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Lagging Enrollment May Doom 'Mellonville' Private School Faces Difficulties

By BILL SCOTT Mellonville Private School may not open in September. This was divulged last night during a meeting of the school's board of directors and parents of the 41 students officially enrolled in the 1969-70 year, grades 1-9 facility recently announced for next term in a leased building at Sanford Airport.

Speaking to a gathering of approximately 75 persons, John V. Mercer, chairman of the school's board of directors, said unless 85 students with partially paid tuition are obtained before June 15, the facility would have to suspend operations. This would mean at least 24 more registrations and the holding of those already signed.

## Probe By Kirk Will Be Asked

Investigation by the office of Gov. Claude Kirk of "the situation in Altamonte Springs" will be requested by Mayor W. Lawrence Swofford at the meeting of the City Council scheduled for 7:30 p.m. today at City Hall, the chief executive of the South Seminole city advised The Herald. The mayor conferred with the governor's office this morning.  
Swofford stated the investigation could "involve other officials in Seminole County" as well.  
To be pinpointed by the mayor, he said, is the action of three of the Altamonte councilmen, William Nickols, Albert Sabbarre and Donald Martin, in requesting a state audit and thus committing the city for expenditure of some \$5,000 in municipal funds outside a public Council meeting.  
In an air mail special delivery letter to Sen. Bill Gunter's legislative auditing committee, the trio, describing themselves as "consulting the majority of the Council of the City of Altamonte Springs," requested that "all city books be sealed and examined to the extent necessary to get a true picture."  
The letter further stated, "We understand that the cost assessed will be based upon man hours actually expended."  
Senator Gunter's office immediately ordered the a formal request for such an audit be tendered by a majority of the governing commission, Gunter's office told The Herald by telephone from Tallahassee.  
Attempt by a citizens of the city because of the action to obtain a warrant against the three for violation of "government in the sunshine" law failed.  
It was not known at press time today whether a representative of the governor's office would be present at tonight's meeting.

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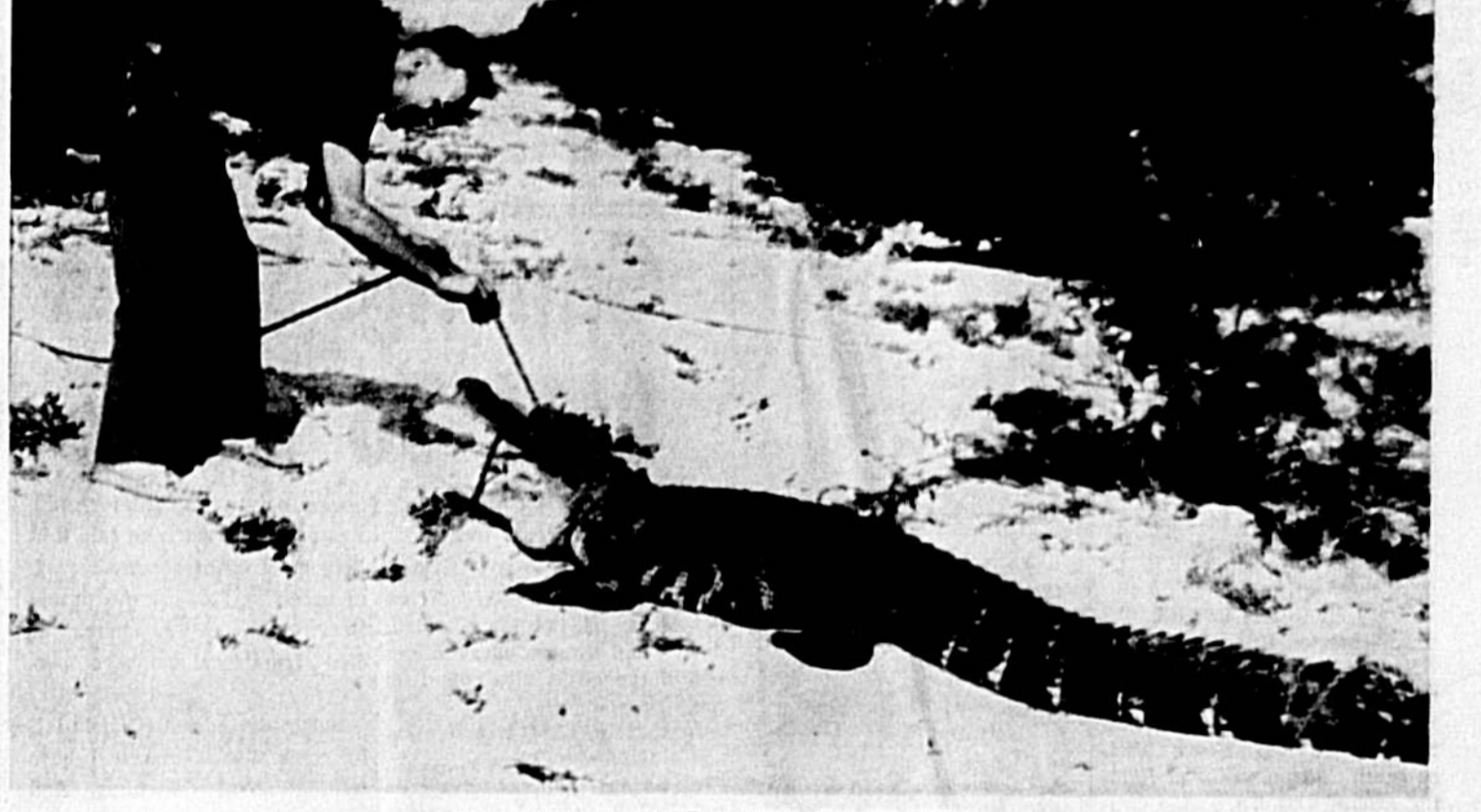

## Building Zooms To \$2.7 Million

Building permits continued at record levels in Seminole County last month for new construction valued at \$2,700,000, according to report today from the office of Robert Brown, County building inspector.  
The total did not include value for the new apartment complex, Honey Point, to be located on the corner of SR 415 and Lake Howell Road. Permit has not been issued as yet for the complex, to have 132 units.  
County Commission yesterday approved rezoning for the tract on which the apartment building is to be constructed. Plans call for the facility to have 72 two-bedroom apartments, 56 one-bedroom units and four three-bedroom units. Estimated value of the complex is not available.  
Rezoning of the tract from agriculture to R-3 was approved yesterday on a four-to-one vote, subject to site plan approval by the Planning and Zoning Commission, for their entrance approval by the State Road Department and declaration and storage lanes to be built at the expense of the developer.  
Commissioner Greg Drummond voted against the rezoning proposal, noting the lake in that area already is troubled with pollution and the large number of residents in the apartment building would further pollute the water.  
Drummond asked the members of the board and the acting director to take a tour of inspection with him to determine if a junk yard on Douglas Avenue off SR 415 is expanding its operation in violation of the law.  
The district 3 commissioner requested the Sheriff's Department to investigate trash which has been thrown near the intersection of Arden and Fairview.

## Bassett Caught In Fib

The Sanford Airport Authority bill had not been introduced in the legislature as of noon today, report from Rep. E. Pope Bassett Tuesday notwithstanding.  
Sen. William Gunter, concerned over a published report in The Herald yesterday, quoting Bassett that the bill had been placed in the hopper, telephoned at noon today, saying that "the measure has not even been typed into final draft."  
Gunter said he and Sen. Kenneth Plante have been "visibly concerned" in the matter and had contacted Bassett, secretary of the local delegation, this morning and were "informed that the measure is to be typed and would be filed this afternoon."  
Gunter also pointed out that "at this late date there is little chance the measure will be approved" since the Legislature is scheduled to adjourn sine die on Friday. He added that "I'm not attempting to bring in partisan politics but Bassett has been opposed to this bill from the start."  
"The 'Robson bill'—providing that the voters of Sanford will elect the mayor—passed the House this morning 104-0.

# Our Local Growth-Good

Sanford and North Seminole County are being removed from the U.S. Department of Commerce's "depressed area" list effective the last day of this month.  
Letters from Thomas S. Francis, Office of Development Organizations director, to Sanford Mayor Lee P. Moore and Seminole Chamber of Commerce officials disclosed that reviews of unemployment data show there is no longer any reason to designate this area as a redevelopment area under the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1968.  
Francis continued, "On the basis of unemployment data recently supplied us by the U.S. Department of Labor for our annual review, we have determined that your area no longer qualifies statistically for designation. We are obliged, therefore, to terminate its present designation, effective June 30, 1969."  
The Federal official urged a continuance of the Overall Economic Development Program (OEDP) and to renew and revise goals to meet existing circumstances.  
Latest information from the Seminole Chamber of Commerce reveal reasons for the rapidly expanding economy of the county and the inclusion of the area from the "depressed" designation.  
Industrial growth has been steady with employment increasing 141 per cent from Jan. 1, 1968, to May, 1969. Figures disclose still more jobs by 1970 with a labor force expected to climb from 18,500 to 20,000 persons.  
Manufacturing alone is expected to exceed 5,000 persons during this period.

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## Phone Firm To Expand

A building and equipment addition to the present Southern Bell Telephone Company Sanford-Pairfax office will be started this month and is expected to cost a total of \$508,000.
