## COOLIDGE FOR WORLD COURT BUT OPPOSES BONUS

### WORK STARTED ON MUNICIPAL YACHT BASIN ON LAKE FRONT

#### APPROVES MELLON PLAN FOR TAX REDUCTION AND IS AGAINST THE REVISION PRESENT TARIFF LAWS

##### MESSAGE TO CONGRESS DELIVERED TODAY FOR RESERVATIONS

Suggests Legislative Program Touching Almost Every Aspect of National Life—Is Against Price-Fixing

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—President Coolidge addressed Congress today for the first time since he became chief executive, thus breaking a studied silence he has maintained on public questions since he entered the White House. Mrs. Coolidge sat in executive gallery and was given an ovation from floor and galleries. Senators, Representatives and spectators stood and cheered when the President entered.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—A delegate program touching almost every aspect of national life was presented by President Coolidge today in his first message to Congress.

He endorsed President Harding's proposal for American membership with reservations in the world court; unqualifiedly approved Secretary Mellon's tax reduction plan, and announced his opposition to enactment of soldier's bonus legislation.

He also went on record as favoring stimulated consolidation of railroads, reorganization of the railroad freight structure as applied to farm products, and government assistance in the disposition of exportable wheat. He declared against pricefixing for farm products; against repeal of the rate section of the Transportation Act; and against revision of the tariff law.

Making his first pronouncement on many public questions, the President presented a series of succinct recommendations without attempt at argument. He used exactly nine words in disposing the bonus question. After urging adequate care for disabled former service men and generosity in providing such care, he said, "I do not favor the granting of a bonus."

The treatment of the world court and the Mellon tax plan was almost as brief. In approaching the court problem he noted that American foreign policy always had been guided by the principles of avoidance of permanent political alliances sacrificing independence and of peaceful settlement of international controversies. He called attention that the United States acting on these principles had for nearly twenty-five years been a member of The Hague Tribunal and added that the proposed world court was "a new and somewhat different plan."

"This is not a partisan question," he added. "It should not assume an artificial importance. As I wish to see a court established, and as the proposal presents the only practical plan on which many nations have ever agreed, though it may not meet every desire, I therefore commend it to the favorable consideration of the Senate, with the proposed reservations clearly indicating our refusal to adhere to the League of Nations."

The endorsement of the Mellon plan was presented in the course of a discussion of the fiscal condition of the nation, during which the President called attention that through the budget system and economy in expenditures, the necessities of the government exclusive of the Postoffice Department, had been brought down to \$3,000,000,000.

"It is possible, in consequence, to make a large reduction in the taxes of the people," he continued. "A proposed plan has been presented in detail in a statement by the Secretary Continued on page 8.

The police say that he admitted serving a term in prison for annoying young girls, but denied knowledge of the Borth girl.

#### SEMINOLE COUNTY WILL HAVE FINE EXHIBIT IN N. Y.

At a meeting held last of the agricultural and publicity committee of the chamber of commerce, many plans were made for the Seminole County exhibit at Madison Square Garden in New York in January.

B. F. Whitner, county demonstration agent, will have charge of the exhibit, and at last night's meeting he placed before that body tentative plans. Everything that is produced in this county in agricultural products as well as manufactured goods are to be placed in this exhibit, according to Mr. Whitner. The hearty cooperation of the citizens of this county is urgently requested as the success of the exhibit means the success of the feature as an advertisement for Seminole County.

Space literature is to be printed giving the citrus prospects of Seminole County along with other interesting data relative to agricultural prospects. Another feature is to have leaflets printed containing a number of recipes for the preparation of celery in various forms for serving.

Another plan that has been decided upon is to distribute Seminole County celery and Muscat variety strawberries from the O v i e l o strawberries from the Oviedo section to the visitors at the exhibit. This will be an especially good advertising feature it is believed.

#### OVER 600 HUNTING LICENSES GRANTED

Resident hunting licenses to the number of 600 have been issued for Seminole county by County Judge E. F. Housholder up through yesterday. Besides that number there were issued 60 non-resident licenses to citizens of Florida but from another county and five were issued to residents of other states.

Due to the fact that the season is much shorter than it was last year it is believed that the number of licenses issued this year will be less than last year. The season this year opened on December 1 and will close January 15.

It is interesting to note a connection with the issuance of hunting licenses, that a large amount of the money taken in from this source, goes to the county school fund. Of the \$1.25 charged for resident licenses the fund receives 75 cents; of the \$4 charged of non-resident licenses the school gets \$3 and from the other non-resident licenses the school fund is enriched by \$23 of the \$25 collected.

The price of trapper's licenses are \$1 but as there is no provision by law as to the disposition of it otherwise, it is all turned over to this fund. To date there have been 172 licenses of this kind issued.

Mr. C. C. Cook, of LaBelle, Fla., is reported as the largest apiarist in Florida, operating in the neighborhood of a thousand hives.

#### OSCEOLA ROAD TO BE REPAIRED SOON BY COUNTY BOARD

Two Miles of Road Is To Be Put in Good Condition—Eight Inch Marl Surface Is Ordered.

A most important step was taken by the County Commissioners at their regular monthly meeting held on Monday when they authorized the advertisement for bids for the surfacing of the Osceola road, which for some time has been in an almost impassible condition.

The stretch of road which is to be repaired is about two miles in length. Bids will be opened at the next meeting of the board to be held in January and the advertisement calls for an 8-inch marl surface to be put on the roadbed.

Hon. Forest Lake appeared before the board with a petition signed by the taxpayers of that district asking for aid on this road and he urged that the board immediately take steps to have it put into good repair.

That it will mean much to Sanford is shown by the fact that many people in that vicinity have been going to New Smyrna for their supplies because of the bad condition of the road but when it is put into good shape, this business will come to Sanford.

Other important business taken up by the board was the agreement to issue to the Seaboard Air Line Railroad Company a franchise in perpetuity.

Mrs. Inez Meredith appeared before the board to ask for aid in connection with the road from Forest City to Palm Springs. The matter was referred to C. W. Entaminger.

H. C. DuBose appeared in behalf of Mrs. W. F. Geiger for financial assistance. The board authorized the issuance of a warrant for the sum of \$25 for her aid.

E. L. Kilbee and Mrs. Raulerson asked the board for permission to charge a 50 cent toll over the Titusville ferry and the money that is derived from that source to go to repairing that road which is in bad condition. The board granted them this privilege, the same taking effect yesterday and the road is to be kept in good condition on a 50-50 basis with Volusia county.

Notary public bonds of the following were approved: Virgil L. Smith, R. C. Phillips and Tunis P. Lewis. County depositories for the coming year were named as follows: Seminole County Bank of Sanford, First National Bank of Sanford, People's Bank of Sanford and Bank of Oviedo.

Resolutions were passed that Volusia county is to acquire legal title to the bridge known as Monroe Bridge over the St. Johns river.

A full attendance of the commissioners were present. Those present were: John Meach, chairman, G. L. Hledsoe, C. W. Entaminger, B. F. Wheeler, E. Curlett and E. V. Douglas, deputy clerk.

#### CITY PLANNING TO SPEND LARGE SUM ON DEVELOPMENT OF WATER FRONT AND BUILDING THE PIER

#### MATERIALS BEING ASSEMBLED FOR WORK

Will Greatly Enhance Property Values And Make a Valuable Addition to the Attraction of the City

Work has begun on Sanford's new yacht basin. George L. Alvarez, who is to have the construction in charge, arrived Tuesday and yesterday started preliminary work on the new project. His crew of workmen were busy making forms for the concrete piles to be used in the construction of the extension of Park avenue, into the bay.

As soon as some of the forms are finished and the concrete mixer is placed on the ground, work on pouring the concrete will begin. The concrete piles will be 18x10 inches and will vary from 16 to 20 feet in length.

A shipment of steel arrives today as well as a shipment of cement. Other materials and equipment are in transit, said Mr. Alvarez, and there should be no further delay in the work.

Sanford's new yacht basin when complete will answer a crying need of this city. It will be somewhat like the yacht basin of St. Petersburg but in many respects will have more attractive features.

R. J. Galespie of Jacksonville, represented by Mr. Alvarez, has the contract for the placing of the concrete piling, making the necessary dredging in the basin and filling in of the extension of Park avenue. The amount of this contract is \$44,921. The rest of the work which will run the total cost of approximately \$67,000, will be done by the city in charge of the city engineer and city manager.

Sanford people will watch with interest the progress on its latest progressive step in beautifying its waterfront. When it is completed this city may boast of another big achievement and point with pride to one of the finest yacht basins in the state if not in the South.

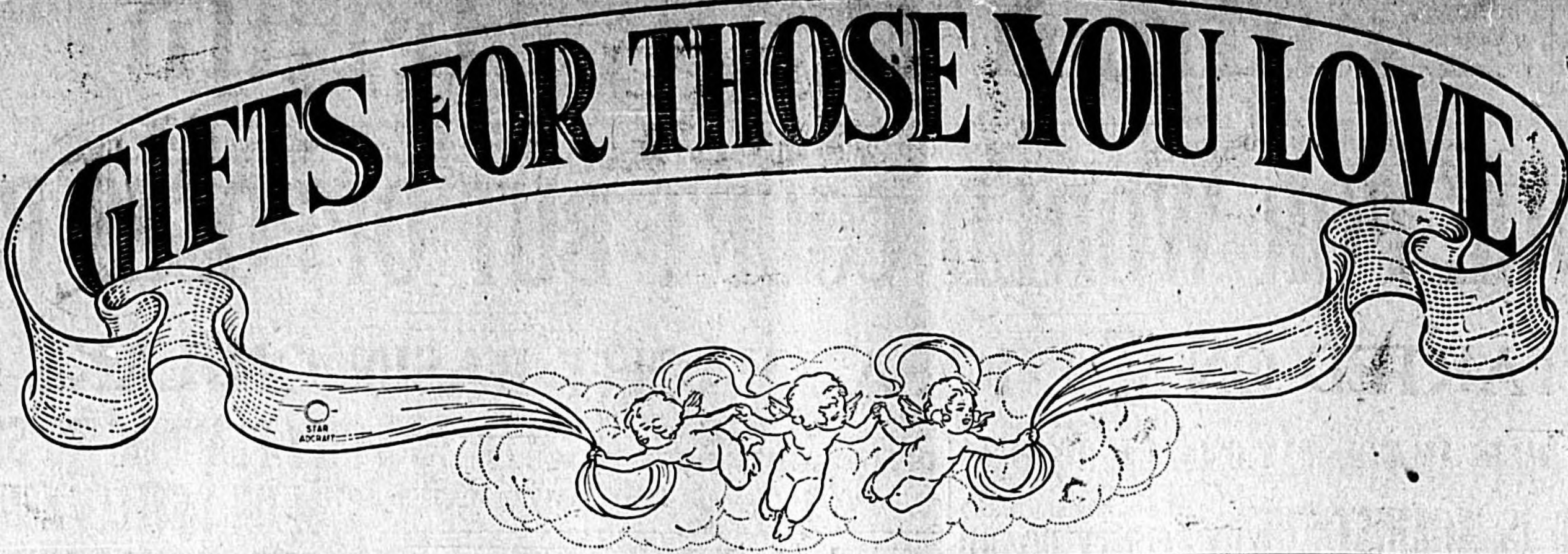

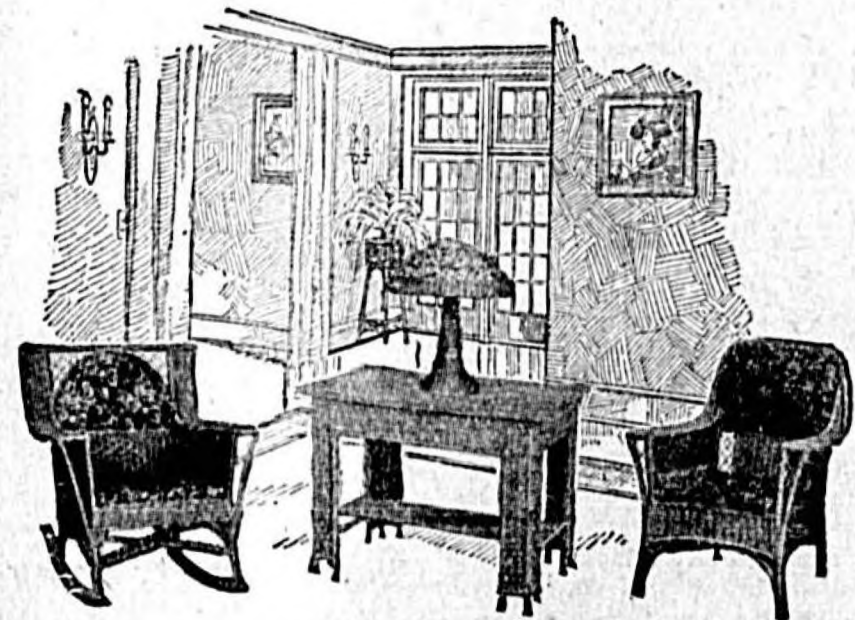

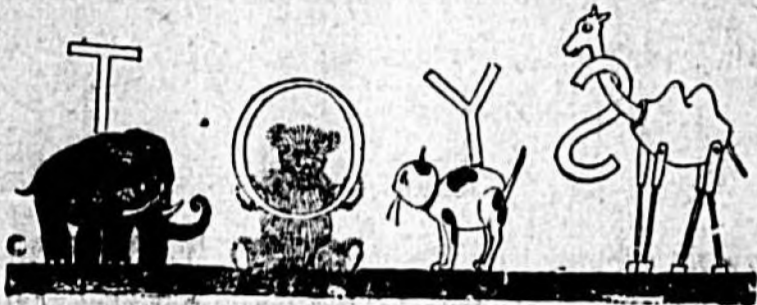

COUNTRY-BRED PRESIDENTS

New York Tribune

Amid the mass of editorial comment on the life and character of Theodore Roosevelt being published at this time is that of the New York Times, which, in connection with a statement that all of the presidents of the United States have been country-bred or natives of smaller towns and cities points to Roosevelt as the one exception.

But Roosevelt is not only the one exception, he is the one exception that "proves the rule" and emphasizes the rule, whatever it is, by being himself a "rural-minded man and an apostle of the outdoor life," although born in New York city, which was then, as now, the metropolis of the country. As the Times says, the only other president born in a city of considerable size was Mr. Taft. The city was Cincinnati, which, contained not more than 150,000 people.

Three presidents were born in towns that had not then grown into cities. The two Adams in Quincy, Mass., and Andrew Johnson, in Raleigh, N. C. All the other presidents were born in villages or small towns or the actual country. Washington was born near Bridges Creek in Virginia; Jackson near Cretton's Pond, N. C.;

Lincoln near Hodgenville, Ky.; Harding near Blooming Grove, Ohio, and Coolidge amid the silences of a granite cradle near the village of Plymouth, Vt. Among those born in villages or small towns were Van Buren in Kinderhook, N. Y.; Grant in Point Pleasant, Ohio, and Cleveland in the Presbyterian manse at Caldwell, N. J.

Many of the presidents were born on the farm, and the fact that all of them, with one exception had a rural environment during their youth, is not to be wondered at because during the first century of our national life the rural community predominated. There were few cities of metropolitan size or pretensions.

This is all changed now and with the great increase of urban communities we may expect a change in the training of our public men. However, changes that are taking place in the distribution of our population have the effect not of further dividing rural and urban people either in the social standards of life or their outlook upon the world, but of reconciling and bringing them together.

A RESOLUTION REQUIRING THE WIDENING, GRADING AND PAVING OF SIXTH STREET FROM MYRTLE AVENUE TO LAUREL AVENUE TO A WIDTH OF 24 FEET INSTEAD OF 16 FEET, AS HERETOFORE AUTHORIZED.

Whereas, heretofore appropriate proceedings have been had providing for the grading and paving of Sixth Street a width of 16 feet from Myrtle Avenue to Laurel Avenue, and,

Whereas, it is now deemed advisable that Sixth Street should be paved to a width of 24 feet from Myrtle Avenue to Laurel Avenue, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Commission of the City of Sanford, Florida deems it advisable as a necessary public improvement, in addition to the improvement by the paving of Sixth Street between Myrtle Avenue and Laurel Avenue to a width of 16 feet, that said pavement should be increased to a width of 24 feet, and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that it is the determination of this Commission that all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon Sixth Street between Myrtle Avenue and Laurel Avenue will be benefited by the improvement provided for by this resolution, and that the special assessments to be made and entered against all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon such contemplated improvement shall be made upon a foot frontage basis. That is to say, that in the preparation of the special assessment roll covering the contemplated improvement, such special assessments shall be determined and prorated according to the foot frontage of the respective properties specially benefited by said improvement, and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Tax Assessor and the City Clerk of the City of Sanford, Florida, in accordance with the provisions of Section 101 and 102 of the Charter
