Burns May Turn Down SIC Post

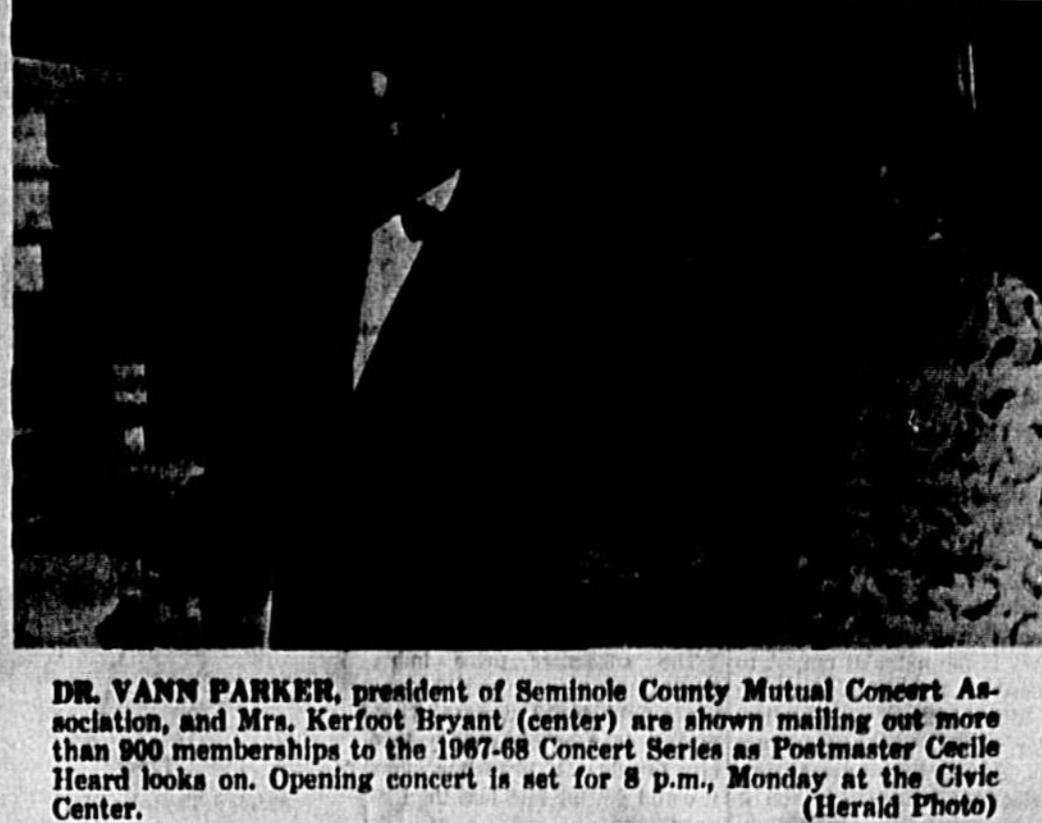

Port Hearing On Acquiring Land Stated

Hearing on a petition of "order of taking" in land condemnation proceedings by the Seminole County Port Authority will be held before Circuit Judge Tom Waddell at 1 p.m. Nov. 21.

Authority directors were informed last night of the hearing date by Attorney Gordon Frederick, who said the court will decide how much cash and 100-plus per cent of appraised value—the Authority will be required to place in escrow until the actual value is determined in later condemnation hearings.

With the order of taking approved, the Authority may proceed to acquire use of needed land for the Port of Sanford on the St. Johns River prior to the actual acquisition of title. This will permit the Authority to proceed with engineering plans and construction.

The Authority will be required to borrow from local banks to meet the amount ordered by the court to be placed in escrow. This loan will be repaid later from the sale of bonds.

Preliminary sketches by the engineers of the port layout were presented to the directors for their study by Administrator Francis Roumillat. Final plans are to be ready about January 7.

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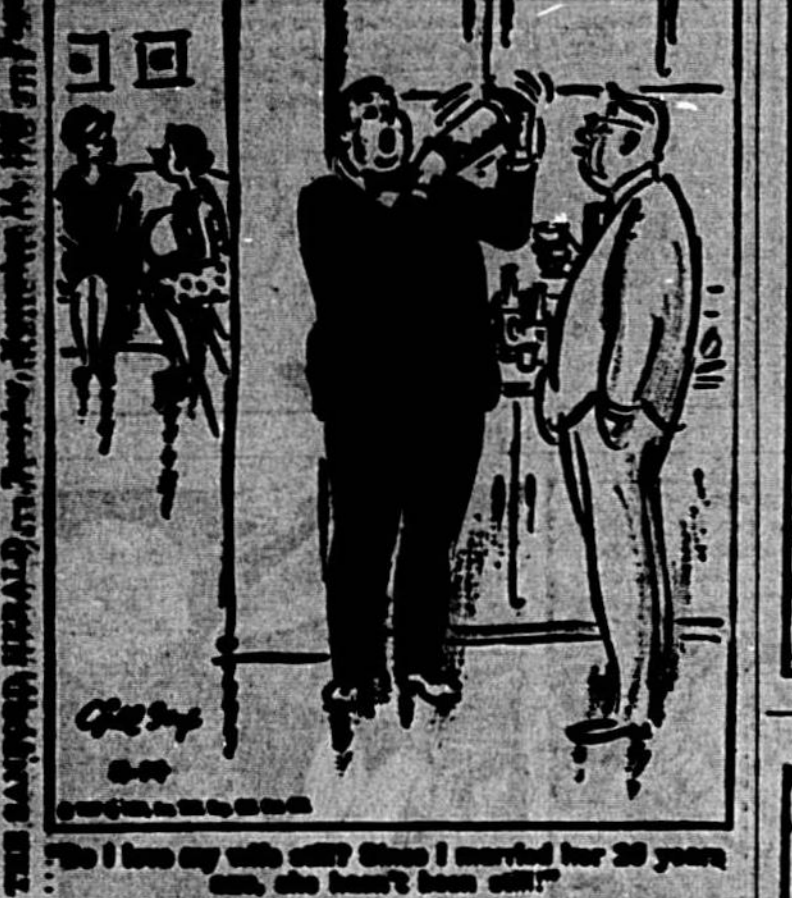

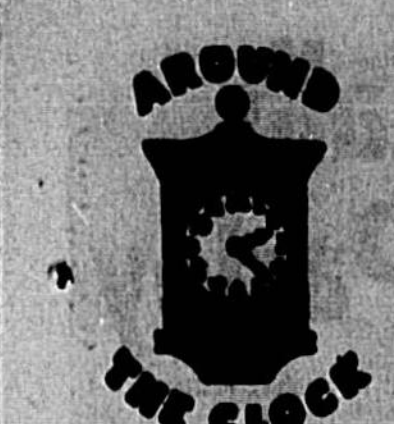
