Dixie Editors Figure Stevenson Has 50-50 Chance Of Taking South

Editor's note: This is the first of a series of five articles on the political situation as now, as seen by newspaper editors and political writers of 6 states).

NEW YORK — Dixie editors believe the South will be split in the 1948 presidential battle. The consensus of those leading part in an Associated Press survey is that the bulk of Dixie once more will be safe for the Democrats. But newsmen say that if the selection were held now (Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower might be able to storm the Democratic fortress in the South and border states and snatch three or possibly five states from Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson. Louisiana, Louisiana and Florida are the big question marks, Virginia and Kentucky lesser ones.

In state after state, even in some of those considered sure to go Democratic a biggest vote ever secured a Republican presidential candidate.

The way a North Carolina editor said at the moment, the Stevenson county apparently applies to much of the Southland:

"There will be more Republican votes but not nearly enough at the moment to constitute an opinion of Southern newspapermen that Democratic nominee Adlai Stevenson is certain to sweep the presidential election in Alabama, Arkansas, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Oklahoma and West Virginia. Those nine states have 10 electoral votes. Kentucky is considered close but fairly sure to go Democratic. Virginia editors think their state is leaning toward Stevenson by such a scant margin as to be highly doubtful. Kentucky has 10 electoral votes.

Editors are uncertain as to whether Texas, Louisiana and Florida, with 4 electoral votes among them, will remain Democratic or not over to the Republican camp. When results of surveys in five Middle Atlantic and 11 Western states are combined with those in the South, newsmen turn up with these opinions, on the basis of present trends:

1. Stevenson has the edge in 11 Southern and border states which are fairly safe or at least leaning his way. The states are: Alabama, Arkansas, Mississippi, Louisiana, Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, Tennessee, Oklahoma and West Virginia.

Needed to win the election: 256 electoral votes.

In the South, as in other regions, many editors and correspondents say it is too early to tell how people will vote in November. Many voters, particularly the independents, they say, are waiting to hear what the rival candidates have to say before making up their minds.

But at this state of the campaign many Dixie newsmen say a trend is apparent that may bring a record vote for the Republican ticket in November even if it falls short of carrying any states.

Again, as in other regions, they cite these factors: Sentiment for a change. Eisenhower's personal popularity. High taxes, "mismanagement and corruption" in government.

But in the South there also is mention of the civil rights issue and the administration's opposition to state ownership of tidelands oil.

If voter sentiment shifts later on, Stevenson will pick up Southern newsmen expect it to be Stevenson's direction. That is the case in Arkansas, for example, and in Florida, too.

The reasons offered are that Stevenson will pick up Southern support as he becomes better known while Eisenhower may lose a bit of ground as the first flush of enthusiasm aroused by his early

Auto Workers Union Asks GM For Wage Hike

DETROIT — Bound by contract until 1953, the CIO United Auto Workers are asking General Motors to go beyond their historic cost-of-living pact and grant immediate wage and pension benefits for years ahead.

If G. M., the industry's pattern setter for years ago, the union presumably will ask Ford, Chrysler and other auto companies with similar contracts to do likewise.

The UAW disclosed yesterday additional benefits sought on the subject, as secret as the contract negotiations themselves, have been held recently. But the talks reportedly have been brief so far because the union has declined comment on its nature.

The union's National General Motors Council, representing some 350,000 G. M. workers throughout the country, has asked for a 5 percent wage increase for 1952. Emphasizing that it was not attempting to reopen the non-negotiable contract, the council said additional benefits were needed to bring the contract signed in 1948 up to current living conditions. It also asked a resolution asking the industry's biggest producer to "implement" the agreement by:

1. Boosting the guaranteed annual 4 cent hourly raise — the annual annual improvement factor — to 5 cents.
2. Adding 21 of the 35 cents an hour gained in cost-of-living adjustments since the pact was signed to base pay. This would mean that workers would be taken away if the cost-of-living dives sharply between now and May 1953.
3. Adjusting pensions of G. M. workers to the cost-of-living pact to give them the same purchasing power they had when the agreement was signed. The union did not say how much of a raise would be needed to reach the maximum of \$25 a month, including social security.

Ike's Speech

Eisenhower, the Republican presidential candidate, has "changed his mind" and now concedes that not all public servants are bad. He recalled that the general originally said he was going to clean out Washington from end to end.

"We (Democrats) don't all around the breakfast table dividing up the pie," he said in an obvious reference to Eisenhower and Robert A. Taft breakfasting together last week. "We may have our family squabbles, but there are not two Democratic parties."

Robot Planes Without Pilots Are Now Operating In The Korean War

WASHINGTON (AP)—American robot planes, untouched by man in long-range flights, have sought out and destroyed Communist targets in Korea—heralding the explosive birth of push-button warfare.

The Navy, which developed the new secret weapon, today revealed details but revealed it as:

1. An outmoded airplane carrying a 2,000-pound bomb and guided from carrier-deck launchings to target crash entirely by electronics. A television camera is perched in its cockpit to send back pictures of its flight.

2. Associated Press staff photographer Fred Waters, aboard the 27,000-ton aircraft carrier Boxer, cabled an eye-witness account of the new missile's first use on Sept. 1 in Korea waters.

Navy censors delayed Waters' story until yesterday, cleared it and then said in an announcement: "A number of guided missiles have been launched successfully against Communist targets in North Korea from the USS Boxer."

Waters, in an additional dispatch, placed the number of missiles already launched at four to six. His eye-witness account said the pilotless "suicide" plane he watched was a World War II Grumman, herded to its target by a guide plane. Its progress into the combat zone, he said, was watched on a television screen in a secret room aboard the Boxer, 150 miles from the target.

The Navy announcement lacked many of the details in Waters' account, but gave this description:

1. The new missile, armed with a powerful warhead, is sent aloft from a catapult aboard the carrier.

2. There are two guide planes, one on the carrier and one in the air.

3. Both are equipped with special electronic equipment.

4. The first guide plane sends the missile roaring skyward. At a predetermined altitude, the airborne guide plane takes over and directs the missile to the area of its target.

5. By the time the missile goes into its payoff dive, the guide plane is miles away out of anti-aircraft fire.

6. All during its flight, from the carrier deck to the target, the missile records its progress via teletype in a specially equipped electronics room aboard the ship.

The Navy announcement said the Boxer has been using an AD3 Skyraider (Douglas attack plane) as the guide craft in its first such attacks.

The first operational team—five officers and seven enlisted men headed by Lt. Comdr. Lawrence A. Kurtz of Washington, D. C.—is Guided Missile Unit No. 90. The unit trained at the Naval Air Development Center, Johnsville, Pa.

The Navy would neither identify the targets nor assess the damage inflicted.

electronics experts aboard the carrier "rode with the missile, mile by mile, through wondrous electronic instruments."

On the television screen, he said, the men crossed the Sea of Japan and watched the jagged peaks of Korea loom larger. He said tension in the room mounted as the target neared.

Then the target—"an enemy concentration in a valley between two shadowy hills." And then:

"... The instruments suddenly went blank. The screaming dive had ended squarely on target, and the missile had crashed to oblivion."

The heavily censored description of the new missile shows it to be apparently as far a cry from other guided missiles now in use.

Slimmer Diet Of Dairy Products Is Slated Next Year

WASHINGTON (AP)—Current production trends point to a slimmer diet of dairy products, eggs, poultry and pork next year.

There may be the only livestock food that will hold its own with the rest.

The general outlook is drawn from several recent Agriculture Department reports showing that the production of milk, chickens, and hogs is declining.

These downturns were said to reflect the fact that rising costs are discouraging many producers.

The fall pig crop—which will become the pork supply next spring and summer—is expected to be 9 per cent smaller than last year's.

Milk production during the first eight months of this year was down 1,000,000,000 pounds from the corresponding period last year. Production in August was the smallest for the month since 1940.

Commercial hatchery production of baby chicks during August was 15 per cent smaller than in the same month last year. For the first eight months of the year, hatchery production was down 5 per cent from the corresponding period last year.

The main cause of these downward production trends is an advancing cost of livestock and poultry feeds that is not being matched by corresponding increases in prices of grain, rice, dry beans, sugar, peas, most food crops—such as bread nuts, and most fruits and vegetables—are likely to be as plentiful as this year.

Missile Supply Is Reported As Large

TOKYO (AP)—The man who directed the first use of guided missiles in the Korean War said today the Navy has "immediately available enough missiles to mount a sustained large-scale robot campaign in Korea."

Lt. Comdr. Lawrence A. Kurtz said missiles carrying atomic bombs conceivably could hit any target in the world.

Kurtz commanded the 12-man team which catapulted a missileless plane from the carrier USS Boxer Sept. 1—men watched on television as the plane launched the age of push-button warfare with a strike against a Communist target in North Korea.

Kurtz told a news conference "continent-to-continent guided missiles are possible." The Korean text was the "Merry-go-round" what probably will come.

The equipment used was "rather obsolete—we have better things than this," he added.

Attempted Escape Is Foiled By Guards

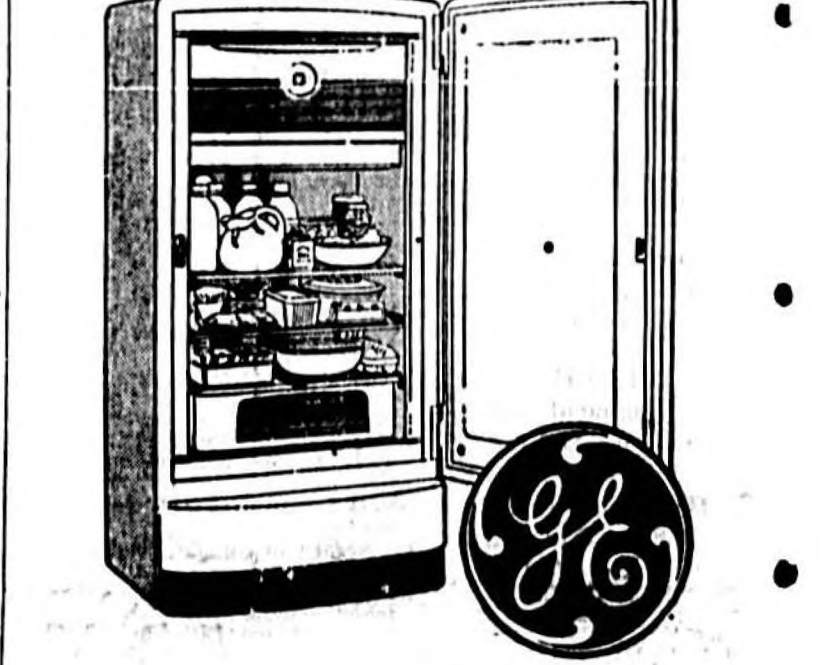

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Robot Planes Without Pilots Are Now Operating In The Korean War

By WARREN ROGERS JR.
WASHINGTON (AP)—American robot planes, untouched by man in long-range flights, have sought out and destroyed Communist targets in Korea—heralding the explosive birth of push-button warfare.

The Navy which developed the new secret weapon, (infield many details but revealed it as:

An unpowered airplane equipped with a 2,000-pound bomb and guided from carrier-deck launchers to target crash entirely by electronics. A television camera is perched in its cockpit to send back pictures of its flight.

Associated Press staff photographer Fred Waters, aboard the 27,000-ton aircraft carrier USS Boxer, cabled an eye-witness account of the new missile's first use on Sept. 1 in Korea waters.

Navy censors delayed Waters' story until yesterday, cleared it and then said in an announcement: "A number of guided missiles have been launched successfully against Communist targets in North Korea from the USS Boxer."

Waters, in an additional dispatch, placed the number already launched at from four to six. His eye-witness account said the pilotless "suicide" plane he watched was a World War II Grumman, headed to its target by a guide plane. Its progress into the combat zone, he said, was watched on a television screen in a secret room aboard the Boxer, 150 miles from

the target.

The Navy announcement lacked many of the details in Waters' account, but gave this description:

1. The new missile, armed with a powerful warhead, is sent aloft from a catapult aboard the carrier.
2. There are two guide planes. One is equipped with a television camera in the cockpit. Both are equipped with special electronic equipment.
3. The first guide plane sends the missile roaring skyward. At a pre-determined altitude, the airborne guide plane takes over and directs the missile to the area of its target.
4. By the time the missile goes into its payoff dive, the guide plane is miles away out of anti-aircraft fire.
5. All during its flight, from the carrier deck to the target, the missile records its progress via television in a specially equipped electronics room aboard the ship.

The Navy announcement said the Boxer has been using an A12 Skyraider (though attack plane) as the guide craft in its first such attacks.

The first operational team—five officers and seven enlisted men headed by Lt. Comdr. Lawrence A. Kurtz of Washington, D. C.—a guided missile unit No. 20. The unit trained at the Naval Air Development Center, Johnsville, Pa.

The Navy would neither identify the targets nor assess the damage inflicted.

Slimmer Diet Of Dairy Products Is Slated Next Year

By OYD A. MARTIN
WASHINGTON (AP)—Current production trends point to a slimmer diet of dairy products, eggs, poultry and pork next year.

Beef may be the only livestock food that will hold its own with its year-to-year supply.

This general outlook is drawn from several recent Agriculture Department reports showing that the production of milk, chickens, and hogs is declining.

These downturns were said to reflect the fact that rising costs are discouraging many producers.

The fall pig crop—which will become the pork supply next spring and summer—is expected to be 9 per cent smaller than last year's.

Milk production during the first eight months of this year was down 1,300,000 pounds from the \$2.5 billion pounds produced in the corresponding period last year. Production in August was the smallest for the month since 1940.

Commercial hatchery production of baby chicks during August was 15 per cent smaller than in the same month last year. For the first eight months of the year, hatchery production was down 5 per cent from the corresponding period last year.

The main cause of these downward production trends is an advancing cost of livestock and poultry feeds that is not being matched by a corresponding increase in the price of hogs, eggs, poultry and milk.

Missile Supply Is Reported As Large

TOKYO (AP)—The man who directed the first use of guided missiles in the Korean War said today the Navy has "immediately available enough missiles to mount a sustained large-scale robot campaign in Korea."

Lt. Comdr. Lawrence A. Kurtz said missiles carrying atomic bombs conceivably could hit any target in the Korean peninsula.

Kurtz commanded the 12-man team which catapulted a missileless plane from the carrier USS Boxer Sept. 1—men watched on television as the plane launched the age of push-button warfare with a strike against a Communist target in North Korea.

Kurtz told a news conference "continent to continent guided missiles are possible." The Korean text was the "fore-runner of what probably will come."
