Made Me The Goat, Williams Testifies

A closed door City Commission meeting in which Ex-Police Chief Arnold Williams was asked by the city attorney to fire or suspend Lt. Joe Hickson from the police force was revealed in testimony before the Civil Service Board last night.

The Civil Service Board adjourned the hearing until 7 p.m. June 11.

Williams, in four and a half hours of testimony, two under questioning by the board and three under questioning by City Attorney William C. Hutchison Jr., told how he asked commissioners to back him up but "they made me the goat."

He testified of two February meetings at which Hickson was the prime subject.

"They asked me what kind of officer he (Hickson) was. I didn't have much to say about him," Williams said.

Hutchison brought up the point that six months before this, in September of last year, the City gave Williams a letter criticizing his "leadership ability."

Hutchison kept hammering away that Williams was afraid of Hickson and emphasized an open commission meeting.

Williams said he received a call from Hickson during the meeting about the recent arrest of Hickson's wife accused of selling beer to minors at the Pig N' Whistle.

"Yes," answered Williams. "Well, weren't you afraid of Hickson?" questioned Hutchison. "I was never afraid of Lt. Hickson," said Williams. "Didn't you tell the commission you were afraid?" (Continued On Page 3)

Local Judge Elated Over Circuit Bill

Circuit Judge Volle Williams Jr. of Sanford expressed elation when informed of the approval by the State Senate of a bill creating the new 18th judicial circuit which places Seminole and Brevard Counties in the new circuit.

An identical bill passed the House of Representatives late last week. Under the proposed bill, which now goes to the Governor, Williams will continue to sit in Seminole and Brevard Counties.

Orange and Osceola will be in the ninth judicial circuit while the 10th circuit will be in a new 19th judicial circuit.

"I'm so happy I wouldn't mind if I got tossed in the river," Judge Williams said, and lawyers in Brevard County objected to the bill.

Phillip Logan, president of the Seminole County Bar Association said today, "I'm sure it (the new circuit) will assure the bar and the bench in the affected counties to give a better and more complete service to the people."

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Ask Water Rate Hike For Longwood

A raise in water rates for residents of the City of Longwood was recommended by Ralph Fisher, city superintendent, at the meeting of the City Council Thursday evening.

Claiming the city is losing \$10,000 annually on the water system, Fisher recommended a minimum charge should be raised from \$2.00 to \$2.50 per month.

Being his statistics on minimum charge for 900 customers for a year, Fisher claimed that any increase would be taken up in revenue of \$21,000 annually while expenditures are \$32,040.

Operating budget for the water department, however, shows anticipated revenue of \$31,000 with expenditures including new water lines to 484, including Road on SR 484, Longdale and to Longwood Plaza as well as fittings for SR 427 to total \$39,245.00.

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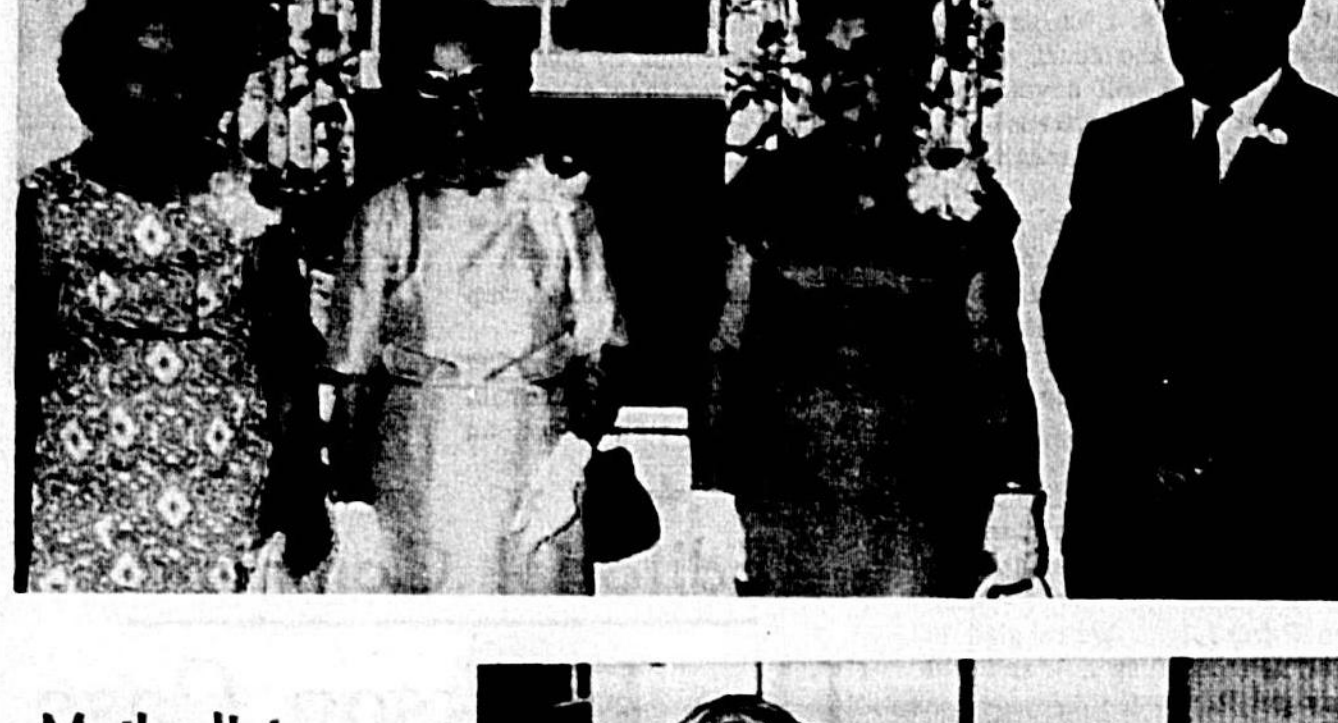

'Meanest Ham' Jams Calls Of Wounded Vets

ABOARD U.S. SANCTUARY. Off Vietnam (AP) — A "mean ham" from Watts, in Los Angeles, is jamming calls from wounded servicemen aboard the Sanctuary to their families in the United States. The Sanctuary, a hospital ship just off the Vietnamese coast, is filled with wounded American Marines and soldiers.

Every night about 20 radio calls from patients on the ship are picked up by ham operators on the U.S. West Coast. The ham place long distance calls to the families of the wounded men and connect the radio signals into the telephone line.

"All the hams are great except for that mean guy from Watts," said Navy Lt. Val Galasyn of Canterbury, Conn., a doctor who is largely responsible for the service.

When the Sanctuary arrived in mid-April, the operator from Watts was helpful.

"But once he got our confidence, he started jamming our calls," Galasyn said. "He would take our call, punch in the telephone line to a guy's family and just as the conversation began there would be this terrible racket so nobody could hear. It sounded as if he was playing an oscillator into the transmitter."

"You can imagine what that meant to a wounded guy out here thousands of miles from home trying to talk to his mom or wife. We don't know why he does it, he just does it."

The Watts operator sometimes does not show up for days. Then he comes on and it tries to escape him by changing frequency.

"All the other guys are fantastic," said Galasyn. His team of operators are Radioman George Beaver of Palatka, Fla., Frank "Smoker" Sloyer of Home, Ga., and Electrician Jim Lencioni of San Leandro, Calif.

Among the hardest working hams on the other end who receive only personal satisfaction for their long hours of work are Jim and Dean in Los Angeles, George in Hollywood, Frank in Van Nuys, Syd in Berkeley, Cal in Portland, Ore., and Gerry in Seattle.

The hams are known only by their first names and their call cards stuck on the wall of the Sanctuary's ham shack.

Gerry in Seattle has an arrangement with a local Veterans of Foreign Wars post to pick up the tab on the long distance calls. Some other hams are trying to set up the same deal. Otherwise, all calls are made collect.

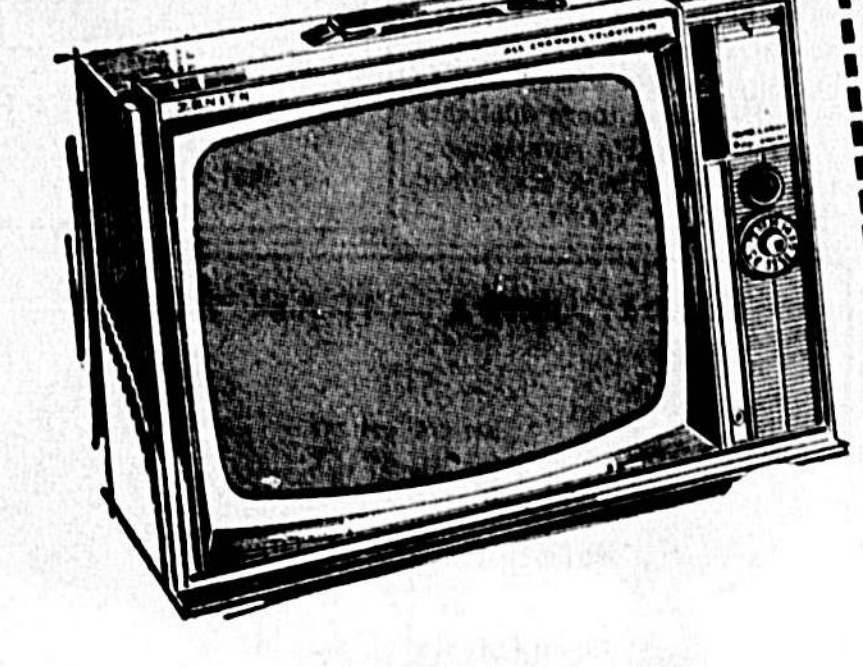

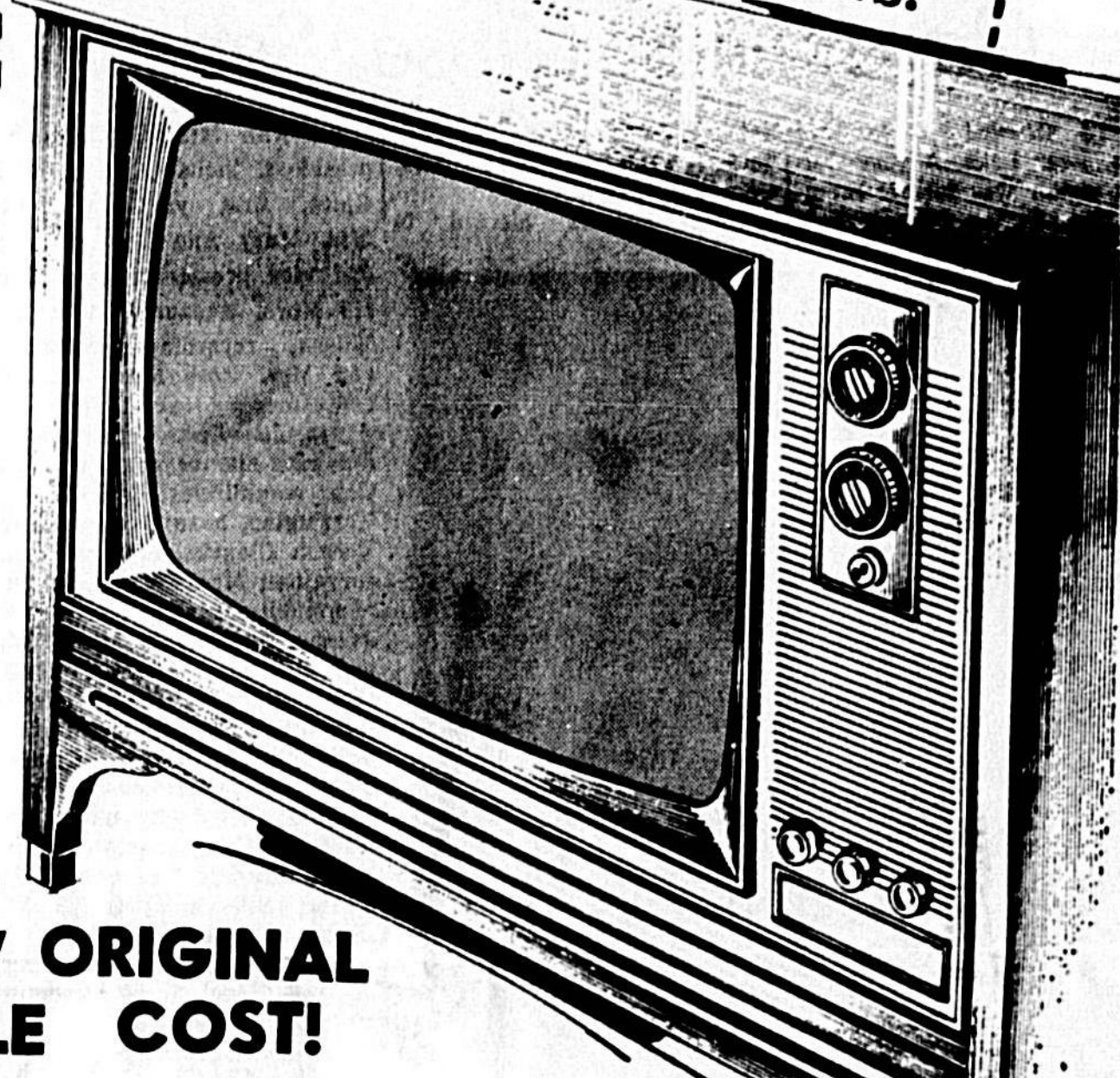

SHAVING STROKES

by Frank Beard

Unlike the backswing, the downswing is a very definite sequence of individual actions. The result is a chainlike reaction with each part of the body moving at different points, yet directly affecting every other part. The end result is a perfectly timed swing that resembles one movement.

A perfect illustration of the downswing and backswing look is the spontaneous reaction of a tightly coiled spring that has suddenly been released. It looks as though the uncoiling happened all in one action, but what actually happened was that the bottom of the spring began the reaction and pulled the remainder of it right along with it.

THE GENERAL move of the hips and weight during the downswing will automatically drop the hands into the proper position. The general move of the arms and the weight will automatically drop the hands into the proper position for the impact area. After the downswing begins, there are two other important moves to be made. First, return the shoulders to their proper position, reversing the original turn in the backswing. The right shoulder goes back under the club in a vertical plane never moving laterally. Next, the head must be in place.

As the weight, hips and shoulders begin their move to the left, there is a tendency for the head to move to the left. A tip here is to make sure that your left cheek never moves in front of the ball.

Heavy War Rages In Sinai Desert

JERUSALEM (AP) — For the third time in 20 years, war broke out today in the Middle East and gunfire sounded in Israel and in three of its Arab neighbors — Egypt, Jordan and Syria.

The Arabs, sworn to destroy Israel, were battling the Jewish state's forces on two fronts, at Egypt's Sinai frontier and on the Syrian and Jordan borders.

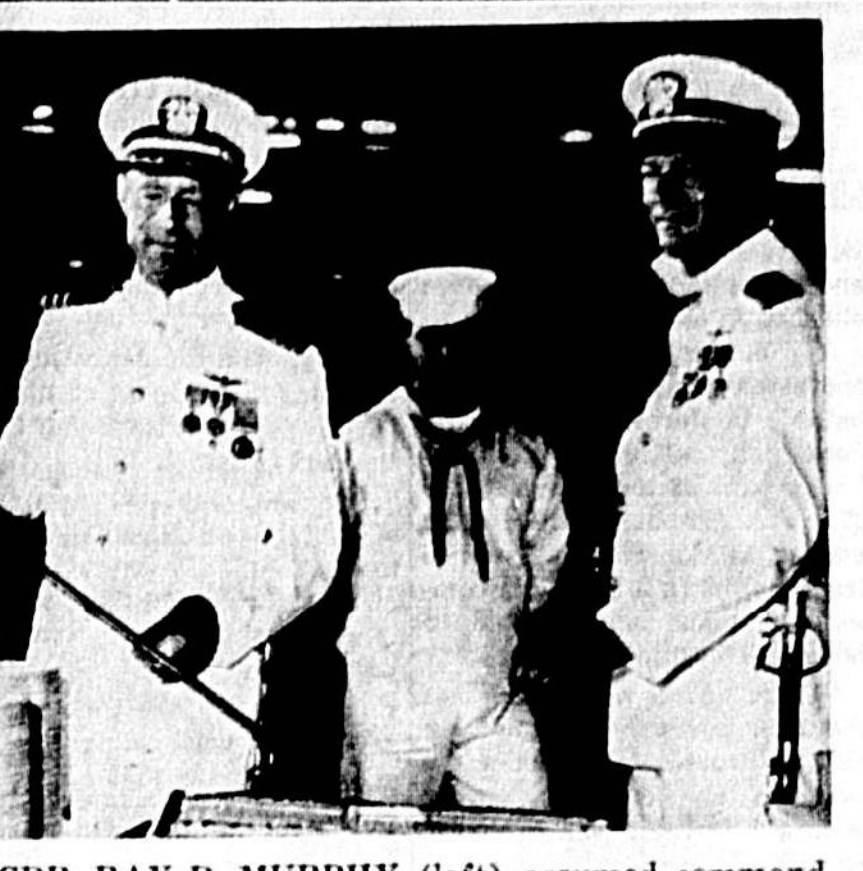
Each side accused the other of lighting the fuse for the explosion which, as in 1956, threatened to involve the major powers.

The main fighting today appeared to be in the Sinai Desert, across the frontier that United Nations forces guarded until Egypt's Gamal Abdel Nasser ordered them out 18 days ago.

Artillery fire was heard in Jerusalem, the holy city divided between Jordan and Israel. Israel's port of Haifa was bombed. Israeli planes attacked the airports of three Arab capitals, Cairo, Amman and Damascus.

Kelly had been hired early this year by the board at a salary of \$22,500. He was expected to retire from the Air Force sometime this month.

The board had interviewed some 20 candidates for the post. The industrial board was organized by the city last year to seek industrial development for the Sanford area.

Serving on the board are Joe Paullucci, A. K. Shoemaker Jr., Howard McNulty, Howard Hodices, Lee Moore, Ernest Southward and Harold Slama.

Sanctions: Will It Hurt Seminole?
Local school officials were uncertain today of the effects of the sanctions by the Florida Education Association on the hiring of new teachers here.

"We are certain the sanctions will have some effect, but as to how much, it will be awhile before we can tell," Frank Gore, director of personnel, told The Herald.

Gore reports 55 new teachers have been appointed since the start of the school year. There are always a few isolated instances where positions are hard to fill. We are, of course, making every effort to have all the positions filled before the teachers start back to work on Aug. 14," Gore stated.

Seminole County is one of approximately 25 counties in the state where the starting salary for teachers is \$5,000 per year. Ten or 12 counties in the state have paid this year up to \$5,200 and the remaining counties have paid below \$5,000.

Starting salaries in neighboring counties this year were Orlando, \$5,000; Volusia, \$5,200 and Brevard, \$5,100.

However, Brevard County recently adopted schedules calling for teachers in the 1967-68 school year to have starting salaries of \$5,800. Seminole, along with other counties in the area, is waiting to see what the Legislature is going to do about teacher salaries before it takes action to change its schedules.
