much they produced. But in recent months, after a trial run of some years, equal pay has been denounced, blamed on Mao's enemies, its proponents castigated as "egalitarians." Industries have been ordered to pay workers according to the amount and quality of work.

. The planting of private plots by farmers has been banned time and again over the years as archaic capitalistic recidivism. In recent months, the order has gone out that Mao officially sanctions these plots. Private industry and profits have been frowned upon

since Mao's armies took over China two decades ago. But since early this year farmers have been officially allowed to run small-scale cottage industries for profit. It is clear from the reports out of Hong Kong that none of these shifts made Mao's men happy. It appears they were bowing to the inevitable.

In explaining the move to pay workers according to their production. Chinese mainland newspapers have noted that peasants receiving equal pay lost their socialst enthusiasm. Production fell sharply and the economy was threatened with disruption. Regardless of orders to the contrary, through this purge and that over the years, Chinese farmers have



Mao, the theory runs, has ordered a nationwide easing up to mend his badly torn fences, consolidate his rule and bring the wobbly Chinese economy back on its feet. Mao's men have been ordered to show tolerance toward the political errors of those who repent, particularly if they are technologists, or specialists with special skills Experienced schoolteachers, replaced during the Cultural devolution by politically reliable but inept substitutes, are now being brought back to their old jobs.

Drug Traffic: Our Real Asian Enemy

For several years now there have been vague stories and accusations that Southeast Asian officials and other

heroin trade. These stories reached their peak in recent official reports in Washington and in an NBC television According to these reports the situation is as follows: Major opium-growing areas in Burma and Laos have long produced opium for local consumption. In recent years, an increasing amount of this opium has been refined into heroin for shipment to America. As much as



one third of the heroin on the U.S. market may come from Southeast Asia. The Shan and Meo tribesmen of Burma and Laos receive about \$20 a pound for the opium they harvest. The heroin manufactured from this pound of opium retails in the United States for about \$14,000. American attempts to suppress this business have been limited to the capture and burning of raw opium shipments and to the destrucion of a few "factories" in Burma, Thailand and Laos. Diplomatic pressure has been applied on the Thai gov-

ernment to suppress the trade and, of course, the U.S. government tries to intercept all shipments of heroin at J.S. ports of entry. By and large these efforts merely increase the price of available supplies. The potential profits of the heroin trade more than make up for the minor risks the traffickers face. There has been little or no attempt to attack the prob

Following his presentation, the Board promptly and without much discussion adopted the figure of \$154,386, a decrease of \$10,836 less than requested by the Authority. Ryan, obviously incensed by this action, decried the

whole procedure as an exercise in futility. "You had your minds made up before I came here tonight." Drummond told him that there had been several work sessions on the budget during which time, the final figures had been approved. Ryan only attended the initial session when he presented his budget for approval.

According to Florida statutes, the Port Authority must present a budget and the County Commission either approves or disapproves the total figure and sets a new figure, if required. It is not necessary for the Authority to submit a line-by-line apprasial of its budget to the commission, according to Ryan. This caused considerable flurry at the outset of budget hearings when Commissioner John Kimbrough said he did not see how they could give a blanket approval of a total figure without knowing something of the manner in which it would be used. Commissioners obviously did not appear to especially like the attitude of Ryan in his lofty citing of the statutes which stipulated that the Authority did not have to give any explanation on line items, that the Board must either approve or disapprove the total figure as presented.

Although a breakdown was submitted to the Board, the total figure as presented by the Authority was not, in fact, accepted, but was whittled to a lesser amount by the Board and it was adopted in this final form at the public hearing on





McGovern brought his campaign to Min nesota Wednesday night for today's planned speeches to the AFT and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He was in Chicago Wednesday where he received a polite but formal reception from the American Legion's national convention and held a fencemending visit with Mayor Richard J. Daley.

Nixon Plugs "World Peace"

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) - President Nixon launches his campaign for a second White House term in the Midwest and California today after telling jubilantly cheering Republicans he seeks "a new American majority" that will win the election and build peace "the world can enjoy for generations to come.

Vice President Spiro T. Agnew, meanwhile, remained behind to face reporters' questions before heading to Minneapolis Friday to speak to the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He won renomination with only one dissenting vote and two abstainers, and got a boost for the 1976 presidential nomination from Mrs. Nixon.

As the confident Republicans headed home from a convention marked by three days of harmony with barely a discordant note, antiwar protesters also began to leave after failing in their effort to stop the GOP proceedings. More than 900 demonstrators were arrested Wednesday night in a series of running clashes with police.


