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

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Convicted arsonist back in jail

Prisoner mistakenly released, awaits

SANFORD - Tensions at the John E. Polk

Correctional Facility eased Thursday night when a haunting week-long mistake was recti-fied.

Sheriff's office deputies arrested Gilberto Roman, 47, at about 6:30 p.m. Thursday at the Lake Kathryn Motel in Longwood. Roman, a convicted arsonist who was awaiting trial



trial for attempted first-degree murder on an attempted first-degree murder charge, was mistakenly released from the jail Feb.

"I can not tell you how good I feel now that he is back in jail," said jail director David Diggs. "Last night was the best sleep I've had in three days."

The error went unnoticed for five days until Orange County paperwork arrived Tuesday at the jail authorizing his transfer to a state prison. Roman was convicted of arson in Orange County after he set his exwife's home on fire in 1999. He was sentenced to approximately three years of prison time. Roman was awaiting a retrial in the Seminole Jail for another 1999 incident where he allegedly tried to run over his ex-wife with a vehicle.

Welcome Home

With a Scrabble board, a deck of UNO cards and other personal belongings, Roman was released from the jail at about 11:30 a.m. last Thursday. Five days later, as

about 10:30 a.m., Roman was leaving the state Department of Motor Vehicles office in Sanford with a brand new drivers license.

Armed with a license photograph that was practically still wet, a special task force of deputies and investigators created a plan of attack and implemented it around noon, said sheriff's office spokesman Steve Olson. The plan included around-the-clock protection of Roman's ex-wife at an undisclosed

"They wanted to go out an work the streets without him knowing he was wanted," Olson said why the sheriff's office wait-

Main Street hosts grand-opening event

SANFORD - More than 200 dignitaries from the Central Florida region gathered in the old Post Office to kick-off a new era for Sanford Main Street Inc.

The event served as the grand opening of Main Street's new offices and a public introduction to the organization's new executive director, Marlene Frith.

Frith likened the event to an oldfashioned barnraiser in her native

state of Western Pennsylvania. "We're here to raise awareness and raise money," Frith told the crowd. "Just like a barnraising, a community comes together to help their neighbors."

That awareness and money will be used to implement the four-point strategy of the national Main Street organization: Design, organize, promote and

attract economic development to the downtown Sanford.

One of 50 such organizations in the state, Sanford Main Street was created to revitalize downtown. Firth said the strategy has a proven track record, evidenced locally in DeLand. She said every dollar raised for Main Street activities returns \$39 to the local community.

Blind man claims self defense in stabbing incident

SANFORD - A blind elderly man almost stabbed another man to death Thursday night at the Outreach Rescue Mission located at 1701 West 13th Street.

Police responded to the mission at approximately 10:30 p.m. to find Brian Stanley, 36, sitting in a chair covered in blood. He was stabbed twice with a kitchen knife. Once in the chest and another time in the back of the head.

Almost an hour beforehand, police responded to the mission in reference to a disturbance. According to the reporting officer, Stanley appeared intoxicated as his eyes were bloodshot and his speech slurred. The mission advised police they just wanted Stanley to go to bed and leave the others alone. The officer reported Stanley went back to bed. Apparently he didn't stay there

long.
In their second visit to the mission, officers followed a blood trail through the mission to find the suspect in the center of the main room, sitting in a brown chair. The suspect admitted to the crime, but stated he was only protecting himself after Stanley threatened to do bodily harm to him, according to the police

report.
"The suspect is alleging he was threatened," said Sanford police spokeswoman Cleo Cohen. "We have the suspect, but no arrest has been made."

Stanley allegedly grabbed the man and that's when the suspect stabbed him with the kitchen knife that he had hidden underneath his pillow. The knife was later found by police wedged between the suspect's chair and

A GLANCE AROUND OUR COUNTY

What a deal: The sale of the six-story building at the corner of 1st Street and Park Avenue, often referred to as the First Union Bank building, has created a buzz among downtown property owners. The upper floors have been vacant for years and the building was on the market for months. Enter Lago Real LLC. The local company purchased the build-ing for \$1.35 million, a bit pricey some thought.

Turns out Lago Real may have got the deal of the century. First Union officials announced last year that the bank would leave downtown Sanford. The bank brass changed their minds after First Union merged with Wachovia. According to whispers heard Around The Clock, the new contract runs 10 years at \$187,000 per year. Even the math-challenged



realize that's a great deal. Throw in some federal tax incentives for restoring the building to National Historic Register standards and that \$1.35 million starts looking pretty cheep.

In the beginning: It wasn't the Seminole **County Commission** or even the city of Sanford that first generated debate about a county conference center. It was the school

board. That's right, the one government entity that hasn't weighed in with its opinion is responsible for eight years of plans, plans and more plans.

Carlton Henley, who wasn't a county commissioner at the time, brought the idea up in 1994 during the public comments section of the commission meeting. He had just come from a school board meeting where it was decided that high school graduations would no longer occur at each school's football stadium. Evidently a less than graceful family member of a graduate had stumbled on the stadium steps and sued the school system.

The board's decision didn't make much sense to Henley (or the general public), especially since the stadiums would still be used for football games and other activities. Henley, a former football coach and retired principal at Lyman High School, blew off a little steam at that 1994 county commission meeting about the ridiculous prospect of Seminole County families having to travel to Orange County to watch their sons and daughters graduate. He suggested the county build a facility large enough so graduates of Seminole County high schools could actually graduate in Seminole County.

Bet Henley never thought that eight years after making the suggestion, it would still be a major issue for the commission (of which he is now a part, having been elected in 1998). As Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide pointed out, though, the conference center is moving at the speed of light compared to the discussions on a new courthouse. It took the commission 12 years before it finally approved the new \$45 million project.

As a side note, Henley's original suggestion to build a facility big enough to hold graduation ceremonies has been nixed. Even Henley admits that to build a center that big would not be cost effective. It comes down to the "Easter Sunday" principle don't construct a building big enough to hold the single largest crowd of the year. Build it slightly bigger than the average attendance, with room to

The old coach would still like to see graduations held in Seminole County. Considering his past success in getting others to take up his cause, perhaps Henley could make a suggestion during public comments at the school board. Domed stadiums, any-



Parenting class deserves support

Teen-pregnancy. Drug abuse. School violence. Declining literacy. Name a social ill that plagues society and you'll discover the root of the problem most often lies in dysfunctional family situations.

How has society addressed the problems? Too often with efforts that treat the symptom rather than the problem. Strict criminal penalties are the solution for the lawand-order crowd. Those programs have their place, as do rehabilitative or social service programs championed by

But what if we get serious and attack the problem before it occurs? What if we provide adults with the skills they need to be parents and children with a stimulating environment that encourages learning and improves socialization?

Such a program exists here in Seminole County, the only one of its kind in Central Florida. Penny O'Connell and Elaine Ray run the Parenting Labs, a comprehensive program that provides parents with a hands-on learning center to improve their child-rearing skills.

Parents can begin soon after their child is born. That may sound early, but child development doesn't wait for mommies and daddies to acquire parenting skills.

"Each period we discuss a different topic: how to discipline your child, how to promote cognitive skills, everything you need to know as a parent," O'Connell said.

Parents aren't the only ones to benefit. Since children accompany their parents to the classes, they participate in the activities, as well. Research has shown that infants who are put in stimulating environments learn quicker and develop social skills earlier.

"From birth to 2 years old is a critical time," Ray said. "Children develop so quickly at that age. The sooner you put them in a stimulating environment, the better off they will be."

The classes meet twice a week for two hours. The sessions are divided into seven six-week periods beginning in August and running through May. Each class period usually begins with a 25 to 30 minute lecture on a specific topic. Expert guest speakers are common. There is plenty of interactivity with parents and children: singing

songs, finger-painting and sharing time.

While the Parenting Labs provide a much needed service to a wide cross-section of the community—from parents who struggle to make ends meet to those who have abundant finances—the program is in jeopardy. Expansion at Seminole Community College will result in the destruction of the portable classrooms used by the Parenting Labs. After April 1, the program will terminate unless another space is found.

It's not as easy as leasing vacate space. While the program's meager \$36,000 annual budget is covered through the \$70 per six weeks tuition, there's no money for rent. Raising tuition is not a viable option because it eliminates parents who already struggle to pay.

Perhaps those politicians who talk about the importance of education can find a way to help this most basic of learning programs. Want to knock out the illiteracy rate? Then fund a program that gives kids a jump on reading skills before they enter kindergarten. Frustrated with child and family services programs that struggle to find solutions to dysfunctional family problems? Then support a program that offers important parenting skills that address problems before they occur.

Good parenting does not guarantee 100 percent success. Humans are fallible. Parents and children sometimes make poor educational and/or life choices despite the best efforts of society. But parents should have the opportunity to learn solid child-rearing skills that give them, and their kids, the best chance for success. The Parenting Labs provide that opportunity, and community leaders would be wise to lend O'Connell and Ray a hand to continue their innovative program.

Afghan claims of civilian deaths deserve investigation

"It is well that war is so terrible lest we should grow too fond of it." - Robert E. Lee, 1862

You cannot qualify war in harsher terms than I will. War is cruelty, and you cannot refine it."— William & Sherman, 18

As the campaigns. against terror began in Afghanistan, Donald Rumsfeld's plainspoken frankness about the essential business of war annihilating the enemy was refreshing. Like Colin Powell a decade earlier, the secretary of defense was boldly on point when • • • • • • speaking about what American bomber pilots and ground com-

al-Qaida and its Taliban defend-But Rumsfeld's highly touted candor has deserted him lately as he has been faced with questions about the possibility — indeed, the likelihood -- that American defense forces mistakenly caused hundreds, possibly thousands, of civilian deaths in Afghanistan.

Even as the Pentagon has reluc-

tantly opened investigations into-

mandos were up to: eliminating

one or two of the incidents, Rumsfeld and other military spokesmen are dismissing most

reports of civilian casualties as anti-U.S. propaganda.

Just last week, a spokesman for U.S. Central Command hewed to the Pentagon line in response to credible reports of civilian deaths, including those of 17 children, in a bombing raid on the village of Thorai on Oct. 21.

We can confirm that the (Taliban command) facility that we struck was the only thing that we hit," the spokesman said.

Yet villagers have given American news organizations a very different account. They described panicked attempts to flee their homes in Thorai --- near the Taliban stronghold of Tirin Kot — as bombs started to fall. They loaded families onto a trailer, hitched it to a tractor and set off in the dark. But they didn't make it very far before a missile hit the front of the trailer, leaving bodies bloodied and torn asunder. Survivors claim 21 civilians were

Then there is the Dec. 20 American air strike on a convoy in the province of Paktia, which killed as many as 60 people. While the Pentagon has insisted that the vehicles were carrying Taliban leaders, survivors say the convoy was headed toward Kabul, taking tribal elders to attend the inauguration of the American-backed interim president, Hamid Karzai. Karzai himself has said the air strike may have killed U.S. allies rather than

enemies. There are other credible reports of bombs gone awry or soldiers mistakenly attacking civilians or allies. William H. Arkin, a former Army intelligence analyst who is a military adviser to Human Rights Watch, told The New York Times that he knows of about 300 reported incidents, and "I'd say about a third involve some civilian casualties that would be

worth taking a second look at." So why is the Pentagon

compromise our war on terrorism or taint our victory over the Taliban. Indeed, it is still true that the vast majority of Afghans are far better off for our efforts: They have been liberated from the vicious yoke of the Taliban, and their country stands to gain a sta-

If the United States is to keep the moral high ground in the war on terrorism, we need to investigate credible reports of civilian deaths caused by our military forces and make the findings public. It is most likely that casualties to civilians or allies were the result of honest mistakes --- errant technology or faulty intelligence. In some cases, for example, it seems likely that American pilots and commandos have been deliberately misled into targeting an anti-Taliban force by a rival anti-Taliban force.

The Pentagon doesn't give Americans enough credit for maturity or realism. We know that innocents are sometimes the casualties of the fog of war. But must those deaths also be shrouded in the miasma of denial and



That is why North Carolina senator John Edwards, a Democrat, whose name recognition barely reaches beyond Chapel Hill and the offices of political consultants and corporate lobbyists, was in New Hampshire earlier this month. Edwards' shiny good looks are not the only reason his name is being spoken of with anticipation in the party; his current anonymity is his strength. Who knows? Edwards is one of at least seven Democrats who are already getting ready for 2004. The others on that list so far would include Al Gore, senators Joe Lieberman of Connecticut, Majority Leader Tom Daschle of South Dakota and John Kerry of Massachusetts, House Minority Leader Richard Gephardt of Missouri and Gov. Grey Davis of California.

The Potomac knows. Hope springs eternal in Democratic breasts that the world will return to normal. That old man politics, he just keeps rolling along.

Fellow senior Eric Horbal, who was one of several students to give Bonjione a rose following the announcement, agreed with Ockeshia.

"She's more than a teacher, she's a friend," Horbal said. "She's always willing to stay after school to help you."

According Seminole County Schools Superintendent Paul Hagerty, Bonjione was selected for Teacher of the Year after each Seminole school nominated one individual as a candidate for the recognition. A selection committee narrowed the candidate list down to 10 teachers and then visited each of their classrooms for evaluation.

Thursday's announcement was a complete surprise to Bonjione, who had tears in her eyes while accepting a balloon and flowers from friends, family and co-workers during the afternoon presentation.

"This was totally unexpected," she said. "I thought the Teacher of the Year had already been selected and it wasn't me.

"I want to thank everyone." she said. "But, most of all the

kids. They are the ones who make this job worthwhile."

Bonjione, a 29-year teaching veteran, has taught English, humanities, art history, advanced placement and International Baccalaureate Baccalaureate courses during her career. Her first 26 years were at Lyman High School and the last four at Seminole High School.

Seminole County School Board member Dede Schaffner was present during Thursday's Teacher of the Year announcement. She was not only at the school representing the Board, but also as a parent of three Seminole students who were taught by Bonjione.

"She is one of those teachers you never forget," Schaffner said. "She is an awesome teacher that has touched so many lives. The school system is lucky to

According to Seminole High School Principal Karen Coleman, Bonjione's dedication to education extends outside the classroom. Four years ago, the teacher organized a school-wide afterschool tutoring program where student and teacher volunteers work two afternoons a week with 30 to 50 students. Under her leadership, the school's National Honor Society has increased from 80 to more than 300 stu-

"She is a superior and exceptional teacher," Coleman said. "She makes her classroom come

"She also reaches out to the entire student body," Coleman said. "She is one of those people who is involved in every facet of our program."

Teacher of the Year is not the first honor bestowed on Bonjione. She was a winner of the Disney Teacherrific Award in 2001 and a Princeton University National Endowment for the Humanities participant in 1992. She has also served as a reader, a judge and a writer for the state and national brain bowl tourna-

Bonjione is also known for encouraging her students to become active within the community. Her students have served breakfast at Orlando's Feed the Soul, donated toys to children in Central Florida Regional Hospital, provided treats to patients/staff in healthcare facilities, sponsored a

"Senior Prom" for residents at a local nursing home and collected support letters for the rescue workers involved in the Sept. 11

Her community efforts have not gone unrecognized by local officials.

"Recently, I had the occasion to talk with Ms. Bonjione," Sanford Police Chief Brian Tooley said. "I was impressed by her commitment to her students and her dedication to teaching. Talking to her, you get the sense that she relishes being a teacher and the love she has for her stu-

Bonjione is now Seminole County's candidate for the state's Teacher of the Year program. And, Principal Coleman, Seminole County's only Florida Teacher of the Year, believes a state evaluation committee will soon be appearing in Sanford.

"The teachers in Seminole are all great teachers," Coleman said. This program selects an outstanding person to represent all those great teachers.

"And, my prediction is we will have a state committee here," she said. "We will have another state Teacher of the Year."

of the mistake. After working through the night, the sheriff's office released the mistake to the public. Additional information and tips became available, and Thursday authorities learned Roman purchased a white Grand marquis from an Orange County used car dealer. Several tips Friday also led deputies to Roman's Longwood motel room and eventually his return to a Seminole jail

The mistaken release was the result of human error, said Diggs.

Seminole Circuit Judge O.H. Eaton Jr. granted a new trial Feb. 1 in Roman's case of attempted murder after witness Jose Guzman refused to testify. Jail officials received paper work from the clerk of the court office, citing the witness for contempt of court for refusing to testify.

Guzman, who was already in the jail on other charges, faced no additional time for the contempt of court charge because of time already served. A jail clerk, however, misinterpreted the informa-tion to be Roman instead of

Jail officials even checked with Orange County before releasing Roman, but they had no further holds on him because he was already sentenced to prison, according to Olson.

"We can learn from this and get better," Diggs said.

Other than internal changes, Diggs said the clerk of the courts office has agreed to make the paper work more clear in the

It's Not the First Time

"In the last three years, we've done that 12 times, but in that time we've released 54,000 without incident," Diggs said.

In 1998, a series of mistaken jail releases triggered changes at the facility. Four new lieutenants were hired to provide 24-hour

supervision at the jail booking office, said Diggs. A four-step process of approving jail releases was also created. It involved a clerk, a quality-assurance civilian, a booking sergeant and then a final check from the lieutenant.

"In this case, all four approved the decision that turned out to be a bad one," Diggs said. "Every time we have one of these things we find something new."

Although the jail's margin of error over the last three years is less than one percent, Diggs said those mistakes are unacceptable. He said an independent study "from outside the system" will help in reevaluating the jail's release process.



Academy. Taught how to be a businessminded person while growing up and as a young man, Wright desired to be an entrepreneur. 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

Hittman said. Before Sept. 11, the most in one day was in 1966 when a building collapsed killing 12 fire-

"Each will be remembered for their sacrifice. Above all else, the fire department is a family," Hittman said. "A family that saves lives at no cost.

"With the loss of 343 firefighters, we take some comfort not a single one died in vain," Hittman

Despite the heavy losses within the ranks, the fire department orchestrated the single most successful rescue mission in history saving more than 20,000 lives, he

Shortly after the twin towers collapsed, casualty estimates for missing firefighters was about

"I think we all knew in our hearts it would be higher," Hittman said. "No one would stay home."

Some fire halls brought both companies because one wouldn't stay back and other firefighters came straight from home, he said. The average response time of the fire department is four minutes. Within 10 minutes five ladder trucks and 14 engines were ready

130

to begin the rescue mission.

What few people know is Mayor Guilliani was only minutes away from being killed," Hittman said. "He left the command center just minutes before it collapsed and killed everyone inside."

The terrorist assault on the 16acre complex resulted in the collapse of 300 floors and seven different buildings. Hittman was in one of those command centers when "arguably the most valuable real estate on the planet was devastated." He has a personal story for that day, but he keeps most of it to himself.

"I don't like to talk about that," Hittman said. "After the first building collapsed it was a free for all." He sought shelter underneath a fire truck and "it's as simple as that," he said.

Many firefighters still bear the pain and anguish of Sept. 11 as today almost 1,000 personnel are on leave or light duty, he said. Replacing lost leaders started as soon as Sept. 16 when 171 people were promoted - five of who were

Over the next several months, the department would hire more than 300 firefighters, train nearly 12,000 and give medical exams to 8,000. In addition to replacing fire-

fighters, the department was also faced with the loss of more than 100 vehicles: 18 engines, 15 ladder trucks, two hazardous materials and two rescue trucks.

Another little known fact, Hittman said was for several days after Sept. 11 a 1,000-mile shoreline of New York and New Jersey had zero fire protection.

To prevent another devastating high-rise collapse, more efforts will have to be made in building codes, Hittman said.

The World Trade Center was totally different in design than other buildings," Hittman sald.

The exterior walls were the load bearers and when the planes took out 5 to 10 floors, it created a "pancake collapse." The lightweight trust construction is "building more with less," he said. He illustrated his point by comparing the concrete to steel ratio in the World Trade Center, which is 40 to 60, to the 60-40 ratio of the Empire State Building.

Despite the great losses, Hittman said firefighters have become an "international symbol of strength and leadership."

You don't have to go to the movies to find a hero or turn on the television," he said. "They're down the road at the firehouse.



"I always wanted to live in an old church, fire house or school," Farrell said.

Farrell has a deeper connection to the firefighters than just her building. Her grandfather was a firefighter with the New York City Fire Department.

I consider this building a gift and part of the city's heritage," Farrell said. "I love having these guys here and listening to all their stories."

The retired firefighters enjoyed seeing their old living quarters. Sharing a meal of chili and rice, the men sat around a table made from baseboards of the original building and remembered their days at the station.

One time we took some roped and tied this one guy to his bed while he slept," Hardy recalled. "then we sounded the alarm. You should have seen him trying to get out of that bed!"

Lt. Ed Brooklyn, who retired in

1986, marveled at how small the building looked after all these

"I don't know how we ever got all our equipment in here," he

"Up here in the dormitory, the walls were paneled, and we had a drop-in ceiling," Brooklyn said looking at the exposed brick walls. "This place has a lot of

Brooklyn also remembers the poles the firefighters used to quickly descend to the first floor whenever the alarm sounded.

"The trick was not to grab the ole with your hands," he said. What you wanted to do was cradle the pole in the crook of your elbow and wrap one leg around it. You didn't burn your hands up that way, and you could also slide down the pole faster."

The poles are no longer in the building, though Farrell has formed the second-floor floor boards so you can still see where the octagon hole was cut. The same shape is recessed into the first floor ceiling.

"I'd love to put the pole back up if someone would tell me where I can find one," Farrell

Retired Chief William C. Gailey served 33 years and 4 months in the department. He was working at the Tip Top gro-cery store on Sanford Avenue and 4th Street before he joined the department. Although he had an offer to manage the store, and later was recruited to sell cars full-time at the Lincoln dealership, he stayed with the department for job security.

"It was my meal ticket," Gailey said. "I knew there was always

going to be a job fighting fires."
While there were plenty of good times to remember, the trip down memory lane wasn't with-

out sadness. Many of the fire-fighters at the luncheon responded to a call at the downtown pet store in 1979 that killed one of their brothers.

"Lt. Price and Ed Brooklyn were working the line when the wall collapsed," Gailey said. "Price was off duty at the time, but he responded anyway. His brother-in-law Joe Morgan owned the pet store."

Brooklyn remembers trying to warn Price of the falling wall.

"We were next to each other, and I just happen to look up as the wall started to collapse," Brooklyn said. "I yelled 'Get out of here!' I turned to run and took a giant step away. The wall came down and hit me on the legs and back. It covered Price up.

Despite his injuries, Brooklyn said he enjoyed serving as a fire-

"We had some good men in the department and it was an honor to be a part of the department," Brooklyn said.

"In six weeks, Main Street has come to a level of recognition that hasn't been accomplished in the 11 years of the organization," said Main Street President Bob Kuhn. "The success of Main Street is so important to the city because we can help accomplish the dreams of the mayor, the city commission and the city manager."

One of Main Street's goals is to complete a market analysis of downtown that will guide the organization as it completes its four-point mission. Frith announced that Robert Prescott, executive director of the Bush **Executive Center at Rollins** College Crummer Graduate School of Business, has greed to partner with Main Street to complete the analysis and provide ongoing technical support.

"It's really a return of Rollins College to Sanford," Frith said, noting that the school was incorporated at the corner of Park Avenue and 1st Street, the heart of downtown Sanford.

Main Street has also formed a partnership with Edward Schons, director of university economic development at the University of Central Florida, Frith said.





"I always had hobbies," he said. "I was a woodworker and collected various things, including clocks and guns.


"But, I decided to quit all that and started painting. My father painted, so I thought I would give

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



Drought and water use in the landscape

Drought can occur in all parts of Florida and usually does at one time or another, and normally, some months are drier than others. Springs for instance, are dry, but other factors besides the weather can influence the amount of water available for landscape use. Increased urbaniza-tion coupled with a limited water supply is pre-disposing much of the

state to a greater chance of water shortages. Because of Florida's sandy soils, plants may experience drought stress after only a few days without rain or irrigation. With limitations on water, we must decide how to best use the ilmited water available for landscape irrigation. The following guidelines are given as suggestions for management practices during drought.

General Practices

Water early in the morning. Less water loss occurs from evaporation and wind drift in the morning because of cooler temperatures and generally less wind. Plants watered early in the morning also have a chance to dry before night fall and will be less susceptible to diseases. Irrigate deeply at long intervals rather than frequent, shallow watering. Deep watering improves drought resistance by promoting deeper, more exten-sive root systems. Depth of watering should be about 12 inches for most landscape plants. One inch of irrigation wets a sandy soil to a depth of

12 inches. Don't fertilize or, if you do, do so with a slow se fertilizer Pertilization

stimulates growth and increases water needs. Avoid unnecessary applications of pesti-cides that require "watering in", instead, use a sprayer to reduce the amount of water

Water Restrictions Ferrer

Remember that water restrictions for central Florida allows residential watering only two days a week, and not between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Odd addresses may water Wednesdays and Saturdays; even addresses or no address on Thursdays and Sundays. New landscapes may be watered on any day between 4 p.m. and 10 a.m. during the first 30 days after planting. Planting new landscaping is discouraged.

Management Practices for Turf

Irrigate turf only after it starts to wilt. Signs of wilting include footprints that remain in the grass long after being made and large proportion of grass leaf blades remain folded over the mid-vein during the hottest hours of the day. Raise the cut-ting height of turf. Although taller grass uses slightly more waster than shorter grass, a higher cutting height promotes deeper rooting and maintains turf quality longer. Mow less frequently. Mowing stresses the grass plant by increasing respiration and reducing root

Although mowing less often, never remove more than 1/3 the length of the blade to prevent too much stress on the grass. Use a sharp blade when mowing. A sharp mower blade produces a cleaner cut that heals more quickly and loses less water than a cut made by a dull hlade

Management Practices For Bedding Plants, Shrubs and Trees

Add mulch to beds to further reduce evaporation from soil and to moderate soil, temperature, reducing stress on roots. Mulch depth should be 3 to 4 inches after setting. If possible don't use overhead sprinklers for shrub and flower beds; hand water, flood irrigate, or use trickle irrigation. Greater water loss can occur with overhead irrigation because of evaporation and wind drift. Irrigate trees and shrubs only after they start to wilt.

Drooping leaves and a change in leaf color can be used to determine when to water the plants. Many trees and shrubs can survive drought without irrigation providing they are well established and were irrigated prior to the drought. Move container plants into shaded areas so their water needs will be reduced.







Sponsored by the Sanford Senior Center, Central Florida Regional Hospital, and the Seminole Towne Center, the goal of the mall-walking program is to help people improve


their physical conditioning without any stressful, high impact aerobic program. Walkers report improvement in sleeping patterns, increased muscle tone and in overall fitness levels.

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
