

Health Hints

By DR. A. W. WOODALL THE ROLE OF SUNSRINK IN HEALTH

As a rule we most appreciate the things for which we pay. That which is always free we take more or less for granted and fail to realize its true value regardless of how valuable it might be.

This is true of sunshine. Beidee the air we breathe, sunshine is the only health giving, life-sustaining agent that we martals do not have to pay for with either money or work, and we are especially fortunate to be living in Florida where there is an abundance of it.

Most of the health derived from sunshine are due to the ultraviolet rays. They are not heat rays and they constitute only a very small percentage of the rays of the sun, but they produce definite and sometimes striking effects both extremeally and internally. Certain skin diseases, such as acre and ringworm, have yielded to treatment with ultra-violet rays. Some hone diseases, especially rickets and tuberciasio, are amenable through exposure of the surface of the body to ultra-violet rays.

The man who discovered that electricity and magnetism are related Hans Christian Oersted, once said, 'The Universe is a manifestation of an Infinite Reason and the laws of Nature are the thoughts of God,"

From Pythagoras and Euclid to Newton and Einstein, the mathematicians and scientists voyage on enchanted seas to find new jales of wonder. In the microcosm of the atom and in the universal laws of celestial mechanics, they find the poetry of harmony and perfection. They unveil for man the simple and sublime unity of Creation. In the structure of the universe, they discover the divinest poetry-the granduer of the infinite.

By godlike magic given to man, linking the infinistesimal to the infinite, the scientist penetrates the atom and he lassos the flying stars. And in the order beauty and unity of the cosmos, in its sublime and eternal design, he finds Divinity.

The age-old conflict between Science and Religion is being resolved. In the first flush of triumph in the laboratory, the scientists of a century ago allowed pride to get the better of them. Twentieth-century scientists, knowing more, are less dogmatic about spiritual matters and less idolatrous in their regard for the sovereignty of physical law. They are discovering that God's universe contains imponderables beyond the reach of test tubes, formulas, and slide rules.

Science is rooted in a moral order of reality it did not create. Where would science be without the passion of truth and its everyday dedication? Where would it be without the self-denial and splendor interrity of its saints? Whence this spirit of consecration? Whence this pasion and honor and devotion? The scientist is under obligation to a higher loyalty, to something regal in the universe which he did not create but must obey. This spirit comes from something in the soul of men

Science would not have developed as it has in our Western civilization if it had not been for the Judeo-Christian faith which has steeped the minds of scientists with the eternal importance of human enterprise.

For centuries, scientists believed that mutualy nonconvertible; that matter could neither be created nor destroyed. When Einatein set forth his famous conversion formula, he dared to turn his back on three centuries of scientific thinking. Had Einstein's formula remained on paper, the world would have been impressed. But something did happen over Hiroshima. A city was destroyed because a small group of men were willing to proceed on the assumption that E-Mc2, and now we know that matter and energy are convertible.

The matter which disintergrated first privately over the American desert and then publicly over Japan ceased to exist as matter. We can no longer say "I am a materialist," now that we know that nothing is ultimately material. We can no longer deny Creation. 
