SANFORD MEETS MILITARY INSTITUTE FRIDAY

WHELCHSELL TO PLACE STRONG TEAM IN FIELD

Half Dozen Backfield Stars Are Groomed For Tilt With Heavy Eleven Of Orlando

Visitors Present Skilled Backfield Sanford Has Slight Advantage In Weight Among Linesmen

A final practice session tonight under the watchful eye of Coach Whelchsell will put Sanford High School's grid warriors on edge for the battle with Orlando Military Institute here tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock on the Municipal Athletic Field gridiron.

Twenty-seven men are groomed for the game, including the first line and Coach Whelchsell's six regular backfield men. The coach has not yet decided which of his backs will begin the game, but the most likely combination to carry the hunt of the scoring work is Stoinoff, Captain Maxwell, Higgins and Tatterton, with Higgins running the team. Haggen and Walker will be given plenty of chance to work.

The regular Sanford linemen are scheduled to start. If the local boys can roll up good score at the start, Pezera will be given another opportunity to display his ability at end when either Stanley or Edinfield are pulled from the game.

Fairfield, reported to be a shifty player, will run the Orlando Military boys from quarter. He will have three good backs, Wolfe, Armstrong and Caldwell to call on for gains through the Sanford line. The Sanford boys have a two pound advantage on the line, but it is concentrated between the guards and Stanley and Edinfield will have to huck heavier men at the ends. Miller at right tackle will face in Peckham a man outweighing him by 30 pounds. Yancy's 208 pounds may be shifted the right side of the line and Miller brought in left tackle to even up the weights.

With no celebration for Armistice Day scheduled in Sanford, a good crowd of local rooters are expected to turn out for a last glimpse of the High School boys. The other two games scheduled for the year are out-of-town.

TUNNEY PLANS TO DEFEND HIS TITLE 3 TIMES IN 1928

First Battle To Be In May, Second In July And Third In September; Break Looms Between Champ & Rickard

NEW YORK, Nov. 10. — (INS) — In a copyright interview, published in the late editions of the New York Evening Journal today, Gene Tunney announced that he intended to defend his world's heavyweight championship three times next summer, naming New York, Chicago and Philadelphia as the cities in which the three title matches were scheduled to take place with the possibility that one of the bouts would be held on the coast.

The first match, Tunney said, would be held in May, the second in July and the third in September. The champion added that he would fight in defense of the title twice more before 1930, at which time he plans to retire.

In his statement, Tunney informed Tex Rickard that if he wished to promote the first championship fight, he would have to make plans to hold the affair before the end of May. Incidentally, the statement declared that Rickard's contract on Tunney's services was not exclusive and that no other promoter had an exclusive call upon those services.

Tunney stated he had promised Mayor Thompson, of Chicago, to defend his title in the great stadium here during the summer, provided the offer made him proved satisfactory. The champion added that he had received an offer from a Chicago promoter to appear in a title next summer and that the offer was altogether satisfactory.

In conclusion, Tunney said that he had under consideration a first class offer to fight on the Pacific coast next summer but did not divulge its source nor the proposed site of the bout.

The world's champion's announced decision to fight three in one season had red all precedent and left boxing world fairly stunned by the news. Usually years instead of months have separated the appearances of successful heavyweight champions but Tunney a ring iconoclast from the first, has had a way of doing and saying extraordinary things.

If he really fights three times in one season, promoters may find trouble in rounding up suitable opponents for him. Rickard already has a heavy weight elimination tournament under way with Jack Sharkey, Tom Heeney, Paulino and Jack Delaney among the entrants, and it was generally understood that the survivor would take on Jack Dempsey next summer for the right to challenge Tunney in what was expected to be the latter's single appearance in the ring next year.

However, if the champion fights in Chicago, the promoter is likely to be Jim Mullin, a personal friend of Tunney's.

Some time ago, a Philadelphia offer was announced with George Godfrey, negro heavyweight, as the proposed opponent (whether this is the offer Tunney refers to in his statement is not known).

This was Tex Rickard's valuation today of Gene Tunney's copyrighted announcement that he plans to box in defense of his title three times next summer.

The promoter evidently was somewhat exercised by the champion's statement, for he fairly shouted his side of the story, which was that his contract with Tunney gave him exclusive right to Gene's services until October 1, 1928.

"I can't understand what Tunney is talking about," Rickard added. "The contract clearly states that Tunney must defend his title for me in the next championship fight and that I have any time until October 1, 1928, to name the date."

HOP TO ENCIRCLE AFRICA PLANNED BY ALAN COBHAM

Hero Of Australian Flight Is Scheduled To Leave On 20,000 Mile Jaunt Around Dark Continent This Month

LONDON, Nov. 11 (INS)—Considered to be the "Lindbergh" of British aviation and the most famous airman on the British Empire, Sir Alan Cobham, who started the world with his flight to Australia and return, together with other long distance, European flights, is preparing for another daring 20,000 mile flight around Africa in which he hopes to bring about the inauguration of the British Air Route through Africa, and encourage the use of airlines as a means of protection for the dominions.

Using a Short All-Metal flying boat fitted with two Rolls Royce Condor engines, the largest All-Metal airship in the world, and weighing, when fully loaded, more than ten tons, Sir Alan Cobham plans to commence his flight about the middle of November, and completely encircle Africa over a route never before used.

Famous Airman

Ranked among the foremost airmen in the world, Cobham is a pioneer of English aviation and has done more for flying propaganda than any other man in Great Britain. He came into prominence following the War when in 1919 he carried 10,000 people, while engaged in civil aviation. His first long-distance flight was in 1921 when he flew 5,000 miles around Europe. In this same year he opened the Spanish Air Line to Morocco, and since then has covered thousands of miles in his European and African flights. In 1926 he made his most spectacular flight from London to Melbourne, Australia, and return. A distance of 20,000 miles which he completed in 320 hours and for which he was knighted by the King.

Many people have been puzzled as to why Cobham, with his experience, has never attempted to fly the Atlantic. Even Lindbergh cannot boast of a career similar to this.

His answer is that he does not believe in what he terms "stunt" flying, and to him a non-stop trans-Atlantic flight is a "stunt," therefore he strongly disapproves of it.

"I think Lindbergh's flight was a wonderful feat and an unexpressable hope to aviation, for it proved what things can be accomplished by the aeroplane. But these recent attempts are merely theatrical stunts and are done for the glory received. They are not helping aviation. Can anyone tell me what was learned from the flights

AMERICANS ARE BOOMING BRITISH MOVIE INDUSTRY

U. S. Producers Preparing To Send American Directors And International Actors To Buck Up English Films

LONDON, Nov. 11 British film industry is more elated today than ever before in its history. There are two main reasons for this. One is the increasing breaking down of the American market barrier. The other is the rush of actors and actresses of international fame to participate in the making of British pictures.

Legislation requiring the showing of a definite quota of British films in every program in Great Britain may have had something to do with this state of affairs; but coincidentally many of the biggest American film magnates have begun to show a keen desire to co-operate with Britain in its efforts to build up a flourishing industry.

Joseph M. Schenck, when in London, said that he wanted to establish, as soon as possible, a center for his organization in Britain, where pictures mainly produced by his own directors and with British artists would be made.

"I shall probably start," he said, "by bringing over one of my directors to exchange ideas with the British producers. He would have first-hand knowledge of the type of pictures which would be most welcomed in the United States. The creation of a wide market for British productions in the United States would help

He will not play against Princeton in the Bowl tomorrow, nor even again don that blue sweater with the numeral "18" tacked on its back.

They didn't fool Caldwell, those powers that be in things athletic at Yale. For more than three hours and in 10,000 well-chosen words they debated pro and con, but not ones did the lad waiting for their verdict, hold out hope.

"I'm out," he said. He was, Bruce knows his Yale. The statement issued to the press by Professor Nettleton, who presided, after the meeting said:

The board of control of the Yale University Athletic Association deeply appreciates the generous initiative of both Princeton and Harvard in suggesting that Bruce Caldwell be presented, if possible, to play in their coming games with Yale.

Both Harvard and Princeton clearly and courteously recognized that under our dual agreements final responsibility for determining all questions of eligibility rest with the university concerned under the existing rules.

"Mr. Caldwell is clearly ineligible to compete in football against Princeton and Harvard, and it seems equally clear to us that no single university can change the rules themselves.

After careful consideration, our board has accordingly unanimously confirmed the decision already announced."
