The early lack of water in Canada which prompted dire pro-phecies of greatly depleted sup-plies of waterfoul may prove a left handed blessing, according to information from competent logists.

"If there had been heavy rain fall during early Spring, in all probability ducks would have nested in shallow sloughs and potholes which would have dried up during the drought conditions that prevailed in the Prairie per June," biologists point out. "As it was, the birds nested in deeper water : reas with 5 did not dry un 2 and, as a result, are 'sitting pretty'."



### The Hidden Cause Of Accidents

Safety experts have spent years of study in smalyzing the causes of accidents, and police officers and road build-ers have expended much effort in making the highways as fool-proof as possible, but still the accidents occur and still the explanations and advice about avoidance fill the newspapers.

There are many obvious causes for automobile accidents and they have been repeated so many times, they have become monotonous. Too much speed, loo much liquor, failure to heed traffic signals, faulty brakes, blowouts, wet pavements, lack of vision caused by rain or log, all are blamed over and over again for the numerous mis-

haps on our highways.

There is one cause of accidents, however, which we feel is often overlooked by the experts, and which, in our opinion, is more directly responsible for highway tragedies than any other factor, and which, if the truth were known, lies at the root of most accidents usually laid to the more obvious explanations.

We believe the disposition, character, or personality of an individual has a tremendous bearing on whether or not he or she has an accident. We are not unaware of the importance of proper physical co-ordination and sound facullies, but as important as these are, too many accidents are directly traceable to a bad disposition, a brutal character;

Men and women who drive cars in fits of anger, and GOD IN OUR LIVES IS LIKE dates for a first-class wreck. Those, who do not place much in a BOILER, RESIST. lision to prove that someone else is wrong; persons, who won't give an inch because they are selfish, or hog the road and disregard the rights of others for the same reason, are certain, sooner or later, to join that large, but not select, group which has been involved in a traffic mi-

The worst part about this is that there is hardly any way to prove it and certainly it would be a very difficult thing to correct. It is up to the individual citizen to do his own missionary work with himself and to conform his attitude to a standard of decent principle which would eliminate all the accidents needlessly caused by mere cussedness.

### Outside Promoters

It seems to be an unhappy characteristic of most towns to believe that an outsider must be brought in whenever a promotional enterprise is to be undertaken. Very often these outsiders are fly-by-nights and leave the community with no forwarding address after running up hills and in general disappointing the people who hired

The Lakeland Ledger says "this practice is more noticeable during the winter season, when an unusually large number of glib and spurious campaigners come this

way. In some instances the promoter gets as much as 80 percent of the money raised.

"Local citizens do not like to be harrangued by outside promoters, especially those who bring pressure under guise of helping a good cause. Among the most obnoxious are those who use the telephone to sell tickets.


