

### Bill Terry Again Low-Rates Dodgers

NEW YORK, Jan. 29, (AP)—Bill Terry, who has moved out of the membership into the front office of the New York Giants, feels that about the same toward the Brooklyn Dodgers now as he did in 1934 when he asked if they were still in the league.
