Growers Warned Of 30 Degree Weather Predicted Tonight

Cold Wave Spreading From Great Lakes Into South States To Invade Florida

Citrus Expected To Escape Frost

Drop In Temperature May Not Be Severe If Winds Continue

The cold wave spreading southeastward from the Great Lakes region gave the Midwest and other sections a severe touch of winter today. It was colder from the Dakotas southward to the Rio Grande valley and the Texas coast and eastward to the Atlantic Ocean. Minnesota felt the full fury of the West, and sub-zero readings were fairly general in sections of Wisconsin and Iowa.

Much colder weather is forecast for Florida tonight and Saturday, but the Weather Bureau at Lakeland which issues frost bulletins said "present indications are that northerly winds will continue most of the night in the Central Florida district, thus preventing a fall in temperature to extremely low levels." Meteorologist Ellison said tender truck crops may suffer, but citrus probably will escape damage. He warned truck growers to take precautions. His prediction of temperatures for truck on ground included: Sanford, Plant City and Winter Garden, 30; Pinellas Park and Ocala, 34.

The U. S. Weather Bureau forecast a generally fair and somewhat cloudy day with temperatures 22 to 28 degrees in north portion, freezing in central portion, frost to extreme south portion if winds subside, Saturday fair and colder in extreme south portion. Extreme northwest fair and slightly colder, heavy frost to coast. Temperatures 24 to 32 tonight, Saturday fair.

14-Inch Snowfall

FARGO, N. D., Dec. 20.—The worst storm of the winter swept across North Dakota today. A snow fall of 14 inches was recorded and drifts impeded traffic. The mercury dropped to 14 below zero at Fargo. A cold north wind swept South Dakota bringing temperatures in the low 20's with a minimum of 4 below at Brookings.

Dinner Not To Raise Party's Election Fund

Young Democrat Club To Observe Jackson Day, But Cut Price Of Proposed Meal

The Young Democrats Club of Seminole County will observe Jackson Day on Jan. 8 by serving a banquet in the Mayfair Hotel that evening, but the affair will not be for the purpose of adding to the war chest of the party, as suggested by James A. Farley, national chairman. The charge is to be only \$1.50 per plate, officers of the club decided at a meeting last night, and the balance that will be left over after expenses of the dinner are paid will not be large. J. Alex Sharon, appointed to attend to publicity in connection with the dinner, said today.

In correspondence with the Club the suggestion was made by Mr. Farley that a charge of at least \$3 per plate be made, but this price was cut in two by the officers attending the meeting. In larger cities, according to press dispatches, a charge as high as \$10 per plate was suggested by the national chairman as a means of helping raise a campaign fund.

2 Other Ex-Officials Acquitted Of Conspiracy, 3rd Trial

BISMARCK, N. D., Dec. 20.—(AP)—A federal court jury on Thursday acquitted former Gov. William Langer and two other former North Dakota officials of conspiracy charges.

Freed with Langer were R. A. Kiger, former chief secretary, and Frank Vogel, former state highway commissioner. They were charged with conspiracy to obstruct federal relief legislation by soliciting political contributions from workers paid with federal relief and highway funds.

Mart, Canning Kitchen's Put Up To Pynchon

Michael And Dawson Are In Conference With WPA Director On Local Projects

E. A. Pynchon, state director of the FERA, failed to stop in Sanford yesterday on his return from a conference with District Director Swopes in Orlando, so Market Manager J. G. Michael and County Agent C. R. Dawson went to Jacksonville today to confer with Mr. Pynchon.

Mr. Michael was to consult with the WPA officials about the Farmers Market in Sanford, and Mr. Dawson was to talk with him about the canning kitchen. Both of them hoped to be able to convince Mr. Pynchon of the necessity for pushing both projects without delay.

While in the City a few days ago Mr. Pynchon told H. M. Penworth and R. L. Glenn that he could "assure" them that the roads about the market would be paved at once, but he was not in a position to give any information as to when the paving project would be built. Mr. Penworth is chairman of the supervisory committee of the market, and Mr. Glenn is chairman of the County Planning Board.

Market Manager Michael said that the construction of the loading platform, for which WPA funds have been allocated, is especially desired as it will make possible the assembling of fruit and produce for broken cart shipments to northern cities.

County Agent Dawson said he hoped to get Mr. Pynchon to authorize work on the canning kitchen. The old canning kitchen in Sanford is "entirely too small," he said, and those at Oviedo and Geneva need improvements. The Sanford kitchen is so small that last year those desiring to use it had to make application a week in advance, Mr. Dawson said.

The WPA cannot be expected to provide equipment, according to the County agent, so he will go before the County Commissioners again at their January meeting and ask them to offer the price of \$300 asked for the equipment. The equipment was offered the County for \$300 and the Commissioners made a tender of \$200, but that price was rejected.

Mr. Dawson said that the canning kitchen equipment belongs to the old Rural Rehabilitation department, superseded by the Rural Settlement Administration, but the RRA has no appropriation for such kitchens.

Plutarco Calles, Ex-President Of Mexico, In Danger

Return Of 'Iron Man' Is Protested By 50,000 Workers

MEXICO, CITY, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Gen. Plutarco Elias Calles' return to the country from which he departed last Spring because of what he termed President Lazaro Cardenas' "march of radicalism."

Fifty thousand organized workers are scheduled to participate in the mass protest against Calles' return to the country from which he departed last Spring because of what he termed President Lazaro Cardenas' "march of radicalism."

Bitter attacks on Calles by labor leaders organizing the demonstration, and the declaration of the newspaper La Prensa that "the government may be unable to give Calles guarantees" of safety, caused speculation and expectancy over Sunday's possible developments.

Most guards had been withdrawn from Calles' home, only a garrison of the city, and if the demonstrators marched there they would find the former president virtually unprotected unless the government took precautions.

Frequent visits in the past few days to both President Cardenas and Calles by Aaron Saenz, former high official and close friend of Calles, led to the reports that negotiations are under way for the ex-president to leave the country despite his statement that he would remain unless expelled forcibly.

Teddy's Grandson Is Injured In Accident

BOSTON, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Kermit Roosevelt, Jr., 20, of Oyster Bay, Long Island, grandson of the late President Theodore Roosevelt, was injured as his automobile skidded from the road into a tree today. With him was William Burnham, 20, of Brookline, classmate at Harvard. Both were taken to a hospital with lacerated faces and bruises, but hospital authorities said neither was seriously hurt.

Supreme Court Acts In Tampa Flogging Case

Lower Court Ordered To Grant Hearing To Six Policemen Now Under Arrest

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The Supreme Court today ordered Circuit Judge Harry N. Sandler of Tampa to give an immediate hearing to six policemen charged with the flogging murder of Joseph Shoemaker. The high court granted the order to Attorneys Pat Whitaker and Charles F. Blake, defending the six prisoners, who said that Judge Sandler refused to hear arguments on a writ of habeas corpus because State Attorney Farrior was not in court yesterday. Whitaker said he will present the order to the court tomorrow and ask an immediate hearing. The men are being held without bond on warrants based on affidavits by the sheriff and the chief of detectives that they premeditated the death of Shoemaker. The six had been suspended prior to their arrest on charges they raided the house where Shoemaker and his companions were holding a meeting without having a warrant for the raid.

TAMPA, Dec. 20.—Joseph Shoemaker and two others were abducted outside city police headquarters on Nov. 30, and carried away to be flogged, tarred and feathered. Shoemaker, organizer of unemployed workers here and former state committeeman of the Socialist Party in Connecticut, died Dec. 9.

The police officers under arrest were suspended by Mayor R. E. L. Chancey, along with three other city employees, pending investigation of Shoemaker's death. They are Sergeant C. A. Brown, Crosby and F. W. Switzer, and special officers R. L. Chappell and C. W. Carlisle.

The next luncheon will be at 12:15 P. M. Thursday, the day after Christmas, and the luncheon the following week will also be on Thursday, the day after New Year's, since both holidays fall on Wednesday, the club's usual day for meeting.

Britain Seeks New Alliance Fearing Attack From Italy

Remains As Premier

The fall of Premier Laval of France was believed almost certain yesterday to result from his agreement with Sir Samuel Hoare of Great Britain on the discarded peace plan, an agreement which forced Hoare's resignation as British foreign secretary. Today's dispatches, however, state that Laval will remain at the head of the French government.

The possibility that the Italian government might attempt to place both England and France in an embarrassing position was indicated by spokesmen for the British government. He said Italy still regards Great Britain and France as bound by the Franco-British peace plan, pending decision by the Fascist grand council.

On the actual battlefront, spirited fighting of three days was halted as 2000 Askari soldiers celebrated victory dances in the Mai Tinchet valley near Addis Ababa. Casualties of the Ethiopian flank attack and the resultant Italian counter-attacks were set at more than 1,000 in force hand-to-hand fighting. The Ethiopians lost more than 500 and the Fascist dead numbered about 300.

Confidence Vote Given Baldwin British Premier

LONDON, Dec. 20.—Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin transformed political peril into victory last night when he won a sweeping vote of confidence on the government's revamped foreign policy, abandoning the Peace Plan.

The House of Commons, which earlier had heard Baldwin humbly apologize for the "blunder" of his resigned foreign minister, Sir Samuel Hoare, voted endorsement of a strong League of Nations policy, 327 to 165.

Home Of Publisher Wrecked By Bomb

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 30.—(AP)—Lyndon (Red) Foster, lobbyist and pamphlet publisher, was wounded in the arms and face Thursday when a bomb wrecked his apartment in the fashionable Wilshire District.

Foster, who has been associated with a pamphlet denouncing "religion racketeering" was thrown from his bed by the blast. Leaden slugs were found embedded in the walls, furniture and floors. An area of several square miles was shaken.

The publisher blamed his political enemies for the explosion. Officers said the bomb was set to a long pole and set against the window of the apartment.

Navajo Indians Are Called Last Pagans On Continent

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—The last remnant of paganism in America is the Navajo Indian nation of the West, the Right Rev. Frederick H. Howden, missionary of the Episcopal Church, said at the meeting of the Prot. stant Episcopate at New York, Dec. 19, at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine.

Describing his work among the Navajo Indians, Bishop Howden said that although Spanish missionaries first reached them during the sixteenth century, the Navajo, in contrast to other western tribes, have clung to their old religion with a few exceptions and refused to be converted to Christianity.

The 45,000 Navajo roam over a wide area in the southwest of the United States, Bishop Howden asserted. "It is hard to convert them from their old beliefs, it must be done slowly, in a spirit of brotherhood and a better way of life," he said.

nature the Indians of the West are deeply religious, and that atheism or agnosticism is unknown among them. Empathically denying that there is any "Indian problem" today in the social sense, he said that when properly educated, the American Indians make "magnificent citizens."

"One thing I wish to make clear is that the Indian is not a vanishing race," he said. "There are more Indians alive in North America today than there were when Columbus landed."

Bishop Howden did not amplify his statements as to the increase of the Indian population of the United States, beyond pointing out that the Navajo Indian nation had increased from 9,000 in 1889 to 45,000 today.

Divorce Courts And Tuberculosis Said To Do Greatest Damage

Divorce courts and tuberculosis do more damage to American homes than any other two things. This is the belief of Dr. W. W. Bauer, director of Public Health for the American Medical Association. Dr. Bauer was a visitor to Florida recently.

Tuberculosis kills more persons between the ages of 15 and 35 than in any other age group, Dr. Bauer states. Facts in Florida bear out these figures—there have been 408 deaths in this group last year.

Illness or death of men and women in this age group frequently breaks up a home. Divorce courts break up homes in the same

age group but with no more finality than tuberculosis.

Often a mother, recognizing fatigue, hacking cough or afternoon temperature, postpones seeing her physician until the disease has advanced so far recovery is impossible. Frequently, the disease strikes the wage earner, thereby cutting the economic status of the family and in many instances, causing orphan children and a broken home.

In addition to the poultry show and community agricultural and individual farm exhibits, there will be an educational display, flower and dog show, and cat and dog shows.

GAINESVILLE, Dec. 20.—(P)—Joe C. Jenkins, Gainesville attorney, has sent a second request to Attorney General Cary D. Landis asking permission to use the official's name in injunction proceedings against 21 legislators now on executive payrolls.

ST. PAUL, Dec. 19.—(P)—Cannibalism among baby chicks could be cured, Edward A. Schutz, a Minneapolis producer, said, by a red light which makes the chicks see black.

Baby chicks, especially white ones, were prone to pluck feathers from other chicks, Schutz said. Tiny specks of blood appear. Then the cannibal instinct gains the upper hand. Under the red brown light the blood appearing after a feather is plucked looks black and the chicks let it alone.

Social Security Session Studies Plan Of New Deal

Conference To Draft Program For Aiding 2 Million People

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—More than 200 representatives of the welfare agencies of 30 states, Alaska and the District of Columbia met with the Administration officials to start a course for providing security for more than 2,000,000 persons.

The group, described by Arthur J. Altmeyer, a member of the Social Security Board, as the "shock troops" of a great national welfare program, went into action on problems of providing aid for 1,000,000 needy aged persons.

Miss Frances Perkins, who will make public plans for a meeting Tuesday, following up the Social Security meeting today, brought a different welfare front between the representatives of twenty-six national organizations and officials of the Division of Labor Standards of her department to discuss co-operation in the improvement of labor standards.

The meeting, which was presided over by Frank Bone, executive director of the Social Security Board, concentrated on the sections of the Social Security Act which provide for aid only on a basis of need. Under the act, aid includes provisions for joint financial responsibility by state and federal governments. These programs are old-age assistance, aid to the blind, aid to dependent children, maternal and child health aid, aid to crippled children, child welfare and public health.

The labor standards conference announced by Secretary Perkins will be similar to one held next year. It will consider the possibilities of obtaining state legislation on child labor, minimum wage, hours of work, industrial home-work, health and safety and workmen's compensation, as well as the problems of obtaining effective administration of labor laws which created the work of the division.

Annuity Plan Of Westinghouse Co. To Be Withdrawn

Social Security Act Compels Big Firm To End Trust Fund

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 20.—The Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company, through its president, F. A. Merrick, announces that beginning Jan. 1, 1938, its annuity trust plan for employees would be withdrawn.

The discontinuance of the plan, Mr. Merrick said, was due to the passage of the federal Social Security Act. The trust fund was established many years ago by the founders of the company and at present has thousands of former employees on its rolls who received compensation annually.

In a letter sent to those who received yearly annuities, Mr. Merrick stated:

"The recently enacted Social Security Act places the welfare obligations of the company on a much broader basis than heretofore undertaken by it, including among other matters, provisions for unemployment compensation as well as old age benefits and beginning with the year of 1938 requires the payment by employers, of taxes for these purposes in proportion to the amount of their pay roll as heretofore and, in addition, will have to pay the new tax in-

Provision for the company is necessary for the adjustment of its annuity plan. Accordingly, on and after Jan. 1, 1938, the issuance and distribution of company annuity under the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company annuity plan will be discontinued.

INFANTILE PARALYSIS: I

During the last few years a number of laboratories throughout the country have issued reports suggesting that we are close to the production of an effective vaccine against poliomyelitis, or infantile paralysis. Many recently, however, a technical discussion among certain of these experimenters casts a pall of doubt over all infantile paralysis vaccines in general.

It has been shown definitely that infantile paralysis is caused by a virus, that is, by an infinitesimally small disease-causing agent. This virus probably enters the nervous system by way of the olfactory nerve (olfactory nerves) located in the nose. From the olfactory nerve the virus spreads through the brain tissue down to the spinal cord. The virus appears to have a selective affinity for the motor parts of the spinal nerve system, hence the paralysis. It is not generally understood by the public that infantile paral-

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Il Duce Orders War To Continue; While Britain Seeks Help

England Still Lays Claim To 'Zone Of Influence' Over A Part Of Ethiopia

Secret Deal Was Made 40 Yrs. Ago

Concession Arranged Then Yet In Force

Baldwin Announces

London, Dec. 21.—Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin revealed during questioning in the House of Commons that Great Britain still claimed a zone of influence in northern Ethiopia, as arranged in the "secret" Anglo-Italian deal ten years ago which failed to win Ethiopia's approval.

The Prime Minister, replying to William Colclough, a Communist, said the arrangements respecting the concession asked by the British and Italian governments with regard to Lake Tana and a proposed railway connecting Entebbe with Italian Somaliland, as outlined in the notes by the two powers exchanged in Dec., 1925, were still in force.

That being the case, he said in reply to a further question, there was no reason to notify the League of Nations that the 1925 arrangement had lapsed.

Under the Haile-Lesal pact terms the only territory left to Ethiopia was the northern zone containing the Lake Tana basin and the headwaters of the Nile, which are vital to British-controlled Egypt and the Sudan.

This summer pact of Ethiopia was the result of the Anglo-Italian treaty of 1925, a secret treaty of 1915 and the Anglo-Franco-Italian arrangement of 1923.

The Haile-Lesal pact gave Italy control over nearly half of Ethiopia, but denied her a corridor and railroad to link Entebbe and Italian Somaliland, Premier Benito Mussolini is understood to have protested this omission through Dino Grandi, his Ambassador in London, reminding Britain of her 1923 deal.

The Haile-Lesal proposals apparently took care of France's rights under the previous agreement paring off out of zones of influence in Ethiopia, although the terms granted to Ethiopia a corridor through Entebbe to the support of French critics have pointed out that Ethiopia was not to be allowed to build a railway through the corridor. Such a railway would divert trade from the Djibouti, French Somaliland, terminals of the line to Addis Ababa.

Grand Jury Will Continue Probe Into Todd Death

Police Decide That Actress Was Victim Of Accident

Los Angeles, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Police today dropped their investigation of the question-marked death of Thelma Todd today on the theory that the film beauty was the victim of an accident and not of a perfect crime or suicide.

However, the county grand jury gathered up loose ends of the bizarre mystery with its foreman expressing the belief the actress was slain in a "murder by mistake." More than 30 witnesses are summoned for the grand jury's first hearing Monday.

Deputy District Attorney Johnson said he definitely did not believe the glamorous blonde movie actress was a "murdered" victim as previously suggested by George Rochester, grand jury foreman.

"Perhaps she was very depressed over something," said Johnson.

"Perhaps she was fully aware of what she was doing when she turned on the motor of that car (her big phantom in the cliffside garage in which her body was found Monday)."

A coroner's jury held the probably accidental death of the actress as a "murder by mistake" but recommended further investigation.

Heavy Life Loss In Explosion On Docked Freighter

Santos, Brazil, Dec. 21.—The salt-peter and sulphur cargo of the 25-year-old Swedish freighter Britt-Marie exploded Friday, splitting the ship in two, tossing flaming bodies hundreds of feet into the air and wrapping fire to the gaint coffee warehouses along the waterfront.

The ship sank within a few minutes, leaving the water strewn with wreckage and injured. At least 20 stevedores were aboard the vessel when a series of small explosions in the hold gave warning of the big blast.

Some were believed to have saved themselves by leaping overboard and swimming ashore. Most of the crew of 25 were aboard when the cargo exploded but the captain and several others were ashore.

The blast rocked the city. The superstructure jumped high in the air in a billowing mass of flame and smoke.

Wood and iron fragments fell 1500 feet away. Mangled bodies were found by the concussion.

Bags of burning sulphur were scattered on the roofs of warehouses sitting there after. Water-front residents ran panic-stricken from their homes into showers of flaming fragments.

Premier Directs His Blackshirt Troops To Prosecute Conquest Of Ethiopia

Britain Looks To Nations' League

'All For One' Is Substance Of Speech By Cabinet Member

Premier Mussolini directed his blackshirt troops to proceed with the campaign conquest in Ethiopia today and Great Britain again took up the challenge to "sanctionist" nations with a warlike appeal for aid.

The Italian dictator, according to reports to the now dead Franco-British proposals for peace, posed his "unshakably united" people against "disorganized and contradictory" nations seeking to penalize him for taking up arms against Ethiopia.

At Birmingham, Neville Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, who had been mentioned widely as possible new foreign secretary, told an audience of conservative party workers "I trust the nations of the League will show they are prepared to make themselves resist any attack which may be made on any one of their number." Thus were the lines drawn last for a resumption of the economic battle between the League of Nations under British leadership and Italy over the question of aggression in East Africa.

Troops were busy at the front. An Ethiopian government communique issued at Addis Ababa said the vanguard of Gen. Jamal Ahmed's troops on the northern front had recaptured Edda Sillat, 30 miles west of Addis Ababa, and Dadd Sheh from the Italians. Dispatches said Italian losses were considerable, that 10 tanks were captured.

Paris, Dec. 21.—(AP)—If Premier Laval fails to stave off a European war, authoritative quarters disclosed last night France is prepared to defend herself and aid Great Britain in the event of an Italian attack.

Recent movements of French troops, ships and airplanes were disclosed as significant in diplomatic circles, following a disclosure in London that Britain has asked Mediterranean powers what precautions they have taken.

Lighted Tree Placed On Top Of Tall Stack

Fabricated out of pipe, a 30-foot tree has been placed on top of the 175-foot stack of the Florida Power & Light Company's power plant just across the bridge on the road to DeLand, and will be lighted every night until New Year's.
