





More than this, though, is that we don't seem to have learned to live, either with ourselves or with the other people of the world. In spite of our knowledge, and in spite of our affluence, we seem to find it difficult to discover any sort of valued and ultimate destination for living. Two cars in every garage, lovely homes, and fine furniture are real fine, but they don't fill a gnawing lack in life. We have an itch we cannot scratch, an empty feeling in the pit of the stomach that no amount of stuffing with rich food can fill.

Truthfully, we are no better off than man ever was. We are still mortal, weak, and unable to do the right thing, even when we know what that is. We are in the same situation St. Paul was in when he wrote: . . . "The good that I would, I do not: but the evil which I would not, that I do . . . O

.. wretched man that I am." And we hate to admit it. The solution to this dilemma is found in an ancient prayer. "O God, the strength of all those who put their trust in thee: ... mercifully accept our prayers; and because through the weakness of our mortal nature, we can do no good thing without thee, grant us the help of thy grace"

We hate to admit weakness, but once we do we can make the step we need to make. We must fall back upon the strength of the One who made us and all mankind. We need to find power, and we can from Him who has reached out to the world and to men like Noah and Abraham and Moses. We can "find power from Him who sent His Son into the world, and who has sent His Spirit to dwell in those who would receive

A few weeks ago we celebrated the Feast of the Pentecost. -when the apostles received the Holy Spirit and were filled with "such power that they thrust out into the whole world to witness to the truth they knew in Jesus Christ. That gift of the Holy Spirit still comes to those who are baptised. It still is very "much in the world. That's why we still celebrate the Pentecost. The power of God is available to those who will respond. "We may never have an experience comparable to that of the

'Meanest Ham' Jams Calls Of Wounded Vets

ABOARD U.S.S. SANCTU-ARY, Off Vietnam (AP) - A "mean ham from Watts," i Los Angeles, is jamming calls from wounded servicemen aboard the Sanctuary to their families in the United States. The Sanctuary, a hospital ship

just off the Vietnamese coast, is filled with wounded American Marines and soldiers. Every night about 20 radio calls from patients on the ship are picked up by ham operators on the U.S. West Coast. The hams place long distance calls to the families of the wounded

men and connect the radio signals into the telephone line. "All the hams are great en cept for that mean guy from Watts," said Navy Lt. Val Galasyn of Canterbury, Conn., s doctor who is largely responsible for the service.

When the Sanctuary arrived in mid-April, the operator from Watts was helpful.

"But once he got our dence, he started jamming our calls," Galasyn said. "He would take our call, patch in the telephone line to a guy's family and just as the conversation began there would be this terrible racket so nobody could hear. It sounded as if he was playing an oscillator into the transmitter.

"You can imagine what that meant to a wounded guy out here thousands of miles from home trying to talk to his mom or wife. We don't know why he does it, he just does it." The Watts operator some-

times does not show up for days. Then he comes on and it tries to escape him by changing frequency "All the other guys are fan-

tastic," said Galasyn. His team of operators are Radiomen George Beaver of Palatka, Fla., Frank 'Smokey' Stover o Rome, Ga., and Electrician Jim Lencioni of San Leandro, Calif. Among the hardest working hams on the other end who receive only personal satisfaction for their long hours of work are Jim and Dean in Los Angeles, George in Hollywood, Frank in Van Nuys, Syd in Berkeley, Cal in Portland, Ore., and Gerri in Seattle.

The hams are known only by their first names and their call cards stuck on the wali of the Sanctuary's ham shack.

Gerri in Seattle has an arrangement with a local Veterans of Foreign Wars post to pick up the tab on the long distance calls. Some other hams are trying to set up the same deal. Otherwise, all calls are made collect.




Commencement Exercises for one hundred thirty-four graduating seniors will be held June 5 at 8 p.m. in the Roy A. Allen Gymnasium.
