LaGuardia's Election

As this is being written latest reports indicate that Mayor LaGuardia has been re-elected for a third term as head of the administrative government of New York City. Considerable interest has been aroused by this campaign, partly because of the colorful personality of New York's mayor, and partly because of the national implications involved in the election.

New York's cosmopolitan population is emphasized by the fact that in this campaign the Mayor seeking re-elecso.75 tion was a son of Italian parents, immigrants from a country not supposed to be particularly, friendly to the Catholic, himself an immigrant, who got his start in politics on the New York police force.

LaGuardia had the advantage of being at one and the same time leader of the large Italian colony in New York City and then an outstanding supporter of Roosevelt's anti-Axis foreign policy, of being a Republican with the support of such conservative elements as-those led by Thomas E. Dewey while having the backing of such Democratic leaders as President Roosevelt and large segments of the

During the last war LaGuardia served overseas with distinction with the air corps of the United States Army, Following the war he threw himself into politics with such enthusiasm that he was elected successively to the New York State Assembly, the House of Representatives in Washington, and in 1932 to the mayorship of New York ity, probably next to the Presidency, the biggest administrative job in the country.






