

Doctor-Owned Pharmacies Under Fire

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., said today that a growing number of doctors now own pharmacies or drug companies, and may turn their patients into "captive consumers."

Hart, chairman of the Senate anti-trust and monopoly sub-committee, opened hearings on doctor-owned pharmacies and doctor-owned drug repackaging and redistributing companies.

In his statement prepared for the session, Hart said, "certainly when a patient goes to his doctor and is given a prescription for a drug in which the doctor has no choice but to purchase that trade name drug."

"Also, when a doctor suggests using his pharmacy downstairs — or calls a prescription in to a pharmacy — it is likely that the patient seldom protests," he said. Hart said the subcommittee was concerned about the independent druggist who finds his usual prescription business cut off, and the drug companies whose drugs are no longer prescribed because of the physician's financial interest in another company.

Hart said to date the subcommittee has identified about 100-doctor owned drug companies involving possibly 5,000 doctors.

Goldwater Could Win Florida, Lubell Poll Shows

NEW YORK (UPI)—A survey of five key southern states indicates Sen. Barry Goldwater could sweep much of the South in the November presidential election, pollster Samuel Lubell said today.

Lubell, as reported in the New York World-Telegram and the Sun, said his interviews with voters revealed that more than a quarter of those who supported John F. Kennedy in 1960 "now talk of casting their ballots for Goldwater" rather than President Johnson.

Lubell said that his poll indicated these heavy losses "are being offset somewhat by the return to the Democratic party of one-time Democrats who went for Richard Nixon."

He said, however, "when all the voter-shifting is balanced out, my interviews show that as of today Goldwater would carry Florida and Virginia, probably South Carolina and perhaps even North Carolina."

He said only in Texas, of the five states in which he conducted interviews, is Johnson running ahead of Kennedy's showing four years ago.

Lubell said that even Texas showed signs of weakening.

"On every street sampled in Texas towns, the Johnson supporters were on the defensive before irate neighbors who protested: 'That civil rights law takes away the white man's rights.'"

He said his survey indicated a "new mood of militant political revolt is surging through the South."

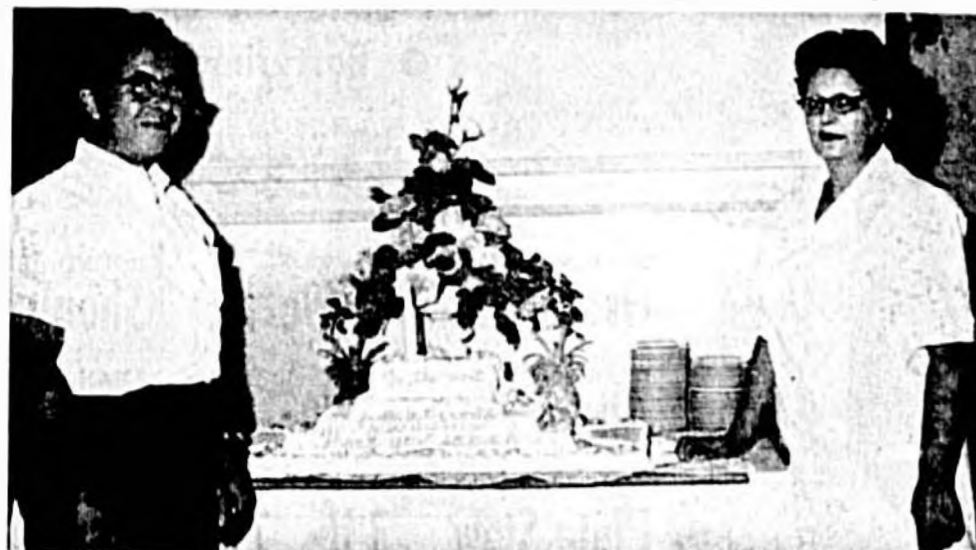

Texan Throws 'Sea Monster' Back In Gulf

GALVESTON, Tex. (UPI)—Nelo Seaman obediently threw the "sea monster" he caught back into the Gulf of Mexico.

It turned out the creature of the deep Seaman's shrimp boat had landed was a leatherback sea turtle. His radio message to shore had created quite a stir until the true identity of the catch was learned.

This one had a shell four feet long and weighed about 500 pounds, relatively small for these turtles. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission said the leatherbacks are in danger of becoming extinct and should be released at once. They are protected by law.

Sea turtles are seldom seen by man except when caught in the trawls of shrimpers in the Gulf of Mexico. They spend their lives at sea and only the females return to land in the spring to lay their eggs.

The leatherback, rarest and most peculiar of the group, has a dark brown shell without scales, and may reach a length of eight feet and weight of three quarters of a ton or more. The young are about three inches long when hatched. Adults if aggravated on shore, can strike out with their flippers and bite with their sharp jaws.

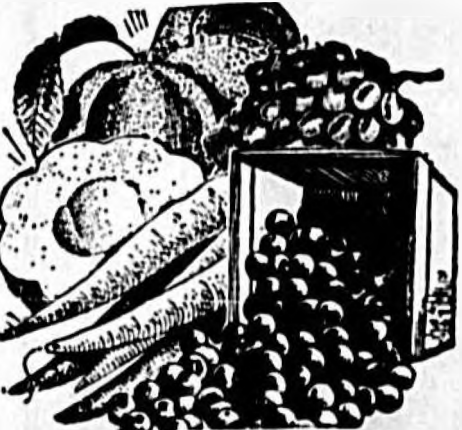

U. S. Retaliation Tells Reds We Mean Business

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson's order for a swift military retaliation against Red gunboats and bases in North Viet Nam was designed to prevent further Communist miscalculation about U. S. determination to defend Southeast Asia at all costs.

Administration officials said today the President's orders to the Seventh Fleet and its air arm were issued with the full realization they might spark armed reaction from Communist China.

But the Chief Executive also recognized that Peking and Hanoi must be left no room for doubt about the peril they risk by further attacks on American naval vessels on the high seas.

Officials said Tuesday's attack by North Vietnamese torpedo boats on U. S. destroyers, the second in three days, made it clear the Communist action was deliberate and not the result of any tactical error on the part of an individual flotilla commander.

There were two possible explanations for the obviously premeditated attacks, according to U. S. officials. They said the attacks could indicate:

—The initial thrust in a broad new campaign of Communist aggression in Southeast Asia in which open military moves would replace the present tactics of subversion and guerrilla warfare, or

—The belief that red gunboats could establish the Gulf of Tonkin as a safe haven or sanctuary from which to attack American and South Vietnamese forces without fear of retaliation.

In either event, President Johnson was said to feel that it was necessary to strike at once, with a limited blow tailored to clip the offense, to convince the Communists of their error on either or both points.

The President's advisers were unanimous in their agreement on the decision to strike back as soon as daylight permitted at the North Vietnamese torpedo boats and their supporting facilities—the bases from which they came to make their assault on the U. S. destroyers Maddox and C. Turner Joy.

The 16 Republican and Democratic congressional leaders who were called to the White House late Tuesday to hear what the President intended were said to have been unanimous in their approval of the swift move.

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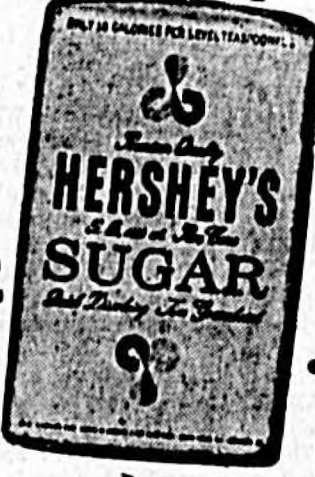

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Salinger Named To Fill Engle's Senate Seat

(UPI)—Pierre Salinger, press secretary to two presidents, Tuesday was appointed U. S. senator to succeed the late Clair Engle.

Gov. Edmund G. Brown, a Democrat like Salinger, announced the appointment of the 39-year-old Salinger at a news conference here. Engle died last Thursday after a year-long fight against a brain tumor.

Salinger, a jovial, cigar-smoking former press secretary to the late President John F. Kennedy and President Lyndon B. Johnson, faces a Nov. 3 general election contest for the full six-year term against Republican George Murphy. Salinger is heavily favored to defeat the former actor.

Murphy served notice he would make the interim appointment an issue in his campaign against Salinger.

Rescuers Reach French Miners

CHAMPAGNOLE, France (UPI)—Rescue workers broke through Tuesday into the cavern where nine cheering, singing miners had been trapped for eight days by a cave-in. An emergency shaft 200 feet deep reached the miners at 12:55 p. m. (6:55 a. m. EST), eight days and 45 minutes after they were caught underground by the collapse of a limestone mine shaft in Mont Rivet.

The men were expected to be hoisted to the surface in an escape capsule within three hours. They had been in communication with their rescuers over an emergency telephone line for days, and they were in good condition despite the ordeal.

The fate of five others trapped by the same cave-in was uncertain.

Cabinet Fails To OK Building

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The Cabinet refused for a second time Tuesday to approve a request by a Tallahassee architect firm that it construct a 10-story office building across from the Capitol Center.

Wallis Associates, Inc., asked Cabinet approval for the move a week ago. Gov. Farris Bryant directed a committee to study the request.

The committee reported today that it had taken "no affirmative action" because it had not seen the firm's specific proposal for the building.

Reapportioning Delay Bill OK'd

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Judiciary Committee Tuesday approved legislation to stall reapportionment of state legislatures for a minimum of two years.

The committee voted 10 to 2 to approve a bill by Senate GOP leader Everett Dirksen which would postpone Supreme Court ordered reapportionment until state legislatures can have two regular sessions to consider the problem.

RFK Urges Bail Bond Reforms

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy Tuesday urged Congress to reform the bail bond system and checkbook justice.

In testimony prepared for a Senate Judiciary subcommittee, Kennedy said the rich man and the poor man do not receive equal justice in the courts under the present bail system.

Bail has become "a vehicle for systematic injustice" because it consigns to prison any one who can not "pay for their freedom," he said.

U. S. Speeds Military Buildup In Southeast Asia



Power For Any Showdown Ready

The United States rushed men, ships and planes to Southeast Asia today to meet any possible showdown with the Communists over Viet Nam.

Red China has charged that the United States had "gone over the brink of war" with its retaliatory air strikes against Communist North Viet Nam.

But Peking took no apparent action to back up the North Vietnamese.

The fast-moving Viet Nam crisis included these developments:

—Congress moved in bipartisan fashion to unite behind President Johnson in his punishment moves against Viet Nam.

Two key Senate committees swiftly approved a resolution approving an American policy of firmness to preserve peace in Southeast Asia, and sent it on to the full Senate for action. The House is expected to act soon after the Senate.

—In Moscow, the Soviet government newspaper Izvestia condemned the American air strikes against North Viet Nam. It termed the strikes "aggression" and warned Washington not to "go too far," but Izvestia coupled the warning with a plea for peace in the region, saying "for this noble object no effort should be spared."

Peking broadcasts, while claiming that "aggression by the United States against the Democratic Republic of Viet Nam means aggression against China," said it was up to North Viet Nam to "hit back in self defense against the armed attacks of U. S. imperialism."

U. S. Ambassador Alistair Stevenson told the United Nations Security Council Wednesday that the United States would not tolerate attacks by North Viet Nam or anyone else.

UN Secretary General Thant was making a state visit to Washington that had been planned before the crisis broke out.

It gave Johnson an opportunity to outline U. S. policy to him in person.

Through American embassies around the globe, Johnson informed U. S. Allies of the why and wherefore of Wednesday's action. All but France, still dithering for neutralization of Southeast Asia, quickly expressed firm support.

There were scattered minor demonstrations against the U. S. action in Japan, Sweden, Algeria and Scotland, but no violence.

On the American political front, Sen. Barry Goldwater, the Republican nominee, praised Johnson's decision.

"I believe it is the only thing he could do under the circumstances," Goldwater said. "We cannot allow the American flag to be shot at anywhere on earth if we are to retain our respect and prestige."

Units of the U. S. Seventh Fleet, which patrols Communist coastlines throughout the western Pacific, were dispatched from ports in Japan and Hong Kong to the Indochina station.

Squadrons of American jet fighter-bombers were shuffled west from the United States, to Honolulu, to Okinawa and the Philippines, to Thailand and to South Viet Nam itself.

Six F102 Delta Dagger jet fighters arrived in Saigon Wednesday to provide air defense for any retaliatory raids by North Viet Nam.

More F102s landed 875 miles north at Danang, only 100 miles from the North Vietnamese border.

An aircraft carrier task group, normally based at San Diego, Calif., was transferred from the First Fleet, patrolling the U. S. Pacific Coast, to the western Pacific.

Eight American submarines, three of them nuclear-powered, were poised for action at undisclosed locations in the western Pacific.

The carrier USS Ranger, with 100 combat aircraft, sailed out of San Francisco Bay today for the Far East, returning to station there after maintenance work was quickly terminated.

(Crews manning the Vigilant aboard the Ranger are from the Sanford Naval Air Station. The Reconnaissance Attack Squadron 5 members were recently deployed to the West Coast as the first unit in an historic move which combines the East and West Coast Navy groups for worldwide protective coverage for the United States.)

The crisis boiled up suddenly on Sunday when three North Vietnamese patrol torpedoes made an "unprovoked attack" on the destroyer USS Maddox. The Maddox was checking on Communist shipping in the Gulf of Tonkin, 35 miles off the coast of North Viet Nam.

Letter Named Trio's Killers, Gregory Says

JACKSON, Miss (UPI)—A Mississippi so terrified by the consequences that he fled the state may have been the informer who sent FBI agents to the graves of three missing civil rights workers, an integrationist said today.

Negro comedian Dirk Gregory said in Honolulu early today that he had turned over a letter to the FBI three weeks ago that pinpointed the spot near Philadelphia, Miss., where the bodies of the victims were buried and named the men responsible for the killings.

The letter was in response to a \$25,000 reward Gregory offered.

Gregory also said he had a tape-recorded interview with another Mississippi resident who named seven men as the killers but that the resident said he got his information from others.

The FBI here and in Washington declined comment on Gregory's statement. Neither would they confirm reports that arrests were expected "at any time."

Gregory turned over copies of the letter, written from Washington, D. C., today.

The letter was signed but Gregory asked that the name be withheld. It was typewritten and contained frequent misspellings and grammatical errors.

"This is a Mississippi man writing this letter," Gregory said. "He had to be scared. He went to Washington and got a box number there."

The copies of the letter that Gregory produced said that the three civil rights workers had been followed after their release from jail to a rural area where they were "surrounded" by a "sum of five men" and shot.

FBI agents found the bodies of the youths under 23 feet of clay in a pond dam on a farm near Philadelphia Tuesday evening. Reports said that an official autopsy, expected to be made public today, would show that the workers were shot.

Waterfront Project Called 'Wise Move'

Francis E. Roumillat Jr., proprietor of a drugstore bearing his name, today called the proposed lakefront marina "a wise and progressive move" if the City of Sanford "aggressively promotes the development of the Sanford Marina."

Roumillat led the marina plan with the port facility which is now being analyzed, saying the two would "make Sanford and Seminole County the focal point of Central Florida."

"The merchant's statement follows:

"The proposed Sanford Marina, in addition to the barge port facility now under study, will truly be the key to the economic stability of this area. Sanfordites have wistfully gazed at their lakefront for many years, wishing something could be done to utilize this wonderful natural asset.

"It is through the combined efforts of a small group of Sanford businessmen that the potential of our lakefront has been brought sharply into focus. This group has spent their time, money and effort to place before the City Commission and the citizens of Sanford a plan to develop our lake shore to the fullest extent—a plan that will benefit the citizens many times over the cost of the undertaking.

"The marina development by the city and the barge facility development by the county will make Sanford and Seminole County the focal point of central Florida. In the foreseeable future, Sanford can become the recreation center, and the barge port the distribution hub for waterborne commodities for the whole of Central Florida.

"It will certainly be a wise and progressive move if our City Commission aggressively promotes the development of the Sanford Marina."

Bryant Talks Of New University System

TALLAHASSEE, (UPI)—Gov. Fritz Bryant said today a chancellor system for Florida's universities would probably be the best step the state could take to improve its educational setup.

Bryant told his weekly news conference that the chancellor system had its advantages and disadvantages, but "it probably is it."

"A chancellor system would take away from the Board of Control a great deal of details," he now has to cope with, the governor said. He said the Board of Control system of governing the university program had an equal number of advantages and disadvantages.

Bryant added, however, he was pleased with the progress which has been going forward in the state's junior college program.

Bryant also said he was concerned with the nine white and Negro ministers being held in jail here on 60-day terms for a 1961 sit-in demonstration at the Tallahassee airport.

"I'm concerned about anybody in jail. I'm concerned when persons take the law into their own hands," he said. He said it was "a dangerous precedent" to allow civil disobedience simply because "you don't like the law."

Planes Scout Wave Off Puerto Rico

MIAMI (UPI)—Hurricane hunter planes were sent out today to check a weak easterly wave that dumped heavy showers on Puerto Rico Wednesday night.

The Weather Bureau said winds had been clocked up to 30 miles per hour but there was no sign of circulation.

Forecasters said the check was "purely precautionary."

Easterly waves are watched during the hurricane season because they sometimes develop into tropical storms.

Altamonte Appoints Charter Committee

An eight-member charter committee was appointed last night in Altamonte Springs to review and revise the town charter in preparation for a possible city manager-commmission form of government.

The committee was selected as an aftermath of a recent suggestion by Mayor Lawrence Swofford that the charter be "ancient" and in need of modernization.

Plans call for a point-by-point review of the document and this will be followed by public meetings at which time residents will be briefed on the steps to be taken.

A legislative act would be necessary to adopt the new form of government and town officials hope this can be done in time for the State Legislature session next year.

Nikita Caught In Dilemma

LONDON (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev today appeared caught in a dilemma by the sudden flare-up of hostilities between the United States and North Viet Nam.

On the one hand, he must give support—in words, if not in actions—to North Viet Nam because it is a Communist country under attack.

On the other hand, he cannot condemn the United States too strongly, because that would harm his efforts to ease the cold war.

These considerations are complicated further by Moscow's rivalry with Peking for world Communist leadership.

Cypriots Clash

NICOSIA, Cyprus (UPI)—Greek and Turkish Cypriots, firing bazookas, mortars, machine guns and rifles, clashed today near the Turkish Cypriot fishing village of Mansoura where arms and men allegedly have landed from Turkey.

A cease fire won by Swedish UN troops Wednesday night collapsed when Greek Cypriots fired bazooka shells into the Turkish Cypriot village of Ayos Theodoros.

But further cease fire efforts were continuing, officials said.

Court To Study Release Plea

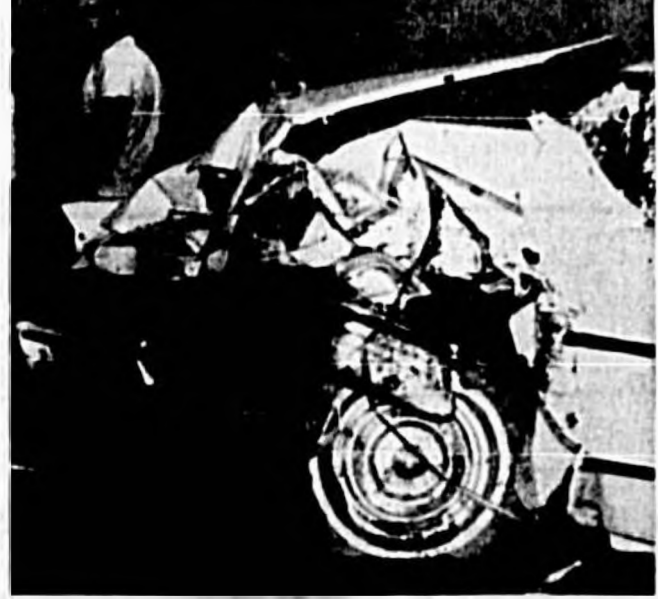
