

### Texas Heads List Of Grid Teams In A. P. Poll

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The University of Texas football team, which got into high gear for the opening game of its season and hasn't been throttled down since today rolled into first place in the Associated Press football ranking poll.

The awesome scoring machine which Coach Dana Bible has perfected in the fifth year of his five-year plan ran a close second to Minnesota the first two weeks of the poll. A week ago the Longhorns moved up on even terms, and in his fourth weekly ranking went out in front by 37 points.

Of the 121 football experts throughout the country who took part in the voting, 73 made the Texans first choice, and no other split his ballot between Texas and Minnesota. The Longhorns were ranked first or second on 110 ballots, and accumulated 114 1/2 points, 111 for the Gophers, points being awarded on the basis of 10 for a first-place vote, nine for second, eight for third, and so on down.

Texas hit probably its peak of the year earlier in the Southern Methodist last Saturday, when Bible's boys won 34-0. They gave them a total of 230 points for six games, on average of a fraction over 38 per game. On defense they have allowed only 27 points while beating down Colorado, Louisiana State, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Rice and S. M. U.

Minnesota, rated No. 1 team nationally a year ago, slipped from the top after scoring what was perhaps the Gophers' most creditable victory—an 8-7 conquest of Northwestern.

### Navy Searches Bag Of Tricks For Notre Dame

BALTIMORE, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Canny Swede Larson, who likes to play a hunch, is at it again—packing surprise dynamite to throw at the Irish when Navy takes the field Saturday hoping to blast high-flying Notre Dame from the pedestal of football's unbeaten teams.

For the third straight year Larson is digging into the junior varsity grab bag to haul out another prospect for the Middle hall of fame.

Two years ago Dick Shafer came up and ran Army right into the turf. Last year it was Bill Chip, a fancy-blocking back. This time it's Teddy Gilliland, 174-pound speedster from Altoona, Pa.

So the nearly 65,000 fans who will jam Baltimore Municipal Stadium may see new stars. Besides Gilliland, Cassin Florsay, a top-flight soph, will be back after being sidetracked by an appendectomy, and Zeke Zechella is recovered from injuries likely to see action.

But those boys will have to be good to outshine Barnacle Bill Busk, the great Navy back who will be rested and ready.

"We've got to win this one, but it's going to be tough," Larson said.

There'll be nerve-tangling action from start to finish with both teams unbeaten up to the 15th clay of their series in which Navy will be seeking its fourth triumph. Notre Dame has won 11. Each team has won five games and each has played one scoreless tie—Navy with Harvard and Notre Dame with Army.

Larson said the Irish are worth 142 points rolled up since, but defensively the powerful and numerous Middle, linemen claim a slight edge, having yielded only a safety and one touchdown compared with 27 points against the Irish.

### Harmon's Record As Sophomore Is Beaten By Kuzma

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Tom Kuzma made up his mind to come to the University of Michigan when a boy across town from him in Gary, Ind., made a football name for himself with the Wolverines.

Nobody—except maybe relatives and home town cronies—ever expected Kuzma to touch the amazing gridiron record of that other Gary lad, Tom Harmon.

But Gary's Tom No. 11 fooled them. Harmon's Michigan football team might have been choice pickings for several 1941 opponents if Coach Fritz Cralter had not come up with this sophomore to fill Harmon's old tailback position.

By mid-season, this 18-year-old grinder had surpassed Harmon's sophomore record in scoring, had earned his first-year passing mark and had become one of the Western Conference's greatest kickers.

Midway through Michigan's eight-game schedule, Kuzma had scored five touchdowns, passed for two more and made his bid as the greatest Wolverine kicker since Harry Kipke got his diploma in 1924.

Cralter has described Kuzma's kicking, such as his 63-yard boot out of bounds four yards short of the goal against Northwest-

ern, as "miraculous."

Harmon as a sophomore crashed over the goal line three times. He didn't start punting until his junior year. He heaved three touchdown passes.

Kuzma, a 200-pounder, has a five-pound advantage over Harmon. Each of the Gary boys stands six feet, one inch.

The Michigan coach, always reluctant to praise a sophomore, says that "Kuzma is a good boy to have around."

Cralter will tell you Kuzma can match Harmon in power driving and punting, but that he'll never equal Harmon's speed and shifty broken field running.

"Kuzma doesn't pass as well as Harmon did as a sophomore," Cralter says. But Kuzma is improving. He got off to a bad start in this department of the game but redeemed himself in the critical Northwesters' battle by tossing 10 and 20 yards for both of Michigan's touch-downs.

Kuzma had to go to summer school after his freshman year to bring his grades up to Western Conference eligibility standards, but he buckled down and got a "B" average for the summer term while coaches moaned that his chances were less than one to five.

Phi Gamma Delta welcomed the outstanding gridman as a freshman and found him "a great social mixer." He waits on tables at the fraternity house to help meet school expenses.

In a geology class last Spring, Tom met Peggy Cannon, an attractive local brunette. Since then they've been studying the stars together as often as they get a chance. She's a sophomore, Kappa Kappa Gamma, and the only girl on the campus Tom dates. Peggy says that "Tom really dances well."

Aside from studying and acquiring Miss Cannon about the campus, Kuzma says, "Football is my whole life right now." He plans to study business administration and wants to be a salesman.

"A name in football might help me sell when I get out of school, don't you think?" Kuzma asks with a chuckle.

The boy from Gary has had some trouble gaining his posi-

tion as a sophomore football sensation. The trouble started when his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Michael M. Kuzma, forbade him to play football. He talked them out of that. Now they're ardent fans.

"I was the climax on our team at Emerson High School at Gary," Tom admits. "The coach said once 'I never had a chance to make the team.'"

Tom's determination helped alter that. He went to the practice field early, spent his summers kicking and throwing a football. When Harmon returned to Gary in the summers for "lifeguard duty" in the city parks, Kuzma, who had a job cutting the park grass, began exchanging punts with him. "Next summer, Kuzma is going to be a lifeguard."

Michigan's biggest football star didn't begin to shine brighter than the other sophomore candidates until his intrasquad game after spring training last year. He has held that position ever since.

He's a versatile athlete. In high school he excelled in basketball. On hurdles and pole vault and earned a letter in swimming. He is enthusiastic about baseball, but Emerson High didn't have a team. Kuzma plans to go out for basketball.

"If I can just make the grade in football, though, the season's sensation says that's all I really care about in athletics."

LaGuardia's Election

As this is being written latest reports indicate that Mayor LaGuardia has been re-elected for a third term as head of the administrative government of New York City.

New York's cosmopolitan population is emphasized by the fact that in this campaign the Mayor seeking re-election was a son of Italian parents, immigrants from a country not supposed to be particularly friendly to the United States at the moment.

LaGuardia had the advantage of being at one and the same time leader of the large Italian colony in New York City and then an outstanding supporter of Roosevelt's anti-Axis foreign policy.

During the late war LaGuardia served overseas with distinction with the air corps of the United States Army. Following the war he threw himself into politics with such enthusiasm that he was elected successively to the New York State Assembly, the House of Representatives in Washington, and in 1932 to the mayoralty of New York City.

LaGuardia's regime has not been without its mistakes. As he himself has said, "When I pull a bone, it's a beaut." But withal, he has brought more honesty and efficiency to New York City's administration than would have been thought possible for anyone to do at the time Samuel Seabury was investigating Mayor Walker's administration.

Perhaps it is only a straw in the wind—it is from such straws that public policies are made—but Mayor LaGuardia's re-election will be taken as an endorsement of President Roosevelt's foreign policies, not only because LaGuardia enjoyed the active support of Roosevelt, but also because the New York Mayor has been one of the most outspoken critics of Hitlerism in the whole United States.

New Oil Fields Sought

For the first time in years, the American oil industry is drawing more crude from the ground than is being replaced by the opening up of new, or expansion of older fields.

This has been caused by the rapid acceleration in production in the past year. The industry has had to meet an abnormal increase in demand resulting from the broadening of defense production, plus British and now Russian requirements.

If the present rate of increase in demand, now running 10 percent over last year, continues for another year, it will be sufficient to cut the known reserves from an estimated 15 to less than 13 years supply, based on latest reports of the geologists.

To avoid such a depletion, and at the same time to meet all demands for oil products, it will be necessary for the oil industry not only to effect a material increase in exploration and development but also a substantial expansion in refinery equipment.—Wall Street Journal.

When its national defense program for the civilian population, as well as to continue much needed efforts at home.

The Red Cross has more than doubled the number of field directors and medical workers in its employ stationed at Army and Navy posts and hospitals, he said. Red Cross staffs are at 185 stations and hospitals covering 900 points of military and naval service. Approximately 200 field directors and assistants are dealing with the able-bodied personnel of the Army and Navy, while another 140 workers, assigned to Army and Navy hospitals, render medical social service to convalescing patients as well as plan medical rehabilitation.

To facilitate these within-camp activities, Mr. Speer said, the Red Cross has undertaken a \$1,250,000 construction program to erect Red Cross administration buildings at each of 60 Army camps. These buildings contain offices, consultation rooms, living quarters for the Red Cross staff, and a reception room and lecture room for classes in Red Cross first aid and home nursing courses.

In the Crimea, however, the Soviet position continued desperate, with split Russian forces backed up to the sea at Sevastopol and Kerch and threatened with the horror of a "double Dunkirk" attempt at evacuation under artillery and dive bomber bombardment.

The Germans were believed within artillery range of the Black Sea naval base of Sevastopol in the south and to the east had planted the Nazi flag at Feodosiya, port 50 miles from Kerch and the narrow Kerch-isthmus, separating the Crimea from the northern Caucasus. Both Sevastopol and Kerch were under devastating Nazi air attack.

The destroyer Greer had a bloodless engagement with a submarine on Sept. 4; the destroyer Kearny limped 400 miles back to port after being torpedoed on Oct. 17, and the Reuben James was sunk on Oct. 30-31.

The Navy's announcement that "it is believed all living survivors (of the Reuben James) were rescued," marked the greatest single American Navy vessel disaster since the U. S. S. Maine exploded in the harbor at Havana, Cuba, with a loss of 260 officers and men.

The destroyer had 142 men aboard when the steel-nosed torpedo crashed into her. Tonight, on the basis of the Navy announcement, 97 members of her personnel were dead; eight were wounded and 37 were safe and unharmed.
