Doctor-Owned Pharmacies Under Fire

Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., said today that a growing number of doctors now own pharmacles or drug companies, and may turn their patients into "captive consum-

Hart, chairman of the Senate anti-trust and monopoly sub-committee, opened hear ings on doctor-owned pharmacles and doctor-owned drug repackaging and redistributing companies,

In his staetment prepared for the session, Hart said. "certainly when a patient goes to his doctor and is giv en a prescription for a drug in which the doctor has an interest, the patient has no choice but to purchase that trade name drug.

"Also, when a doctor suggests using his pharmacy downstairs - or calls a prescription in to a pharmacy it is likely that the patient seldom protests," he said. Hart said the subcommitte was concerned about the independent druggist who finds his usual prescription business

the physician's financial interest in another company. Hart said to date the sub committee has identified about 100-doctor owned drug companies involving possibly 5,000 doctors.







U. S. Retaliation Tells Reds We Mean Business

**

WASHINGTON (UPI) President Johnson's order for swift military retaliation against Red gunboats and bases in North Viet Nam was designed to prevent further Communist miscalculation about U. S. determination to defend Southeast Asia

Administration officials said today the President's orders to the Seventh Fleet and its air arm were issued with the full realization they might spark armed reaction from Communist China.

But the Chief Executive also recognized that Peking and Hanoi must be left no room for doubt about the peril they risk by further attacks on American naval vessels on the high seas.

Officials said Tuesday's attack by North Vielnamese torpedo boats on U. S. destroyers, the second in three days, made it clear the Communist action was deliberate and not the result of any tactical error on the part of an individual flotilla commander.

There were two possible explanations for the obviously premeditated attacks, according to U. S. officials. They said the attacks could indicate:

-The initial thrust in a broad new campaign of Communist aggression in Southeast Asia in which open military moves would replace the present tactics of subversion and guerrilla warfare, or

-The belief that red gunboats could establish the Gulf of Tonkin as a safe haven or sanctuary from which to attack American and South Vietnamese forces without fear of retaliation.

In either event, President Johnson was said to feel that it was necessary to strike at once, with a limited blow tailored to clip the offense, to convince the Communists of their error on either or both

The President's advisers were unanimous in their agreement on the decision to strike back as soon as daylight permitted at the North Vietnamese torpedo boats and their supporting facilities—the bases from which they came to make their assault on the U. S. destroyers Maddox and C. Turner Joy.

The 16 Republican and Democratic congressional leaders who were called to the White House late Tuesday to hear what the President intended were said to have been unanimous in their approval of the swift move.

Hoover's Birthday

It is not given to many men to enter the ninth decade of life. Even fewer are those who reach that age still capable of purposeful work, who still have goals ahead of them and things they want to accomplish.

Even rarer is the man who can reflect that in his lifetime he has received the highest honors his fellows can accord him.

Rarest of all is the man who can look back with the knowledge that, because he lived, literally tens upon tens of millions of other human beings live.

There is one man, however, who qualifies for each of these categories -Herbert Clark Hoover, 31st president of the United States, now 90 years old.

It was the misfortune of Herbert Hoover to be president on Oct. 29, 1929, when the New York stock market crashed and ushered in the worst depression in history.

Given the simplistic nature of popular politics, it was inevitable that Hoover, who had warned Congress about the dangerous trend of the market, should be held to blame and his party go out of national power for the next 20 years.

But it has been the good fortune of Herbert Hoover to live not 20 but 32 years after those dark days. Now that the events which wrought his downfall have faded into the flat perspective of history, the real achievements of the man stand out in clearer relief.

The young Hoover was the very model of the self-made man, the brainy, pluck-and-luck fellow who makes the world his oyster—the type who, rather than the cowboy, is the real American hero.

Born Aug. 10, 1874, at West Branch, Iowa, Hoover was an orphan at the age of 10. He was later taken to Oregon by an uncle.

Like a proper fictional hero, he worked his way through the new Leland Stanford University in California and in 1897 went to Australia as a mining engineer.

In 1899, still following the script, he married Miss Lou Henry of Monterey, his one and only love affair, and went to China as a mining expert. He manned a machine gun at the siege of Tientsin during the Boxer uprising.

By the age of 30 he was rich. At the outbreak of World War I, he was in London directing 50,000 employes in mining enterprises around the

When the Belgian Relief Commission was formed in 1915, Hoover was appointed its head and is credited with saving the lives of some eight million persons. Called home in 1917 by President Wilson to become U.S. food administrator, he imposed "meatless Tucsdays" and "wheatless Wednesdays" on Americans and made them like it.

Following the war, he fed whole nations, including Russia, spending more than \$600 million with an overhead cost of less than one-half of 1 per cent.

After serving as secretary of commerce under Harding and Coolidge, Hoover entered the White House in a landslide in 1928. He went out under an avalanche in 1932.

For 13 years he was simply an aging ex-president, until President Truman sent him on a tour of a famine-stricken world in 1946. Hoover's administrative genius saved the lives of more millions,

Then, in 1947, Truman put him to work heading a commission on government reorganization, a task which received bipartisan acclaim, even if all Hoover's recommendations were not followed.

Herbert Hoover has written 30 books. His collection of 20th-century documents at Stanford will place historians in his debt for generations to come. He is just completing the fourth and last volume of his "An American Epic," the story of his World War II relief work.

We hope he will pause long enough from his busy day to accept the sincere birthday congratulations of his fellow Americans.



Salinger Named To Fill Engle's **Senate Seat**

(UPI)-Pierre Salinger, press secretary to two presidents. Tuesday was appointed U. S. senator to succeed the late Clair Engle.

Gov. Edmund G. Brown, a Democrat like Salinger, announced the appointment of the 39-year-old Salinger at a news conference here. Engle died last Thursday after a year-long fight against a brain tumor.

Salinger, jovial, cigaramoking former press secretary to the late President John F. Kennedy and President Lyndon B. Johnson, faces a Nov. 3 general election contest for the full six-year term against Republican George Murphy. Salinger is heavily lavored to defeat the former

Murphy served notice he would make the interim appointment an issue in his campaign against Salinger.

Rescuers Reach French Miners

CHAMPAGNOLE, France (UPI)-Rescue workers broke through Tuesday into the cavern where nine cheering, singing miners had been trapped for eight days by a cave-in.

An emergency shaft 260 feet deep reached the minera at 12:55 p. m. (6:55 a. m. EST), eight days and 45 minutes after they were caught underground by the collapse of a limestone mine shaft in Mont Rivel.

The men were expected to be hoisted to the surface in an escape capsule within three hours. They had been in communication with their rescuers over an emergency telephone line for days, and they were in good condition despite the ordeal.

The fate of five others trapped by the same cave-in was uncertain.

The committee voted 10 to 2 to approve a bill by Senate GOP leader Everett Dirksen which would postpone Supreme Court ordered apportionment until state legislatures can have two regular sessions to consider the problem.

RFK Urges Bail Bond Reforms

WASHINGTON (UPI) -Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy Tuesday urged Congress to reform the ball bond system and end checkbook justice.

In testimony prepared for a Senate Judiciary aubcommittee, Kennedy said the rich man and the poor man do not receive equal justice in the courts under the present ball

Ball has become "a vehicle for systematic injustice" because it consigns to prison any one who can not "pay for their freedom," he said.


