





County commission Actions

The threatened flooding of SR 434 by Island Lake south and north was ordered investigated by Commissioner Greg Drummond Tuesday.

Drammond told the board and County Engineer Bill Bush he has received complaints that rising waters in the north section of the lake are bottlenecked. He asked Bush to check the lake levels on both sides of the state highway and the weir and pipe system on the northside, co-ordinating his efforts with the Longwood city engineer.

In other action, the board instructed Bush to release use permits to Altamonte Springs and allow the city to install a 12-inch water main in the Douglas Avenue right-of-way. Permit fees were waived.

Commissioner Dick Williams said the increased water supply will provide better pressure and fire flow for the county areas served by the city system.

Permit conditions are that the city install the pipe on the right-of-way shoulder and keep the pavement unobstructed. Bush was authorized to stop work if the rules are not





Hyacinths Becoming Difficult Problem

Periodically a community is faced with a oblem that, with a relatively small amount of effort on the part of its paid problem-solvers, could be quickly resolved.

Seminole County, particularly Sanford, is plagued by just such a problem. Hyacinths. A pesky water plant is slowly

choking the life from many of the waterways in

this part of the state. The hyacinth is a plant, we are told by classic literature, that sprang up from the blood of the youth Hyacinthus, whom Apollo loved, when Apollo mistakenly hit him with a thrown

Or, if you don't like that version, we are told the hyacinth is a precious stone something like the sapphire, or commonly, a well-known plant of the genus hyacinthus, having spikes of bellshaped white, pink, yellow or purple flowers.

They all add up to one thing - trouble. Take a drive along the Lake Monroe lakefront on any given day. Marvel at the infestation of the hyacinths. Note how adroitly the cane pole anglers and fly rod experts somehow keep their lines from becoming snarled.

Also, stroll along the docks, or through most neighborhoods in Seminole County. Listen to the complaints about how difficult it is for boaters to utilize the waterways.

Seems the hyacinths wreak havoc with propellors, especially on outboards. Several solutions leap to the fore but unfortunately they all cost money.

But isn't that to be expected? After all, for a state that boasts tourism as its first-place industry, it's stupid for us to tolerate for one second longer the damage being done to our waterways, and to our top industry, by those confounded hyacinths.

Hijacked Trucks To Talk Back

WASHINGTON (AP) — In an effort to curb cargo hijackings, federal officials are working on a plan to send out radio signals asking trucks where they are. And the truck will tell

The system, still in the developmental stage, someday could help police quickly recover stolen or hijacked trucks. Hijackings currently account for about 10

per cent of all truck cargo losses—around \$50 million annually, according to figures from the American Trucking Association and the Department of Transportation. The hardest hit area is New York City-Northern New Jer-

No price tag has been put on the Transportation Department's so-called "electronic license plates" as yet, but a spokesman said the department was aiming for a cost below

One system already has been demonstrated at the department's Transportation System

Center in Cambridge, Mass. Another lesssophisticated system also is being considered.

Here's the way the system works: A sending unit mounted in helicopters or light airplanes beams out the call letters of the overdue truck as the aircraft flies over the truck's planned route.

This signal activates a radio receivertransmitter inside the hunted truck, which responds with its identity. The sending unit then calculates the direction of the signal and the distance between the truck and the

The sending unit activates only the receiver-transmitter being hunted, the department said. Units in other trucks ignore the com-



Is Charged With Murder

PITTSBURGH, Pa. (AP) — Deposed United Mine Workers President W.A. "Tony" Boyle was charged with murder today in the killings of UMW insurgent Joseph A. "Jock" Yablonski and Yablonski's wife and daughter.

The charges, outlined in two state warrants, are based on new evidence from William J. Turnblazer, a middle-echelon UMW official who has turned state's evidence and who claims Boyle "initiated and instigated a plan to assassinate and murder" Yablonski, authorities said.

murder charges against Boyle, 71, who rose to power in the UMW under the tutelage of the late John L. Lewis. The second warrant sets forth murder charges against Turnblazer, authorities said.

The state warrants were filed today in Washington, Pa., 20 miles southwest of Pittsburgh, and were expected to coincide with announcement of action in the case by a federal grand jury later in the day.
