Mrs. Mann asked for the students who have heard the rumor that the Red Cross is charging men for sweaters and clothes that have been knitted voluntarily, to raise their hands. Many students raised their hands, and then Mrs. Mann asked them to tell her who told them these rumors, for they can be stopped only by tracing them to their source. When no one could tell her who told them these rumors, Mrs. Mann asked them how did they know that the rumor was true. Many declared that these rumors are nothing but propaganda that our enemies have spread to destroy the organization that is the mother of the people—the American Red Cross.

In conclusion Mrs. Mann read the Red Cross Policy, which was recently published by the Red Cross. The policy is as follows: "It has always been and now is the definite policy and instructions of the Red Cross that no charges shall ever be made to any service man for any Red Cross article or service which is furnished from the funds or supplies contributed to the Red Cross. If any service man, for example, has ever been asked to pay for sweaters, or any similar articles, the person making such sale was acting wholly contrary to Red Cross policy and instructions. If any such sale should now be made or proposed, the Red Cross desires complete information concerning the incident and the situation will be promptly and vigorously corrected."
