When the woman walked back to her car and started to drive away. King, who is residing with relatives in Lake Mary, jumped into his pickup truck and rammed her vehicle in an attempt to stop her.

"She was pretty shook up when I concerned, King is a hero and should be rammed her so I jumped out of the truck,

Foreman Is Credited With Citizen's Arrest In Murder Case grabbed my piece (.38-caliber handgun), received a commendation from his ran up to her car and told her if she didn't get out of the car without a gun, I'd kill her," King said. "She had another gunlying there beside her that was fully loaded, I couldn't let her get away. She killed a guy just because he lied to her and I just couldn't buy that."

"I guess that's about the only other thing in my life that's of any benefit to anybody," King said. "I got wounded with shrapnel and that's how I got the purple heart but the commendation was for directing the tank fire, killing the enemy that had my company pinned in All that happened in the demilitarized zone (DMZ) or buffer zone and after I got home, the government was telling everybody some six months later that our troops were just now going into the buffer, DMZ. That's unbelievable."

King said that although he didn't know. Brooks well, "he was a kid hat always be pretty well liked by his co- Tuesday."

### Second Donovan Link Killed Gangland Style

NEW YORK (UPI) - The FBI is investigating the second gangland style slaying of a man involved in the investigation of Labor Secretary Raymond Donovan, special prosecutor Leon Silverman says.

Nathan Masselli, 31, of Scarsdale, N.Y., the son of reputed mobster William Masselli, was fatally shot in the Bronx Wednesday by a passenger in his Lincoln Continental who leaped from the car after the shooting, police said.

"I am distressed by the murder of Nathan Masselli," Silverman said Thursday, "It is disturbing that witnesses who have been involved in this investigation have died in this horrible fashion."

Silverman said he had requested an FBI investigation and the bureau "immediately" complied.

#### More Rates Decline

The trend toward lower interest rates, touted as essential for economic recovery, persists with the Federal Reserve Board's decision to lower the discount rate it charges banks for borrowing by half a point to 10 percent.

Another important interest rate the prime lending rate that banks charge their best comporate customers has been dropping steadily and currently stands at 13.5

The Fed's move announced after the stock markets closed was widely anticipated on Wall Street Thursday where stocks hit an 812 month high as a record 137.33 million shares were traded.

The discount rate applies to banks which borrow from the Federal Reserve. When it goes down it represents a decline in the cost of money from one major source for banks which can then be passed on to customers. Shifts in the discount rate often can be the only reliable signal available on whether the central bank is moving with or against the tide of market interest rate trends.

"The action was taken to bring the discount rate into better alignment with short term market interest rates," said the Fed in a brief announcement Thur-

#### Stock Sales Are Record

NEW YORK (UPI) - Wall Street's busiest rally ever drove prices to an 812 month high, set two new volume records and approached the 1 billion share mark today with a boost from the Federal Reserve's decision to

The Dow Jones industrial average, up 18 points to 903 at midday, withstood late selling Thursday to gain 7.52 points to 892.41 on a record 137,3 million shares.

The closely watched Dow wich climbed to the hig level since it finished at 892.69 on Dec. 4, 1981, has soared 115.49 points since hitting a 27% month low Aug. 12. The paper value of all New York Stock Exchange issues has risen an estimated \$138.15 billion in the same

Thursday's record 137,330,000 share turnover wiped out the old mark of 132,690,000 traded Aug. 18 and set the stage for the summer rally's volume to pass the 1 billion mark today.

NATIONAL REPORT: Weather forecasters say the next two weeks of the hurricane season are historically frought with danger and say they are on the alert despite the fact it has been a very calm summer. The number of hurricanes historically peaks Sept. 10 with hurricanes hurtling across the Atlantic on that date in 90 out of the last 100 years said Neil Frank director. of the National Hurricane Center in Miami, "If you look at the number of hurricanes ... over the last 100 years you'll find out that the number of storms on each day picks up from the end of August to the second week of September," Frank said. Florida has faced only the threat of hurricane Alberto this season which struck Cuba and then bypassed south Florida. High winds and flash flooding from relentless 6 inch rains washed out a bridge, sucked roofs off buildings and injured seven people in Kansas and Missouri. Temperatures plunged into the 30s in the Northern Plains. Thunderstorms were scattered from Wyoming to Illinois Thursday but the most severe storms battered Kansas and Missouri with 76 mph winds and rains. Kansas City set a record for August rainfall when storms Thursday pushed the month's total to nearly 912 inches. In August 1888, 9.18 inches soaked the city.



# Sanford Library To Reopen In Month

The renovated Sanford branch of the Semmole County Library will reopen at the end of September or the first of October, the director of the library reports.

Jean Rhein, coordinator of county libraries, said the reopening of the building at First and Palmetto Avenue in Sanford will be about a month behind schedule because of problems

"It's complete with a few exceptions," she

said. "The carpeting that was laid was not satisfactory '

Ms. Rhein said the exact date for the return of the library from its temporary home in Sanford City Hall to the renovated quarters has not been determined yet. That move was previously expected at the end of August.

County commissioners and Sanford officials agreed this week to continue housing the library in Sanford City Hall until the renovations are completed

Commissioners have transferred their insurance on the library to the city hall facility and have been paying a portion of the utilities for the facility. Commissioners agreed to continue paying the utilities and to increase he payments because the library is open six

The previous agreement was based on the library being open five days, commussioners

Ms. Rhein said the move will take place as

soon as a certificate of completion is given by Sanford city officials

The move itself will take about a month, during which the library will be closed. Ms. Rhein said the library may be opened at least one night a week when the facility

"We'll be adding a staff member at the library," she said. No plans have been made yet for expanded hours and a survey of library patrons may be done to see what the public's

when someone else is doing something wrong, eventually it will have to affect my job,"

Solitro has been in constant contact with the sheriff's department in the case and investigators say the probe is continuing.

Sheriff's spokesman Chief Deputy Duane Harrell said there is an "on-going active investigation by Investigator Don Eslinger. We certainly haven't closed it out. No other arrests have been made, but there is always the possibility that others could be arrested."

Harrell said Solitro came forward because "he's the type of person who didn't believe in letting a thing like this go on. He and others who came forward were very courageous in doing so because they put their jobs in jeopardy. The people they were up against were in positions to put their jobs in jeopardy. They could have been fired."

The charges against Varney involve the building of a dall house for a fellow county employee, the building of a motorcycle trailer for personal use, the purchase and installation of electrical wiring for a county employee's trailer and body repair work on Varney's pickup truck.

Solitro says about nine other men are trying to "go through the chain of command to work these problems out." However, he said he doesn't know if management will talk with them.

He added that he and several others who turned in Varney are being treated unfairly because of their actions and that this three-month evaluation of their work reflects unsatisfactory performances where they all received "rave reviews three months ago en a previous evaluation."

County Administrator Roger Neiswender said today the criminal investigation into illegal activities in the parks and recreation department is continuing.

"I talked with (State Attorney) Alan Robinson on that as late as today and he said they expected it to go about two more

Neiswender said the county plans to investigate the department internally once the criminal investigation is

Neiswender said precautions set up by county officials

following the Varney arrest are designed to prevent the intimidation and harassment that Solitro has charged. "We have taken precautions to make sure that kind of thing

can't happen," Neiswender said. Percy said there is some confusion about what is going on in

he Solitro matter.

"There are two separate questions - his charges and his review. He apparently thinks the bad review and the Varney thing are related. That's what we have to sort through,"

Neiswender said he has confidence that the system of hearings protects Solitro's rights. "I have confidence that whatever action John Percy takes is the right one."

# County Delays Zoning Change, Hearing Nov. 9

A hearing to change the zoning of the 4.4acre parcel of land along State Road 426 across from Trinity Preparatory School near the Orange County line, has been continued to

Seminole County commissioners have told Arthur Barr, who sought to change the zoning of the property from residential to lowintensity commercial and office zoning, that information Barr provided had not been reviewed by county staff agencies to get an accurate idea of whether drainage is

Barr asked commissioners Tuesday night to

approve 3.1 acres of the property for office and professional uses and 1.3 acres for commercial designation

Barr presented a site plan for the property and explained the office zoning would not allow parking along SR 426. He said the commercial designation would allow small businesses like florists, print shops and dress shops to locate there. The commercial zoning he asked for would not allow convenience stores to be built there.

But residents who appeared to oppose the request said Barr's planned development does

not include plans to retain rain water. They claim the run-off from the property will raise the level of neighboring Bear Gully Lake and pollute other adjacent takes and streams.

The residents also claim the zoning change, if permitted, will allow Barr to ask for a zoning change on a larger adjacent parcel to permit construction of a shopping center. Seminole, County zoning laws attempt to buffer highintensity businesses, like malls and shopping centers, from residential areas with lessintense uses, like offices

The county's planning and zoning commission recommended approval of Barr's recommendations at its Aug. 4 meeting Commissioner Barbara Christensen ex-

pressed surprise that the planning group hadapproved the plan. She suggested the whole parcel be zoned for professional office use and a site plan be developed.

Mrs Christensen and Commissioners Robert Sturm and Robert G Bud" Feather voted to table the matter until November Commissioners Sandra Glenn and Bill Kirchhoff voted against the proposal saying they had no interest in changing the zoning on the

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

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# Confidence Vote On Wall Street

There is no freer market than the stock market. It is a remarkable barometer of public confidence in the economy.

Until recently, it had long gauged nothing but lack of confidence. Stock prices had been in a slump for months, failing to respond to even the rosiest of economic forecasts. The Dow Jones industrial average had just hit a 27-month low.

Then came Booming Tuesday. It started off just like any other day. But news reached the floor of the New York Stock Exchange that economist Henry Kaufman, perhaps Wall Street's most respected sage, was now predicting that interest rates would drop dramatically by the end of the year, a sharp reversal from his earlier pessimistic forecast.

The market exploded. It leapt out of the doldrums and, in a frantic pandemonium of buying and selling, sent stock prices soaring, pushing the Dow to its largest one-day gain in history.

Why the sudden turnaround? It seems apparent that it was sparked by the same thing that caused the long decline: interest rates. When they were high and economist-gurus were predicting they would stay that way, there was little confidence in the economy and the market sank. Now, with interest rates seemingly on their way down, investors are in an optimistic mood.

The market's vote of confidence in the prospect of lower interest rates is further proof that high interest rates, more than anything else, are the bugaboo of the economic recovery. They discourage credit buying and investment, thus contributing to slow growth and high unemployment.

If the economy is to get back on its economic feet, interest rates must continue to decline. But the danger in that is the inflation rate might start to escalate again, which would be even more damaging to the economy. Inflation and interest rates have been like a seesaw in recent years: when one is high, the other is low.

The only way to get off the seesaw is to have the federal government move toward a balanced budget and keep on moving until rapid growth of the national debt is brought under control.

### Happy Ending?

The Justice Department has found no grounds for criminal prosecution in its investigation of reported sexual activity between members of Congress and teen-age pages. The question of whether there has been illegal drug dealing on Capitol Hill remains before a federal grand jury.

This leaves Rep. Bill Alexander of Arkansas complaining that Capitol pages have received a "burn rap." That may be the case, but some good may confe of it.

Alexander heads a commission which has been studying the program for employment of teenagers to run errands for members of the House and Senate. The commission has concluded that the pages indeed need more supervision, and that they should be drawn from the age group of 16 to 18 years rather than as young as 14. Under the commission's recommendations, the pages would be housed in a dormitory and their recreational activities would be under greater supervision.

Serving a few months as a Capitol page in Washington can be an exciting and enriching experience for high school students from around the country — if the circumstances are right. It is regrettable that the corps of pages was touched by rumors of scandal which now appear to be unfounded, but the experience has pointed the way to making the entire program better — and safer — for all the youngsters who participate.

# The Offshore Challenge

Americans are so accustomed to think of their country as the leading industrial nation that they don't discern what is taking place elsewhere in the world. Newly industrializing countries in the Third World are confident that they will be manufacturing centers of the future. They also believe that they will be able to take over the American domestic market.

A recent article in World Business Weekly described what is happening. Japanese companies believe in the advantages of relocating manufacturing operations in the low-cost, newly industrializing nations. They are planning for the day when most heavy industrial products, in their view, will be made in the Third World.

The Third World countries are getting the most modern plants, which use very low-cost labor available in these poor nations.

Mitsubishi, one of the giant Japanese firms, has invested heavily in Singapore, according to World Business, with the goal of launching export drives aimed at the United States and Western Europe. Hitachi, another Japanese company, which is involved in an industrial espionage case in the U.S., has 15 plants in less developed countries. The Japanese steelmakers, by the way, believe that much of the competition from less developed countries will be at the expense of U.S. and European firms.

World Business points out that by 1985 there will be an additional 32 million tons of steel coming from Brazil, Mexico, South Korea, Taiwan and the OPEC nations of Algeria, Nigeria, Saudi Arabia and Venezuela.

It is not only in steel that Japan is making use of plants in the less developed countries. Asahi Chemical Industry Co. has 14 plants outside Japan.

The U.S. government has no plans to deal with this threat. The Congress has not begun to think in terms of a global economic struggle. Yet that is the reality.

All the countries that are expanding heavy industries are doing so to sell goods in the United States and, in the process, squeeze out American companies. If they are successful, American industry a decade hence will be only a fraction the size it is today. And millions more Americans will be without employment. It is a very grim prospect, and most Americans are blind to the reality. If American companies move their operations offshore, in order to compete, unemployment in the United States will increase just that much more.

Ironically, Japan and the less developed countries have been able to industrialize to this degree because the United States has footed the bill for their defense over a long period of years. It also has contributed colossal amounts to the World Bank and other international lending agencies, which have financed the industrial explosion in the less developed countries. The American people already are paying the price for this mad policy of financing international competitors.

The U.S. government could signal to the world that it won't allow its domestic markets to be conquered. The question is whether the government has the vision and the will to do this.

### Japan Rewrites History

TOKYO (NEA) — Even a very short trip to the Far East serves to remind the globetrotter that what seems important depends largely on where you sit.

Over here, even the agony of Beirut has had to share the headlines recently with the flap over Japan's alleged attempt to "rewrite history" by revising its school textbooks on the subject of its behavior before World War II. From Toyko to Seoul, Peking, Taipei, Manila and all the way around Southeast Asia to Bangkok and Jakarta, this controversy has got everybody's knickers in a knot.

I have been at some pains to try to find out what really happened — no easy task, since the revised textbooks are not publicly available yet and it is therefore necessary to rely on hearsay. But I have concluded that the Ministry of Education is probably more sinned against than sinning in this matter.

Japan's national teachers' union is one of the most dependably and strenuously leftist organizations in this fundamentally conservative society, and ever since the war its members have enjoyed sticking it to the conservatives in their history classes, teaching their students that the pre-war rightwing militarists were a perfectly awful bunch who led their nation to measureless disaster. This is true enough as far as it goes, but it is a thoroughly undependable guide to sound voting behavior today — which, however, is precisely how the teachers have sought to use it, pushing socialism and even communism for all they were worth.

Over the years, therefore, various perfectly reasonable Japanese have suggested that Japan ought to ease up a bit on the self-flagellation, particularly in front of students. It's a little as if American teachers were seeking to inculcate a chronic sense of shame in our youth over this country's alleged misdeeds in Vietnam.

Anyway, the Ministry of Education got the message, and gave the go-ahead for various textbook revisions. A reference to Japan's invasion of China in the 1930s was changed to an assertion that Japan "advanced into" China. Details of the Japanese atrocities at Nanking in 1937 were dropped. A description

of how Koreans were forced to work for the Japanese war effort was subsumed under an account of measures for national mobilization. Etc.

Well' You would think Gen. Tojo himself had reappeared and proclaimed the revival of the Greater East Asia Co-Prosperity Sphere. Japanese leftists went into spasms and were promptly followed by the governments of Communist China and staunchly anticommunist South Korea. The former summarily canceled the impending visit to Peking of Japan's minister of education, Heiji Ogawa, snarling that the moment was no longer "opportune." The Koreans, who by and large dislike the Japanese anyway, followed Peking's lead in filing a formal note of protest with Tokyo, then refused even to receive a Japanese delegation dispatched to "explain" everything.

In Taipei, the nationalist government, usually pretty sophisticated about these things but unwilling to seem less alert than Peking to defend basic Chinese interests, rumbled into an equivalent uproar. Even on Okinawa, which longed for and not long ago achieved reunion with Japan, plans were laid for a mass petition with 100,000 signatures demanding reinstatement of references to the massacre of Okinawans by the Japanese militarists. All over East Asia, newspapers and governments got into the act.

Here in Japan, defenders of the government had no trouble (and perhaps a bit of fun) demonstrating that all nations tend to rouge over the more obvious blemishes on their national conduct. One columnist quoted the highly antiseptic accounts in various American encyclopedias of the overthrow of Queen Liluokalani in Hawaii. He could also have pointed out that FDR wasn't quite so thumbsuckingly innocent of provoking, and even anticipating, the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor as most American textbooks would still have you believe.

This whole episode serves to remind everybody how thoroughly, even today, all of her neighbors in East Asia fear and distrust Japan.

# Enzymes: The Key To Aging?

LONDON (UPI) — Many factors go into the complex process known as aging but one of the more important of them — the slowing down of enzyme action with the years — is beginning to yield its secrets.

Scientists at the Weizmann Institute of Science in Israel have found that in old rats reduced activity in the enzymes responsible for many key biological processes may be due to minor chemical changes rather than anything fundametal.

"If these studies are found to apply to man as well," said "Research," the institute magazine, "it may well be possible to consider developing methods of preventing or even reversing such enzyme slowdown and thereby ameliorating some of the problems of old age."

Enzymes are complex proteins critical to life processes. They stimilate chemical reactions in the body and many are required for the digestive process.

The magazine, reporting on the work of biophysicist Dr. Ari Gafni of the Department of Chemical Physics, said he was working with the enzyme known as GPDH, or glyceraldehyde-3-phosphate dehydrogenase, which helps the body rid itself of the products of the breakdown of glucose in physical exercise.

"Some time ago," Gafni said, "scientists began to realize that enzymes extracted from senescent animals can exhibit significantly lower biological activities than the same product obtained from their younger counterparts.

"As a result researchers have begun looking for the reasons for this age-related deterioration of enzyme effectiveness, and thereby providing some clues to at least one aspect of the riddle of aging."

Gafni said that in advanced age, enzymes tend to remain longer inside cells before they are broken down and replaced. This longer residence may result in a type of chemical modification of the cell involving oxygen which can often be reversed.

In his experiments, purified enzyme extracted from young animals was exposed in the laboratory to an oxidizing process and the result showed remarkable similarities to the enzyme samples obtained from old rats.

"Aging phenomena in the body," Gafni said, "are extremely complex processes and therefore difficult to study on the whole organism. When we look at a particular molecule, however, it is much easier to provide some definitive answers as to what actually occurs.

"Of course, the study of a single enzyme can only add a small piece to the giant jigsaw puzzle of aging, the overall design of which will only become more apparent when many more pieces are put in place."

Gafni's work is supported by the U.S.— Israel Binational Science Foundation.

# An Inside Look At Reagan Team

WASHINGTON — Some of President Reagan's more flamboyant appointees — like Interior Secretary James Watt and departed Secretary of State Alexander Haig — are well known to the public. And thanks to the media, The Big Three of the Reagan White House — Ed Meese, James Baker and Michael Deaver — have achieved celebrity status.

But the less publicized administrators are virtually unknown to the American public, even though they are often of equal importance in carrying out the "Reagan Revolution" on a day-to-day basis. These are the department heads, assistant secretaries, commission chairmen and others who are the field commanders of Reagan's bureaucratic army.

Now Ralph Nader has attempted to close the gap in the public consciousness by sicking his "raiders" on the top 100 administration officials. The resulting profiles will be published next week under the title, "The Reagan Ruling Class." My associates Teny Capaccio and Indy Badhwar got an advance peek at the manuscript.

Here are some of the tidbits gathered by Nader's Raiders — forgotten or little-known facts about only slightly better-known people:

— Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger wasn't always the free-spending hawk he now is. Here's what he had to say to the American Enterprise Institute in 1972, when he was President Nixon's budget director: "The identification of a threat to security does not automatically require an expenditure in the defense budget to neutralize it. The nation's total resources being limited, it is necessary to consider what is being given up to meet the treat ... The defense budget, in short, must be seen not only in terms of what we must defend against but what we have to defend. The more we take from the commonwealth for its defense the smaller it becomes."

— Navy Secretary John Lehman described the administration's love affair with the Pentagon lightheartedly but succinctly. Asked by a Nader interviewer about the jar of jellybeans on his coffee table, Lehman said: "Well, there is quite a sweet tooth in this administration for the military."

— Jeane Kirkpatrick, the outspoken ambassador to the United Nations, was once an ardent feminist, though she now speaks of the "extremes of women's-liberation fever." In a 1974 book, she commented on the dearth of women in politics in terms that would strike some Reagan supporters as downright subversive. She wrote that it would be necessary "to abandon the notion, still supported by some influential religious denominations, that men are the natural governors of society, that women are unfit for political or religious or social leadership." She also urged abandonment of the idea "that there is something ineffably incompatible

between femininity and the pursuit of power, that femininity is inexorably associated with the submissiveness of female to male."

— Frank Carlucci, the often-controversial deputy defense secretary, has the distinction of having been the subject of a hostile 167-page book published by the Communist Party of Portugal while he was our ambassador to Lisbon — a feather in any conservative's cap. "It will take some time for our people to know about the high price that the country paid for the activities that Carlucci developed in Portugal," the Communist authors wrote.

The Nader profile also recounts a little-known act of heroism by Carlucci when he was an embassy official in the Congo in the early 1960s. He came to the rescue of a carload of Americans who had been surrounded by an angry mob after accidentally killing a bicyclist. Carlucci leaped into the crowd and distracted it while the Americans escaped. He was beaten, slashed and stabbed in the neck, and barely got away himself.

— Anne Gorsuch, head of the Environmental Protection Agency, resolutely puffed Marlboros while discussing carcinogens with the Nader interviewer. She is described as "a terse, tough attorney whose general litany divulges little to interviewers ... In style and substance, Gorsuch rarely gives an inch."


- Federal Trade Commission Chairman James Miller III has been accused of being a patsy for the business interests he is supposed to be policing. In a living demonstration of the Biblical mote-in-the-eye syndrome, Miller identified the Civil Aeronautics Board, the Interstate Commerce Commission, the Federal Maritime Commission and the Agriculture Department as "captives" of the industries they regulate — yet denied that his own agency had succumbed to this old Washington regulatory malady.

— Thorne Auchter, head of the businessman's nemesis, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, dismissed a federal study that associated nearly 40 percent of all cancer with workplace exposure, saying the "data is probably soft." But it turned out he hadn't read the report.

— Treasury Secretary Donald Regan, who spent most of last year assuring Congress the budget would be balanced by 1984, once wrote: "The events of the 1970s raised the question whether an administration can, in the course of a couple of years, get control over the government's expenditures."

— Interior Under Secretary Donald Hodel once said of the environmental movement: "Over the past several years, it has fallen into the hands of a small, arrogant faction which is dedicated to bringing our society to a halt. I call this faction the Prophets of Shortage. They are the anti-producers, the anti-achievers."



the record with 189 yards in 1978. Carver has gained 102 yards in two



AKRON, Ohio (UPI) - The Firestone Country Club Course, its image as "The Monster" dimmished in recent years, still has a little clout left.

Twenty-six of the world's finest golfers discovered that Thursday on a bright and breezy day, with only three of them - Japan's Masashiro Kuramoto, Australia's Bob Shearer and Raymond Floyd of the United States - able to better par on the 7,173-yard, par-70 Firestone layout and then by only one shot.

The 69s shot by those three were good enough for a share of the first-round lead in the \$400,000 World Series of Golf, a shot better than Lanny Wadkins and two ahead of Curtis Strange, Tom Weiskopf and Jack Nicklaus, who led early but threw away his chance with a double bogey on the 16th hole.

# It's Fish Vs. Beef In Protein Battle

DEAR DR. LAMB - 1 am trying to adjust our diet so my husband and I will not get a heart attack or worse, a stroke. We are eating a lot more fish and less red meats I understand fish have less saturated fat then red meats. But what about the protein content — is the protein in fish

as good as the protein in beef? And if we eat fish instead of red meats will that decrease our cholesterol intake? I have heard that shellfish are high in cholesterol? Is there any danger in eating lots of fish that we should be aware of?


DEAR READER Changing your diet to include a reasonable amount of fish in your diet is a good idea. I don't think you need to exclude red meats as there are many lean cuts such as the separable lean of round steak. It is true that about half of the fat in red meats is saturated fat and it contains little polyunsaturated fat compared to fish. About a third of the fat in fish is polyunsaturated fat and only about a third is saturated fat.

The protein in fish is complete protein and is comparable to other animal sources of protein, including red meats and poultry. Lean fish such as haddock are low calorie foods because they contain so little fat and about 80 percent of the raw weight of fish is water, compared to about 70 percent for raw red they are both good but is it meats

There is a lot of confusion about shellfish. Some of the older reports about cholesterol content were based on measuring techniques that measured other substances besides cholesterol. So oysters are not high cholesterol food but actually low cholesterol foods. Scallops, crab and clams are also relatively low in cholesterol but shrimp contain about twice as much cholesterol as beef.

How do you know they are both good? They both contain twice as much vitamin A as you need. People always want to get the most bang for thie buck, but in terms of vitamins they can get a little more bang than they bargained for. Too much vitamin A and D can be harmful when added to the amount in your normal diet. Stick with vitamins that allowances (RDA)



# Indoor Plants Are At Grower's Mercy

Living plants create an atmosphere of warmth and life whether they are indoors or out. Outdoor plants can often adjust to their environment while indoor plants are at the grower's mercy.

The growth of all plants is controlled by light, temperature, gases, burnidity, soil moisture and nutrients. They are all interrelated and influence the plant's well being

When setting up a planter indoors, unless it is in such a position as to utilize natural sunlight, some preparation must be made to provide artificial light. Brighteness, duration and quality or color all affect the plant.

Intensity of light regulates food manufacture in general, the higher the light intensity, the shorter the plant. Artificial light, when it is

the sole source, should be used 12 to 14 hours during each day. Normally, sufficient light should be installed to provide 200 to 500 footcandles, depending upon the kind of plants

Quality of light is important. Most incandescent lamps emit high red rays, which tend to make for long stems. Blue rays are produced by fluorescent lamps. These tend to grade perlite, 2 ounces of 20 percent super produce short, stocky plants.


All plants adapted for indoor planters will last longer in a day temperature of 75 degrees to 80 degrees F. Contrary to popular belief, air conditioning is more beneficial than detrimental to plant growth. Gases harmful to plants usually come from incomplete combustion of gas, coal or oil

Proper care in providing soil moisture, temperature and light will do much to overcome adverse effects of low humidities common to most interiors. Soil for plants grown indoors should be loose and with good fertility. It should crumble easily and should not pack, even after extended use. A good growing medium for plants indoors is 12 bushel of peat moss, 12 bushel of horticultural

phosphate, 4 ounces complete fertilizer (4-8-8) When plants are grown under artificial light only about 30 percent as much fertilizer is required as for the same plants grown in an outdoor location

Care should be taken to keep indoor plants free of dust. Dust covered le ves cannot perform normally. Clean leaves once or twice a month with a carnel hair brush or damp cloth or sponge Commercial leaf polishes are also available. Water plants several hours before using the preparations to avoid burning. Never use oil of any kind on foliage.

NEW YORK (UPI) - Manville Corp., the multibillion dollar conglomerate, has filed for bankruptcy, citing the heavy burden of thousands of asbestos-health lawsuits.

James F. Beasley. treasurer of the Denver-based company which mines asbestos, said Manville predicted asbestos litigation "could range from anywhere between \$2 billion to many times that amount over the next 20 years.

"Confronted with such potentially massive liabilities, Manville would have no recourse except to sell, liquidate or otherwise dispose of assets and dismember its businesses in order to continue to pay the costs of disposing of these suits," he said.

The comments were included in an affidavit in federal bankruptcy court in New York where Manville filed for protection from creditors while it attempts to reorganize under Chapter 11 of the Federal Bankruptcy Act

The company, involved in manufacturing, mining and forest products, listed assets of \$2,247 billion as of June 30, and liabilities of \$1.116 billion.

Beasley said the company was found liable for punitive damages for the first time in



### Florida's Credit Rating Back On Good Terms Now

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Florida's credit rating has been taken off a major investment analysis firm's probation list, Gov. Bob Graham announced Thursday, Graham said the Standard & Poor Corp., which announced a creditwatch on Florida Government July 26, based its decision on the 2 percent cutback in state. spending approved by Graham and the Cabinet

The creditwatch could have eventually led to higher interest rates when the state sought to borrow money for major projects.

Graham said the cuts "renewed their confidence that Florida officials could enact the kind of measures needed to preserve the state's financial integrity."

Johnson in February 1980 The death of the Johnson child, which was originally diagnosed as encephalitis, was the first in a series of five deaths affecting children Miss Falling tended as baby sitter. No charges have been filed in the other three deaths.

Lakeland prosecutor Quillian Yancey said Thursday he didn't have enough evidence to prosecute Miss-Falling for the deaths of two children there in February 1981.

### Solidarity Crackdown

, WARSAW, Poland (UPI) - The military government began a series of arrests on Poland's holiest day and seized guns, ammunition and spikes in a crackdown aimed at thwarting violent Solidarity demonstrations, Polish television said.

In the Baltic port of Szczecin, a leading Politburo member who negotiated the end of one of the strikes that led to legalization of Solidarity, Aug. 31, 1980, charged Thursday the union's underground was plotting an uprising.

In Lodz in central Poland, investigators uncovered a print shop that allegedly printed Solidarity leaflets, Warsaw television sald.

In Warsaw, authorities swooped in on underground hideouts and captured firearms, ammunition, field glasses torches and spiked devices for use against car and truck tires, Warsaw television said.

# Rec-Vee One Good Way To Go

To the purist outdoorsman, camping means a tent, sleeping bags and cooking over the campfire.

But to those who like to have all the comforts of home while vacationing in the great outdoors, motor homes are the answer.

During the period of acute gasoline shortage when many stations were closing nights and weekends and with the jump in gas prices, demand for the big gas guzzlers dwindled. But now they are more popular than ever, according to Joan Bauer, owner of an area recreational vehicle business.

"A lot of people panicked and got rid of their motor homes, but they are coming back," she said. "I get three or four people a day interested in buying one."

She said the larger motor homes average 6-8 miles per gallon of gas, while the mini-homes get from 8-11 mpg. They range in size from the van to the 32-25 foot, self-contained unit complete with bathroom, kitchen, dining

room-living room and bedroom. The vehicles sleep from two up to seven or eight persons. It depends on the floor plan.

In price, Ms. Bauer said, they range from "expensive to more expensive," New motor homes on her lot begin at \$20,000 and go up — "the sky's the limit," she added. "They can be outfitted with options to suit the owner, airconditioning, awning, television set, TV antenna, stereo radio and we have one equipped with a vacuum cleaner.

### Sometimes, Just Wing It

MADISON, Conn. (UPI) — Chef Jacques Pepin says some people are such slaves to recipes they're almost beyond emancipation.

Pepin teaches cooking 40 weeks a year. This fall he will follow in the public television footsteps of Julia Child with a PBS cooking series scheduled to start airing early in October. (Check your newspaper for local listings.) It was produced by WJCT-TV, Jacksonville, Fla.

Pepin says the hardest thing he does is try to convince students recipes aren't the be-all and end-all. He says people should learn to improvise. It comes with practice, application. If certain ingredients aren't available, people should use their heads and use what's at hand.

Say a recipe calls for shallots and there aren't any. But there are onions and garlic. By themselves they won't cut it but in the right combination their taste will approach that of shallots.

"The proof of the pudding is what's at the end," Pepin said, as he made a grand swipe with a piece of bread at

his plate.

He was sitting at a table in Gloria's French Cafe during a lull and was sipping some chilled white wine. His wife, Gloria, who recently opened the restaurant, was immersed in a flood of business phone calls. His mother, Jeannette, was mending a white tablecloth nearby.

"Everyone wants to fall back on the recipe. It's the least important thing. It's just an idea for a dish, a point of departure. You have to meander," he said. "You can't duplicate a recipe."

We have a used 30-foot 1980 unit that has a price tag of \$29,000, but it is loaded with all the extras.

"Sales are back up," she explained, "because people know it costs less money to camp than to stay home and less money to stay in a rec-vee than in a motel when traveling."

A Casselberry couple recently returned from a 5,000-mile vacation trip in their 13-year-old Winnebago through 14 states and New Brunswick, Canada, by land and sea. (They went by ferry to the Cape Hattaras National Seashore and Cape Cod). On this and previous trips they had plenty of opportunity to learn the advantages and disadvantages of motor home travel.

The husband, who had previously owned a 25-foot camper trailer, found several advantages of the motor home over the trailer. "It's sturdier, and doesn't whip around, doesn't have to be hooked and unhooked to the towing vehicle and facked up. You don't have to hook up the turn signal and brake light, and it's easier to back up than a trailer. It's self-contained and self-powered, you just get in and drive away. It can be parked most places any other motorized vehicle can.

One advantage is that when you get tired you can pull over in a rest area and sleep for a couple of hours (most states discourage overnight parking in rest areas. But they do not usually hassle you if you do), he said. Another is you don't have to look for a restaurant if you're hungry. Just pull over at a convenient spot and fix your meal (this also may be viewed as a disadvantage by the wife.) You always have your own restroom handy as well.

One disdvantage he's discovered is it is harder to get your wife to take a turn at the wheel of such a large vehicle.

Before starting your trip, you need to familiarize yourself with your unit, how everything works and where it is located. He points out there are butane gas tanks to fill, (for the hot water heater, refrigerator-freezer, stove and space heaters). You also must fill the water tank and check the holding tanks. These have to be emptied periodically en route (most campgrounds have dumping stations and water fill-up points)

When in campgrounds you may preser to hook up to the electrical, water and sewer connections to save your own resources.

Because of problems with two tires on the trip, he learned it is difficult to find someone to change tires sometimes — and even more difficult to do the job yourself.

Another problem, he said, is when you are in one place for a while and you want to drive around, you have your entire "house" to take. This is why some people tow a small car behind, he added.

### **CBS** To Examine Guatemala War

It is the richest, most populous nation in Central America, a country with a glorious past, but a tempestuous present and an uncertain future. It is a county at war, CBS News examines why the United States can no longer ignore that country and that war, in REPORTS: C B S4

"Guatemala," to be broadcast Wednesday (8-9 p.m.) on the CBS television Network.

"It's a civil war, a war you might think is none of our business, that shouldn't matter to Americans," says Correspondent Ed Rabel, anchor of the broadcast. "But it does matter

America is all over Guatemala. It is the big prize in Central America...

Several thousand guerrillas, who claim widespread support among Guatemala's poor and claim to be nationalists, not communists, are fighting to take over. The Reagan Administration recommends that the United States help Guatemala's government.

"But because the U.S. has so much more at stake in Guatemala than anyplace else in Central America,' says Rabel, "it could become involved there in a very bigway."

Rabel and producer Martin Smith trace American involvement in Guatemala, first comthe entire country was virtually a branch office of the United Fruit Company, then politically, munist agents.'

beginning in 1954 when the CIA overthrew Guatemalan regime which was advocating land reform.

During the next 20 years, Guatemalan officials reputedly became increasingly violent and corrupt. In the late 70s, U.S. military aid stopped after Guatemala ignored President Carter's human rights policy. Yet some 10,000 Americans live in Guatemala, and a third of our top 500 corporations have operations there.

The broadcast visits the countryside, and reports on the plight of Guatemala's Indians, who make up more than half the population, yet remain second-class citizens. "In Guatemala, liberty doesn't exist," says one Indian guerrilla.

Rabel and Smith profile General Efrain Rios Montt, who took over the country last spring in a bloodless coup. Surprising in a country that is mostly Catholic, Rios Montt is a Born Again Christian, and has the substantial support of such American evangelists as Pat Robertson, president of the Christian Broadcast Net-

In Guatemala's cities, Rios Montt has restored some faith in government. Not necessarily so in the countryside, where the civil war continues. There are reports of many massacres.

Teague spent 35 years in the news business before he began his book with the words: "Here I go, committing professional barikiri in print. Before you finish these pages, my career as a broadcast journalist is nearly certain to be terminated."

Teague is still employed by NBC's New York City flagship, WNBC-TV, but his sometimes abrasive book, "Live and OffColor: News Biz" (A&W Publishers, Inc., New York) is calculated to make ratings-conscious television news executives cringe.

Teague says local television news in recent years has been just a conglomeration of fluff, porno and drivel, misdirected by attempts to win the ratings.

"How can you make the decisions about your lives, your family, your business if what you are getting is information about what the beautiful people are doing?" Teague asked.

The veteran of the Milwaukee Journal, the New York Times and NBC-TV starts with the premise television news has become "the primary source of information" for the modern man and woman.

His first recommendation is to take the local news business out of the ratings game. If they must be ranked, he writes, let it be done by a panel of professional journalists, educators and representative cross section of the population in that particular viewing area."

"I think we should put the information out there," he said, "We should not have a society that has an excuse for not being informed."

Teague's second radical proposal suggests the various channels each take separate time slots for their news, At intervals, a year for example, the stations would rotate so all get the benefit of the most popular time slots.

"A newscast is not supposed to be just another vehicle for peddling underarm deodorants," he wrote, "The public needs to

"There is no good reason why the three flagship stations in New York should all be providing essentially the same information simultaneously at 6 and 11." Teague concludes his way, this is the closest thing a news show in my cynical heart to a prayer - I like to think we can make news biz better. What we have to do, first of all, is jettison the excess baggage that hampers our pursuit of excellence."

Why did it take Teague, now 53, so long to arrive at his 'I can') take it anymore' attitude?

He admits he enjoyed the limelight, played all the games, and came up with ginunicks to increase his "survival quotient."

He says, "I've done as much sleaze as anybody."

"We know from history people would rather be entertained than informed," he said. There is nothing wrong with entertainment, Hell, I need the money."

# E.T. Is Taking Over What Mickey Started

Mickey Mouse began the through the years. movie merchandising craze 50 years ago with his ubiquitous wrist watches, some worth \$500 today, but the lovable little extraterrestrial of "E.T." is taking over.

The world apparently is panting to buy anything associated with the plastic and rubber likeness of the huggable, magical space visitor in Steven Spielberg's runawa \* smash movie.

The problem is that most of the 43 licensees producing more than 100 E.T. products haven't gone to market yet with their lunch pails, underwear, Tshirts, pens, flashlights, electronic games and dolls.

Those few companies that have gone to market are cleaning up.

Kamar International, of Torrance, Calif., which produces stuffed E.T. toys, was earning \$100,000 a day before merchandising E.T. Now orders are coming in at the rate of \$2 million a day and continuing to increase.

Universal Studios and Spielberg's representatives say E.T. merchandising was purposely delayed until the picture was released - last June 11.

Probably closer to the truth is that they were unprepared for the E.T. mania and bowled over by its boxoffice receipts, reportedly \$200 million in its first two months in theaters.

spokesman Universal said it is probable earnings from E.T. merchandising will surpass the film's box-office profits.

Sale of product tie-ins with exceptionally popular films most of them science fiction or fantasy - have contributed substantially to new to the movies, but early from the year before.

"Star Wars" and "The Empire Strikes Back" products - toys, games, apparel and ginnincks = have earned \$1.5 billion for 20th Century-Fox and producer George Lucas. which harvested only \$700 million (or less than half that amount) at the box office.

It was not "E.T." but "Annie" that was supposed to be the runaway hit of the summer of '82. An extensive campaign for "Annie" merchandising was launched by Columbia Pictures well in advance of the movie.

"Annie" has not lived up to expectations in theaters, but the merchandising results aren't in yet.

Mark Baron, a Columbia spokesman, said, "Two years before the picture ("Annie") was completed Columbia and Rastar Productions were working on the merchandising.

"More than 50 companies are involved as licensees, representing every major product category Knickerbocker toys are making the dolls in various price ranges and they are doing very well.

"Annie's red dresses are selling through Sears Roebuck, which has a whole line of products with a premium promotion license. They don't manufacture products. They just promote and sell them which is good publicity for us.

"'Annie' jewelry is going great door-to-door through Avon, Much of our stuff hasn't come out yet. A lot of 'Annie' merchandising is keyed to the Christmas market because retail sales are slow for everyone."

Felix The Cat was an early pioneer. But it was Mickey Mouse and his watches back in 1933 that demonstrated what could be done with clever merchandising.

In addition to watches, the canny little rodent's likeness appeared on lunch boxes, books, coloring outfits, jewelry and hundreds of other items.

Disney's "Snow White and The Seven Dwarfs" proved a bonanza to the studio's consumer products and retail merchandising department when kids took the animated characters to their bearts.

"You can't count the thousands of items that have been produced with Mickey's likeness," said Disney archivist David R. Smith. "His popularity hasn't waned. We're still selling as many items as we used to do, even though kids today baven't seen Mickey on film. Our last new Mickey Mouse film was

"Donald Duck, Goofy and the Winnie The Pooh characters have also enjoyed widespread popularity in merchandie.

"We've never seen totals of all Disney merchandising in today's dollars, but it would be extremely substantial. For a time the merchandising helped carry this company. But I would say profits are well into the billions."

In the last year alone, Disney merchandising accounted for gross revenues of \$127 million, up 17 percent
