

Flight restrictions lifted at OSIA

The Federal Aviation Administration announced Monday that flights under Visual Flight Rules (VFR) may resume today around the Orlando metropolitan area.

The National Security Council required the FAA to impose VFR restrictions in all Class B airspace — a 20-nautical-mile radius around major airports — following the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11. The restric-

tion grounded all VFR flights out of the Orlando/Sanford International Airport, which falls within the 20-mile radius.

"It's good news for us," said Larry Dale, president of OSIA. "Most of our general aviation flights — pleasure planes and some business planes — have been grounded, and it's hurt a number of businesses here at the airport. It's also had an affect on some of the training Comair has been able to do."

Larry Tague, president of Orlando Sanford Aircraft Sales, said he was pleased

to have the restrictions lifted. Tague's company sells aircraft to general aviation users.

"We couldn't fly the planes at all, so we couldn't demonstrate them for our customers," Tague said. "We also have customers who fly into the airport. They couldn't do that under these restrictions."

Tague said allowing VFR flights will "put us back to normal," though he doubts the company will be able to recoup lost sales.

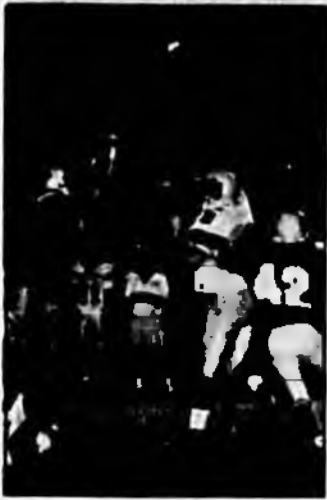
"We've sold one aircraft since Sept. 11.

We average about five or six during a that same time frame," Tague said. "Of course our overhead costs never stopped. We still had employees to take care of."

Until Monday's announcement, only those pilots rated for Instrument Flight Rules (IFR) could fly in the Class B airspace.

"You had to file an IFR flight plan, which means you have to follow a prescribed route, be under air traffic control

Deputies host fund-raiser for memorial park

A fun-filled day is planned in the effort to build a community-funded park. It all takes place Saturday, Nov. 3 in Oviedo.

Problem Neighbors

Sunland residents say apartment complex riddled with flaws

SANFORD — A county neighborhood continues to fight city hall over an apartment complex approved by the city of Sanford.

Residents in Sunland Estates, which is just outside the Sanford city limits, say the city should not allow residents to move into Wyndham Place Apartments until problems with drainage, lights and traffic, among others, are fixed.

"We've been down there (city hall) since February fussing," said resident Ruth O'Neill. "Now I have lights coming into my home." Resident Donna Dondanville also has lights shining into her living room. According to Dondanville, the

developer demolished her retaining wall and promised to reconnect her fence with the new wall required by the city. Six months later, Dondanville, who is recovering from a quadruple bypass, continues to chase her dog almost daily because it escapes from her yard through the hole left by the missing wall.

"I start shaking when I think about this," she said. "I'm so furious. Our property values are definitely going down."

O'Neill and her neighbors in Sunland Estates were told most of the apartment buildings would be two-story; however, more than 90 percent of the 260-unit complex is three-story.

Other concerns of the neighbors include drainage from the apartments running into their lots, illegal U-turns at the entrance of their subdivision and foundation cracks in homes.

Originally neighbors complained about a Styrofoam and stucco wall constructed around the perimeter of the complex. In the development order, the city demanded the wall to be block, but the developer claims they received a permit from

the city to build the Styrofoam wall. City Commissioner Randy Jones brought the discrepancy to city hall and the old wall will be torn down.

Three years ago, the Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission denied the land use, but was overturned by the city commission. Mike Skat, chairman of the P&Z board, said he knew it was a "poor place" to put an apartment

Police use speed to attract teens

LONGWOOD — Police utilize a variety of programs to teach juveniles the dangers of illegal drug and alcohol use, but no other activity catches the eye like "Beat the Heat."

Complete with hotrods and dragsters, a group of local police officers are keeping Seminole's roads safer by teaching juveniles not only the horrors brought on by impaired driving, but encouraging drivers not to drag race in the streets.

Beat the Heat is a national program sponsored by the National Hot Rod Association (NHRA) with hundreds of chapters across

the US and Canada. The theme of the program is "racing for education," and to become a member one first has to be a police officer or firefighter.

According to Longwood investigator Ryan Bruce, flashy cars help "break down the barriers" between police officers and juve-

niles. Since March, Bruce has put about 300 hours of his own time into his 1976 Chevy Nova hotrod making it one of the hottest road machines in Seminole.

"All these cars are built with money out of our own pocket

Deputies close unlicensed senior home

Seminole County deputies, including one specializing in Elder Services, and the Department of Children and Families arrested a Sanford woman for operating an assisted living facility without a license.

Mary Elizabeth Cooper, 67, was arrested after an investigation uncovered she did not have a license to operate her business. The home is located at 2979

Truman Street in Sanford. At one time, deputies say the home was a licensed assisted living facility to care for the elderly. The license, however, has not been renewed in two or three years.

A DCF representative visited the home on Friday, Oct. 19 and noted unsafe and unsanitary conditions.

On Monday, Oct. 22, Seminole deputies and DCF visited the home and removed the resi-

dents, who were then placed in other facilities that are licensed. Those removed from the facility were a 99-year-old man and two women, who are both 82 years old. Their names were withheld for confidentiality.

Cooper was arrested and charged with Owning/Operating an Assisted Living Facility without a License. She has since posted bond and has been freed from jail.

Animal shelter reopens Friday

SANFORD — Seminole County's animal shelter is re-opening Friday with a new name, new management and a chance for people to lock-up their spouse, boss or any other member of the community.

The SPCA of Central Florida Seminole Branch is hosting a "Whine" and Cheese Lock-Up from 1 to 3 p.m. on Oct. 26 at the newly renovated facility. It will be the first event held at the shelter since the financially troubled Humane Society of Seminole County announced in June its plans to merge with the Orlando Humane Society — creating the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (SPCA) of Central Florida.

"We are hosting the event to let people know we are here, we are open, and we aren't going anywhere," said Edward DeAguilera, SPCA of Central Florida manager of community relations. "And, we want people to come out and show their support."

Discussions for the merger began earlier this year when the Humane Society of Seminole County approached the Orlando

County teaches residents how to create a habitat

GENEVA — Seminole residents wanting to commune with nature in their very own backyards should journey out to the Ed Yarbrough Nature Center in Geneva Saturday.

From 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the nature center will be holding "create a backyard habitat day." Chris Duby, of the county's natural lands program, said the program is an opportunity for residents to learn how to respect and to live with wildlife in their own backyards.

"There's good and bad ways to interact with wildlife," Duby explained. "We basically offer up ideas on how to safely attract wildlife."

Too often residents throw table scraps to animals, but according to Duby that is just conditioning the animals to associate humans with food, which can be especially dangerous with several animals, especially bears and alligators.

"They think they're doing a good thing by giving out left-over french fries or pizza, but it's an easy meal for them," Duby said. "Even if you live next to a retention pond you're probably going to have to deal with alligators one time or another."

The backyard habitat day program includes exhibits, displays and nature crafts for children, plus two video presentations;

shells around animals and learn how to create a pond/water garden.

Through the exhibits and displays residents will learn how to safely attract wild animals to their property by planting natural vegetation and butterfly gardens and building ponds, birdhouses and brush piles.

According to Duby, small yard ponds with fish have become the rave, but what many residents don't expect is the ponds also attract turtles, frogs and even snakes.

Duby also suggests the program is for all residents, not just those who live in rural areas.

"Anywhere I go, even here in downtown Sanford, I've seen wildlife," Duby said, pointing out he's viewed opossum, fox and raccoon in the downtown area.

Special appearances will also be made by live animals that residents may find in their backyard. Door prizes, drawings for native plants, birdhouses and more are also part of the program. The Ed Yarbrough Nature Center is in the 180-acre Geneva Wilderness Area that lies to the south of the Geneva community on County Road 426 in East Seminole County. CONFUSED YOUNG WOMAN IN LOVE

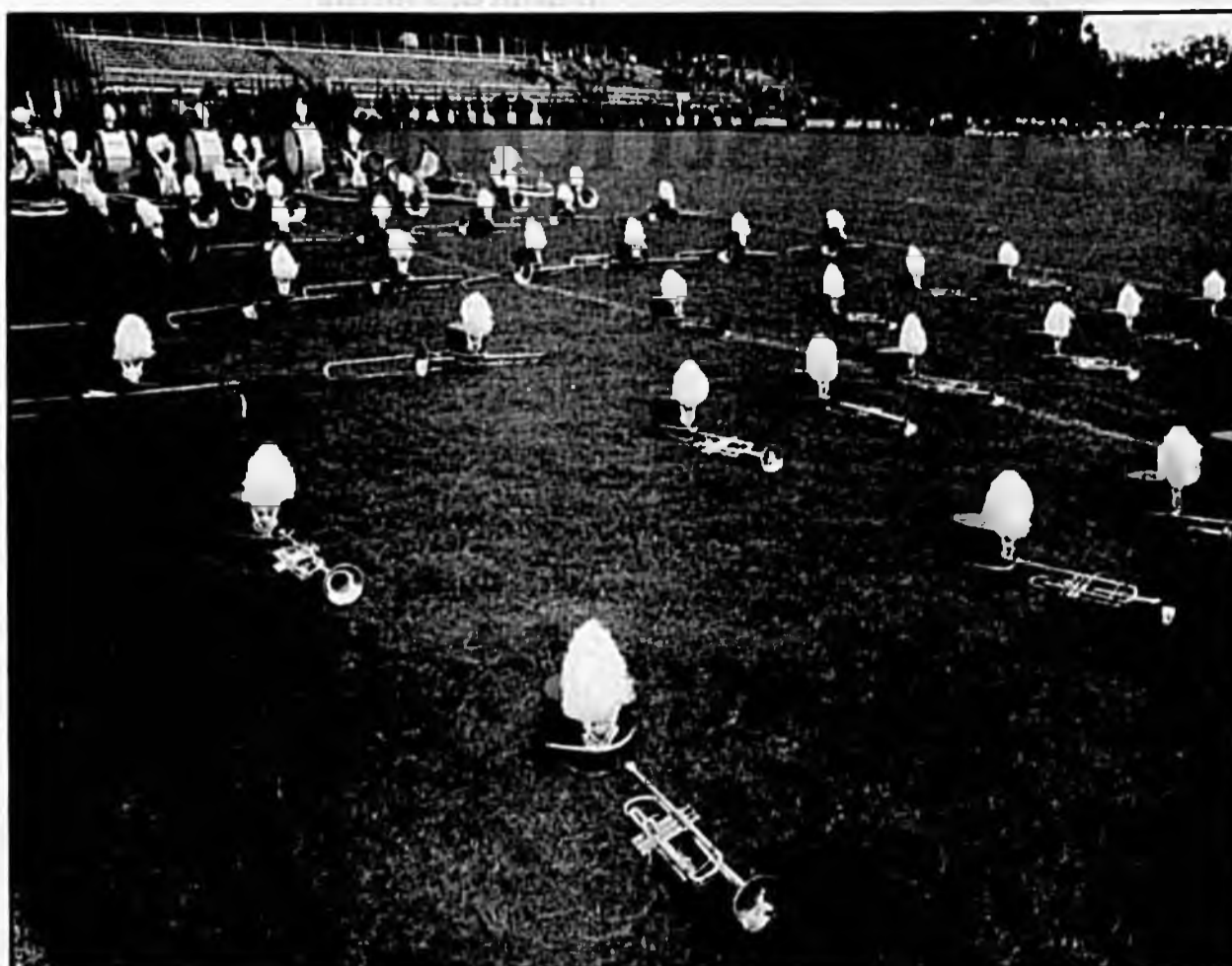

For years, the owner and his son have done all the cooking. They make all of their own soups, garnish sauces and cook all their own meats, not to mention their fresh biscuits and home made sausage Gravy made fresh everyday.

They have tried to keep their prices low for the senior citizens, working people and large families. Anyone can afford to eat at the Golden Lamb. They have also made a few changes. Come into a clean restaurant and try the good food at a fair price and excellent, friendly service.

and donations," Bruce said. "We burn a lot of midnight oil on our own time working on these cars. It's something we enjoy doing, and we know how to do it."

Since 1993, Bruce has competed in drag races at sanctioned tracks and believes the best way to stopping young drivers from racing on the streets is to get them interested in real drag racing.

Five years ago, Seminole County Sheriff's Office Sgt. Mike Messer started the Florida chapter of Beat the Heat. He said he felt a need to get involved after working crash scenes where juveniles were recklessly speeding.

"I've had to give two death notices for kids that were fooling around on the roads," Messer said. "It's not a fun thing to go notify the parents."

"When we first started this thing up, we were doing everything — races, displays," Messer said. "The third year I was in this I think I contacted 10,000 kids myself."

Next week marks retirement for Messer so the program has been transferred to Longwood investigator Jim Hockenberry. Retirement will close the chapter of law enforcement in Messer's life, but his fervor for racing will never die.

After 20 years of racing, several number one finishes, and an ESPN racing cameo, Messer's desire to drag race continues to grow, as so does his collection of dragsters. With retirement, Messer hopes to have more time to work on his new funny car, which he estimates will easily break 200 mph on the quarter-mile. He also owns 1932 Bantam and a 1965 Cobra hotrods.

The local Beat the Heat program is gaining momentum, especially with recent troubles of illegal drag racing in Orange County, said Bruce. The group is attracting new members and new dragsters and plans to start racing again early next year.

"They think you can just grab a wrench and go," Messer said about kids who think they are drag racers by just street racing. "You have to have an education to run these."

"They're not racing (on the streets). They think they are, but not until they get in a controlled environment where everything is equal can they find out who the best driver is."

The group's roadsters will be on display at Longwood's Halloween carnival Oct. 28 and at the Oviedo Marketplace Mall Nov. 3. The local Beat the Heat group will also be hitting the local schools spreading their important message.

society for financial advice and help, DeAgullera said. The two groups agreed to consolidate and become the SPCA of Central Florida, and the Seminole County Commission approved a lease agreement giving Orlando management of the Sanford facility.

The organization decided in July to temporarily close the facility for renovations and restructuring. About 30 animals living at the shelter were moved to other facilities, and according to DeAgullera, were eventually adopted out to new owners.

"When we got the building, we knew it was in poor shape," DeAgullera said. "We understood that. The previous staff did the best they could with what they had."

However, when the new management conducted a thorough inspection of the facility, it realized major renovations were needed to meet its standards, including an overhaul to the electrical system.

"We found that some critters had chewed up the wires in the ceiling, so most of the building had to be re-wired," DeAgullera said.

More than \$100,000 was spent updating the shelter, including the addition of bacteria resistant floors. Some walls and ceilings were knocked down, a few were added and the electrical system replaced.

"Another \$100,000 is needed to get the shelter up to par," he said. "But, we need to open. Seminole County needs its shelter."

During the facility's soft opening on Friday, community members and officials will notice the building is brighter, cleaner and more accommodating to animals and visitors than it has been in the past. However, according to DeAgullera, the changes are not just aesthetic. With its restructuring, the Seminole shelter will now be able to provide various new programs to the community, including a low-cost spay and neuter clinic, an on-duty veterinarian and an on-site wellness clinic.

There are other changes. The facility is now a low-kill, rather than a no-kill, shelter, which means aggressive or animals in bad health will be euthanized. Vouchers will no longer be given to spay or neuter an adopted animal. Instead, the dog or cat is required to be spayed or neutered before they leave the facility.

The new staff will include Operations Manager Lindsey Bayer, an animal cruelty investigator and between 10 and 15 other full- and part-time employees. Three of the 10 employees working at the facility before the merger are returning.

"We are going to do things differently now, and we told them we are going to go by our rules," DeAgullera said. "Some decided not to stay."

DeAgullera said although the Orlando-based organization is now managing the facility, the Seminole branch will be managed on-site by Bayer.

"Seminole County has a different character than Orlando," he said. "We know we can't run the shelter from Orlando. That's why the staff will be based in Seminole."

DeAgullera said funds will also be fairly distributed among both facilities based on need and circumstance. Various fund-raisers will also help raise money for the Seminole facility.

The SPCA of Central Florida is

also planning an aggressive community outreach program for Seminole to help raise awareness of the shelter. Along with Friday's Whine and Cheese Lock-up, the Wiggle Waggle Walk is planned for Saturday, Oct. 27, in Fort Mellon Park. Registration begins at 10 a.m., and contests, including "Best Pet Sing-a-long" will be held throughout the morning. Complimentary refreshments will be available for animals and their owners, and all money raised will go toward the SPCA of Central Florida.

Many of the programs offered at the Orlando facility will also be available in Seminole, including a strong volunteer program, pet-assisted therapy programs and training and education programs. The shelter's goal is to take a proactive, rather than reactionary approach to animal welfare.

"It's important to us to illustrate our programs and have a strong PR campaign in Seminole County," DeAgullera said. "Previously, the only time the community heard about the facility is when it needed money. They did what they could, but

we are going to do things differently."

"Our mission is to promote responsible human behavior toward animals, and our vision is basically to put ourselves out of a job," he said. "The vision is for every animal to have a home and for us to no longer be needed."

Friday's Whine and Cheese Lock-Up will be held at the facility, located at 2800 County Home Road in Sanford, next to Flea World. People interested in attending should make reservations by Wednesday and can call

407-351-7722, ext. 269 to RSVP. Each guest will receive refreshments, and entertainment and door prizes will be provided, including the chance to win two tickets on Delta Airlines.

The first temporary resident will also arrive at the Seminole facility during the event, with others arriving throughout the day. The shelter will officially open to the public on Saturday.

Continued from Page 1A complex and feels terrible for nearby residents.

"The finished product is nothing like I thought it would be," Skat said, who voted against the land use which allowed the apartments to be constructed.

According to Skat, the good news is the developer, the county and city are working to alleviate drainage problems in the neighborhood, which may not be the result of the new apartments, but rather just the drainage inefficiency of the half century old neighborhood.

"I know right now it hasn't been a pretty sight out here, but we're going to work diligently to get it cleaned up," said apartment project manager Wayne Carroll.

Unfortunately for residents some of their problems go past the apartments unsightliness and is now effecting their quality of life. When the apartments were first brought before the board, they were labeled as a mix of three- and two-story buildings, but ask any Sunland resident and they'll swear all the buildings are three stories tall.

In fact, more than 90 percent of the 260 apartments are three-story buildings, despite assurances by the property owner during a P&Z meeting that there would be more two-story buildings than three-story buildings.

O'Neill's yellow, nicely landscaped home is now dwarfed by the three story apartments. Adding to the height of the apartments is the fact that the developer raised the land approximately four feet near O'Neill's home. Visible cracks in O'Neill's home and sidewalks

were caused by vibrators compacting the soil at the apartment complex, she said.

According to resident Julian Johnson, a retired city of Orlando and Seminole County engineer, he was surprised the city allowed the land to be raised that high.

"To begin with a fill this high will create pressure in ground water," he said. "They're going to have to relieve that pressure some way."

Johnson also said he was shocked the Florida Department of Transportation allowed the apartment complex to impact the nearby roads. According to many residents, they have to battle drivers making U-turns at their subdivision entrance.

Residents speculate the problem will increase when apartment renters are traveling down Lake Mary Boulevard turn right onto 17/92 and want to get into Wyndham Place Apartments. The current median doesn't

allow for left hand turns so residents say drivers make U-turns at their entrance to go into Wyndham Place Apartments.

Another concern of Johnson's is before the apartments were constructed there was plenty of room for Florida Power and Light to maintain power poles, but he fears a masonry wall built by the complex will prohibit routine maintenance. He cited the broken pole in his own backyard as an example.

Despite all their complaints the residents of Sunland Estates say they are receiving little to no support from their county commissioner, Daryl McLain.

"Our beef is just not with the apartments, it's with the city and McLain too," said resident Laura Fernandez. "It's costing taxpayers money, and he doesn't seem to care."

The FAA lifted VFR restrictions in Class B airspace at 15 sites last week. Monday's announcement removed the restrictions at 12 more Class B sites, including Orlando. Dale

said the only restrictions that remain are in Washington D.C., Boston and New York.

Other restrictions still apply. Only those aircraft equipped with encoding transponders will be able to fly VFR in Class B airspace. Pilots' whose aircraft do not have the transponders must obtain a waiver before flying.

Furthermore, the FAA has requested all VFR pilots in Enhanced Class B airspace fly normally and avoid aerobatics, circling or loitering, and unpredictable flight paths.

Winter Springs makes the show

WINTER SPRINGS — It was a bitter-sweet 72 hours for the Winter Springs football team.

On Friday, senior Deon Jenkins took the opening kickoff, broke up the middle and then down the left sideline for a 95-yard kickoff return and the Bears never trailed again as they rolled to a 35-0 Class 5A-District 3 victory over Titusville at the A. W. Epps Sports Complex.

With that victory, Winter Springs clinched its first-ever playoff berth.

First-year head coach Steve Katz then led his Bears onto the home turf on Monday looking for the 5A-3 title against Mainland in a make-up game resched-

uled from September 14th.

But just as they had done in earlier victories over Lake Mary and Lyman, the Buccaneers got a turnover on the opening play of the game and quickly scored to take command of the game and never looked back in blanking Winter Springs 26-0.

Just as it had done against Lyman last week, Mainland kicker Eric Fult popped up a short kick that confused the Bears' returners and by the time the ball was

recovered the Bucs' Harold Felder made crushing hit that forced a fumble and Robert Brown recovered at the 12.

Moments later, freshman quarterback Jon Garner found junior Donnell Golphin open for an 18-yard touchdown pass and after Fult's extra point, Mainland led 7-0 just 1:41 into the game.

Winter Springs looked like it would tie the game early in the second quarter as the Bears drove from their own 36 to the Buccaneers 14 before a fumble gave the

back to the visitors at the 19.

After an incomplete pass, Mainland star running back Antonio Hamilton swept around the left side, made a beautiful stop-and-go move and ran 81 yards to pay dirt.

Winter Springs' defense rose up after that and shut down the Buccaneers offense the rest of the half and the score was 14-0 at halftime.

Things looked good for the Bears to start the second half as a clip on the kickoff return gave Mainland the ball at the 10.

But Hamilton immediately put a dagger in the Winter Springs hopes when he sprinted 80 yards down to the 10, only missing a 90-yard TD run when he lost See Bears, Page 2B

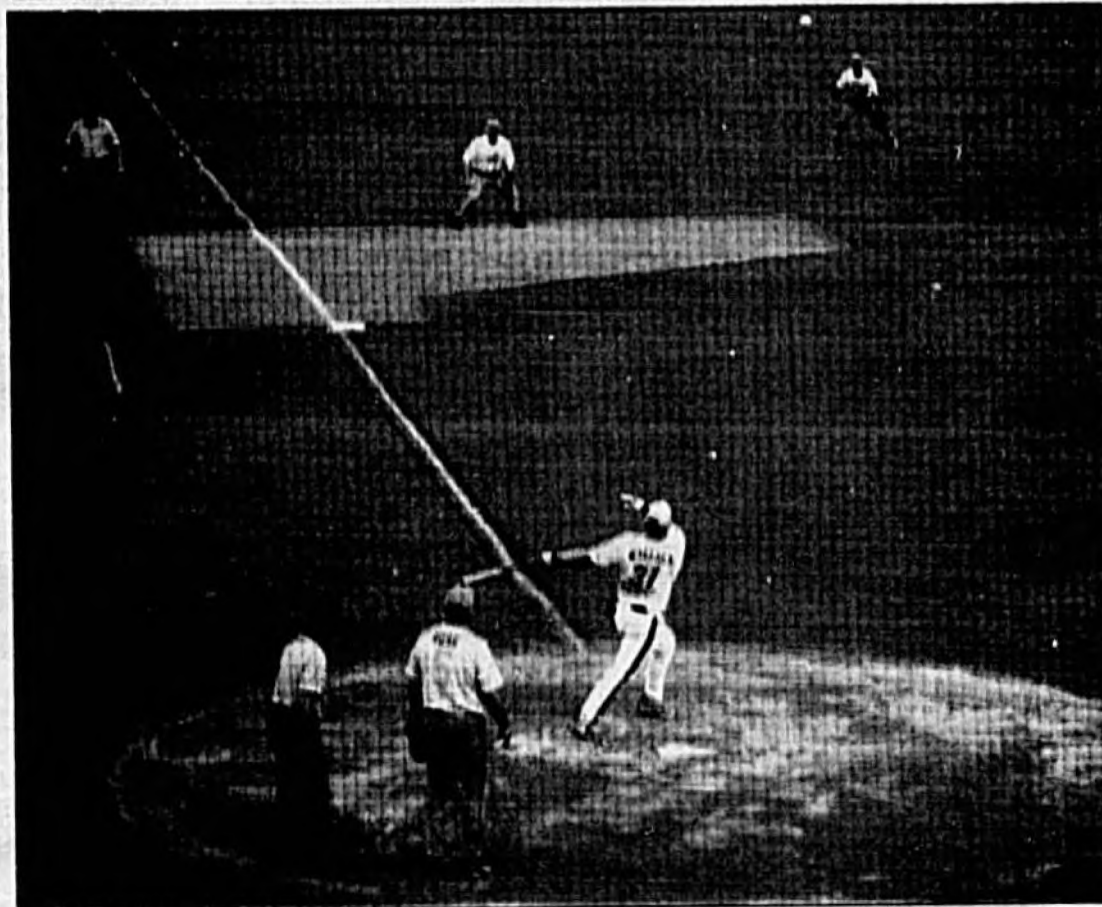
Softball (Amateur Softball Association) banner to its collection.

When they were blanked by Mainland on Monday, but their 4-2 district record, with favorable tie-breakers, is good enough to finish second no matter what the Rams do.

While teams play their final district games this week, it really becomes a matter of winning the final two games for teams like Lake Brantley, Lake Howell, Lake Mary and Seminole if they want to make the playoffs. Two At-Large bids are available in each region, a group of four districts, and the best two records get in.

So it is very important that teams try to finish at least 6-4, a record that was not good enough to get Oviedo or Lake Mary in last year.

This Friday will find Lake Mary (4-4 overall) at Lyman; Jacksonville-Sandalwood at Lake Brantley (5-3); Seminole (4-4) at Oviedo; and in the biggest game, Merritt Island (4-3) at Lake Howell (4-4). All games are set to begin at 7:30 p.m.

The regular season will conclude on Friday, November 2nd, with non-district games that figure to determine who gets into the playoffs.

As if playing Oviedo this week wasn't bad enough, Seminole closes the season by hosting undefeated and Class 4A-District 5 champion Palm Bay, the defending Class 6A State Champions; Lake Mary is at Lake Brantley for a crucial game for both squads; and Winter Springs is at Lake Howell. The other game finds Lyman playing at Olympia, a first-year Orlando program, in a game that will be for pride only.
