But the 20 Lake Brantley High School students and one normally earthbound reporter who took their first glider flight last weekend got much too excited to simply sit back and enjoy the silence. It was a bad day for gliding, cold, windy and cloudless. Gliding in Central Florida - where there are no mountains - depends on thermals, wind currents created by the sun's uneven heating of the earth. Lakes and woodlands absorb heat, while open fields and sandy stretches reflect it - and a glider can soar up into the

On a good day, you can glide for hours. The world's record for staying aloft is 56 hours and an eight-hour flight is nothing unusual. But last Sunday, the longest ride lasted a little less than 20 minutes. But 20 minutes is more than long enough for the normally earthbound reporter. The climb up - at the end of a tow chain pulled by a conventional powered aircraft - is long and steep. The winds bounce you around and the other plane's bouncing is transmitted down the tow chain to multiply the effects. The two-man glider, a lightweight plane designed to float on the slightest wind, seems dangerously fragile. But then the spinning dial reaches 2,000 feet and you pull a knob, releasing the tow chain, and soar peacefully along, high above the earth. It's almost eerie. There are no engine noises, no throbbing motor underneath your feet to reassure you that, yes, there is something keeping you up here, 2,000 feet above the ground. You're just gliding, silently. Acres of forest slide past. You can see Oviedo, Lake

Seminole VD Rate Shows High Drop Herald Staff Writer

Florida still leads the nation in infectious syphilis and the incidence of gonorrhea in 1975 was up 5.7 per cent over 1974, according to Dr. Clifford H. Cole, administrator of the state's veneral disease control program. But, Seminole County's syphilis rate dropped 29.4 per cent during the last half of 1975 compared with the first six months of the year, said Dr. Cole. In Seminole County the rate of gonorrhea also declined 21.1

per cent during the second half of last year compared with the first half. The county's dubious distinction of ranking 19th of Florida's 67 counties during January to June 1975 improved to 22nd in the state during the July to December period. Seminole's ranking in the incidence of infectious syphilis went from 16th to 19th in the last half of the year while its gonorrhea rating went from 20th to 22nd in Florida in the last half

of the 1975 year.

"On a clear day you can see the towers at Cape Kennedy." the pilot says, To the earthbound reporter, it's like a dream of flying suddenly come true. To the students, it's part of a science class at Lake Brantley called aviology and they describe

their experience in scientific terms. "The only trouble I had was losing altitude on turns," said one who'd flown the glider himself for a few minutes. Others talk about air speed, spoilers, altimeters, other technical terms.

Some of the students come from military families where flying is no more remarkable than driving a car. Almost all have more than a passing interest in aviation. Instructor Jerry Kirkman describes the aviology course as "interdisciplinary," involving physics, carth sciences, aeronautics, biology and a smattering of other

The field trip to Flying Seminole Ranch east of Oviedo is the students' introduction to flight.

Although the course is not designed as a 'ground' school' program for training pilots, some of the students do go on to earn licenses. Kirkman is an avid flyer licensed for powered craft, but not for gliders.

This morning he stays on the ground, taking pictures, answering questions, joking with the young flyers. The atmosphere on the gound is very much like waiting in line for a particularly wild roller coaster ride.

But the glider beats any roller coaster on earth. The slow, wide circles thousands of feet above the ground, looking down on houses and trees and cars reduced to the size of toys, is absolutely breathtaking - and the natural fear of flying puts an edge of excitement onto it. And it's naturally real - soaring just like a bird, on

wings and air currents and, for those of us who don't understand the scientific reasons why the glider won't suddenly crash to earth, a prayer. The glider is more like a bird than a powered air-

plane, even though it's built of aluminum, for it simply skims across the treetops on a breath of wind. The reality of it makes it that much more exhilirating. "Yeah," said one of the fliers with a chuckle, "it's sort of a natural high."

Lockheed Chairman, Officer **Resign Over Bribe Scandal**

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Lockheed Aircraft Corp., plagued by an international kickback scandal and a \$600 million debt, has forced the resignation of its top two executives.

Resigning in the shakeup Friday were Daniel Haughton, chairman of the huge aerospace firm, and A. Carl Kotchian, vice chairman and chief operating officer. The resignations came at a special board meeting called in the wake of Kotchian's admissions to Congress that Lockheed had paid officials of several countries at least \$22 million to aid sales of its aircraft.

Board member Robert W. Haack, 58, who was elected chairman pro tem, said the directors felt "the company, employes and shareholders would perhaps be better protected if they (Haughton and Kotchian) as potentially controversial people excused themselves from the premises."

Nigerian President Killed In Aborted Military Coup

NIAMEY, Niger (AP) - Nigerian President Murtala Muhammed was assassinated during Friday's abortive military coup and was replaced as chief of state by Gen. Olusegun Obasanjo, chief of staff of Nigeria's armed forces, Lagos radio announced Saturday.

Muhammed was buried early today near his birthplace in Kano, in northern Nigeria, the broadcast said, and the ruling Military Council decreed seven days of official mourning throughout the country.

Radio Lagos also confirmed that the coup led by Lt. Col. Dimka collapsed and that the ringleaders were arrested. Earlier, both the Manchester Guardian and London's Daily Express said in reports from Lagos that Muhammed's car had been riddled with bullets in a roadside ambush early Friday morning.

Airline To Halt Service

NASSAU, Bahamas (AP) - Pan American World irways will stop flying to the Bahamas next month after 47 years of service to the sun-baked islands, carrier officials say.

Max Gurney, Pan Am's Bahamas director, said Friday that the airline has applied to the Civil Aeronautics Board for the service suspension as part of cost-cutting efforts in the Bahamas and the Caribbean. Gurney said the petition asks for suspension of daily round trip service from New York to Nassau and Rock Sound, Eleuthera, as of March 15.



Statewide, Dr. Cole said, the incidence in 1975 of infectious syphilis was up 10.7 per cent and gonorrhea was up 5.7 per cent However, the state official noted, this is less of an increase

than the 49.8 per cent increase in syphilis and the 17 per cent increase in gonorrhea which occurred in 1974. Florida still leads the nation in syphilis, he said. Its rate of cases per 100,000 population for 1975 is 56 per cent higher than

California which is second highest. Florida's rate is 37.9 per 100,000. California's is 24.3. Florida had 3,228 cases of infectious syphilis reported in 1975. "The drop in syphilis rates we had in the last six months of

1975 is the first downward turn Florida has had in seven years," Dr. Cole said. "In the areas where syphilis continues uncontrolled," Dr.

Cole said, "there is a failure to observe the first principles of syphilis control

who are concerned about veneral disease. They must provide quick and accurate diagnosis of symptoms. And they have to isolate each infection which means finding its source and preventing its spread."

In the national ranking for gonorrhea rates for 1975, Florida was fifth behind Alaska, Georgia, South Carolina and Tennessee. Florida's rate of cases of gonorrhea last year was 766 per 100,000. This means that one case of gonorrhea was reported for every 130 persons in Florida. This does not include those infections which were not reported.







# Some Theory

William Seidman, President Ford's top advisor on economipolicy, finds much to be cheerful about in his review of economic indicators. However, he cites one indicator which could spell trouble. It's the U.S. Congress, which appears to be in a mood to try to hasten recovery along by pumping billions of dollars into programs to create jobs.

The danger, as Mr. Seidman points out, is that resorting to this old remedy could reverse the headway being made against inflation, thus bringing back the conditions that led to recession in the first place.

Mr. Seidman says that 1.3 million of the two million jobs lost in the recession already have been restored. The anticipated gains in industrial production this year should restore more, and with steady growth the economy again can begin to absorb new workers entering the labor force at the rate of 500,000 a year.

While everyone would like to see unemployment eased more rapidly, the congressional formulas to do so involve staggering federal expenditures, and no one is really sure what the results would be. Democrats advocating a \$6.2 billion job program say it will put 800,000 people to work. How do they know? An authoritative study by the Urban Institute maintains that about 60,000 jobs can be credited to each \$1 billion spent on federal jobmaking programs - less than half of what the Democrats

The idea that the government can spend the country into prosperity is an old one. If our long history of using federal deficits to stimulate the economy tells us anything, it is that any "prosperity" that results is the kind that self-destructs when the bill for inflation comes due.



Did you know that Uncle Sam, one of the United States' most beloved symbols, actually lived? President Ford has accepted on behalf of the American people the original painting of the official U.S. State Department version of "Uncle Sam" done more than 25 years ago by the late artist, Herbert R. Noxon, at the request of the department and found recently stored in an attic of a house in

Acquired by the National Association of Realtors, the painting was presented to President Ford by Philip C. Smaby, of Minneapolis, president, and Harry G. Elmstrom, Ballston Spa, N.Y., first vice president of the association. Its origin and history was authenticated by the Smithsonian Institution where it will remain for public display. President Ford's acceptance of the "Uncle Sam" painting is the start of a nationwide program to tell

the story of the real American who became one of our nation's most beloved symbols. "Most Americans do not know that Uncle Sam actually To help preserve this nearly-lost bit

Americana, the association has produced a 23minute color film and reproduced a 90-page book,

both entitled "Uncle Sam" The Man and the Legend." Both the film and the book will be made available to schools, churches, libraries, civic, social and fraternal organizations across the

They tell the story of Samuel Wilson of Troy, New York, the man on whom the legend is based. A resolution was passed by the Congress in 1961 recognizing Samuel Wilson as the namesake of this national symbol. The use of the name, "Uncle Sam," dates from the War of 1812 when it was first associated with Wilson, a provisioner to the U.S. Army.

Known affectionately as "Uncle Sam" in the area, his barrels of beef were stamped by the government purchasing agents with the letters "U.S." to indicate they were the property of the government. It was this identification which was the foundation for the widespread use of the name "Uncle Sam." Prior to that time, the initials "U.S." had not been used to mean the United States.

In 1950, the State Department needed a portrait of the national symbol, "Uncle Sam," to answer requests from people in foreign countries who wanted to see what "Uncle Sam" looked like.

In their research, the department officials came across a small booklet called the "The Miracle of America" written by Alton Ketchum and illustrated with drawings of "Uncle Sam" by Herbert H Noxon. At their request, Noxon furnished them with four more pencil illustrations of how he imagined "Uncle Sam" to be.

In a short time, Noxon furnished the State Department with a full length painting. It became the official version of the national symbol. Just prior to his death in 1971, Noxon gave the painting, which had been inexplicably returned to him, to his friend, Alton Ketchum, who later stored it in the attic of his Connecticut home.

Smaby said the National Association of Realtors decided to draw national attention to Samuel Wilson during the Bicentennial Celebration because so few Americans realized a real, live man was the inspiration for the father-like figure used to represent the United States: humanized, benign, friendly, yet

firm, and dressed in the "Star Spangled Banner." In the course of its own research, the association came upon and purchased the original Noxon painting. It arranged with Ketchum to reprint his

The "Who's Who" of River Gold, in addition to the cast of 78 dancers who have been rehearsing for almost six months, includes those dozens of volunteers whose labors of love were donated behind the scenes.

More than two years ago, Walter Rye reminded his daughters, Miriam Wright and Valerie Weld, artistic directors and choreographers of Ballet Guild of Sanford-Seminole, (BGS) that although he did not intend to interfere in their business, the country's 200th birthday was just around the corner, and they would surely want to do something special in commemoration of the Bicentennial?

And what a gigantic 200th birthday party resulted! The artistic directors approached Mildred M. Caskey on the matter and her brainstorm mushroomed into a vast Broadwaystyle production.

In her quest for historical data of the area, Miss Caskey, first vice president of BGS board of directors, became such a permanent personality at Henry S. Sanford Museum-Library that she was appointed curator there.

Formerly from Springfield, Ill., where she owned and operated her own dance school and founded Copper Coin Regional Ballet Co., Miss Caskey was also choreographer and associate director with Springfield Municipal Opera, Springfield Theatre Guild, and Corn Stock Theatre-in-the-Round, where she designed the dances for some 60 ballets and musicals

"River Gold" is the fourth historical dance drama Miss Caskey has conceived. In 1968 the ballet, "Shadows of Glory," based on the life of Abraham Lincoln as a young man, earned her a citation from the Governor of Illinois. This ballet which she wrote, directed and choreographed, was in commemoration of the Illinois State Susquecentennial.

She has now directed her talent at the Sanford area. With her, the Rye sisters have arranged the music and spent endless hours converting 200 years of history along the shores of the St. Johns River into a dance extravaganza. Another behind the scenes star is Dr. Genevieve Richardson

of Deltona, the costume designer for "River Gold." She has created more than 400 costumes, ranging from rags to riches. Hundreds of yards of carefully selected fabrics and complementing accents have been authentically executed in the dazzling costumes of the early settlers, the Seminoles, the Revolution, lavish life at the mansion, dashing senores and flirtatious senoritas, can-can girls and on through to today. encompassing the fantasyland of Disney World. 



# Special Touch For Laid Work

Laid Work is done in two separate stages. In part one, an area of the design is completely covered with flat, side-by-side stitches. # It Lasted 39 Seconds 'Quake Was Terrifying

### By JEAN PATTESON Herald Staff Writer

GUATEMALA CITY - Terror was tangible in Guatemala at 3 a.m. on Feb. 4 For 39 devastating seconds it crashed and thundered through he Central American country, an earthquake which registered 7.5 on the Richter scale. A second tremor followed an hour later,

and the third major shock came at noon Feb. 6. When a small group of local news reporters flew into Guatemala City Friday, the country was still shuddering with occasional "aftershocks' - a terrifying feeling as the earth shifts beneath one's feet and buildings tremble.

The plane which flew the news team was an old DC-6 cargo carrier chartered by Green Thumb Corp in Apopka to carry relief upplies to the stricken Guatemalans. Specifically, to deliver food, clothing and blankcts to workers on Green Thumb's nurseries near Guatemala City, and medical supplies to Roosevelt lospital in the capital.

Learning about Green Thumb's proposed relief effort earlier in the week, David Gray of Altamonte Springs, head of the nonprofit foundation Concern In Mankind, started soliciting con-

'The thing just mushroomed," said Gray. "Supplies started pouring in from local people, and then from as far away as New Jersey and Indiana. We took on board about \$600,000 worth of goods - tents, food, orthopedic supplies.

We were met in Guatemala by Ralph Faircloth, director of Green Thumb in Central America and brother of Paul Faircloth, who heads Green Thumb's Apopka operation. The airport was humming with activity - all of it directed by

rifle-toting military personnel. A steady stream of relief planes touched down to unload building supplies, medicines, food and the nuch-needed warm clothing and blankets to protect the ousands of homeless from freezing temperatures of the angelist Billy Graham disembarked about the same time we

I. His organization does not usually become involved in this type of relief work, Graham explained, but the Guatemalan earthquake is so enormous a tragedy he felt compelled to help. Graham was met by Guatemalan President Gen. Kshell Laugerud Garcia, who a half-hour later welcomed the president of Panama to a conference in the airport terminal. Once off the runway, the earthquake damage was immediately

risible. Great cracks ran the height of buildings, window panes were shattered, plaster crumbling.

Groups of ragged natives crowded the portable kitchens which trucked 40,000 meals a day in from Mexico. Others cooked their own meals over tiny fires. Tent cities had sprung up in city parks for homeless workers on Green


