As Storm Center Moves Northward To Florida Coast

MIAMI, Oct. 17--(A)-Steadily increasing winds reached 60mile velocity in the Florida Keys and 50 miles at Miami at 2 P. M. today as South Florida battened down for a hurricane approaching with 110 mile winds whirling around its center.

The peak wind at that hour whistled over the little resort fishing town of Islamorada, on upper Matecumbe Key, about 60 airline

miles south of Misint. The storm center was still offshore but was bearing down on the Florida Keys. Winds were steadily increasing, and fitful Minaquella drummed against thousands of boarded up windows in South Florida.

Palm fronds were stirring and leaves and small branches snapped from trees as gusts drove in from the sea. The heavy weather moved toward the Florida Gulf coast, which may get the heaviest blow after the Keys are passed.
