The Auxiliary has three representatives in the personage of Mrs. J. R. Boyle, Mrs. J. H. Mackey and Mrs. I. R. Hovington. These ladies will make a strenuous effort to inaugurate a Ladies' Auxiliary in connection with the Sanford Trades Council.

The Ladies' Auxiliary of the Central Trades & Labor Council is a little band of women composed of the wives, mothers, daughters and sisters of the union men of Jacksonville for the purpose of trying to help the human race, physically, morally, mentally and financially; in other words, we stand for justice and equality to all mankind.

Any lady who is related to a working man affiliated with the American Federation of Labor has entered into this organization. The prospects from advanced reports show that these ladies will leave on adjournment of the convention a live Ladies' Auxiliary in Sanford.

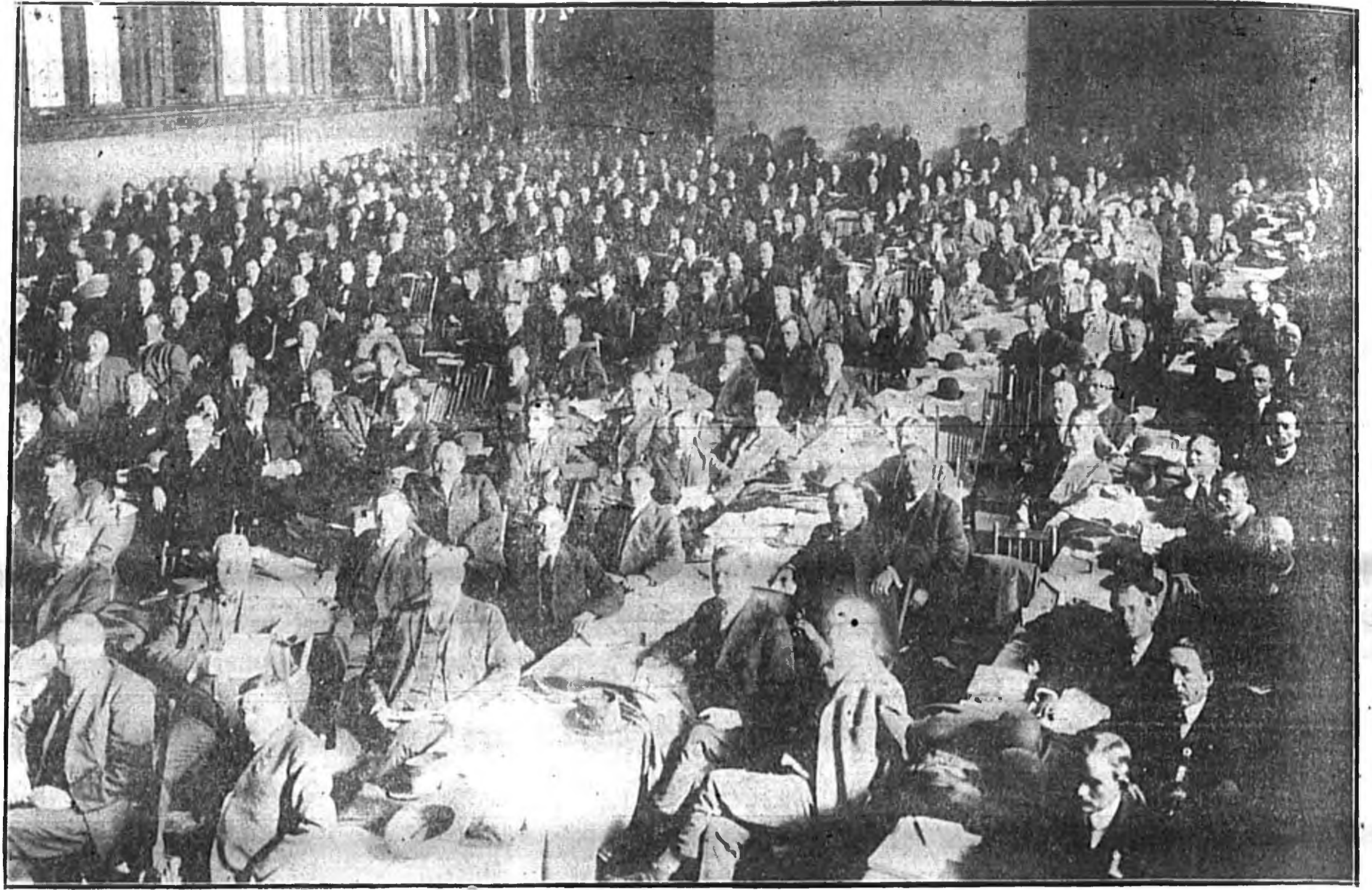

Orlando Enjoyed It

Sanford, the Celery City welcomed the South Florida Press Association and the executive committee of the State Press Association with a cordiality that will long linger in the memories of those so fortunate as to enjoy the hospitality extended to them by the citizens of this wonderful little city.

The members of the two associations met at the office of the Sanford Herald, and shortly after four o'clock were taken for an automobile ride out to the famous celery fields of Seminole county. On either side of the road as far as one could see a carpet of bright green celery greeted the eye. Thousands of acres of this vegetable are planted every year, which has made the farmers of Seminole county, and citizens of Sanford among the most prosperous in Florida.

These lands which are tiled, drained, and irrigated, are of the black loam quality, and are capable of producing three crops yearly. The average number of crates to the acre is one thousand with a net price from one to two dollars for a Sanford. This makes an acre of land capable of earning from fifteen hundred to two thousand net yearly. Celery is no longer an experiment in Seminole county, and this industry has done much to help Florida to take its place as one of the foremost agricultural states.

Upon returning from the ride, the associations held their respective meetings, and at eight o'clock a banquet was tendered them at the Sanford House by the Commercial Club and citizens of Sanford.

The table which extended the whole length of the dining room was artistically decorated.

A huge bunch of celery two feet in diameter and three and a half feet high formed a center piece, while hilts of every variety, and beautiful white roses were placed here and there among clusters of ferns.

The dinner was greatly enjoyed by those present, whose appetites had been sharpened by the outing of the afternoon.—Reporter-Star.

At a meeting of the executive committee for the Seminole County Fair, which will be held in Sanford, Feb. 3, 4, 5, 6, held recently, the educational features were a prominent point of discussion, and as Mr. Walker the chairman said, "One can never hope to make a success of a fair, financially or in point of entertainment until its educational value is recognized in the planning." It is very true that "a little nonsense now and then" is a drawing card to any entertainment, but in this age of doing things the public is seeking opportunity to note the progress of others that they may build better for themselves.

The fair is a school for the planters, the breeders and the home makers alike, and suffices for sales agent for those who exhibit worthy examples.

The lack of most departments of a fair is the method of demonstrating exhibits. One can stroll around among a collection of exhibits and products and see them merely as space fillers and at once regret their loss of time.

But suppose these exhibits are explained by one posted as to methods of making, combining information as to material, time and cost would not this medium be of untold value at a nominal expense? While it is true a vast majority attend a fair on pleasure bent, there are many who would by seeing the practical demonstration gain a great degree of valuable experience that they could utilize in their own business. As the fairs are becoming factors in the commercial interests of the state it is also very important that their moral influences are considered. If we can and will look features that will interest as they please and entertain we can feel reasonably sure the public will know we have catered more effectively to the modern demand. Hence in building a successful fair like any other structure it must have a good foundation. The several committees propose to work along these lines in all departments and it is safe to predict not only a pleasant but a profitable and profitable fair.

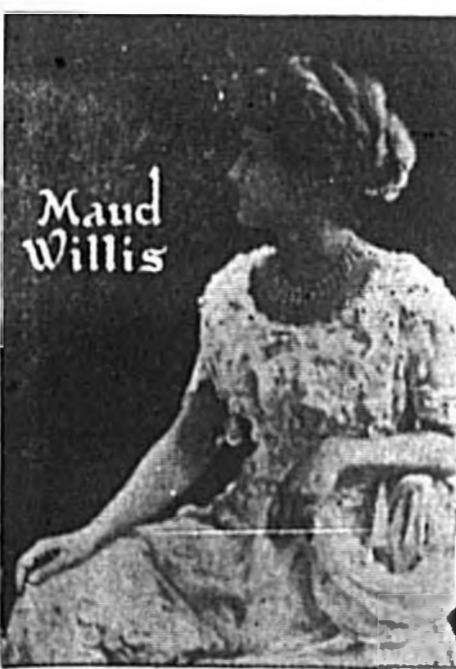
Stanley Hanson Here

Inspector Hanson, U. S. Inspector of Marine Fisheries was in the city on Saturday, January 10, on his inspecting tour.

Mr. Hanson's appointment became effective Dec. 1st last, and he is now on his first tour of inspection. His district includes the entire Atlantic coast from Cape Fear to the Caloosa. He made a trip up the Caloosa river, visited fish camps and other points on Lake Okechobee and down the state drainage canal to Fort Lauderdale. He went as far down the east coast as Miami and Coconut Grove, and then came back up the coast to West Palm Beach, Lake Worth, Fort Pierce, Eau Gallie and other places. At Prince Park he joined Capt. B. J. Pasotti, U. S. Inspector of Federal Birds Reservations, and made several trips over the famous Mosquito Inlet reservation; then to Daytona, St. Augustine and Jacksonville. He will now devote some weeks to the interior of the state. He expects to visit every section of Florida, investigate conditions and confer with various state and county officials regarding the enforcement of both federal and state laws. Secret service men will follow Inspector Hanson's tour, and make arrests for all violations coming to the attention of the Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Sociological Survey, at Washington.

From February 16 to December 20 is an absolute closed season on migratory birds. The law makes a full closed season between sunset and sunrise, and Inspector Hanson that many violations are being made with respect to this section. The common "bull bat" or "night hawk" is being shot in different parts of Florida contrary to law, also the rail or mud hens and coots, and he says serious consequences will follow the killing of these birds.

Florida now has 11 National Bird Reservations. Federal wardens are employed to care for these breeding and resting places, and it is a violation to go even upon these reserves without permission from the wardens, under penalty of \$1,000 cash fine, or six months imprisonment or both.

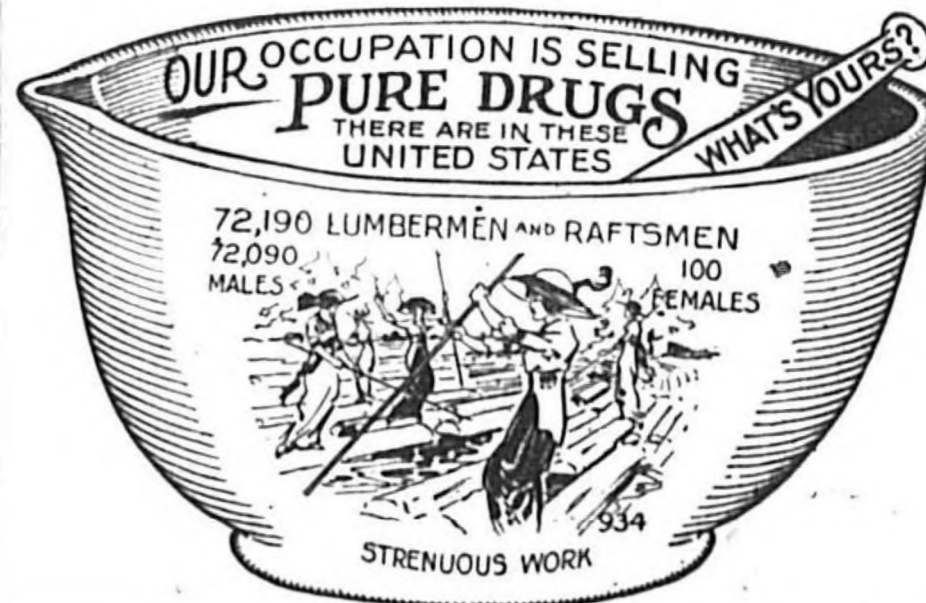

WOMAN'S CLUB

Wide Awake Business Meeting Held

There was a large attendance of the regular business meeting of the Woman's Club held Wednesday afternoon in the club house which was very inviting in its new dress of white plastering. The president, Mrs. Dickins, called the meeting to order and presided throughout with her usual poise and dignity. In her brief but interesting preliminary talk, Mrs. Dickins stated that her New Year's wish to each member was that she should feel herself as important as any other member—just as necessary to the success of the club work. She also charged the members to make it a special point to exercise a spirit of greater friendliness toward the new and timid members especially, suggesting as slogan for the year the former state president's (Mrs. Wm. Hocker's) closing sentence in her address before the Lakeland Convention, "Let us be kinder than is necessary."

She also called attention to the fact that the Library has come home to the club house, and as the Woman's Club is the natural mother of the library the members should do all they can to advance it in every way. The library is open Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturday afternoons and Saturday evenings till ten p. m.

The minutes were then read by Mrs. Watson, secretary pro tem and approved by the club.

Most interesting reports followed from the officers of the club and chairmen of the various departments. Miss Hawkins, the treasurer gave a most gratifying report. A vote of thanks was tendered the Welfare Department for a Christmas present of ten dollars to the general fund, and to the Civic Committee of the Welfare Department for twenty dollars, part of the proceeds of the play given by this committee in the fall.

Mrs. Maris, chairman of the Literature Department called the attention of the club to the change of the general literature reception from the date given in the year book to Jan. 27th, and though program was not definitely announced there seemed to be an understanding among the initiated which was strongly hinted at that this department has a very rare treat in store for the club on that date.

Mrs. Terhune, chairman of the Welfare Department then gave a splendid report from this always active department. Its success largely through the efforts of Mrs. Wright to secure funds from the school board to employ an instructor to carry on the work of the Corn and Tomato Canning Industry in the Seminole county schools was the cause of most favorable comment. Mrs. Wright stated that the club was greatly indebted to Mr. Thrasher for his efforts in securing the money to make the work possible.

Mrs. Terhune also announced that there would be a Better Babies' Contest held at the Seminole County Fair and that the Welfare Department would offer two prizes and Mr. Marks, director of the Fair would offer one for the most perfect baby (physically), and that the physicians of the town had offered their services to examine the babies free, providing the mothers would not take up more time than was necessary as it takes considerable time for the examination.

Mrs. Terhune also reported the sale of Red Cross seals, and announced the musical comedy to be staged under the direction of Miss Rogers on Jan. 28th for the benefit of the Welfare Department.

Mrs. Dickins complimented this report and spoke especially of the good work in securing the Corn and Tomato Canning Instructor.

Miss Stumon, the chairman of the Music Department announced the costume recital which was to be given by Miss Aspinwall that evening for the benefit of the pinao fund. Also a meeting of the chorus to be held Saturday afternoon at three o'clock.

Mrs. Fitts, chairman of the Social Department made an excellent report, the best part of which was that they had cleared over \$75.00 from the dancing school, which had been given to help pay for the plastering.

The president then announced the appointment of Mrs. J. W. Barnes as chairman of the Press committee and general reporter.

The matter of keeping open house at the club house during the Fair was voted upon, and it was decided that committee should be there to receive the ladies of the county and to use it as a rest room in compliance with a recommendation by the board.

Mrs. Dickins brought the matter of birth registration and vital statistics before the meeting saying that it was the first time in the history of the federated clubs that the individual club had been appealed to by the government. On the 18th of January a whirlwind campaign will be conducted to secure the birth registration of every child in this country. Mrs. R. M. Mason has charge of the work in Sanford and will have a committee to assist her in collecting the

vital statistics and will make her report directly to the Children's Bureau at Washington.

Mrs. Henry Wight then spoke of the "Save a Baby Campaign" which is being carried on by the Children's Home Society of Florida at Jacksonville. She said that last year that institution took care of 800 homeless babies, restored them to health when necessary and placed them in good homes for adoption. Some of the churches here have been active for this cause and sent in a good sum, but all that has been sent from Sanford is not enough to pay the expenses for a year of one little girl there now from Sanford. Mrs. Wight impressed upon the club the importance of the work and stated that they cannot afford for the Children's Home Society to feel that we are not doing our part—that each member should work to get every man, woman and child to give ten cents toward it. Every one giving ten cents or more will receive a certificate or certificates of stock showing that he has "co-operated with Florida's Greatest Charity to the end that every homeless orphan and needy child in Florida may be properly cared for and provided a good home."

These certificates were turned over to Mrs. J. W. Barnes, who will have charge of collecting the money from anyone interested and forwarding it to the state superintendent, Marcus A. Fagg.

Mrs. C. O. Walker announced the rummage sale, which is to be conducted by the ladies of the Library Association Saturday p. m. at the Leffler building to defray the expenses of moving the books and fixtures to the club house. She requested all the members who have anything to give to the sale to send it to one of the following women: Mesdames Key, Frank, Whitner or C. O. Walker, if possible. If not, and they will notify Mrs. Key she will be glad to send for it.

Mrs. R. C. Weidler of Lakeland was introduced by Mrs. Dickins and told the club of the Chautauqua which is to begin here on Feb. 9th. She said it was to be the biggest chautauqua ever held in Florida, and spoke of the unusual ability of the director, Mr. Adams, and the talent in general. All members were urged to take tickets as the Chautauqua Association has turned over the matter to the Woman's Club, and all money from the sale of tickets above \$1,000.00 goes to the club. Some tickets were sold at the close of the meeting. Mrs. Weidler offered her services to sell tickets or help in any way she could.

The president had announced that Mr. Marks and Mr. Thrasher would address the club but was surprised when Messrs. S. O. Chase, C. E. Walker, J. N. Whitner, C. R. Walker, Marks and Judge Herring filed in, led by Mr. Thrasher, who was greeted by a round of applause from the ladies, who thus sought to show their appreciation of his work in securing funds for the Tomato Club instructor. Mrs. Dickins handled the situation gracefully and one after another of the august body was invited to speak to the club, but on account of the lack of time only three responded. Mr. Marks of the Fair Association first addressed the ladies on the subject of the Fair. He complimented the Woman's Board of Managers of the Seminole County Fair on the systematic appointment of heads of committees and districts to supervise the exhibits which are in their keeping, and said that the Fair wanted to have a good showing of all kinds of women's work—arts, crafts, needlework, antiques, flowers, cooked foods etc. He also suggested that a committee be appointed to look after the Better Babies' Contest. The exclusive right to serve the people during the Fair with food and drink was presented to the club by Mr. Marks. A discussion followed and a vote was taken to accept the proposition, which was that the ladies should furnish the food and the labor and the net proceeds are to be divided equally between the club and the Fair Association.

Mr. Thrasher then spoke of the Corn and Tomato Club work and told of the benefits to be derived in many ways by the boys and girls being trained to conserve the fruits and vegetables of the state which are now going to waste. He said that one of the most efficient teachers in the state has been engaged, by Miss Harris, the chief, and would be here soon to begin work and it was possible there could be some showing of the work for the Fair. He told of the display of one young lady at the Lakeland Fair which was purchased by a real estate man as an advertisement. He also spoke of the auto industrial parade to be had at the Fair, stating that there would be a man here to decorate the cars and asking all club members who could to enter their cars. Complimenting the women on their demonstrated ability to get effective work done when they made up their minds, he suggested the advisability of their conducting a "Clean Up" day before the Fair.

He also stated that Dr. Porter would have the state board of health exhibit and Dr. Perry of Jacksonville would have his sanitation exhibit at the Fair.

Mr. C. R. Walker spoke briefly of the library, announcing that the new charter called for a meeting Thursday afternoon of the Library Association and all interested friends to assist in launching the Sanford Library as it is now a chartered organization. He spoke most optimistically of dreams coming true saying the club house, a municipal building was the realization of a dream not even conceived of ten years ago. His few promotive remarks were like the arc of a circle, they suggested completion, and there arose in the minds of his hearers a library building splendidly equipped standing beside us like a friend to instruct and inspire. "Where no vision is the people perish," and we would have more of these dreams from our friends.

Mrs. Dickins then urged the club to do all in their power to assist the men in these different lines of work as we had often called upon them and this was our chance to show our appreciation.

The Literature Department meeting for Dec. 30, 1914, was held in Prosbortian Manse, Mrs. Maris, chairman, presiding.

The Literature Department has postponed its reception to the general club until Jan. 27, thus a full regular program takes place Jan. 13 in the place of reception calendared in year book. (On January 13, election of chairman, as well as chairman for membership committee will take place.)

Following announcements Department proceeded to enjoy first paper of afternoon's program, "Edward Everett Hale and His Works," by Mrs. E. D. Chittenden. Valued quotations from this writer were given, also characteristics of the life molded by parental love. A volume entitled "For Fifty Years" was shown which had the distinction of being presented by Dr. Hale himself to Mr. Fernald's father.

Mrs. Martin's paper dealing with Life of Louisa M. Alcott and read by Mrs. J. W. Barnes was pleasingly depicted, as life of this writer was so full of good fruits, seen by all and loved by children who are imbued with characters of "Little Women," "Joe's Boys" and others. Reminiscences were read from a leaflet written by a relative of Louisa Alcott's. The fine and even tenor of her life gleaming through all the days, thus weaving the thread of her love, wrapping it closely around those who were in the immediate home circle.

Big Real Estate Deal

Major Benjamin Drew of this city has sold to R. D. Mr. W. B. Makinson of Kissimmee is mentioned as one of the parties interested in the big transfer, along with other Osceola capitalists.

Mr. Drew, shortly after arriving in Sanford seven years ago purchased this property for \$56,000. "In one and a half years he not only cleared up the amount of the purchase price but eight per cent on the investment as well. He then sold it to the Holden Company, who managed the aggregated interest for six years, but about two months ago bought back the same property, which he is now transferring to R. D. Waring and associates.—Reporter-Star.

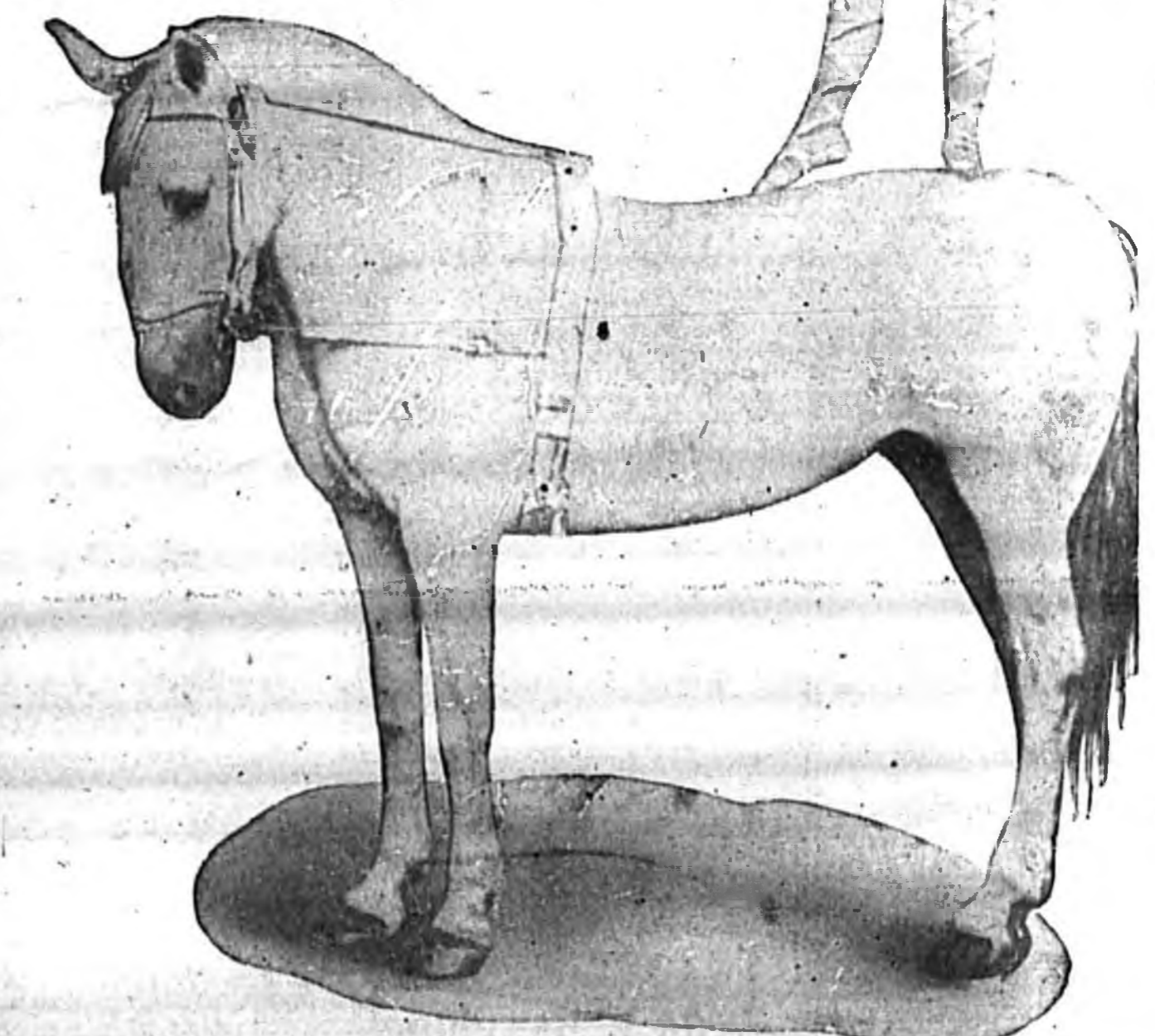

Robert B. Miller, pastor of the Third United Presbyterian Church, Pittsburg, Pa., and Julian S. Miller of this city and two sisters, Miss Mary B. Miller, principal of the South School and Miss Josephine Miller, who lives at home. They were all at the bedside when the end came.
