## Casselberry mom released from jail

The bond of a Casselberry woman who locked her two kids and dog in a self storage unit was reduced from \$50,000 to nothing Tuesday.

In his order setting conditions of release, Circuit Judge O.H. Eaton Jr. wrote, "The fact the children are in protective custody is serious incentive for her to remain in Seminole County to answer to these charges."

Eaton used several facts about Adrienne Johnson to support his decision. He listed that she has no prior convictions for any offense, has lived in Seminole County for six years, lost her job as a nurse aide as a result of incarceration and has no substantial funds to pay the current bond.

"The facts of this case appear to be easily established, but the defendant is not a flight risk," Eaton wrote. "The possible penalties in this case are serious but there is no minimum mandatory penalty."

"The factors required to be considered in determining conditions for pretrial release should be without monetary conditions. There is no reason in this record for the bond to have been increased to \$50,000. Such a substantial increase leads to the conclusion that the bond was increased for the purpose of keeping the defendant in custody rather than by any reason authorized by law. If that was the reason, it was clearly erroneous."

# HUD: No rush to hire director

SANFORD — In a reversal of an earlier mandate, top-level officials from the Department of Housing and Urban Development now say there is no hurry to hire an executive director for the Sanford Housing Authority.

The newly appointed SHA Board of Commissioners, which met for the first

time in mid-May, attempted to meet a HUD imposed July 1 deadline to hire a new director. Despite concerns from Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard and members of the SHA board about the feasibility of meeting the deadline, HUD officials refused to alter the deadline.

The board missed the deadline, and last week Kenneth Armstrong of Ormond Beach rejected an offer to take the job after contract negotiations with HUD broke

down. He was the second candidate to decline the job offer.

On Monday, HUD's position on the deadline changed when Catherine Lamberg said hiring a new director could be put on the "back burner" since specialists from the Troubled Agency Recovery Center (TARC) are currently working in Sanford. Lamberg is the director of TARC.

"I don't know that there is a great rush to hire an executive director," Lamberg

said during a meeting with Lessard and Deputy City Manager Roger Dixon. "I would suggest to the board let's put on the back burner the task of hiring an ED. I would be concerned if the board advertised for the position immediately."

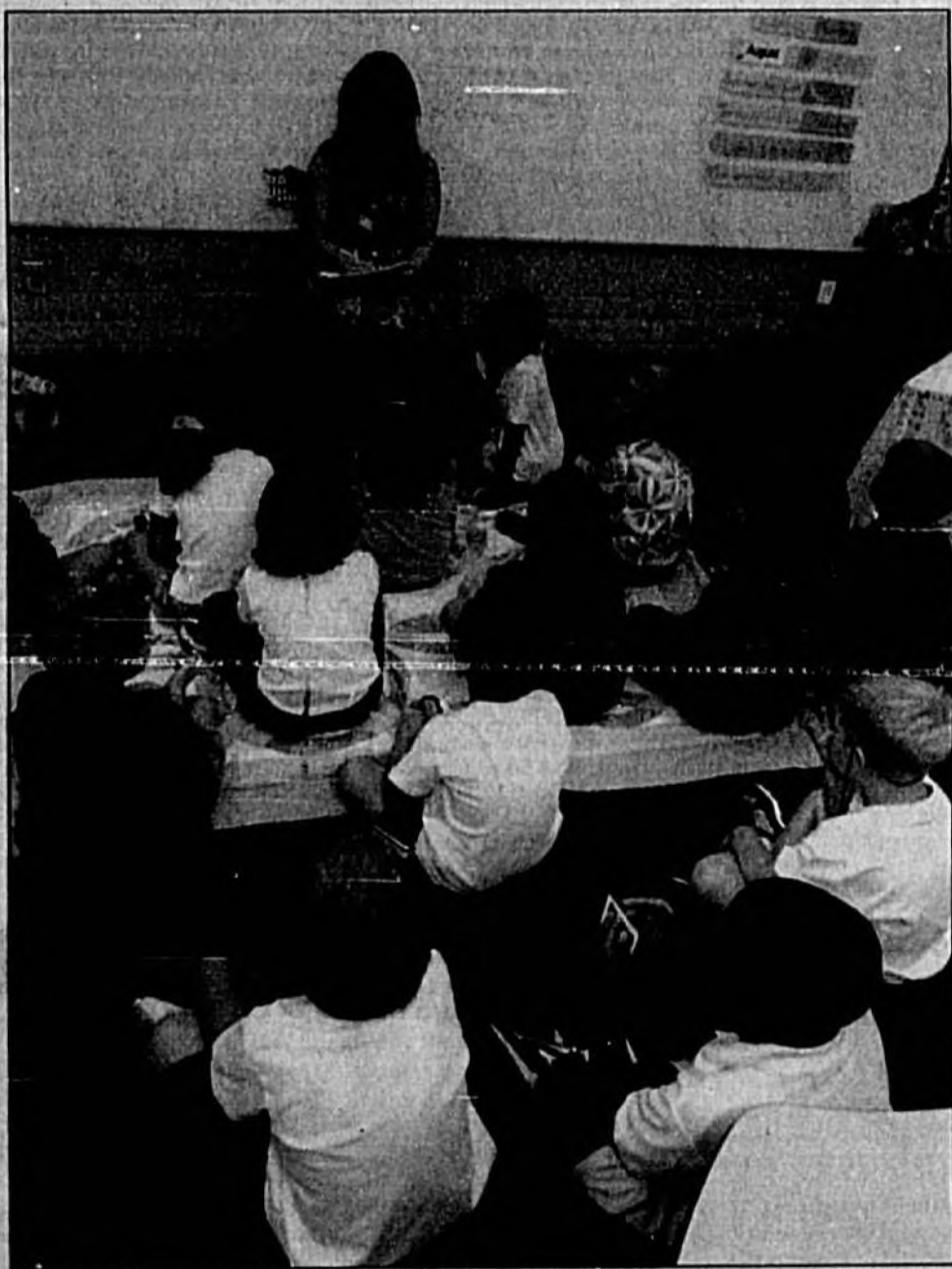
"In this industry we have many mishaps," she added. "This was a mishap."

# Police nab 10 in drug sting

SANFORD — A day after a Sanford resident was almost bludgeoned to death during an apparent drug deal gone sour, Sanford police set up an undercover crack cocaine sting at the same corner.

Within minutes of an unmarked vehicle pulling up to the corner of Cypress Avenue and 5th Street Friday morning, Willie Hill Jr., 30, and Cedric Centall, 21, tried to sell undercover agents crack cocaine.

Hill was immediately apprehended, but Centall ran to a nearby house. He was locked out of the house and began shouting, "I didn't do anything, let me in."

Centall was charged with the sell and delivery of crack cocaine, possession with intent to sell crack cocaine and resisting an officer without violence. Hill was charged with possession of drug paraphernalia and criminal attempt to solicit drugs.

With the dealers off the corner, police set up shop and waited for the dealers' customers to buy more drugs.

Two undercover agents dressed in plain clothes milled around the corner riding bikes, selling crack or marijuana to anyone that requested it. A wire

was attached to each officer and the conversations were picked up by listening devices in a nearby vehicle. Ten agents in five unmarked vehicles waited at strategic points around the corner. With the phrase "it's a go" the vehicles raced to the destination and surrounded the

# Art festival gets a boost from Target

LAKE MARY — The Lake Mary/Heathrow Festival of the Arts received a large show of support last week when Target Corporation presented the group with a \$10,000 grant.

Numerous local organizations and businesses, including the Target Corporation, sponsor the arts festival each year to support local artists and students, said Tony Senador, vice chairman of the festival's 2001 board of directors. Scheduled to begin Saturday, Oct. 6, the 15th annual art show will highlight more than 250 artists, including work from Seminole students.

"The Target Corporation family of giving programs, comprised of Target, Marshall Field's and Mervyn's, is proud to support nonprofit organizations that make our communities a better

place to live and work," said Tracy Ronning, Target Corporation community relations grants coordinator.

Target Corporation is committed to giving 5 percent of its federally taxable income to the communities in which it operates stores, Ronning said. This year, it will give almost \$86 million to nonprofit organizations nationwide.

Each year, money raised from the festival goes toward scholarships for students at all seven Seminole High Schools, Senador said. Since 1986, almost \$1.5 million has been distributed to more than 250 high school students.

According to festival organizers, the success of the Lake Mary/Heathrow Festival of the Arts, which Sunshine Artist Magazines recently included in its top 200 art shows in the

# Couple donates life-saving equipment to sheriff's office

SANFORD — Seminole County Sheriff Don Eslinger was the recipient of the office's first defibrillator, a life-saving device that is popping up in numerous public places, including on the walls of local courthouses.

Jean and Norm Gould, owners of Gould Publishing in Winter Springs, donated the first defibrillator to the Sheriff's Office Monday after working more than a year to raise funds. According to Eslinger, it's the first step in adding the life sav-

ing device to all the sheriff's squad cars.

"These are badly needed by law enforcement and we want the Seminole County Sheriff's Office to be the most advanced," said Jean. "We're hoping other businesses will follow."

The \$4,000 device is about the size of a laptop computer and helps kick start the heart when a patient suffers from an heart attack.

"We're not doing it for the publicity," Jean said. "Our hanks will come when they call us up and say today we helped save a life."

Having defibrillators in public places and in squad cars is nothing new to Brevard County residents. In 1999, local hospitals donated five defibrillators and they were placed in the Brevard County courthouses.

Last year, the Brevard County Sheriff's Office purchased 68 more defibrillators with a \$100,000 grant and \$20,000 of their own money. According to Joan Heller of BCSO, a few were kept for training and specialty units, but the majority of the devices

A GLANCE AROUND OUR COUNTY

## Population explosion

With the start of another school, here is another look at the statistics compiled recently by the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB). The figures in the publication relate to 16 southeastern states, as far north as Delaware, and as far west as Texas and Oklahoma.

Recently, I reported on the population explosion expected in Florida, (383.5 new people per day, from the year 2000 to 2010). This time, let's look at the educational statistics. Florida ranks first of all these states in the number of public high school graduates expected from 2001 to 2010. While the national average and the average of the southeast states are both expected to grow by 10 percent, Florida's graduate level is predicted to grow at 24 percent, 25,500 grads during this period. It should be noted, six of the 16 states expect a decline in high school graduates, as much as down 12 percent in Louisiana.

Of these graduates, 51 percent are listed as minorities.

How about our adults? How many are high school graduates. For the year 2000, the SREB says Florida is even with the national average of 84 percent. For college graduates however, Florida has 23 percent of the population, while the national average is 26 percent, although we did increase by 5.3 percent since the previous survey in 1999.

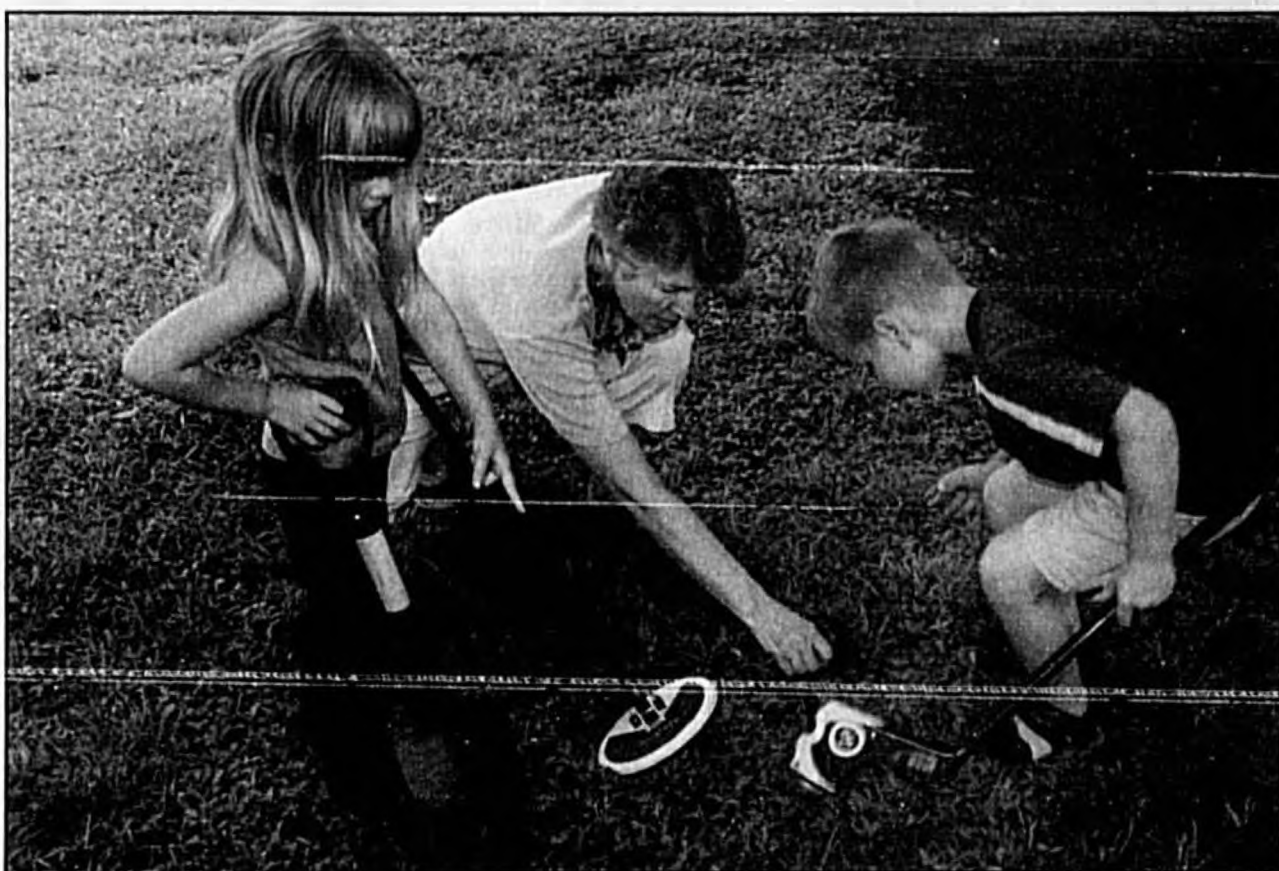
Florida is right at the southeastern level of 18 to 24 year olds planning to go to college part time or full time - 29 percent of the high school graduates. Here, Delaware scored highest with 40 percent planning to attend college.

Florida is considered a net-importer of college students. For the first time, the SREB figures showed more people coming into Florida to attend college, than leaving to attend college in other states. In 1998, the latest figures showed over 13,500 students attending college in Florida, who lived in other states. This certainly says something about the high quality of education being offered in Florida these days.

The cost of attending college has increased in almost every state from 1995 to 2000, with the exceptions of Virginia and Kentucky. Florida's annual tuition and fees costs accounted for 6.5 percent of the median household income, compared with the national average of 7.7 percent. It should be also noted that the number of students receiving financial aid in scholarships and grants amounted to 47 percent. But only 21 percent were from state grants. The rest were from other sources.

What is my purpose in citing these statistics? Only to make people aware of what has been and is presently going on in our high schools and colleges, in the hopes that school leaders will act accordingly to compensate for this unbelievable increase in Florida residents, and the high school and college age youngsters they will be bringing with them.

## Keeping it Green Lake Mary should be commended for its conservation project

Lake Mary City Commission members realize the importance of keeping its city green. With its unanimous approval last week of the proposed Lake Mary Conservation Project, the commissioners emphasized their commitment to the environment.

The Lake Mary Conservation Project, created by city staff, Mayor Thom Greene and former City Attorney Donna McIntosh, creates a foundation for the city's policy on land conservation and preservation. It was created to promote the preservation of wetlands and other green areas for their ecological value to its residents — something that often can be overlooked during periods of rapid growth.

Since the city's incorporation in 1973, recreational green areas have been an important factor in Lake Mary's growth plan. Over the years, a progressive parks and recreation program has been established within the city. Liberty Park, the Sports Complex, Central Park and other neighborhood parks dot the city's map.

Now, the city is focusing on preservation. It hasn't been the easiest objective to meet. Although the city applied and then was approved for two state Preservation 2000 grants, various obstacles stopped the city from acquiring land for preservation areas.

However, the city didn't let a little disappointment stop plans for preservation. Instead, when Darrell and Bettye Leidigh announced plans to donate several acres of wetlands to the city, the idea for the city's Conservation Project was created.

The Conservation Project encourages developers and residents to donate wetlands or other green areas to the city. According to city staff, several developers have already expressed interest in contributing to the project, and hopefully many more will do the same in the future. Under the city's management, the areas will become an ecological preserves within the city's residential and business areas.

Not everyone can donate land to the city. But, Lake Mary residents can be thankful they have a City Commission that is looking out for their ecological welfare. And, if you do own some wetlands that you can't find a use for — keep the Lake Mary Conservation Project in mind. No one could ask for a better legacy.

## Sting Kings Sanford's police department is using an aggressive strategy to combat crime

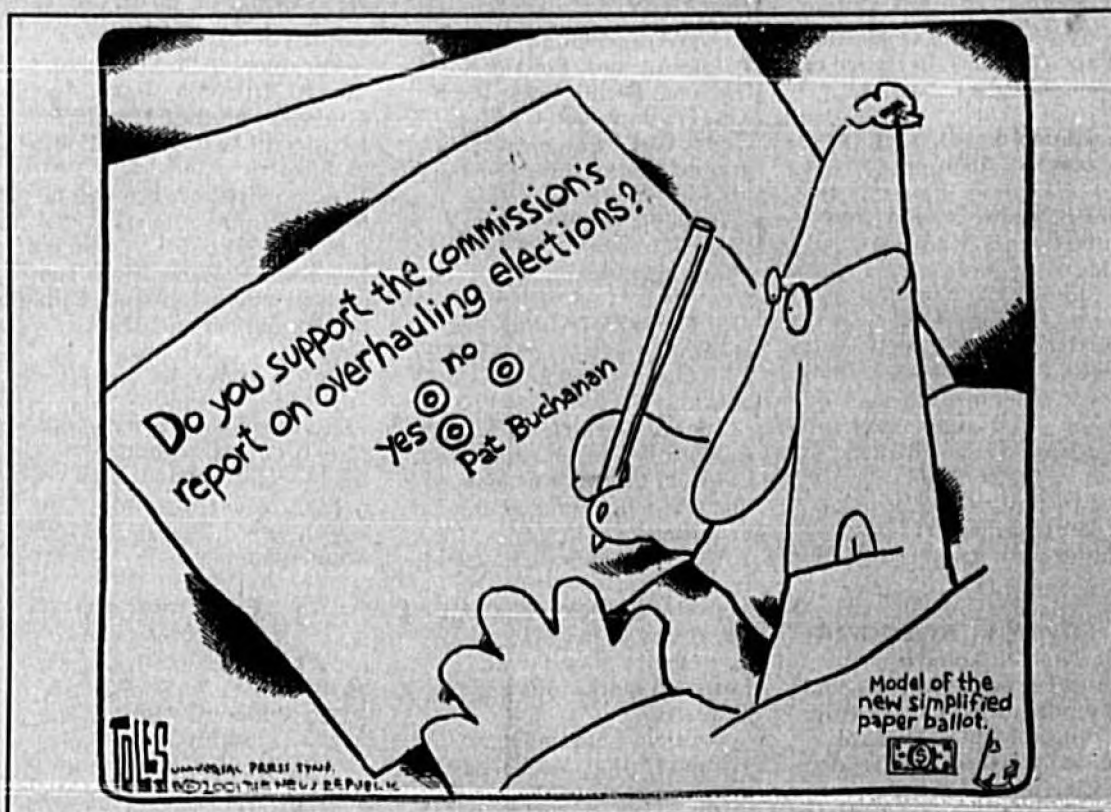
"This is the fourth time this has happened." That was Volena Eckhardt's comment after being arrested for buying drugs Friday afternoon. She's beginning to get the message: Commit crime in Sanford and you're going to get caught.

Eckhardt's arrest was the result of an aggressive strategy the Sanford Police Department has used in recent weeks to combat drug dealing and prostitution. As the department has received confirmation of illicit activities, officers have responded with mini-sting operations, usually conducted within 24 hours of receiving the complaint.

On Thursday, a woman was seriously injured in a botched drug deal. No arrests have been made in that case, but Eckhardt and nine others, including two dealers, were arrested at the same location the next day as a result of a police sting. Those are typical results for the stings the department has been running.

To be sure, these tactics alone want solve Sanford's crime problem. As in Eckhardt's case, many of those stung in sting operations have multiple arrests and are low-level criminals. The arrests will pile up, however, and the courts will be forced to take appropriate action. Continuous undercover operations will also force dealers and hookers to move their operations. Furthermore, these types of police activities lead officers to those running criminal operations, taking a bigger bite out of Sanford crime.

Scoring and whoring won't be eliminated overnight, but Sanford Police Chief Brian Tooley's decision to be more aggressive will pay dividends in the long run.

# The downsizing of government

"Quiet revolution" is a phrase *The Wall Street Journal* has used to describe the governing of George W. Bush. The paper is not talking about new laws or presidential visions, just reporting on the making, remaking and enforcement of the tens of thousands of regulations and regulators that make up a substantial part of the power of the executive branch of the U.S. government.

Republicans have usually been better than Democrats at using that power, particularly over the past 30 years or so. President Clinton came to Washington thinking the chief executive's job was rousing the people and legislating away problems — making speeches and laws — and he began to understand the quieter powers only in his later years.

Bush and the men who came to Washington with him began on day one. *Journal* headlines told some of that story: "Under President Bush, Regulatory Rollback Has a Major Impact" and "From Banks to Baby Belts, Corporate Donors Gain From Cutting Red Tape."

Among the quiet moves that the *Journal* and others have reported on are these: reducing the number of enforcement officers in the Environmental Protection Agency by 10 percent, a cut of 270 positions; reducing the schedule of inspections and surveys of nursing homes; reducing disclosure requirements in corporate reports to the Internal Revenue Service; back-

ing down on Federal Communications Commission orders for audits of telephone companies, which just happened to be among the largest contributors to Bush's presidential campaign; and using advisories instead of enforcement orders on more and more complaints to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

Those are the ones we know about so far. But there are apparently many more in the quiet works. The administration is determined to downsize government.

One of the reasons Bush is able to move so quickly on this Republican agenda is that there are so many old (or experienced) Republicans in his administration. Republicans from Richard Nixon to Gerald Ford, Ronald Reagan and the two Bushes have controlled the White House for 20 of the last 32 years. The party has cadres of talented men and women who know how the executive branch actually works. They know where the bathrooms are and where the bureaucratic bodies are buried. The best exam-

ple of that expertise is the continuing partnership of Vice President Richard Cheney and his mentor, Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld, who was in both Congress and the White House during the Nixon administration. When Gerald Ford succeeded Nixon in 1974, Rumsfeld became White House chief of staff; when he was named secretary of defense for the first time, he was succeeded as chief of staff by his deputy, young Dick Cheney.

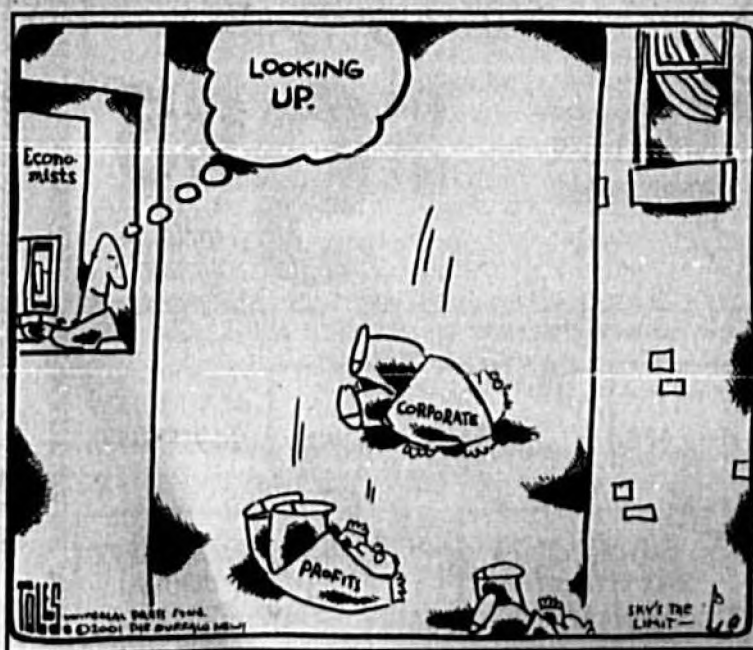
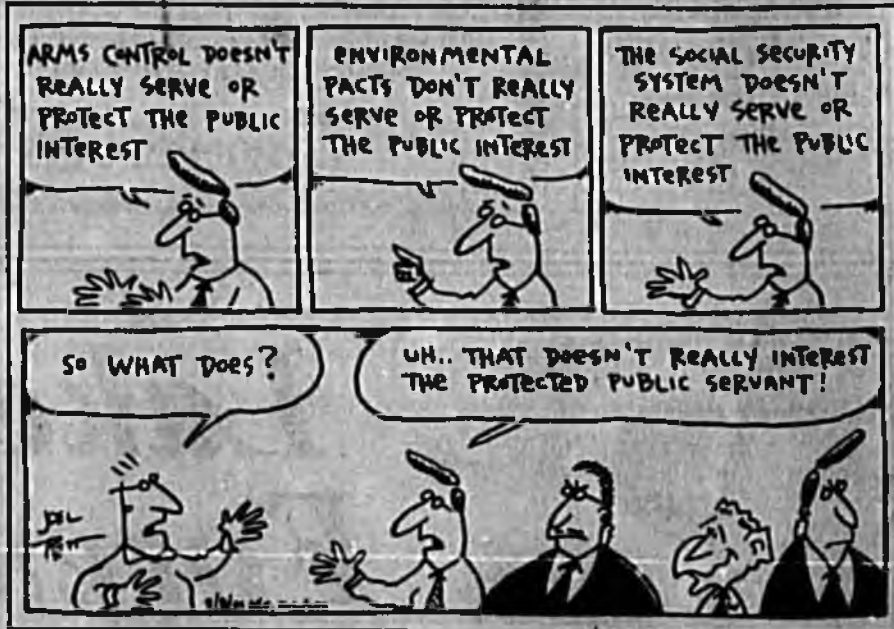
In the years between Ford and George W. Bush, Rumsfeld thrived in the private sector as chief executive of G.D. Searle and Co., a worldwide pharmaceutical company, and then became chairman of General Instrument Corp. But he did not

lose his interest in government and in downsizing its operations.

In 1995, Rumsfeld, a former congressman himself, gave a speech at The Heartland Institute filled with downsizing advice to the new Republican majority in Congress, saying: "Probably one-half to two-thirds of the federal government's non-central departments are no longer needed in their current form... Whatever Congress does to downsize the federal government, the odds are overwhelming that it should be doing more, rather than less, and that it should be doing it sooner, rather than later."

Now the party has the White House and is quietly doing just that, for better or worse.

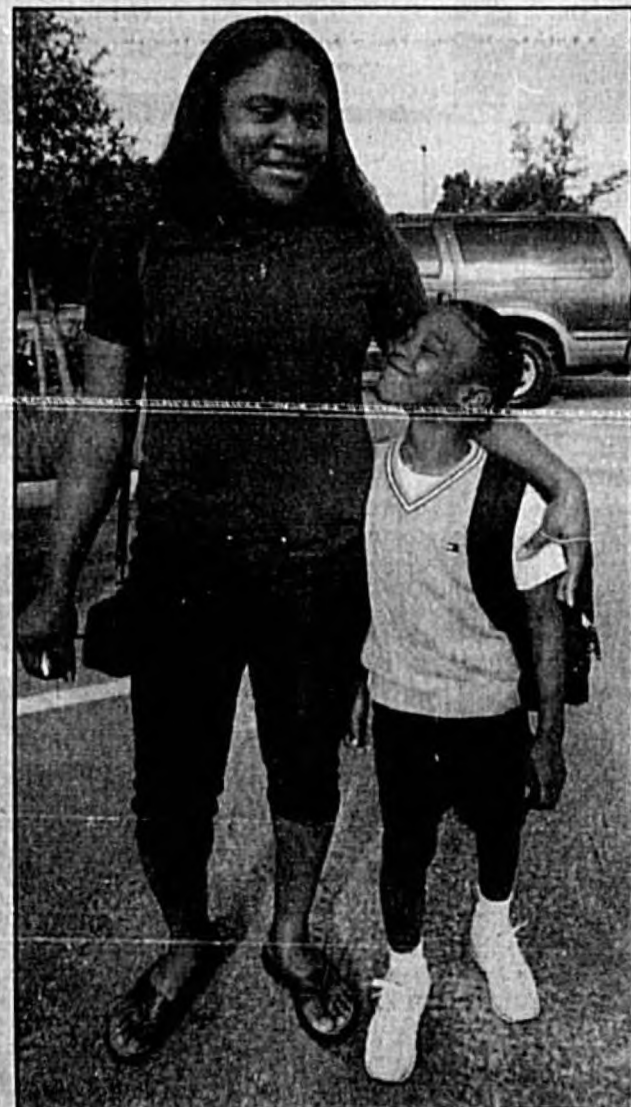

## Muscadine grapes: Perfect for home or garden

The muscadine grape is native to Florida and has been cultivated in the state for many years. It is harvested as single berries instead of in bunches and has smaller leaves and fruit with thicker skins than the bunch-type grapes.

of propagating muscadines. In June, peg a long cane into a trench dug in the ground leaving the cane attached to the vine.

Make a slight cut at the bottom of the cane to promote root production and cover the wounded part with soil. Leave the shoot tips exposed. The layers are uncovered and rooted shoots are separated from the mother cane in the winter.

**Planting**  
Grapes are adapted to a wide range of soils, including most of those suitable for citrus culture. Fine sands and upland soils, especially those with underlying clay at about 3 feet, are ideal for grapes along with well-drained clay soils. Usual planting time is in the later part of the dormant season — February in Central

Florida.

**Trellising**

The two- and three-wire systems are the most common vertical trellises used for growing grapes. The wires are run at heights of 2.5 and 5 feet for the two-wire type and 2, 4, and 6 feet for the three-wire system. Pruning the vines on the two-wire system is less time-consuming than on the three-wire system, which should be used only on small plantings.

**Training**

The first year set a 5.5-foot stake next to each plant space and tie the stake permanently to the top wire of the trellis. As shoots appear from the set plant, select the healthiest shoot and secure it to the stake with string. Remove all other shoots. The selected shoot eventually becomes the trunk of the vine.

It is important to keep the vine growing straight up the stake by (a) tying often and (b) removing all lateral and base sprouts often. Be sure to leave at least one lateral shoot to grow each way on the bottom trellis wire. The shoot should be cut off when it reaches

the top wire to let lateral stems grow each way along the top wire.

**Pruning**

Prune all branches that are less than 3/16 inch in diameter, leaving two to three buds per spur, depending on the vigor of the branch. Remove most of the spurs located at the top of the trunk to prevent crowding and bushiness, which will interfere with harvest. Renew arms that are no longer vigorous. The approximate periods for dormant pruning in Central Florida are January and February.

**Irrigation**

Many first-year grape plants in Florida vineyards have died from lack of soil moisture. Apply 1 to 1 1/2 inches of water every two weeks during April and May. Older plants will also respond to irrigation.

**Harvest**

Muscadines mature in August and early September. They should be picked from the vines and stored at 40 degrees if not processed into jellies, jams, or wine.

# Local lawyers grade judges

SANFORD — Defense attorneys and prosecutors throughout Central Florida recently graded circuit judges in Seminole, Orange and Ocala counties; county judges in Seminole, Orange and Ocala counties and federal judges in Orlando on a 5-point scale.

Judges were graded in five categories — legal knowledge, impartiality, freedom from bias, demeanor and diligence — and then the five categories were averaged for an overall score. Attorneys also had the chance to write anonymous remarks about the judges' performance.

While several judges said they used the poll to help them improve from year to year, one Seminole County attorney is not in favor of the process.

Fern Park attorney and president of the Seminole County Bar Association, Gary Siegel, said the poll may not reflect the opinions of the majority. Only 116 ballots made up the poll, but according to Siegel there is thousands of practicing attorneys in

Central Florida.

"You've got maybe 5,000 lawyers in Central Florida and they could only get a 100 of them to fill this thing out," Siegel said. "It's just not a good sample and I don't think it's valid."

Topping the list with the highest overall rating was 18th Judicial Circuit Judge Kenneth Lester Jr. with a 4.39. However fellow Seminole circuit judges, O.H. Eaton Jr. and Alan Dickey, were close behind with the marks of 4.35 and 4.19 respectively.

"One of the things that gives that poll credibility is they allow prosecutors a chance to participate," Dickey said. "I give it quite a bit of credibility. This year had fewer comments than prior years. When there is a lot of comments it can be more helpful."

While Siegel said he's in favor of the comments portion of the poll, it too is sometimes tainted by attorneys who "have an ax to grind."

"Constructive criticism helps the system move along more smoothly," said Siegel. "If you don't think he's doing some-

thing right then write it down, but what you get in some cases is they (attorneys) will hide behind this anonymity and make vicious statements."

One comment toward Seminole County Judge Ralph Eriksson states "Too immature. These are peoples' lives. Court feels like a high school."

"How is the public going to benefit from statements like that?" Siegel questioned about the comment. "That is a sign of immaturity to write something like that — that's high school."

According to Eaton, the poll "is a significance to everybody." But, when questioned if it was helpful for improvement he was not as sure.

"I think it's helpful if you are on the top and near the bottom, but I don't know how helpful they are when in you're in the middle," Eaton said. "When people go out of their way to write complimentary comments it makes you feel like you're doing something right."

Lester said he believed the poll results were accurate because only a handful of attorneys practice criminal law full-time.

"I think it gives you a fairly accurate indication of how you're doing," said Lester. "I basically see the same attorneys over and over again. I think the vast majority of those respondents are filling out these polls."

According to Lester, many of the "general practitioners" or "street lawyers" who only practice criminal law part-time are the ones that may not be accounted for in the poll, but he sees them only "sporadically" in his courtroom.

Other Seminole County judges were rated including a 3.29 for Carmine Bravo, a 3.55 for Ralph Eriksson, a 3.46 for Mark Herr, a 3.44 for Donald Marblestone and a 2.81 for John Sloop.

Seminole County Circuit Court Judge Thomas Freeman received a 2.72, but according to Siegel that mark is suspect because Freeman has primarily been hearing juvenile cases and seeing only a handful of criminal attorneys.

were placed in squad cars.

"We've got people alive that would not be otherwise," said Heller. "We started off with them in the courthouse. Now we have them scattered throughout the county. We try to have one a car — every shift — in each area of the county."

In less than a year the defibrillators have saved three lives. An 8-hour training period helps deputies learn how to use the defibrillator, but the machine also tells deputies when to administer the shock.

This past weekend two deputies responded to Merritt Island where a 73-year-old Orlando man had an apparent heart attack when crabbing with his grandson. According to Heller, deputies attached the defibrillator, but the machine

said not to shock.

"It makes everyone look like a genius because they're so easy to use," said Jean's son Bruce Gould.

Just weeks after receiving the donated defibrillators, the Titusville courthouse used one in October 1999 to help a susceptible juror regain his heartbeat.

In March of this year, a 39-year-old DeLand woman collapsed at a soccer game in Palm Bay. A deputy had just gone off duty and was watching his son

play soccer. The deputy used the defibrillator from his squad car and saved the woman's life.

Most recently, on June 27, a 70-year-old Melbourne man collapsed in traffic court. According to Heller, the man had no pulse or respiration. Four shocks from the defibrillator and the man was transported to the hospital in stable condition.

The Orange County Sheriff's Office is not as advanced as Brevard, but they still have

seven more life saving machines than Seminole.

Two of them are placed at training facilities in the county to help deputies learn and utilize the tool. Another five are assigned to the court services.

According to police, the defibrillators were acquired last year as part of grant, but have not been used to save a life as of yet.

## Air rescue team finds missing man

SANFORD — Seminole County's Air Rescue 3 helicopter, which is jointly owned and operated by the county's EMS/fire/rescue and the sheriff's office, assisted Monday morning in finding a lost 91-year-old male.

According to program manager Lt. Mike Johansmeyer, the two-year-old joint helicopter program is quickly paying dividends with the find of the elderly male being its "most significant success in the recent past."

The male was located at 10 a.m. almost 100 feet into a heavily wooded area near the Summerlin Avenue and Celery Avenue region. He was reported

missing since the Sunday evening.

According to Johansmeyer, ground units were unable to penetrate the wooded area, but the "eagle in the sky" spotted the man in a clearing in the woods.

Flying 500 feet above the area in a one mile radius, Flight Officer Rob Hemmert of the sheriff's office spotted the missing male and Flight Medic Mitch Ransom of EMS/fire/rescue confirmed it was a man fitting the description.

The Air Rescue 3 helicopter has three primary uses, said Johansmeyer. The helicopter is used to transport critical patients to hospitals, combat brush fires and for search and rescue missions.

Although, the helicopter's

crew is not fully trained in technical rescues like water recoveries, Monday's operation was just doing what all crew members are trained to do, said Johansmeyer.

"Crew personnel in general — not just pilots or medics — are trained to be aware what is going on around and below the aircraft," he said.

Currently, the crew is getting ready to start training for more technical rescues. The training is in the "beginning stages" and could take some time as Johansmeyer said its very important to make sure "everybody is well-trained" when attempting technical rescues.

drug buyer.

Eight people were arrested for trying to purchase drugs from an undercover officer in Friday's sting. While the operation was intense at times, it was a patient waiting game for the officers.

"It's pretty neat when everything goes right which is the majority of the time," said Sanford Investigator Frank Hilton as he waited behind the wheel of an unmarked vehicle.

After a half hour of waiting, the call came and Hilton was in hot pursuit of a woman driving a mini-van who had just purchased crack from the undercover agent. Volena Eckhardt, 53, of Sanford was quickly corralled, but not before she threw the evidence out the window.

As officers pulled her out the car she informed them, "You have no evidence."

Hilton calmly walked less than 50 yards down the road and picked up the bag of crack.

Eckhardt reaction: "This is the fourth time this has happened."

Back at their starting point 15 minutes later, Hilton radioed in.

"31 is back in the pocket," he said, letting his colleagues know he was ready for another take-down.

"There's no discrimination when it comes to this rock," Hilton said as he patiently awaited another crack buyer. "There's no age limits. The crack has no levels — teachers, doctors."

Hilton's sting partner, Mark Padgett from the Winter Springs Police Department, added "I'll tell you what, I've seen a lot of

people get on crack. It really takes them downhill."

Thirty minutes later, a homeless man walked up and purchased crack from the undercover agents. Richard Davis, 59, made little attempt to resist officers as they surrounded him.

Hilton said he rarely worries that crack buyers may be carrying a gun.

"You find very few crack heads with a gun because if they had one, they would sell it for crack," he explained.

The sting wasn't without its glitches as one of the pursuit vehicles suffered a flat tire and was out of commission for some time, but with little activity the loss of the vehicle didn't hurt the operation.

"This is nothing like it used to be before — it was really bad," Hilton said about the crack on the streets of Sanford. "We wouldn't have all this down time before."

Assisting in Friday's operation was the Winter Springs and Altamonte Springs police departments. Also standing by was the Sanford Fire Department for medical assistance in case any suspect tried to swallow the crack before being arrested.

In addition to Eckhardt and Davis, others arrested for purchasing crack or marijuana were Roger Cheshire, 51, Terry Wheeler, 32, Dave Crowe, 47, John Perkins, 44, Marquax Manning, 21, Audrey Defreese, 45, all of Sanford.

# Sheriff warns of local credit card fraud

If you have recently purchased merchandise at the K-Mart in Winter Springs or eaten at the Bistro Cappuccino in Lake Mary you might want to check your credit card bill, according to Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

On Aug. 5, investigators of the Economic Crimes Unit responded to K-Mart in reference to

employees using stolen credit cards.

Check out clerks Lesina Samalayco Suisala, 22, and her stepsister, Erika Gonzalez, 18, were arrested and charged with scheming to defraud.

The two allegedly kept customers' credit cards after they made purchases.

Customers, in their haste, forgot to ask for the cards back and apparently the stepsisters would

use the cards at each other's registers.

So far, about a half dozen victims have been identified.

The plot thickened Tuesday as investigators noticed the accounts of customers who dined at a now defunct Lake Mary restaurant, Bistro Cappuccino, had duplicate charges after the restaurant had gone out of business in May.

Some of the victims state that

they had not eaten at the restaurant in months, in one case, nine months. Victims stated that the FBI has been in contact with them regarding the case.

Seven victims have been identified in the case.

The SCSO is wondering if there are more victims in either of these cases and is asking other victims to call 407-665-6904 to speak to the Economic Crimes Unit.

Lamberg clarified her statements after the meeting, adding that the decision about how to proceed with hiring a new director would "absolutely be left up to the board."

"The executive director is absolutely a critical position, and it would be most beneficial to have a director in place," Lamberg said. "But whether we have a director or don't have a director does not halt the recovery of this agency. My contractor (M.D. Strum) is on the ground fulfilling their obligations, and the recovery team members are busy going about the task of turning this housing authority around."

Pointing to the job her team has done, Lamberg said all of the life-safety electrical problems had been fixed throughout the SHA complexes and that all of the vacate units except those at Lake Monroe Terrace will be ready for occupancy by December.

"Recovery is occurring," Lamberg said.

Board chairman Joe Davis did not attend Monday's meeting. Contacted by phone, Davis said he will urge the board to move at its own pace to hire a new director.

"We're going to take our time," Davis said. "This is on our schedule now."

Board member Angelia Gordon agreed with Davis.

"I'm glad to here they want to give us some time," Gordon said. "I think with TARC in there, we will be all right, as long as HUD keeps those people in place. My major concern is that we establish the appropriate process for hiring a new director. I think TARC tried to move too quickly, and they put us in this position."

"I can't speak for the rest of the board," Gordon said, "but I can tell you I will not vote to go forward with hiring a new director until we have the process in place."

That process, according to Gordon, will include establishing a salary and benefits package before advertising for the job, as well as determining how candidates will be evaluated and interviewed.

"This is our decision to make, not HUD's," Gordon said. "This is going to be a methodical process, but that doesn't necessarily mean it's going to be slow."

The board's agenda for tonight's meeting does not include an item concerning hiring a new director. Gordon said she anticipates the board may discuss putting the item on a future agenda.

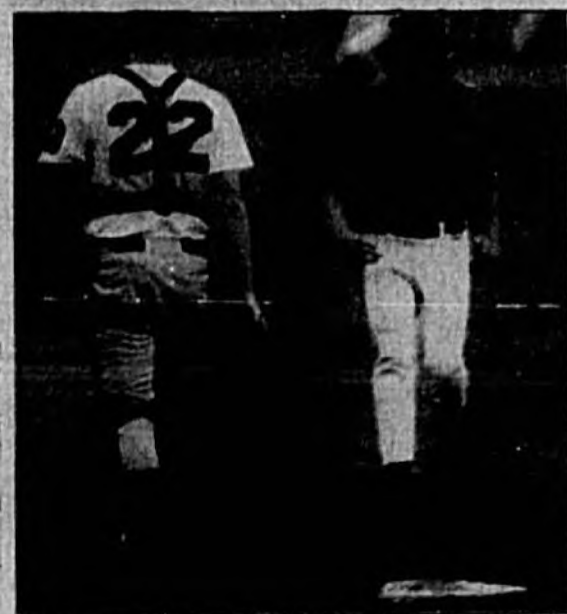
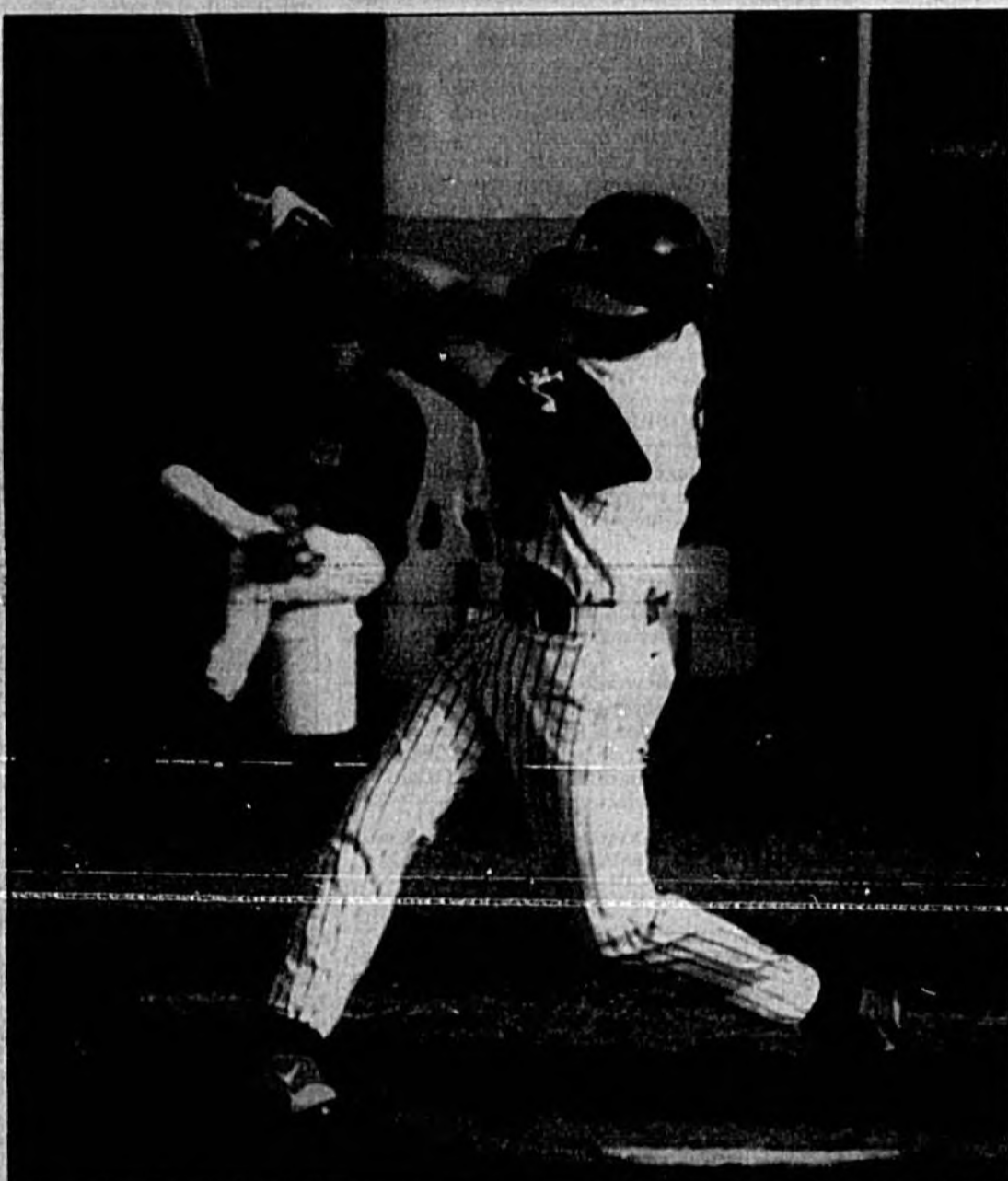

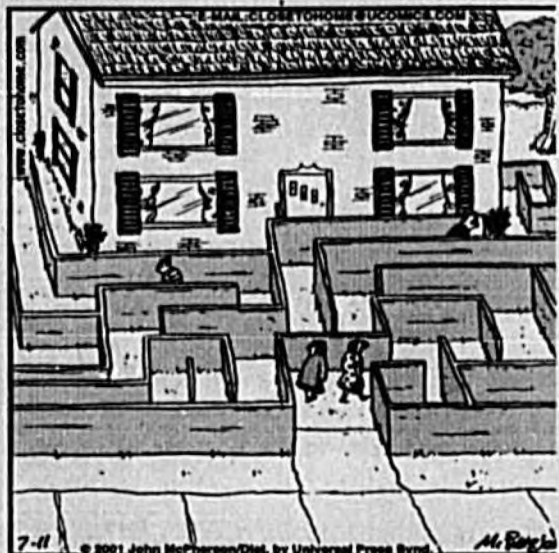
