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Go To the Polls and Vote

Four years ago tomorrow honest and efficient Democracy was peremptorily kicked out of the saddle and taking its place was a sinister, self-aggrandizing plutocracy which rifled our treasury, stole from the Veterans' Bureau monies meant for the defenders of this nation...

Nearly four months ago Democratic delegations, after giving the matter the most careful consideration yet recorded in political conventions, united in choosing John W. Davis as standard bearer in the fight to bring the government back to the people...

Yet Davis has kept the campaign remarkably clean. He has dealt little, if any, in personalities. He has adhered closely and earnestly to the main issues of the campaign and has given little opportunity to the opposition for back-biting.

That he will carry Florida there should be little doubt. Democrats far exceed in number followers of other party principles in Florida, and yet the day will come, and perhaps, in the not so distant future, when Democratic apathy in November elections will prove disastrous to Democratic Florida and the "Solid South" will receive another jar.

But there is another reason why every Democrat in Florida should vote in this particular election. The possibility is frequently spoken of by keen political observers that the Electoral College will be unable to make a choice and the election will be thrown into the House as it has been on two previous occasions.

The Amendments

Interest in tomorrow's election, as far as the state of Florida is concerned, centers primarily in the action of the voters upon the various amendments. Provided that the Democrats turn out in full force and vote, the election of the candidates as nominated in the Democratic primary last June is assured, and the election of the Democratic candidates pledged to John W. Davis and Charles W. Brannan is a foregone conclusion.

As the amendments appear upon the ballot, there is first the amendment relative to taxation and finance, authorizing the Legislature to provide for special rates of taxation on "intangible property".

Unquestionably greatest interest centers in another amendment relative to taxation and finance which provides that no tax upon inheritances or incomes shall be levied by the States. This amendment has previously been discussed many times in these columns.

There next appears on the ballot an amendment relative to cities and counties, which applies to Jacksonville and Duval. The purpose of the amendment in itself is excellent in that it provides for joint action of city and county officials, and does away with much of the overlapping duties, expenses and wasted salaries, but as the amendment now stands Jacksonville would reap all the benefit of such a measure.

The amendment of great importance appears fourth on the ballot and is in regard to the bonds of our State. It provides for the resumption of bond issue by local tax school districts, and limits the authorized indebtedness of such districts to twenty percent of the assessed valuation of the taxable property in such districts.

The amendment relative to census and apportionment has become a crying need of Florida since the attitude of the Legislature to ignore the present provision on reapportionment. The proposed statute and the present one are similar except that the former provides that in the event a Legislature does not effect a reapportionment during its regular session, the Governor shall call it into extraordinary session within thirty days and keep it in session until the requirements of the constitution are fulfilled.

OF VARIOUS executive abilities, no one exerted more anxious concern than that of placing the interests of our fellow-citizens in the hands of honest men, with understanding sufficient for their stations. No duty is at the same time more difficult to fulfill. The knowledge of character possessed by a single individual is of necessity limited. To seek out the best through the whole Union, we must resort to the information which from the best of men, acting disinterestedly and with the purest motives is sometimes incorrect.

PUBLICATION OF INCOME TAX LIST CALLED ILLEGAL

New York Expert Declares List is Utterly Uninformative; Man's Income Cannot Be Told by Figures Given

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—A remarkable example of the delusion to environment is that of the American income tax payers—a goldfish compelled by pitiless publicity to show itself, but at the same time endowed with power to color the glass of his bowl and distorted view of his true self.

That is the view of the income tax publicity held by Elmer Schlessinger, income tax expert of Chadbourne, Stonefield and Levy, lawyer, who considers the publication of income tax payments not only illegal but utterly uninformative. He said today:

"No one can tell by reading the lists what a man's income is. There are hundreds of ways of legally evading the payment of large taxes. Not one of them being overlooked by the business man of initiative.

"The man of medium salary is the only one who is paying the limit of taxation for his income. The operation of the tax is unfair and highly minutous, and the published lists are amusing in their absurd distortion in the real facts."

Mr. Schlessinger recalled the stamp tax on checks of post Civil war days. A \$10 check carried a 5 cent stamp tax. People there fore paid \$25 debts by five \$5 checks; ridding themselves of the tax and in this the supreme court backed them up holding that the extension of the law was done by legal methods.

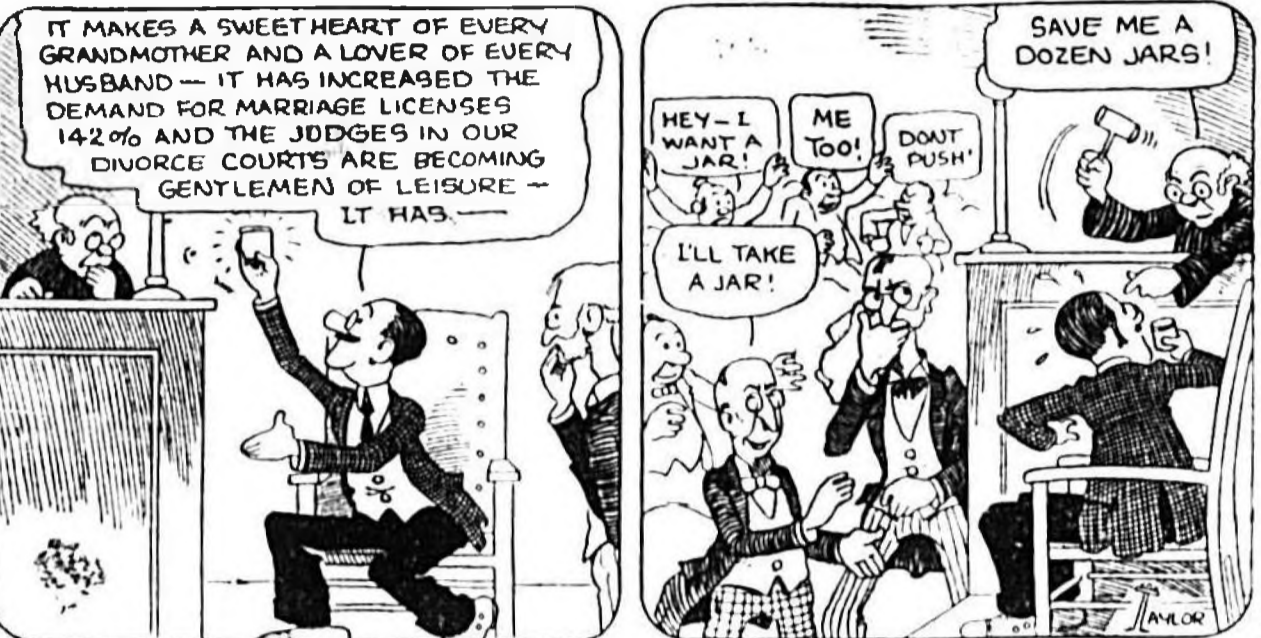
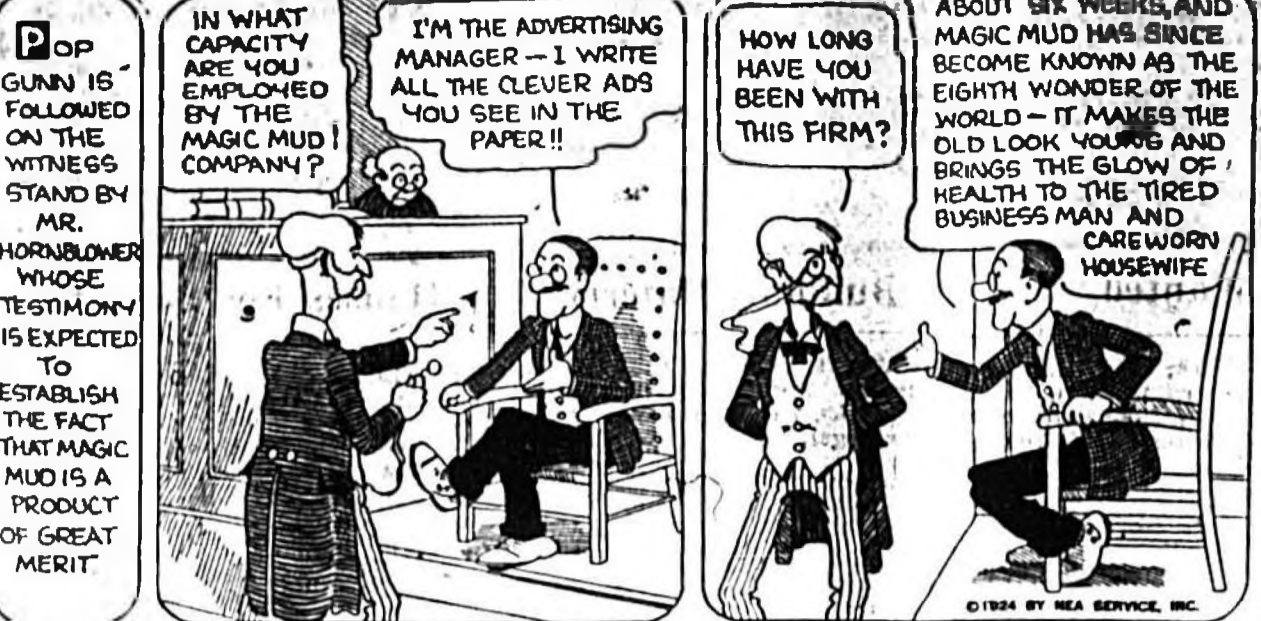
